
How Mangrove "Travels."



No other argument should be necessary in urging that every association be particular in selecting bulls.

Real Value of Bull. All pure-bred bulls are not equally valuable. The daughters of some are inferior to their dams, while the daughters of others greatly excel their dams. The only way one may know the real value of the bull is to compare the production records of his daughters with those of their dams. When he finds that the bull has improved the herd, his search for the bull may end in the stockyard or with the butcher. It is seldom that such a bull is found again. Thus many valuable bulls have been lost and inferior ones used instead. In the bull association this cannot happen, for all the bulls are kept in the association until thoroughly tried. 

BODY FOUND IN THE TRUNK OF OLD TREE

Startling Discovery Made on th Farm of Ed Gleck in LeSueur County (Minnesota)

The LeSueur News tells about startling discovery made recently on the farm of Mr. Edward Gleek o Ottawa township in the woods along the river. LESS HOG-CHOLERA LOSSES

In 1918 Death Rate of Swine From Disease Was Placed at 42.1 Per Thousand.

Prepared by the United States Depart-ment of Agriculture.) Since 1913, when the United States department of agriculture began work to control hog cholera, the dreaded disease has become less and less destrictive each year. A force averaging 165 federal veterinarians has been maintained, working in co-operation with state authorities in charge of quarantine and other regulatory measures necessary for the success of control work. During the fiscal year 1918 more than 5,500,000 hogs were inoculated with hog-cholera serum, and more than 2,200 farms, found to be infected



There Is No Profit in Unhealthy Hogs -Animals Kept Under Clean Conditions, as on Good Pasture, Are Better Able to Resist Cholera and Other

with cholera, were cleaned and disinfected under supervision of the department veterinarians.

Altogether, representatives of the department visited more than 15,000 farms to investigate reported outbreaks, to apply preventive measures and to clean and disinfect premises.
