Now-a-days people consider it a necessity to carry fire insurance against loss of property by fire, and it is just as essential to take out insurance against a few late frosts in the spring in our orchards and vineyards. EXPRESS COMPANY PROFITS.

In the storm of criticism that for some years has been directed against corporations, the express companies have heretofore managed to escape. Nobody wrote magazine articles about the profits of the express companies. The policy most of them adopted was to declare moderate dividends of from 8 to 10 per cent and carry the remainder of the sum available for distribution to the surplus account. When stockholders complained about to which they believed themselves above 5 or 6 cents. entitled, they were told that the control of dividends rested absolutely they did not like the ways the directors directed, they might elect new ones. This the stockholders could not do, because the ones who objected could never command a majority of

The Wells-Fargo Express company, as a result of this style of business. has just cut one of the juiciest "melons" of which there is any record. As a result of its ability to collect a profit of 58 per cent, the company is shown to have accumulated a surplus of \$24,000,000 on a capital of \$8,000,000, and the directors, having reached the conclusion that it was about time to divide, lately notified the stockholders that they were to receive three times the amount of their original investment, one-third in cash and two-thirds in full-paid stock.

The first conclusion that will be drawn from these figures is that the public was overcharged for the service rendered by the express company. The dividends previously declared on the stock were normal business profits, without this extra melon-cutting. This small fortune came from the pockets of the public, and a comparatively few privileged persons benefit at the expense of the majority.

Such excessive profits give force to the arguments of those who are in the arguments of those who favor a cheap parcel post, and the extension of the rural free delivery system, both of which have been opposed by the express companies, for the reason that such public conveniences would cut down the express business .-Washington Post.


