Robert McCord announces through the News, his candidacy for tax assessor. He is an old-timer in the county—having lived in the “old town” in the “hot times” of the city’s history—but for several years past, has been mixing with the cattle raisers. Mr. McCord is an intelligent man, and has through attention to business, acquired a pretty little start in cattle. He has been living three or four years with J. T. Holland, and is still with him, which speaks well for his fidelity. He is highly competent to discharge the duties of assessor.

The Mangum Sun says the Rock Island is breaking dirt within twelve miles of town.

The “double header” question has been settled by the railroad commission of Texas in favor of the railroads. And that settles the question, and double-headers will continue to run.

Another “Barkis is willing” —in the familiar name and conspicuous figure of Jack P. Floyd—as will be seen in the announcement column today. There are few people who would deny knowing Jack Floyd—and absolutely none can complain of never having seen him. As to the confidence enjoyed of the public it is only to say that in all public enterprises he is always in the front, is now alderman, and makes a good one. Nobody ever questions Jack’s good purposes in all business transactions, nor his qualifications for the office. Moreover he has a decided advantage over his opponents, it is the conspicuousness that will enable him to be seen a long way off, and gives the poor tax ridden victim time to hide out and have his spasm over before he is held up.

Jones county also instructed Saturday for judge Wallace, which has heretofore been claimed by one of his opponents. Judge Wallace has been unable to make a personal canvass, his time being fully occupied by his courts; but his many friends throughout this district will take care of his interests and see that the Panhandle has a representative in the court of Civil Appeals at Ft Worth. Up to this date the following counties are known to have instructed for judge Wallace.

Hot Springs, Ark., May 13—Today’s trains brought in 3,000 visitors to the Southern Baptist convention and the city was crowded. Altogether there were 6,000 visitors in attendance on the convention. Nine splendid speeches were made today, which was set aside in the convention as Century Day. Great crowds overflowed the big assembly hall in the Eastman Hotel at the morning, afternoon and night sessions.

Never in the history of Hot Springs were church-going people given such an opportunity

of hearing the gospel expounded, according to the Baptist doctrine as today. The local pulpits were filled by Baptist divines and the churches were thronged with worshippers at both the morning and evening services.

In deference to the visiting brethren, their wives, daughters and friends the saloons were tightly closed. In point of weather, the day was an ideal May day.

Gov. Stone’s Views.

St. Louis, Mo., May 13—Ex-Gov. Wm. J. Stone, vice chairman of the Democratic national committee, while discussing the advisability of Mr. Towne withdrawing from the race for Vice President on the Populist ticket said:

“I think the Populist convention made a mistake in nominating a candidate for Vice President. Instead of simplifying it complicates the situation. However I am glad Mr. Towne is the nominee for reason that I regard him as a big man and I know him to be fair and patriotic. I am satisfied he will whatever may be thought to be for the best having but one end in view and that the success of the ticket to be nominated at Kansas City. If it is the opinion of the Kansas City convention that it would be unwise to nominate him, I am confident he would accept the verdict officially. I have a high opinion of Mr. Towne in every way, but at this juncture I do not press an opinion as to nominating a candidate for Vice President. The End is Near.

The Earth Will Be Burned Up On
May 28, According to Schedule.

Colorado Springs, May 7.—A prominent scientist who is here claims that every indication points to the termination of the world within the next thirty days. He claims that he based this prediction upon the fact that last summer he took observations from Pike’s Peak, which showed him that an entire change of the atmosphere surrounding the world was rapidly taking place, and that the coming of this change would come the termination of the world. The astronomers are looking forward with no little anxiety to the eclipse of the sun on May 28, upon which occasion it is contended that the sun will pass exceedingly close to the earth, and possibly annihilate it altogether. The scientist here contends that the great atmospheric changes of the past two months means great damage to the earth. From every section of the country for the period mentioned, the reports are to the effect that unusually bright and unusually prolonged electrical storms have visited almost every section and have created no little change in the atmospheric conditions surrounding the earth. Should the sun, upon the occasion of its eclipse pass unusually close to the earth as some contend it will, then the gentlemen in question contends that the earth will be burned up. The fact that the sun is daily drawing nearer the earth explains the great electrical storms prevailing everywhere, and gives strength to the assertion that the world is shortly to be burned up.
