**Mr. Stilwell's Road.**

It looks as if Stilwell's transcontinental Orient dream is a success, and Stilwell's persistency and wonderful resourcefulness are certainly entitled to success. About the only mistake Mr. Stilwell has made was his failure to have the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient line to touch at El Paso. Still, if the enterprise goes through as now planned the Rio Grande, Sierra Madre & Pacific will undoubtedly tap it near Guerrero and give this city the benefit of the Orient system in Mexico.

The Topeka Capital says Mr. Stilwell's Orient road is a phenomenal proposition in railroad building. It is the design to have the people of the west build and own this line. Many transcontinental railroads have been built in the west, but none by the west. Wall street or Europe has built them and has fixed the rates and pocketed the profits of construction.

If Mr. Stilwell carries out his plan, and he bids fair to do so, he will prove to the world that the west has reached the point in its development where it can construct its own railroads. It will be a western declaration of independence and it will make a powerful impression upon the class of capitalists who up to this time have completely dominated the railroad situation. His road, moreover, will be 500 miles shorter to the Pacific than any other and will go through a region of unsurpassed productiveness. At the longitude where present Pacific roads enter the western desert, the Orient will reach the sea.

It avoids the mountain ranges in this country and consequently the costly steep grades and tortuous windings and curvatures necessary to scaling the "backbone of the continent." From several points of view the Orient road was a brilliant and inspiring conception. The project is entitled to the warm sympathy of western people. Railroad managers and superintendents who a year ago scoffed at it are now numbered among its stockholders and well wishers. The road will be built, and when it is built it will be a western road in ownership as well as in location, and it will be a factor in the western rate situation to be reckoned with.—El Paso Times.

### Orient Asks An Extension.

First Vice President R. L. McCaulley of the Panhandle & Gulf Railway Co., the Texas corporation of the Orient, arrived in San Angelo Monday afternoon from Sweetwater, accompanied by J. R. Daugherty, a prominent stockman of Nolan county, and one of the directors of the P. & G. They came to interview the San Angelo railroad committee with regard to securing an extension of eighteen months of the contract between this town and the railroad company.

Tuesday afternoon a meeting was held in the directors' room of the San Angelo National Bank there being present in addition to

the following members of the local committee: Messrs. Geo. J. Bird, F. E. Allen, Dr. C. E. May, C. W. Hobbs, J. C. Laadon, M. L. Merz, U. G. Taylor and A. J. Baker; the committee members absent being Messrs. J. A. March, J. W. Hill, C. H. Powell and W. A. Guhrle.

Mr. McCaulley stated the wishes of the company, asking of San Angelo an extension of eighteen months from date of expiration of the contract between the citizens' railway committee and the Orient company. This contract expires in November next, and Mr. McCaulley stated that the railroad people found themselves unable to complete the line to this point by that time. He gave good reasons for this inability, showing that in formulating this contract the strength of the opposition to be met from other roads and interests had been decidedly underestimated. This opposition, however, has been finally overcome, and there are now no further obstacles of this character in the way of the enterprise. Mr. McCaulley stated that he did not believe the entire eighteen months asked for would be required by his company, but they thought it best to secure ample time, in order to avoid possible danger of being compelled to return here with a similar request at a later date. Steel is now en route to Sweetwater, and the work of tracklaying will begin at that point as soon as it arrives. When the line is completed between Sweetwater and Red River, all efforts will be concentrated upon the division between Sweetwater and San Angelo.

The committee members present at the meeting were unanimously favorable to the proposition, but it was deemed best to postpone any action until the fall board could be gotten together, when the matter will be discussed and probably submitted to the subscribers to the bonus fund, from whom, of course, the final decision must come.

One thing is absolutely certain; the road is as valuable to the town and its property owners, and will still be so eighteen months from

the expiration of the present contract, as when that contract was written and accepted. Mr. McCaulley, for the P. & G. Railway company, simply asks this extension as a favor.

Messrs. McCaulley and Daugherty left overland for Sweetwater Wednesday morning—San Angelo Standard, 25th inst.
