Evening News' Washington letter.

Washington, May 18, 1900.

The troubles of the Administration are rapidly increasing. The deeper the Cuban stealing is probed, the worse it gets, and it is now believed that a conspiracy existed to loose the Cuban revenues and that it included officials in Washington as well as in Cuba. In addition to that worry, the enthusiastic reception of the Boer Peace Envoys in New York and Washington, indicating deep public sympathy for the two little republics which are fighting so bravely for existence, has caused Mr. McKinley to loose sleep trying to think up some way to jolly the envoys without offending his silent partner—the British Premier.

How the Cuban scandal stands may be judged by the following extract from a speech made by Senator Bacon, in favor of his resolution for a Congressional investigation of all receipts and expenditures in Cuba since it passed under American control: "Within the past week the fact has been disclosed—a fact that brings the blush of shame to every American citizen—that trusted officials in Cuba have misappropriated large amounts belonging to the people of Cuba. Nobody knows how large these amounts are. At first it was stated they were \$30,000; next it was said they would amount to \$75,000, and now it is estimated the amounts may aggregate \$400,000. At first only one man was involved in the difficulty. Now there are many—so many that it is estimated it may amount to a conspiracy."

### LETTE FROM THE PHILIPPINES.

Mrs. R. R. Cone of this city received a letter yesterday from her son, J. T. Pitt, who is a member of 36th U. S. volunteers, and been in the service more than a year. The letter, in part is as follows:

Seal, P. I., April 5, 1900.

Dear mother: I hasten to drop you a few lines to relieve your anxiety. You cannot understand how things are here. There is little more danger here than in the states, and I think I will get back all right.

The news of the movements of the 36th infantry into which I enlisted just ten months ago tomorrow and got my discharge from the Idaho is in short as follows. After re-enlisting we staid in town for a few days and then were ordered to the front and sent to San Fernando on the R. R., a distance of about 80 miles and at that place we stayed for 6 days and a move was made, and we were in it and in it to stay. We went to a town called Bacalora, 4 miles from San Fernando and held an engage-

ment with the enemy, and continued our march to Deloras and back to Sanantonio, where we remaining eleven days had to whip the insurgents which numbered 200, and we had a hard fight. There were two officers with us and both were wounded and one died from his wound. After we had run the insurgents out, we went back and picked up our dead and wounded and went to a church and sent two mounted men for re-inforcement. They came just as the enemy was coming back, and we had a second scrap with them without losing any more of our men. Well, the rest of the night was spent dressing our wounded. Then there was nothing to do 30 or 40 days; at the end of that time was a general move and that was the close of the fight. Coming to a close we are 150 miles from Manilla and are on the sea coast. There is nothing to do here, and I think inside of 8 months we will be out of the service and go to the U. S.

Well I will close for this time, hoping to hear from you soon.

### Land Monopoly.

In substituting for the existing multiplicity of taxes, levied primarily for the support of the government, a single tax on natural advantages, we give a death blow to the greatest of all governmental favors—the real mother of the trusts—land monopoly.

For the reason that land bears little burden it can easily be monopolized, and that the monopoly is growing closer and closer is shown in the fact that in a condition where the people of the United States at the beginning of this century were almost all land owners, not one fifth of the bread winners of to-day own land. The percentage of landowners is smaller in Philadelphia, "the City of homes", while in New York City not 6 per cent. of the inhabitants own land. The showing is worse in the British Isles where the tendencies have had a longer time to work, 150 persons owning one half the area of England and 35 persons more than one-half the area of Ireland.

What should we do to bring about these suggested changes which we conceive to make for the higher civilization? We should clearly express the wrong we are trying to right and throw our influence with the political party that tends in that direction. Our end will not be reached at once by any sudden change. It will come gradually, by abolishing one by one these governmental favors and establishing the natural order.

While we have been discussing only trusts, the remedies here suggested will solve the labor problem as well, for it is governmental favors such as we have seen that force men into an unnatural competition with each other for the opportunity to employ themselves; whereas the opening up of nature's store house to laborers will so multiply opportunities that wages will naturally rise. For just in proportion as monopoly takes less of the product of labor the product of labor, there will be more to divide as interests to capital and as wages to labor. The demand of privilege work against men in two ways. They create conditions in which production is lessened, and of smaller production they take a constantly increasing share. Do you then wonder that we of the natural order see in the evils of trusts conditions that in good times force willing men into idleness, in bad times cause the strikes, the lockout and the army of unemployed, and at all times work to produce the pauper and the tramp?—National Single Taxer.
