Do we need a system of water works? Ask yourself the question and see what the answer will be. We say yes. We consider this one of the "burning" needs of the day. It is one of the important necessities to make up "Greater" Sweetwater. Now, what is to hinder Sweetwater from having a first class water works system and an enthusiastic volunteer fire company. She has a large lake of everlasting water within easy reach of her, and we see no reason that water could not be successfully piped to town and in that way furnish the entire town with an inexhaustible supply of good water. Of course this will require considerable money but at the same time, it would very soon pay for itself in the different ways that it would benefit the town—that it would be a convenience is unquestionable, and it would also be a great thing financially to every individual in Sweetwater, who owns property here inasmuch as fire protection saves many dollars a year on insurance—the difference in the rate of insurance. Why could not the Sweetwater Commercial Club, which is composed of the very best men in the city, take hold of this enterprise at their next meeting and at least get the opinion of the members of the club. Suppose you do that, and thereby get one of the most important needs of the city before the people in the proper light. There can be no harm done by suggesting the matter, and probably some party with means will become interested

in the scheme and bring the matter into a brilliant reality.

**Prominent Ranchman Shot.**  
 News reached this city early this week, through the columns of the local papers published in Colorado, that U. D. Wulfjen, the eldest son of J. D. Wulfjen, a prominent stockman and banker, of Colorado had accidentally shot himself while on the Wulfjen ranch 14 miles south of Colorado last Saturday morning. The News of that city says concerning the accident, "Early Saturday morning while removing a shot gun from a closet the weapon was discharged striking Mr. Wulfjen in the left arm just below the shoulder, shattering the bone, which the physicians found necessary to remove from the shoulder joint to some four inches below, though as the larger blood vessels are intact the arm was not amputated, hoping if possible to save it."  
 The injured man is in the prime of life and is well and favorably known to quite a number of our people, who will learn of his misfortune with genuine regret.


