Sunday's Battle

The reports in the associated dispatches of the battle last Sunday at Ojinaja were not exaggerated, according to many eyewitnesses who went from Marfa

The battle lasted all day, at close quarters. The sortie of General Salazar, with 800 volunteers, was a brilliant one, turning the fortunes of the day and foreing Ortega to retreat to the Concho and later to a point 10 miles

The wounded on both sides were brought over to Presidio to be cared for by the Red Cross and crowded into a small school house and a church which were converted into hospitals. These number several hundred. The latest authentic reports of the casualties place the dead and wounded on both sides at 700.

The Federals captured three field pieces and a number of prisoners, some of whom were immediately executed. The tacties of Ortega, from the time he first commenced his attack, appear to have been to draw the Federal fire and exhaust their reported that the Federal supply is very low, with all avenues of replenishment being cut off. On Monday they succeeded in surprising and capturing three Rebel autos, loaded with ammunition and killing those in charge of

another big battle is hourly expected as Villa has arrived in person to assume command.

A well known traveling man states that when in Jaurez the other day he met Villa who publiely announced that his 'highest ambition is to capture Orozco and Salazar, take them to Jaurez and invite all El Paso over to see that he himself will fire the shots which will end the career of "these traitors to his friend Madero.''
