# Why \$100,000.00 Bond Issue for Plainview?

FIRST. To pay for the new sewerage plant, and line and right-of-way, also plant site.

SECOND. The city issued warrants for necessary funds, and contracted sale of same, but bonding broker forfeited contract on account of bad bond market.

THIRD. The bond market is still unsettled, but there is a better market for bonds than warrants, so we thought it better to save the city money by asking the people to vote bonds to care for the plant and pipe line, which the city was forced to build.

**FOURTH.** The aldermen of the city of Plainview have already signed notes personally to amount of \$30,000 to care for the work as it progressed, besides using all of the available funds of the city to help carry on the work.

FIFTH. Since the tax rate for this year has already been set and the bond issue will not increase the taxes for this year, we, the aldermen for the city of Plainview, believe such a bond issue to be a wise solution of existing conditions.

Business House Gets Along Without Money

A large business house having head quarters in Rochester City, has undertaken to conduct its affairs entirely without the use of money. Instead of currency it intends to use checks, trade acceptances and travel checks to make payments of every kind, including its payroll. As the concern deals with more than 800,000 individual customers the results of the experiment is

watched with interest. The company's reason for adopting this method is given as an effort to demonstrate a means of ending the epidemic of payroll robberies and "to show that modern business may be conducted efficiently without the use of 'small change,' thus leaving the nation's money where it belongs, in the banks, to serve as the basis of credit."

The announcement says even car fares, hotel bills and railroad fares for the company's force of several hundred salesmen, and other sundries are to be paid by checks. All oetty items, even to one-cent postage stamps will be pard hence forth by checks and "no currency of any amount or deonmination is to be carried in any form as company property."

To meet the payroll of the factory the company has offered to employees either a regular pay check or the option or receiving on pay day a deposit 1 pound each, raising currents and slip showing that his carnings for the week have been deposited to his credit in a local bank.
