Greece and Bulgaria are locked in combat today near the rim of Macedonia and reports out of the Balkans indicate that numerous casualties have already occured. A Sofia dispatch recounts that the Bulgarian Cabinet is called to meet tonight to decide whether or not Bulgaria should declare war on Greece.

In the meantime diplomats at Sofia and Athens are frantically trying to stem the war spirit. Neither nation has even answered the others sharp demands arising from what the Greeks call the Bulgarian invasion of Macedonia and the Bulgarians call the Greek invasion of their territory.




