COUNTY VS. STATE

What seems to indicate at least some individual counties can beat the State Highway Department in obtaining satisfactory road construction at a minimum price is contained in a press dispatch concerning an interview with Joe Burkett at San Angelo this week. Comparison of figures at least show that Nolan county's road surfacing contract is much more desirable than contracts let by the State Highway Department recently.

According to statements attributed to Burkett in the dispatch, surfacing contracts were let to the American Road Co., the firm that is now involved in the Austin investigation, and to the Hoffman Construction Co., for a total of 1,300 miles at a cost of 30 cents per square yard. The Highway Commission, in the contracts, was promised "a second asphalt topping of roads if the first proved unsatisfactory" and any "necessary repairs."

Road men and highway engineers state, and it is generally known, according to county officials, that the surfacing contracts call for 1 1/2 gallon of asphalt per square yard, covered over with chats (fine screenings). This is what the State is said to have paid 30 cents per yard for.

On the surfacing project on Highway No. 70, south from Sweetwater, contracted to C. O'Neal Co. by the Nolan County Commissioners Court, the bid was 24 cents per cubic yard, or 6 cents per yard lower than the contracts let by the state. The specifications, in addition, call for eight-tenths of a gallon of asphalt to the square or nearly twice as thick as the state's specifications. It also calls for the topping of chats as does the state's, but in addition, the 24 cents per square yard pays for a one-inch base of hard stone which the state's contract of 30 cents per square yard fails to receive. And in the county's contract, the bidder furnished all labor and material.

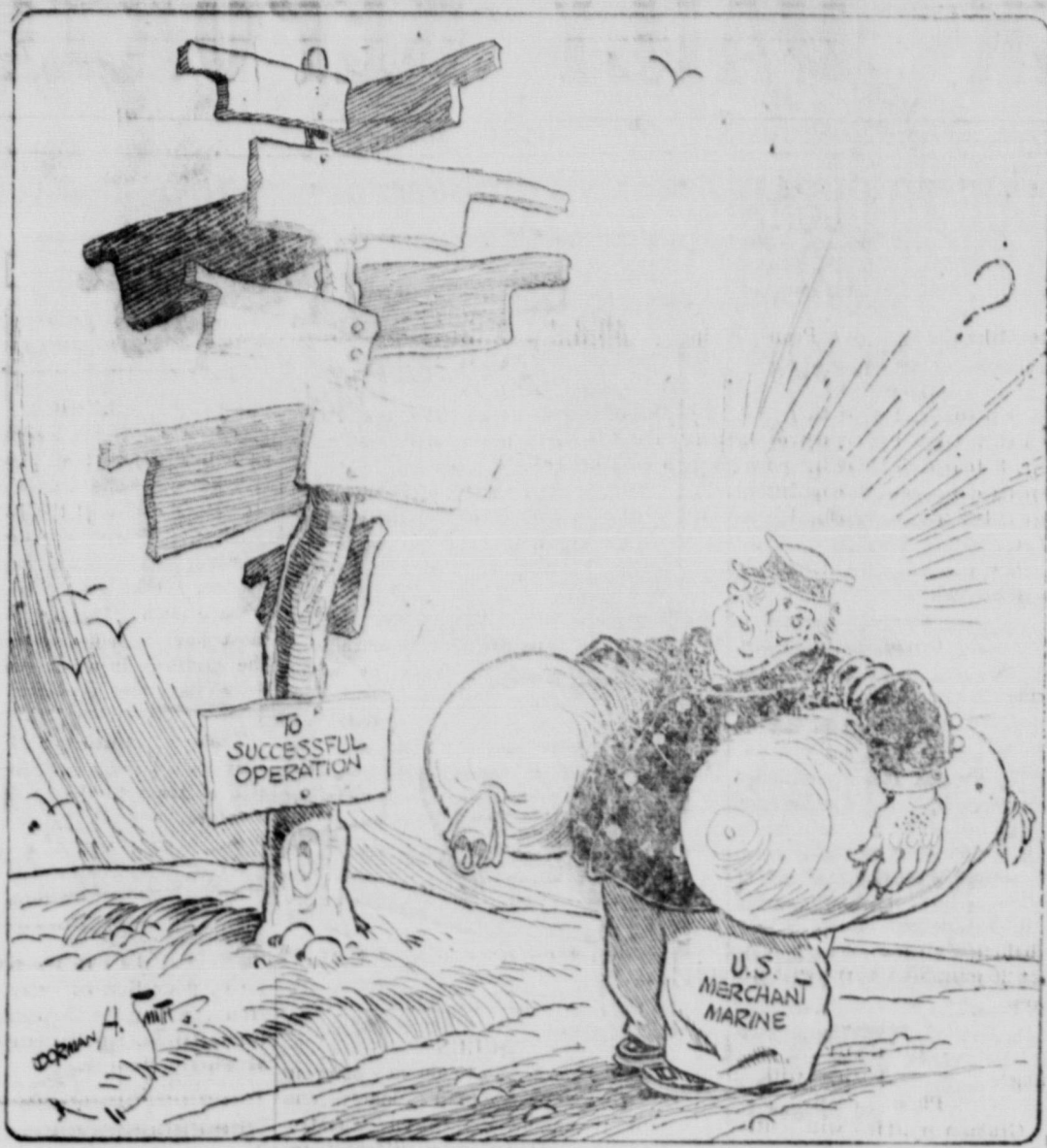
In other words, it amounts to simply this: The Highway Department's contract for a very average quality of surfacing at 30 cents per square yard brings the total cost of surfacing to between 4,200 and \$4,500 per mile. The county's contract for a very much superior type of surfacing at 24 cents a square yard brings the total cost to \$2,400 a mile—a difference, which means a saving of over \$1,800 per mile.

THE GREAT TRAVERSE

It looks as if the good old ballad of the Sewanee river will have to be revised. Folks are no longer "sad and dreary" down that way. Located near one of the branches of the Dixie Highway, Sewanee river natives are seeing one of the greatest travel movements in the world's history. Before winter is over at least a million American tourists will have journeyed over the newly opened highway or have taken other means of reaching the southland.

A southern correspondent reports that this exodus to the south is developing a new social stratum—men who appeal to local charities in cities along the way for food or clothing and for gasoline. Many seem to be traveling on a narrow margin. The blowing of a tire, with no spare and no funds in the pocketbook, plus twenty miles in the mountains for relief, means a desperate situation. But thousands are taking the chance. It is not unusual to see these adventurers at the roadside swapping kitchen utensils and other things for a patched and doubtful inner tube.

It may be doubted if the country has profited by one division of the "leisure class" which the motor car



has developed. A few years ago gypsy outfits were the only professional wanderers seen on the highways. Now hundreds of thousands of natives are living upon the highways, and with less than gypsy resources for support. Many citizens dwelling beside the Dixie Highway will soon be wondering if millions of their countrymen ever really work.

STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

Diplomacy in Washington is greatly shocked at the Chinese ministry of justice's charge that the foreigners' consular courts in China show favoritism toward their own nationals when called upon to try them for offenses against natives.

All the same, everybody who ever had any experience in the far east knows that these courts' decisions almost always are on the side of the foreigners and against the natives.

We hardly to be expected of human nature that the situation should be otherwise. An American, for instance, is arraigned in the American consular court say at Shanghai, on charges which Chinese accusers, or perhaps European residents of the foreign settlement, are pressing against him.

The judge may well feel some little prejudice in favor of his own countryman without being the least bit crooked, and still more so the jury. The extraterritorial system, in its nature, obviously lends itself to injustice.

In my own time in China I recall the case of one little occidental country which maintained a consular court at Shanghai for the benefit of just a single one of its citizens. The consul's official income naturally was very small but his resident fellow-countryman brought it up to a handsome figure out of his own pocket.

This individual ran a gambling house in the international settlement. The foreign authorities who governed the settlement didn't like it and had their police arrest the gambling house proprietor repeatedly.

While the international police could arrest him, however, they had to turn him over to his own consul for trial. One guess is sufficient to tell anybody what invariably happened.

Another celebrated Shanghai case was that of an American who was convicted in the United States consular court of a serious offense and sentenced to a term of several years in prison.

In such situations, the consular jail not being adapted to take care of long termers, it's customary for the judge to order the prisoner's transfer to San Quentin.

This calls for a deputy United States marshal to act as escort and usually somebody who is just leaving for the home country is specially deputized, thereby getting his fare paid by the Government.

It was done in this instance. The captive was locked in his stateroom on the trans-Pacific liner and nobody but the deputy marshal saw him.

At Nagasaki, Japan, where the boat made a short stop, the prisoner begged for a chance to stretch his legs ashore and the marshal consented. Nobody particularly noticed the departure of the two men, but their return, late at night, just before sailing time, was something of an event, due to the advanced stage of the convict's intoxication.

In the morning the sobered prisoner, previously perfectly manageable, suddenly started a tremendous commotion, very peculiarly in a language unknown to anyone else on board.

This continued throughout the voyage, during the trip in the prison van to San Quentin and on into the penitentiary.

A day or two later a Norwegian convict discovered that the man was a countryman of his whom the marshal had substituted, while a too drunk to know what was being done, for his real prisoner, at Nagasaki.

Of course, the marshal had disappeared and neither he nor the genuine convict ever were heard from again by the Federal authorities.

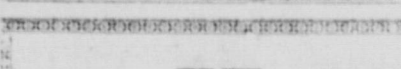

With the minerals and other substances deposited near the outside coverings. When these outside layers, or bran are removed, most of the mineral content is lost. 3-4 cup sugar, 3 cups flour, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon cloves, 2 cups sugar, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 cup buttermilk, 4 eggs, 1-2 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon ginger.

Follow general directions for mixing butter cakes.

Prune Whip

3 teaspoons butter, 3 teaspoons flavoring, 1 cup sweetened prune pulp, 3-4 cup sugar, yolks 3 eggs, 1-2 teaspoon salt, whipped cream, 1-4 teaspoon baking powder, whites 3 eggs.

Make a sauce of the butter, flavoring and milk. Add the sugar, cool all the egg yolks well beaten, the salt and prune pulp. Lastly fold in the baking powder and the stiffly beat on whites of eggs. Pour into a greased baking dish in a slow oven for about 20 minutes. Serve with whipped cream.

Meat Loaf

1 1-2 lbs meat (veal), 1 cup bread crumbs, 1 tablespoon onion juice, 1 green pepper, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 teaspoon pepper and 1 teaspoon salt.

Chop the meat finely or force thru a meat chopper. Add the other ingredients. Pack in a baking dish, brush to with egg white slightly beaten, and bake slowly for three hours. Cool slightly, remove from dish, cut in slices and serve with brown sauce.

Goulash

2 lbs. round or beef, 1 onion, 2 oz. salt pork or beef suet, 2 cups canned or fresh tomatoes, 1 stalk celery, pepper and salt.

Fry out the pork or suet, cut up beef in small pieces and roll it in the seasoned flour; cook until brown in the fat; cover with tomato and boiling water, simmer for two hours.
