MANY KILLED IN WRECK ON FRISCO

At Least Seven Persons Known to Be Dead Following Wreck of "Sunnyland" Today

SCORE PASSENGERS INJURED

Crack Kansas City to Florida Train Jumps Tracks and Rolls Down Steep Embankment

By United Press.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 27 .-Hurtling from the rails while tra veling at a high rate of speed along a stretch of track near Victoria, Miss., today, the "Sunnyland," crack Frisco flyer, plunged down an embankment and was wrecked. Only seven are known to be dead at 1:30 p. m. today.

Revised estimates by the railroad company put the possible dead at a slightly higher figure. A score of injured, some seriously

were taken to Memphis hospitals. The train was running at a high speed when the first baggage car broke loose from the engine down a steep embankment, carrying the second baggage car, coaches and sleepers with it. All were heaped into a tangled mass of wreckage when residents of the small town of Victoria reached the scene

Groans from mangled victims were heard on every hand. Those who arrived at the scene found that the resignation. Earlier in the day the sleepers from which came cries of victims, imprisoned many helpless pas-

sengers. The cars had telescoped and piled up at the foot of a steep slope. When the first rescue train arrived on the scene from Memphis, the people of Victoria were chopping free the pinioned passengers and rendering what aid they could to those most seriously

By United Press. PARIS, Oct. 27-The French cabinet resigned this afternoon. Thus, Premier Painleye's associates brought to a climax a fight of several days which has centered on the removal 'of Finance Minister Caillaux from power.

Painleve went alone to Presider Domergue and presented the join cabinet had held a brief meeting but without action. The actual resigna ion was made around 2 o'clock.

Caillaux yesterday refused to be forced out alone. Instead, he told Painleve and Foreign Minister Briande that if he were to fall, then the whole abinet must go, too.

Rumors were current this morning uggesting that Painleve was seeking o reform the cabinet, including th aking in of Justice Minister, former Premier Edouard Herriot.

DEL RIO, Oct. 27 .- District Attorney Julian Lacrosse today issued a warrant for the arrest of J. Patrick Holmes on charges of sodomy on the basis of litigation pending in Kinney county on change of venue.

Governor Ferguson is said to have told the delegation previously that if \$3,000 in fines which had been paid by Holmes, was remitted his pardon would not be granted. A pardon was granted later, however.

Adoption of Plan at Hearing Here Will Not Cut County's Actual Revenue, Says Judge

AFFECTS FEDERAL LOAN

Session Here May Serve to Obtain Extension of Government Loan -No Favors Shown Line

The main effect of the Orient meeting in Sweetwater Monday when that road's condition was discussed and a tax plan adopted, will be to secure an extension of the government loan to the line, in the opinion of County Judge A. S. Mauzey, whose commissioners court was the first in the state to vote approval of the tax plan. Mau zey does not believe the adoption of the tax plan will in any way take from the amount of taxes the road will pay each year.

"Each county is going to get as much in taxes from the road as the Orient is able to pay" Mauzey mid. "Whether the resolution was passed or not, I believe the road would have been unable to pay more than on the basis named in the proposal."

It was specified in the resolution. manimously adopted at the afternoon session, that the valuation on the line for this year would be placed at \$2,000 per mile; for next year, \$2,500 and year after next, \$3,000. These amounts compare with the \$5,000 per mile valu ation of last year for the Nolan county portion of the line.





Serious Results Likely To Follow Chickenpox Malady

By DR. HUGH S. CUMMING, urgeon General, United States Publie Health Service.

Chickenpox, is primarily an acute communcable disease of children. Occasionally it occurs in adults. The majority of cases occur be-tween the second and sixth years.

It is not always a harmless disease although the morality is low and complications and serious results results may occur. It may leave scars or result in such complications as pneumonia, nephritis and gangrene of the skin.

The agent which produces chickenpox infection is unknown. The child usually becomes sick 14 to 16 days after being exposed to the disease. The patient is listless, has a slight fever, and complains of itch-ing of the skin. An eruption conisting of small papules appears upon the neck or back within 24 hours from the time the child is taken sick. In a few hours these papules change

These have the appearance of small biisters and are due to quantities of liquid accumulating pnder the superficia layer of the skin. At tirst the vesicles are clear. Then they are said to be be translucen. I ater their contents become turbi and the resicles become opaque The e ve wies are blown as lesion and probably contain the infection agent. After a day or two the ves feles rupture. Then crusts form over the broken vesicles. These in turn drop car in from five to twenty days. The vesicles may be few or many in cumber and are found mostly on the upper part of the body. They often come out in successive crops. Some-times they are found in the mouth and throat. The temperature is usually greatest when the eruption appears. When the rash fades the temerature falls.

Disease Is Very Contagio w. Because the vesicles rupture as oon as they appear, chickenpox ; endered communicable very early he disease is spread directly from person to person and indirects because articles freshly soiled by scharges from an infected person. A child having chickenpox should not be allowed to go to school.


