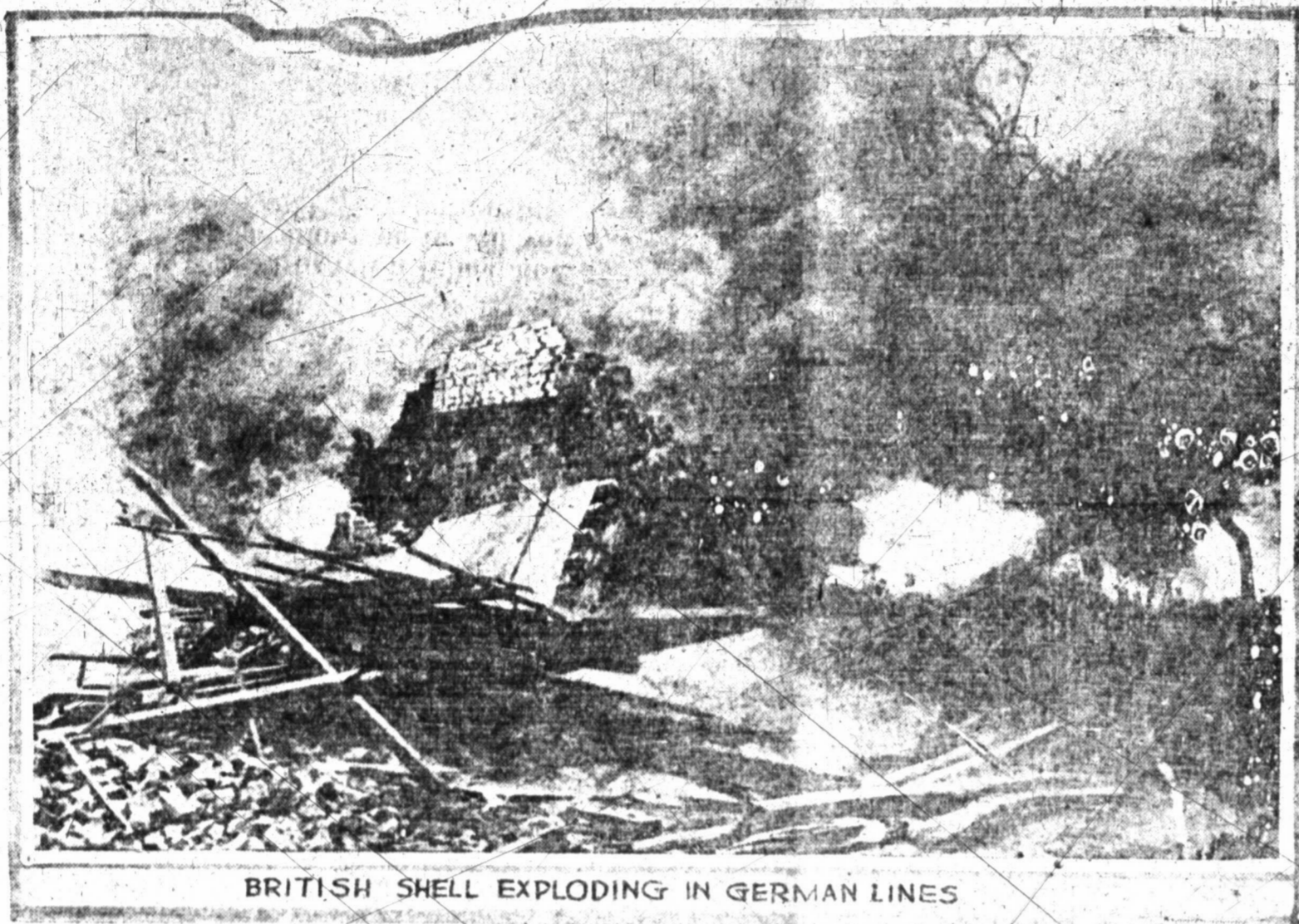

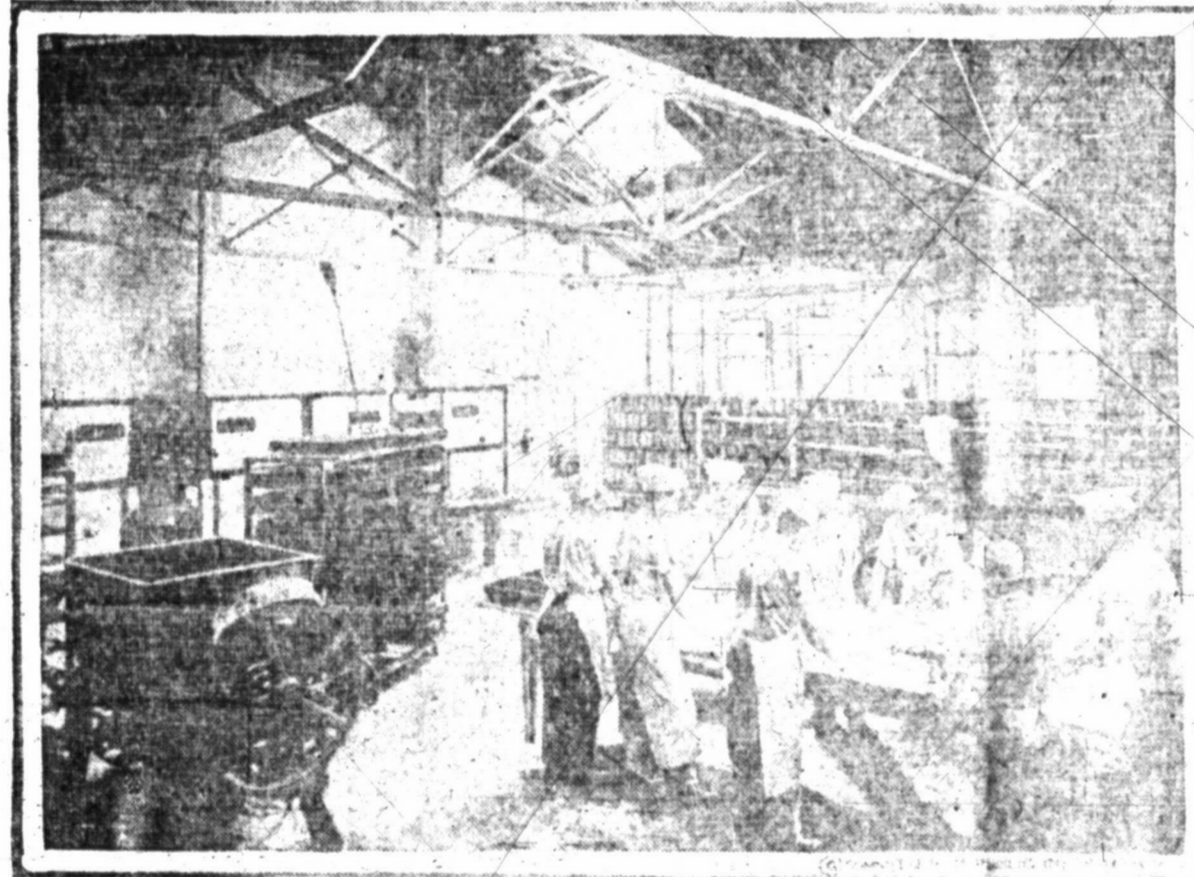
A BRITISH BOMBARDMENT IN THE GERMAN LINES. THE PHOTO WAS TAKEN FROM A PRISONER
