

#### RHODE ISLAND PLACED UNDER QUARANTINE

Washington, Nov. 8 .- An order quarantining the state of Rhode Island against interstate shipments of live stock was prepared tonight by the department of agriculture for issuance tomorrow. Cases of the foot and mouth disease were reported during the day from the vicinity of Washington, in that state.

Rhode Island will make the eleventh' state to be placed under federal quarantine. Massachusetts. New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Illinois, Maryland, Michigan,

Wisconsin and Iowa are the others. Secretary of Agriculture Houston said tonight this epidemic "exceeded in area affected any of the five previous outbreaks in this country. Unless the infection can be immediately localized and quickly eradicated, he said, it threatens untold losses among live stock.

The secretary issued a statement which said in part:

"The treatment or the killing of a single animal in a herd has been tried in an outbreak and did not prove effective. The remainder of the herd soon became affected and had to be killed.

"Veterinary authorities of the United States are agreed that the only method of combatting the disease is to stop all movement of stock and matter which have been subjected to any danger of infection and to kill off without delay all the truth. herds in which the disease has gained any foothold.



That the said Toyah Valley Irrigation Company thereafter and after its incorporation, by means of a system of diversion dams and canals diverted a large portion of the flow of said Toyah Creek and said springs at points above the lands of plaintiffs and carried and conducted same away from the natural channel thereof for the ostensible purpose of delivering same to the owners of land entitled to share proportionately therein, including plaintiffs, in pursuance of said water right contracts; that shortly thereafter the said irrigation company began delivering water to the lands of the defendants described in paragraph fifth hereof, in fraud of the rights of plaintiffs and other riparian land owners, in violation of its contractual obligations to plaintiffs and said That the defendants hereinafter mentioned own lands situated in other riparian land owners, and in violation of its common law and

That the flow of said Toyah Creek is small in volume and insufficient to supply the needs of plaintiffs and the other land owners riparian to said stream, and the acts of the said defendant company in carrying and conveying same to lands not entitled thereto has greatly injured plaintiffs and their said crops and they have annually suffered damage therefrom and have frequently protested to said irrigation company against its said wrongful acts as aforesaid. Cobe against said company, said Cobe being the real owner and controller of said company, and to prvent plaintiffs from bringing said suit caused a suit to be filed by the said receiver against all the plaintiffs and defendants herein to require them to prove their legal right to vey in Reeves County. Cobe vs. Toyah Valley Irrigation Company on the docket of said court appointed receiver of said Toyah Valley Irrigation Company and has continued to act as such from that time to the present and is continuing the unlawful acts of the said defendant company commenced prior to his appointment in appropriating and converting the waters of said stream and carrying and conveying same away from said stream and away from the original surveys crossed by or abutting on said stream, and is delivering and has delivered said waters and a large portion thereof to the said other named defendants for the purpose of irrigating their said lands hereinabove described located in said original surveys away from and distant from the channel of said stream and not crossed thereby or abutting thereon.

Thirteenth. 
