It has reached the point where in a drive of a few miles it is dif ficult to find two filling stations selling it at the same price. Very often there will be a range of from four to x cents in as many miles. And, so far as the regular brands of gasoline go, one is pretty much the same as the other. All cost about the same to produce, with the exception of the "High-Test" and "Anti-Knock" brands put out by a great number of concerns. To Wash Tumblers

Tumblers that have been used for milk, should not be put into hot water until they have been rinsed in cold water. The heat dries the milk and gives cloudy appearance to the glas which cannot be removed.

smooth and tender. Removing Cakes From Pans

Mocha Icing

Lemon Cream Cake

2 level teaspoons of baking powder, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 cup cold water, white of 4 eggs.

Sift flour once, then measure, add baking powder and sift three times: cream butter and sugar thoroughly. add grated rind, then put lemon juice in cup, add water to make cup full, now add flour and juice alternately. beaten whites of 4 eggs. Bake in moderate oven 30 to 35 minuts.

Lemon Cream Filling

Yolks of 4 eggs, juice of 1/2 Lemon, 2 cups confectioners sugar. Put yolks and lemon juice into deep bowl, add sugar gradually, beating all the time. keep adding sugar until just right to spread, beat long and hard and spread over top of cake when cool.

Hot Water Sponge Cake

1 % cups pastry flour, 1/2 cup boiling water, 11/2 teaspoons baking powder. 2 teaspoons extracts, 3 eggs, 1 cup sifted sugar. Sift flour once and measure, add baking powder and sift 3 times, beat yolks until thick and lemon color, beat whites until stiff, put whites in mixing bowl, add yolks to whites then beat in sugar, then fold the flour in lightly, last flavor and hot water, bake in slow oven in an ungreased pan about 40 minutes. Use orange icing

Orange Cream Icing

Juice of 1 orange, fill cup with wavegetables will keep them in fresh color ter, put in small pan, add one-third cup of sugar, bring to a boil and stir spoons of flour stirred together, take from fire and add 1 egg well beaten and 1 teaspoon butter, set back on fire until egg is set.

PETROLEUM HIGHWAY ASSOCIA TION HEAD URGES DEVELOP-MENT OF ROAD

San Angelo, March 8.—Claude C. Wild of San Angelo, president of the Petroleum Highway Association, attended good roads rallies at Rankin, Mc-Camey and Fort Stockton Friday and Saturday where he spoke in behalf of the Petroleum Highway and urged that the counties along the highway southwest from Lubbock cooperate ina road building program that will result in the paving of the highway from San Angelo to Presidio through Irion, Reagan, Upton, Crockett, Pecos, Brewster and Presidio Counties.

Other meetings are to be held in towns along the highway during the next few weeks, and it is the ambition of the president of the Petroleum High way Association to see that the Texas end of the Highway, which runs southwest fro mTulsa through Wichita Falls Cisco and San Angelo, is paved just as soon as possible inorder that a great deal of traffic might be diverted through these counties.

From Tulsa the Petroleum Highway runs through the heart of America to St. Louis and Chicago, and according to Mr. Wild "toucnes the greatest num her of oil fields and serves the wealthiest population of any other road in the

"The Petroleum Highway, when paved, would be fed from the numerous roads running Fast and West, and would be the most liberally patronized of any highway to West Texas. because of its touching the towns in which the Cil Companies, I aving suchpart in the development of the West fexas Oil Fields, have their Organizations.

Mr. Wild believes that when the W Texas end of the Highway hasbeen pay ed, towns along the Route northwest from San Angelo and between here and Tulsa, would lose no time in filling in the unpaved gaps in the Highway.
