# SPEAKER HURLS BROADSIDE

Lee Satterwhite Says Would Not Hes. itate, Were He Governor, to Have Legislative Probe

MILLIONS DOLLARS WASTED

Governor Ferguson Criticised for Hes. itating to Spend \$100,000 While Wasting Millions

By United Press. AMARILLO, Nov. 6 .- Lee Sat. terwhite, speaker of the Texas House, today made a statement to the United Press asserting that he would not hesitate to call a special session of the legislature if he were governor, citing the allegations contained in the petition filed by Attorney General Dan Moody in a suit against a certain road company.

Speaker Satterwhite, while in Washington recently, criticised the present administration and declaring that he would call a special session of the legislature if the outcome of the present investigations warranted provided the governor failed to.

Satterwhite asserted that conditions in the State Highway Department were costing the state millions of do lars while a special session would only cost \$100,000. Indirectly he accused the governor of approving the wast of millions of dollars of the people's money. He said the action of the attorney general in filing the suit was wholly and entirely justified.

Satterwhite's statement in full fol. "There would be no hesitancy about special session if I were governor of --Texas, and such allegations be made against any department whose head was directly responsible for or any such statements made as were filed yesterday. John T. Johnson, West Texas pioneer, cowpuncher, ranch owner and for the past two decades head of the Western Windmill Co., died at his home here Friday morning at 8:20.

The immediate cause of death was double pneumonia. Mr. Johnson was stricken early in the summer with a stroke of paralysis from which he had failed to entirely recover. He spent some weeks in the state of Colorado, at Boulder, and partially regained his health, but a turn for the worse set in some weeks ago and the fatal illness found little bodily resistance.

## THE HIGH COST OF FIRE

It has been estimated that the fire waste of the United States is \$1,044 a minute. Staggering as it may be it is not all of the story.

At the last meeting of the National Fire Waste Council, Ira H. Woolson, New York engineer, made the follow ing estimate:

The best census figures available imilicate a total urban population in the United States for cities having a population in excess of 8,000 approxi mately 50,000,000. Assessing the av erage per capita of \$2.70, as calculat ed in 23 cities, upon this population would indicate a cost for fire depart ment service of \$135,000,000, or a to tal annual fire loss to the country of \$670,000,000, exclusive of water supply. Such figures are staggering and they are believed to be conservative. The end is not reached. How long can we stand such terrific waste? The barden is needlessly heavy, because much of it can be eliminated by judicious legislation."

Upon this basis of calculation the cost of fire would be approximately \$1,275 a minute.





## Cumming Advises Feet Care Should Be Begun as Baby

BY DR. HUGH S. CUMMING. Surgeon General, United States Pub-

lic Health Service.

The care of the feet can be discussed under two headings—preventive and corrective.

As to the former the care of the feet should begin in infancy. As a rule, it is a comparatively easy matter for an orthopedic surgeon to cor-rect congenital deformities of the feet without a cutting operation, if the child is brought to him in its first year.

By skillful manipulation which results in the stretching of shortened tendons and ligaments and by molding the deformed foot into the proper position and shape and holding it there by means of plaster casts, congenital deformities of the feet of young children can very often be
