# THREE DEAD IN **BUILDING BLAST**

ST. LOUIS ROCKED BY EX-PLOSION OF AMMONIA TANKS IN BASEMENT

### MORE THAN EIGHTY INJURED

Fire Started After the Explosion, But Was Soon Put Out by Firemen Who Assisted the Police In the Rescue.

St. Louis, Mo .- The death toll of a terrific explosion that rocked the tenstory Laclede Gas Light building in the down-town business district here stood at three after the ruins of the first floor and basement had been searched carefully.

The list of injured who received hosital treatment stood at forty, seven of whom were in serious condition. The number of persons cut by falling debris, overcome by ammonia fumes and otherwise slightly hurt in the confution police estimated at forty or more.

Cause Still Unknown. Officials of the company still were at a loss to account for the cause of the explosion. Bursting ammonia tanks in the basement spread the ruin, but what caused them to explode was unexplained.

Likewise, the firm's official temporarily were unable to estimate the damage from the blast, the fire which played upon the flames.
