Mexican outrages upon Americans have become such an old story that even the kidnaping by bandits of Wilsular agent at Puebla, Mexico, did not create any great excitement. To be sure, Senator Meyers (Dem.) of Montara introduced a resolution (S. Res. 220) reciting "that it is the sense of this body that the president of the United States and the secretary of war should at once use all the armed forces and power of the United States to recover and have immediately the said Jenkins alive or his abductors dead."

But other senators calmed him. The resolution induced the state department, however, to serve notice on Carranza that he must ransom Jenkins, even if he had to pay the \$300,-000 (Mexican) demanded by Frederico Cordova, leader of the bandits.

The release of Jenkins was effected by Mestre, his personal attorney, who met the bandits, paid the ransom, got a receipt from Cordova and put Jenkins in a hospital at Puebla.

"Nothing very choice on tap today," said the employment man. "You can handle horses, I suppose?"




