FATHER ARRESTED CHARGED WITH STATUTORY OFFENSE

CASE WILL LIKELY BE TRIED IN TULIA WEEK AFTER NEXT

William H. Mellus was arrested on Wednesday night on a charge of incest, his twelve year old daughter being the alleged victim. He was put in jail and since then an examining trial has been held. As this is a capital offense, provision is made that the case be taken before the first term of any district court held in the district, hence he will likely be taken to Tula, where the grand jury is in session, and trial will be held week after next. Mellus, and his wife and children came to Plainview about two years ago from New Mexico, and they live in one of the small houses along the railroad in the eastern part of town. Mellus has been employed for several weeks as delivery driver for the Donohoe-Ware Hardware Co.

Lemons of the Berres community, in the southeast part of the county, died Sunday afternoon of heart failure, and was interred in New Hope cemetery Tuesday afternoon in the presence of many sorrowing friends. Mrs. Lemons was born in Tennessee July 25, 1848, and was married in Cooke county, Texas, Aug. 5, 1868, to W. R. Lemons. She and her husband have lived happily together more than 52 years in the same community in which she died. They had six children three boys and three girls, who lived to be grown and settled.

Mrs. Lemons was a very devoted wife and mother, also a very devoted Christian, she had for many years been a member of the Baptist church at Burns.

She leaves her husband and five children, as follows, to mourn her loss:

200 Warships Are Built

Washington, Dec. 8.—Nearly 200 warships, including ten superdreadnaught and ninety-six destroyers, were completed for the American navy during the fiscal year ended last June 30 and more than 100 others, including eleven superdreadnaughts and six great battle cruisers, were building at that time.

This is shown in the annual report of Rear Admiral David W. Taylor, chief of the Bureau of Construction and Repair, to Secretary Daniels.

WRIT OF ERROR GRANTED IN CITY CHARTER CASE

SUPREME COURT WILL CONSIDER THE VALIDITY OF THE CHARTER

The state supreme court on Wednesday granted a writ of error in the case of the State of Texas et al vs. Chas. F. Vincent et al.

This means that the supreme court commission has examined the briefs of the contending attorneys and finds that it is likely the charter is valid, hence has ordered it argued before the supreme court.

This is the case filed two years ago by the county attorney upon application of certain citizens and is an attack upon the constitutionality of the city charter of Plainview granted by the legislature in the spring of 1917. The court of civil appeals in Amarillo held more than a year ago that the charter was invalid. Last February a commission of fifteen citizens was elected and drew up another charter, which was adopted in an election held in March by a vote of the people, and the city is now operating under this charter.

CLOTHING TO BE SENT TO BALKAN CHILDREN

Hale County Chapter Red Cross Will Collect Ten Garments—Suffering Great

Texas chapters and members of the American Red Cross have been called upon to make and ship at the earliest possible moment several thousand garments for destitute and suffering children of Roumania, Poland, and other of the small Balkan nations to meet and alleviate the most desperate condition in child life since the close of the war, according to the announcement received by Mrs. J. A. Ferguson, President of the Hale county chapter. Each one of the eighty-six chapters in the state has had assigned to it a definite quota of garments, the amount of which is based on the population fixed at 10 garments.

Grim evidence of the toll taken in child life of these stricken countries is contained in the call for garments, which states that the rigors of the past three winters have killed so many of the younger children that there is little need of clothes for children under the age of 12 years. Most of the garments asked for will be made for those between 12 and 14 years.

HIGH COST OF LIVING IS GETTING KNOCKED OUT

DRY GOODS, GROCERIES AND MOST EVERYTHING IS SLUMPING

The high cost of living is getting it in the neck in earnest these days. Dry goods, groceries, automobiles, lumber, clothing and most everything else has come down in price from 10 to 60 per cent.

The local merchants have been advertising heavy cuts in dry goods and clothing for several weeks, and this week the groceryman are advertising reductions of from 25 to 60 per cent. Baker's bread has dropped from 12 1-2c to 10c a loaf and the weight increased. Lumber has dropped 15 to 50 per cent, and brick is on the slide, too.

The reductions are such as to take care of the larger reductions in the prices of farm products, and makes it close to the farmers lighter.

Considering everything there is no need to be blue about conditions in this section. Let's everybody keep optimistic, go about our business as usual, get into the happy Christmas shopping at once, and things will come out alright.

To Cut Cotton Crops Half

A large meeting of Southern farmers, bankers, merchants and others was held in Memphis, Tenn., this week and a movement begun to reduce the cotton production in 1921 one-half by reducing the acreage to one-third of what it was this year.

Secretary of the Treasury Houston has asked congress to increase taxation two billion dollars a year, by increasing the rate on small incomes, and heavier charges on amusements, tobacco, candy and toilet articles, putting a tax of 2c a gallon on gasoline and 50c a horsepower on automobiles and adding to corporation taxes. We do not know whether the government needs this additional income; maybe it does in order to pay off the war indebtedness. It seems that a better plan would be to cut expense, to the red and save two billions a year. The government has thousands of expenses which could and should be eliminated.

Reports show that 1,142 bandits have been killed in Haiti since the U. S. Marines begun their intensive campaign to destroy the bandits on the island. If that many bandits and robbers could be killed in the United States the country would be better off.

With farm products selling lower than cost of production, merchants reducing their prices below cost, and with wages in many lines coming down, now is no time to permit express lines, railroads or telephons or any other public utility companies to charge more.

BOYS' BAND WILL BE GIVING CONCERTS WITHIN MONTH.

"Plainview boys have an exceptional opportunity to become musicians," says Band Instructor G. A. Wright. He states that they don't know what they are missing when they fail to take advantage of the opportunity to get a musical education at the expense of the Chamber of Commerce. According to Mr. Wright, quite different circumstances existed during his boyhood, when he started his musical training.

An account of his training follows: At the age of eight he was living in California, the son of poor parents, who were unable to buy him an instrument. He determined to have a cornet, so he began to deliver milk at one dollar per week in a small town in the upper part of California, with which money he purchased his first horn. There being twelve other children in the family to support, they were unable to give him any lessons at the time he purchased his instrument. At the age of nine, however, he was able to take a few lessons under the instructions of a famous German musician who had graduated from a large conservatory in Germany and had come to America to teach. In this way he learned the rudiments of music.

At the age of ten he ran away from home, traveling about three hundred miles, stopping in the lower part of California. He stepped from the train with only sixty-five cents in his pocket. Immediately he secured a job herding sheep. His duties connected with this new job took him about seventy-five miles from any town, where he seldom saw any person. In the day time he herded about two thousand sheep, and at night he would practice on his cornet. He held this job for two years, and at wages of fifteen dollars per month he saved enough to enter school in The Western School of Music, at San Francisco. His means played out before the three years necessary for graduation were completed, and he then worked his way doing janitor work within the institution. He had offered to quit school, but received encouragement from his professors, who gave him this employment.

Soon after graduating he secured a job as director of a band of thirty-five boys in Selma, California. He directed this band for seven years, which later became the band that was considered the best in the western part of the United States. From the band there developed eight band directors and ten soloists.

Later he became director of a Swedish band of thirty members at Kingsburgh, California. This band also made wonderful developments. He also became instructor of the Diamond Military Band at Black Diamond, California; also of the Rasin Military Band at Rasin City, California. All of the above bands were organized and trained by him, until they became educated musically. During his musical work he has been instructor of many other bands, but they were not organized and trained by him.

Before coming to Plainview he was instructor of a girls' and boys' band in Greybull, Wyoming. After coming to Plainview, the Chamber of Com-

merce was desirous of having a band in town, and learning of Mr. Wright's experience, they immediately secured him to direct both boys' and men's bands. At present he states that the boys' band is showing the best developments, due to their untiring efforts. They practice nearly every night of the week for an hour and a half. He states that the Texas boys, according to his experience, have more pep than any other boys he ever trained. He states that any night that he asks the boys to practice the entire membership of thirty is present at the time to start practicing. He is well pleased with their work, but states that since such uncommon opportunities are offered them, there should be sixty boys instead of thirty. The men's band is doing fine, according to Mr. Wright, but they are not as regular in their attendance as the boys. During their training they practiced in the Scout Hall, but since they have learned to play some they are now practicing in the Chamber of Commerce building.

He states that by the fifteenth of January he will have the boys playing on the streets of the town. Also that they will be able to render first-class programs by the time the town starts on their trade excursion in the spring, as well as to render concerts through the summer.

libraries of the State. There are a thousand or more books on the shelves, but some of these books are never taken out; if they are, they are put back as quickly as they can be put there. Not that these books are immoral or even trashy, but that they are so deadly dull, so uninteresting, that an opiate is nothing compared to them. Most of these little-to-be-desired books are fiction of the latest type, but fiction that appeals to the few.

And now to get back to the text of this little homily. Complaint is made by some of the patrons of the library that the books are not selected for the masses, but for two or three who like the unusual in literature and who forget that there are hundreds who do not.

Fiction, clean, wholesome fiction, appeals to everyone. It is a harmless recreation for the mentally tired and a solace for the lonely. The masses should be considered in the selection of books. Therefore, the whole library board should assist in making out an order for new books, and not leave it to two or three.

The board has its troubles. Some of the best and most readable books on the shelves have been taken out

and never put back. They are loaned by the subscriber to first one and then another until all trace of them is lost, and those who have library cards are deprived of reading the books they have helped to buy. Books cost money, and...
