SICKLES' SPEECH

Excited the Ire of a Virginia Delegate at Louisville

AND EXCITEMENT FAST FOLLOWED

And a Number of Veterans Spoke, but the Resolution of Thanks to the Federal Officer Prevailed.

Louisville, Ky., June 3.—Memphis gets the next Confederate reunion.

A resolution had been incorporated in the report, which had been presented by W. W. Burgyn of North Carolina to the effect that the veterans of Confederate Veterans recognized with appreciation the language of Gen. Daniel E. Sickles, the orator at the annual reunion of the army of the Potomac at Fredericksburg, in which he had mentioned most kindly the men of the Confederacy and the resolution said the Confederates reciprocated the feeling shown toward them by the men of the army of the Potomac.

Gen. Gordon put the question on the adoption of the report. There was a chorus of ayes, and when he called for the vote in the negative he said quickly, "The ayes have it." After he had pronounced the vote there came a few cries of "No." Gen. Gordon said:

"I did not think there would be any negative votes on such a question, but as there were some after I declared the vote I will now resubmit it."

The author of the resolution, W. H. Burgyn, took the floor. He said that he had been present at the meeting at Fredericksburg and had heard the kindly sentiments expressed by the soldiers of the north and he desired the passage of the resolution merely as a matter of courtesy.

Col. J. H. Shepherd of Richmond, Va., said:

A Uxoricide.

St. Jo, Tex., June 3.—Friday at 1 o'clock C. H. Pettit, who lived formerly at Collinsburg, Grayson county, shot and killed his wife with a 38-caliber Winchester, two and a half miles north of this place. Pettit and his wife and baby were being hauled to this place by O. B. Martin, a farmer, living on Post Oak prairie. Pettit requested Martin to stop the team, as he desired to take a saddle off his horse which was being led behind, and place it in the wagon. Martin pulled up and as he did so Pettit seized his Winchester, aimed it at his wife, and fired, the ball entering above the left nipple, taking effect at once. The Winchester was jerked from Pettit's hand and he was told to get out of the wagon. Pettit jumped from the wagon and ran into a thicket a short distance away. Martin drove up to a farm house a hundred yards up the road for assistance, and while there Pettit returned. He had packed at his throat with his pocketknife and it was gaping. The knife entered both windpipe and esophagus. He was taken hold of and tied securely.

Deputy Sheriff Mack Clouts went to the scene and brought Pettit and the baby to town. Pettit is in a critical state. Martin, the driver, says before the shooting nothing but the kindest words passed between Pettit and the deceased.

Bade Him Good Night.

El Paso, Tex., June 3.—Two masked robbers entered the office of the Pierson hotel at 3 o'clock Friday morning and after forcing the night clerk to throw up his hands at the muzzle of a six-shooter, proceeded to empty the safe of cash and valuables. The safe had not been locked, and it was no trouble to pry open the cash drawer. After completing their task the men bade the clerk good night, jumped over the back fence and disappeared.

CABELL EULOGIZES

The Old Confederates, Whom, Declares the General,

ARE TRUE TO OUR COUNTRY.

The Present Officers Honored With a Re-Election, the Same Being Done With Speed of a Bullet.

Louisville, June 2.—Business was the order of the day in the second session of the Confederate reunion which convened at 10 o'clock Thursday morning in the re-union hall.

The Sons of Veterans met at the same time in the criminal court building and their meeting was also devoted entirely to matters of business. The weather has shown no signs of improvement and rain comes down in sheets at brief intervals. Many of the decorations have been ruined by the steady downpour, which has now continued for the greater part of three days.

All the officers were re-elected by acclamation. The re-election was through in record time, the whole taking less than one minute. The list of officers is as follows:

General John B. Gordon, many different commands.

Lieutenant-general, Wade Hampton, army of northern Virginia department.

Lieutenant-general, S. D. Lee, commanding army of Tennessee department.

Lieutenant-general, W. L. Cabell, commanding Trans-Mississippi department.

During a lull in the proceedings in the afternoon Gen. J. J. Horner of Arkansas came to the front of the speaker's stand, and, addressing Gen. Gordon, who was presiding, said: "I move, Mr. Chairman, that we do now proceed to the election of officers for the ensuing year."

"I second the motion," came from a dozen different directions at once. Without noticing the interruption, Gen. Horner went on, "and I further move that the elections be made by acclamation. All those in favor of the motion will signify it by saying 'aye.'"

There came a fierce chorus of "ayes."

In a neat speech General Gordon called Gen. S. D. Lee, who expressed thanks in a few well chosen words and gave way to General Cabell of Texas, who spoke fervidly in expressing his appreciation of the honor done him by his comrades. He said in part:

"I have often said, and I now say it again, that for my part in the war, small as that part was, I would not take a lump of gold as large as the state of Texas, with a diamond in its center as large as the state of Arkansas, and my only regret is that we did not succeed in that war."

The speaker then affirmed his loyalty to the existing state of things and said that there were no more loyal men in the country to the general government than the men of the south.

"When war comes," he said, "if it ever does, between the United States and a foreign country, the men of the south who carried the stars and bars will carry the stars and stripes, and they will carry it right out in front on the skirmish line. In fact, if they are carefully watched they will carry it clear away from everybody. The war comes, the men of the south will be clear off in the front, while the men of the north are making their wills and getting ready come along."

Now Company.

Austin, Tex., June 2.—Thursday was the last day of grace for the Waters-Pierce Oil Company in Texas, and in consequence thereof President H. Clay Pierce and Attorneys John D. Johnson of St. Louis and George Clark of Waco were here. Their visit resulted in the following statement by Secretary of State Hardy:

"The Waters-Pierce Oil Company, a corporation incorporated May 29, 1900, under the laws of the state of Missouri, presented to the secretary of state, on the 31st day of May, 1900, a certified copy of its articles of incorporation, together with its application to do business in the state of Texas. On receiving the certified copy and the application for permit the secretary of state required also the presentation of the anti-trust affidavit executed and sworn to. The said anti-trust affidavit was sworn to by Mr. H. C. Pierce, the president of the new company, and presented to the secretary of state. At the same time there was also presented to the secretary of state a copy of the affidavit of Mr. Andrew M. Finley, president of the old Waters-Pierce Oil Company, to the effect that the Waters-Pierce Oil Company, heretofore in existence and incorporated under the laws of Missouri in 1878, by unanimous vote of the stockholders, had gone into dissolution and out of existence, which said copy of affidavits was certified to under the hand and seal of the secretary of state of the state of Missouri. These papers were presented with the proper fees to the secretary of state, and after consultation with the attorney general it was concluded that there were no grounds of objection to the application, and that the permit was issued on the 31st of May, 1900, by the secretary of state."

Veterans' Sons.

Louisville, Ky., June 2.—By a vote of 101 to 68 the Sons of Confederate Veterans Thursday refused to lay on the table a motion offered by W. H. McLaws, division commander of Georgia, that only the Confederate flag be carried in the Sons of Confederate Veterans' division of the Confederate reunion parade.

Mr. McLaws said he understood the United States flag was to be carried at the head of the Sons of Veterans.

In accordance with a resolution to that effect, Commander Colquitt appointed a committee to extend affectionate greetings to the United Confederate Veterans.

A committee from the United Confederate Veterans then delivered, through Gen. Walker, greetings from the United Confederate Veterans to the Sons of Confederate Veterans.

Commander Colquitt introduced Lieut. Com. Biscoe Hindman, who formally welcomed the Sons of Veterans to Louisville. Sheppard Bryan of Atlanta responded to the address of welcome, returning the thanks of the visitors for their welcome.

Again Gathering.

Ortiz, Mex., June 2.—The Yaqui Indians, after several weeks of inactivity, have again become very annoying to the Mexican troops near Toron. Several night attacks have been made recently, and a number of casualties are reported. It is thought the Yaquis are again gathering in large force in the mountains about sixty miles northwest of Toron.

The seat of the Transvalle government has been moved to Middleburg, east of Pretoria.

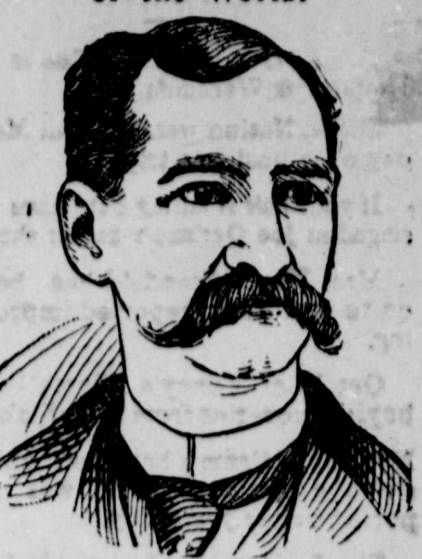

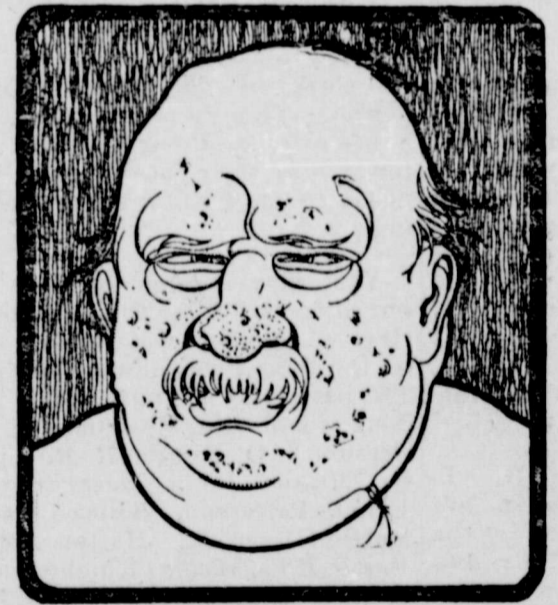
