SANTA FE MAKES CHANGES DUE TO DEATH OF SEARS

F. L. Myers of Las Vegas Made Assistant General Manager

A number of changes in officials on Western lines of the Santa Fe railroad announced yesterday by R. J. Parker, general manager, to be effective June 26. The changes are due to the vacancy caused by the death of T. H. Sears a week ago.

The positions of general superintendent of the northern and southern districts with headquarters at La Junta, Colo., and Amarillo, are abolished. The title in the future will be assistant general manager. C. H. Myers, promoted.

Bristol will be assistant general manager of the northern district with office at La Junta. He has been general superintendent. Had Mr. Sears lived he would have been assistant general manager of the southern district.

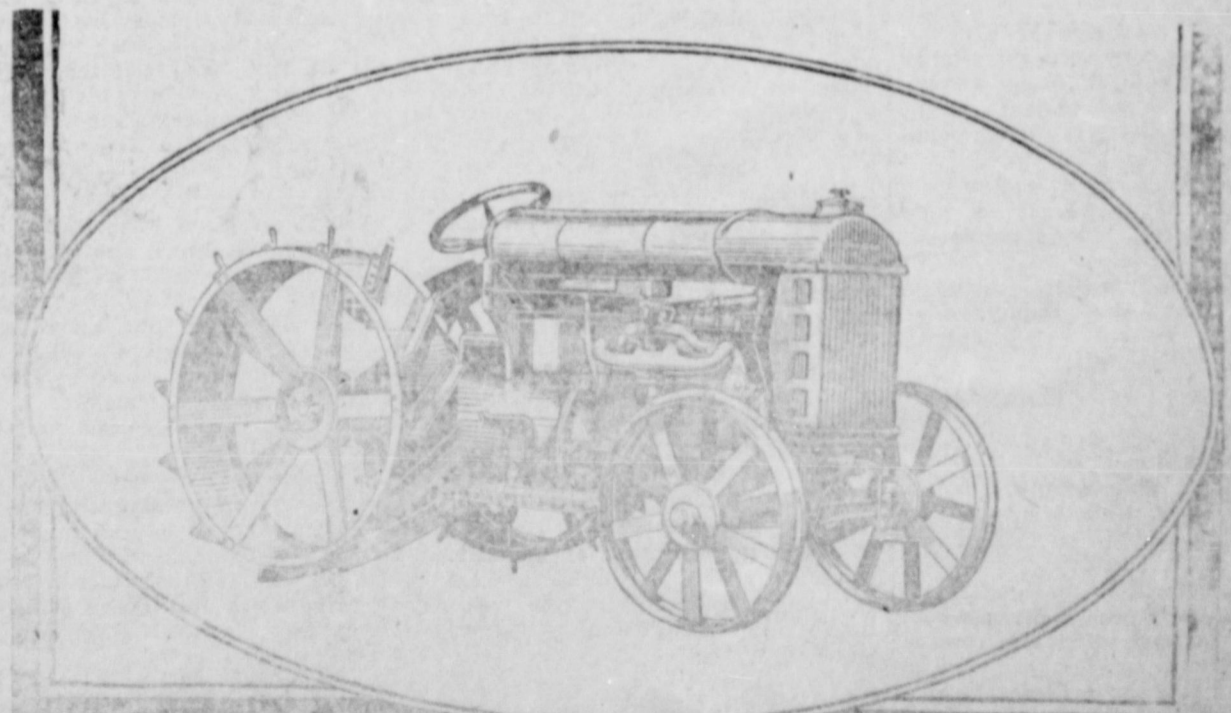
