

STEPHENS TRIAL CONTINUES HERE

Son and Widowed Daughter of Defendant on Witness Stand Most of Friday

CAUSED MARTIN'S ARREST

Dan Stephens Tells of Going to Roby and Making Statutory Charges Against Deceased

Details of his trip to Roby where he caused Otha Martin to be arrested and of indictments concerning the questioning of his sister, Mattie Stephens by Fisher county officials following the birth of her child were told by Jasper Stephens, son of Dan Stephens, who is on trial here for the murder of Otha Martin. The defendant's son was on the witness stand over an hour Friday afternoon and underwent a long cross examination by prosecution attorneys.

Questioned by L. B. Allen of the defense counsel, young Stephens related learning of the birth of a child to his sister, Mattie. After the baby was born the witness said he went to Roby to see Sheriff Lambert and that he picked up Jones Polk, then a constable, enroute. Since that time, Lambert has died and Polk is now under indictment in connection with the killing of Jim Bob Largent at McCaulley several months ago.

Polk found Martin when they arrived in Roby, took him to an office there and detained him until Sheriff Lambert arrived and placed him under arrest, the witness continued. Stephens said that it was at his request that Martin was arrested.

The following day Lambert phoned Dan Stephens and Jasper Stephens to come to Roby, the witness continued, as Martin wanted to make bond. Young Stephens stated that Roy Formway, county attorney, would not file the complaint until he had a statement from Mattie. The four went back to the Stephens home, and Jasper Stephens, Formway and Lambert went into the room where Mattie was in bed, the witness testified.

Stephens said his father remained outside the door. This was on Saturday morning, the day after the baby was born, Stephens said.

"Mattie told the county attorney that Otha Martin was the father of her child," declared Stephens from the witness stand. He added that Mattie told the county attorney of her intimacy with Martin and also with the second boy, George Maberry. The witness told of going back with Lambert and Formway and swearing to the complaint against Martin.

The prosecution, in the cross examination, went over practically the same ground as covered in the defense examination of the defendant's son. Jasper Stephens stuck to his story and practically every detail, and his statements were unshaken by the stiff questioning of Brooks.

Dr. Pardue told of attending Mattie when her child was born. Cross examination by the state sought to bring out facts relative to the condition of the girl, physically and mentally following the birth of her baby. Dr. W. J. Horne, a physician in Hamlin in 1923, told of Mattie Stephens coming to his office, stating to him that her husband had "gone north," and "asked to be examined." The girl told him that she was married, he stated. The physician said he did not know who she was at that time.

Mrs. Otha Martin, daughter of the defendant and widow of the man for whose killing Dan Stephens is being tried, told of her relations with the deceased during the morning session of court. She was still on the stand at noon when court adjourned for lunch while Judge Leslie was passing on the admissibility of certain letters as evidence. Frequent clashes of the opposing attorneys marked the session.

Her father objected to Otha Martin as a witness, Mrs. Martin testified. She went with him for the greater part of two years prior to her marriage in December, 1923.

She did not go with him, she testified, for several months, while he was under indictment for violation of the liquor laws in Fisher county, but following his acquittal on this charge she again resumed acquaintance. She said she loved him and still loves him. They ran away to be married.

Mrs. Martin was unaware of the intimacy existing between her sister, Mattie, and her husband, she testified, until February 4, 1924, when her sister gave birth to a child and said Otha Martin was the father.

Cross examination of the witness by the prosecution brought frequent objections from the defense counsel.

NOT GUILTY IS DORA COMMUNITY MITCHELL PLEA AWARDED HONOR

Fighting Air Colonel on Trial at Washington Formally Denies Unmilitary Conduct

COURT IS ADJOURNED

Will Meet Monday at 10—Recuse to Give Opportunity to Prepare Witnesses Both Sides

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—A general plea of "not guilty" was entered today by Col. Wm. Mitchell on all charges of misconduct for which he is being tried by court martial here.

The pleading followed a short session of the court, which has adjourned until Monday at 10 o'clock to give both prosecution and defense counsel an opportunity to examine and prepare witnesses.

The plea of not guilty was made after the last effort of the part of Mitchell's counsel to obtain a bill of particulars, specifying what part of the San Antonio statement constituted misconduct.

Following the denial of the court, Mitchell stood by his place at the defense table and in clear and emphatic tones answered "Not guilty" as the judge read the charges one by one.

After the adjournment, Frank Reid, civilian counsel for Mitchell, announced that President Coolidge and Secretary of War Davis might be summoned to testify pointing out that it had developed yesterday that these two were the accusers of Mitchell and that his client should be granted the privilege of facing them.

Three of the Texas newspaper men to whom Mitchell gave his story were present and will likely be called to the stand.

There was an acrimonious tilt between Reid and Col. Moreland over the denial of the bill of particulars requested by defense counsel and denied by Moreland who ruled it had no place in a military court.

LEAGUE QUILTS

Believing Bulgarian-Greek Squabble at End, Council Disperses—Achieve Purpose

ROSCOE DOWNED IN GREAT GAME

Thrilling Broken Field Run, Sensational Aerial Attack, Brilliant Playing Feature

FINAL SCORE IS 25-0

Sweetwater Scores Second and Third Quarters With Two Touchdowns In Last Period

In a game made thrilling by brilliant playing, sensational aerial attack and long broken-field runs, the Sweetwater high school Salty Pups proved superior and easily took the big end of a 25 to 0 score over the Roscoe high school eleven before a large crowd at the Nolan County Fair Thursday morning.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Salty Pups made one count in each the second and third quarters, followed by a pair of touchdowns in the last period. In the scoreless first, Roscoe was unable to make a first down while the Sweetwater crew made gain after gain for four first downs and had pushed the ball to the 20 yard line when the quarter ended.

Helpless against the Sweetwater line, which held like a stone wall, and penetrated for decisive gains by the brilliant Salty Pup backfield led by Herring, Schuhmann and Bledsoe, the Roscoe machine resorted to end runs and forward passes during the last three quarters in attempts to march to the goal line.

Sweetwater kicked to Roscoe to open the game. The visitors punted after failure to gain necessary yardage. On the first play, Herring made first down on a long end run which netted the locals 11 yards.

The visitors covered the ball in midfield when the Sweetwater snap from center was fumbled. The visitors punted again when the Sweetwater line proved too strong and the backfield too fast, for gains. Bledsoe made first down on a line play and a pass, Herring to Mitchell, netted the Pups another 10 yards. A short pass put the ball on the 20 yard line when the whistle blew, ending the 12 minute quarter.

A penalty on the 15 yard line put Pups back 35 yards from the goal, the penalty doubleless robbing them of a counter. Bledsoe covered himself with glory and also 15 yards of Swat-ter Park, when he grabbed up a fumble following Henry's snap from center, and raced away thru a broken field in a long end run.

On the 18 yard line another penalty sent the Pups back 5 yards and the ball went to Roscoe on downs. Herring returned the Roscoe punt 15 yards, placing the ball on the 30 yard line. A penalty again sent the Pups back to the 45 yard line. Herring made first down thru the line and successive gains carried the ball to the 22 yard line. Another 10 yard gain through the line put the Pups on the 12 yard line. Straight line plunges carried the ball six yards, and Herring went the final six through the line for the count. He failed to kick goal.

Early in the second half Roscoe completed a well carried out forward pass, and behind beautiful interference, the visitors made a gain of 12 yards for their first first-down of the game.

The failure of an aerial attack in which Sheridan intercepted one of the passes for a 10 yard gain, did not dishearten the visitors who clung to the overhead brand of playing through out most of the remainder of the game in futile attempts to finally complete a long pass that would result in a touchdown for them.

Herring went 18 yards through the line for the second touchdown, and again failed to kick goal.

Following the kickoff, Roscoe completed a pass for 30 yards that was one of the sensations of the game. It was the only time in the clash that the Roscoe Ploymen got within yelling distance. With Roscoe fans yelling for a touchdown, the visiting eleven summoned every ounce of strength for the next play that placed them on the 18 yard line. Sheridan again knocked down a Roscoe pass, but a Sweetwater penalty put the visitors on the 13 yard line where a pass failed as the whistle blew.

Herring, Schuhmann and Sheridan were the outstanding gridmen in the last quarter. Their swift end runs and line hitting ability gained ground for the Salty Pups constantly. The Pups did little aerial work which did not prove so successful.

Roscoe covered the ball on a fumble in the last quarter, but immediately thereafter, Herring intercepted a Roscoe pass for a 15 yard run and Sheridan made 10 yards on the following line plunge. With the ball on the 8 yard line, Schuhmann plowed thru the Roscoe line for the count and Herring

TO IRRIGATE

Coke County Calls Big Meeting November 13—Plan to Dam Colorado River Soon

BRONTE, Oct. 30.—A big irrigation project for Coke county will be discussed at a meeting on November 13, at which time many prominent men in irrigation enterprises will be present. A Lincoln Fellow, of Denver, Colorado, who is general superintendent of all federal government irrigation projects; W. R. Lence, of Wichita Kansas, president of the Orient railroad; J. A. Norris, president of the Texas Board of Water Engineers; J. A. Kemp, of Wichita Falls, who is the man responsible for the big Wichita valley lake; and many other prominent engineers and attorneys from all over Texas will be present. The committee will give publicity to the meeting all over the South and special invitations will be sent to men who have had experience with big projects of this kind.

The contemplated new district and dam will probably not be as great a financial undertaking as the first district, which is still tied up in the courts, but will be a tremendous undertaking and one that will turn water on at least 100,000 acres of fertile land. This is short of the acreage of the first project and is due to the fact that enough water can not be had at the never like to take care of any more. The new site is about 15 miles further up the Colorado river above Robert Lee. It is planned to irrigate 100,000 acres.

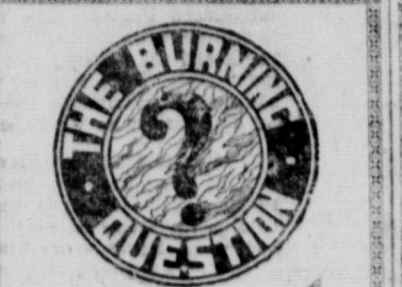

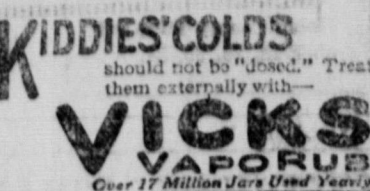

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

CAKES

The idea of telling others about a delicious White Loaf Cake came after a neighbor had just dropped in, requesting a new cake recipe. She said she had made the same three layer cake with chocolate frosting so long that her family was actually tired of it.

A great many housewives do have this habit. They find some recipe that always turns out pretty well and they bake this same cake week after week. Everyone enjoys a good piece of cake not any kind of cake you might buy, but a delicious piece of cake that fairly melts in your mouth, either with a chocolate fudge frosting or a plain boiled frosting, or without any frosting at all.

Some who like cake do not care for the fussy frostings. Some like spice cake, some prefer the sponge, others the old fashioned gingerbread, but the majority seem to be in favor of a plain white loaf cake, not unlike to an angel cake.

White Loaf Cake

1-2 cup butter, 1 1-2 cups sugar, 4 egg whites, 2 cups flour, 3-4 cup milk, 2 level teaspoons baking powder.

Sift flour once and measure; add baking powder and sift five or six times. Sift sugar then measure, cream butter, add sugar a little at a time mixing very thoroughly. Then add milk and flour alternately, fold in carefully the egg whites beaten until very stiff, then add flavoring. Bake in ungreased pans in an oven forty to fifty minutes at 350 degrees F.

Here are just a few things that will make an ordinary white cake as delicious as an angel cake or even better when you stop to realize that an angel cake is a little inclined to be tough.

Sift your flour before measuring. Tear into squares, sheets of wrapping paper to use in sifting the flour and baking powder together. You will find if you sift them five or six times it will improve greatly the texture and lightness of the cake and it will take only a couple of minutes to do this! Simply sift the flour on one sheet of paper, then pour back into the sifter placed on the other sheet and then back and forth this way until completed.

Cream the shortening in the bowl, using a wooden spoon, until it is very soft before adding any sugar.

Add the sugar a little at a time while creaming with the butter, and not all at once.

Add the milk and flour alternately so as to avoid a lumpy batter.

Fold the thoroughly beaten egg whites in the last thing, being very careful to fold and not stir. There is a great difference.

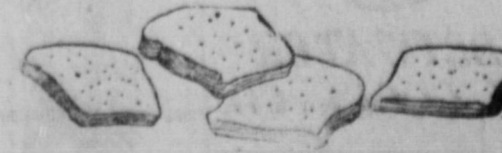
