#### AUTOS BLAMED FOR SCARCITY FARM LABOR

Austin, June 19 .- Automobiles are blamed for the scarcity of farm labor by W. B. Yeary, cotton specialist of the state department of agriculture, who sair:

"In the cities thousands of men formerly employed in productive enterprises or on the farm are employed as chauffeurs or yardmen.

"With prosperity hundreds thousands of automobiles were sold in the South. Farmers who had not been able to own a buggs or a carriage became owners, mainly of the cheaper grades, while many of the city and town people bought the finest made. Automobiles call for garages, sales agencies and gasoline stations, averaging one of these upon nearly every block. They had to be manned. which drew heavily upon productive

Mr. Yeary goes on and to say that these "chauffers and yardmen" earn larger salaries than many farmers, farmers hesitate in paying the price for labor."

NOMINATE NEWSPAPER MAN FOR PREJIDENCY

Was Farmer Boy, Taught School, Printer, Editor and Legislator and U. S. Senator

Warren G. Harding has always been a resident of Ohio, which state he has represented as United States senator since 1914. In private business life he is publisher of the Marion Ohio, Star.

He was born on a farm near the village of Blooming Grove, Mororw county, Ohio, Nov. 2, 1865 the eldest of eight children. His father George T. Harding, was a country doctor whose forebears came from Scotland. Before going to Ohio, the Hardings were residents of Pennsylvania, where some of them were massacred by Indians. Others fought in the Revolutionary war. The mother of Warren, Mrs. Phoebe Dickerson, was descended from an old-time Holland

Dutch family, the Van Kirks.
In his youth Warren Harding lived the life of a farmer boy, attending the villaie school until 14 years age, when he entered Ohio Ceros college of Iberia, from which he graduated. As editor of the coffege paper he first displayed a talent for journalism. He was obliged to stop school now and then and earn the money with which to pursue his college course. At one time he cut corn, at another painted barns and at still another drove a team and helped to grade the roadbed of a new railway. At 17 he taught a district school and played a horn in the village brass band.

At odd times he worked in village printing office, in time becoming an expert typesetter and later a linotype operator. He is a practical pressman and a job printer, and as a "make up man" is said to have few equols. The luck piece he has carried as a senator is the old printer's rule he used when he wos stiick-

In 1884 Dr. Harding moved his farvily to Marion. A short timt af terward the father purchased for Warren Harding the Star, then a mall paper.

On the paper Warren Harding performed every function from devil to managing editor. In all the years the senator has owned it there has never been a strike or a threatened

Senator Harding is closely identid with many other large business nterprises in Marion and other parts the state. He is a director in a ank and several large manufacturg plants and is a trustee of the ity Baptist chdrch.

Mr. Harding has twice represented the Thirteenth senatorial district of Obio in the state legislature and served one term as lieutenant gov-ernor. At the 1914 election Harding ras elected United States senator y a majority of more than 100,000, ning 73,000 ahead of the next ghest on the ticket. In the genate e is a member of the committee on foreign relations. Senator Harding narried Miss Florence Kling in 1891,


