CHANGE OF VENUE WILL BE ASKED IN MOREHOUSE CASES

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 31.—It was authoritatively learned today that the state of Louisiana will ask a change of venue when the trials of some of the defendants named in bills of information on the various charges in connection with the Morehouse activities in Morehouse parish last summer which culminated in the kidnaping and disappearance of Watt Daniel and Eddie G. Moore, housekeepers at 46, 15th Street, New Orleans, bearing in Bechtel during October.

Attorney General A. V. Cooe, who drew up the bills of information, declined to say if he would make any statement on the trials, which are preparing to have some of the pieces in which lesser offenses were charged, tried before Judge Fred M. Odem of the fourth judicial circuit who sat in the Morehouse case.

Odem set Oct. 10 as date for the court session next month to

fix a date for the trial of these cases for the middle or latter part of October.

CLEANUP DRIVE IS LAUNCHED BY CITY AND CIVIC LEAGUE

An active cleaning campaign which will have for its purpose the thorough cleaning of all buildings, residence property and vacant lots in the city and the highways leading into the city, was launched Friday morning at a joint meeting of the women of the civic league, members of the chamber of commerce and the city health department.

Monday night a committee from the civic league will go before the city council and petition the city fathers to set aside a clean-up week in which the people will be asked to clean up their property for the benefit of the fair. During the week designated a personal appeal will be made to the civic pride of the property owners to clean up their property.

The first day of the week a careful check will be made on the lots and vacant lots and property that are not cleared of weeds and rubbish will be listed. In accordance with the city ordinance notices will be mailed out to owners of the property advising them to clean up their property.

A notice has been given if the property is in the same condition the city will clean up the property and assess the expense against the property owner.

Mrs. J. M. Isbell, chairman of the sanitary department of the civic league, will see that the wagons and alleys in the residence section. Mrs. Bert Dean, chairman of the city beautification committee, will work in connection with the other committees, and urge property owners to make their property attractive to visitors during the Texas-Oklahoma Fair.

City Will Assist
Dr. A. H. Douglas, city health officer, will assist in the campaign by inspecting all the downtown after the opening of the highway leading into the city of all trash and garbage. Dr. Douglas said that permits had been issued to 27 men who were licensed to haul garbage and that the wagons would be available in the residence section. A minimum of \$8 cents a barrel for hauling away the garbage will urge that householders insist that the garbage be carried to the city incinerator.

Aside from the regular clean-up activities, the civic league will make an effort to stimulate interest among the highways leading into the city of all trash and garbage. Dr. Douglas said that the wagons would be available in the residence section. A minimum of \$8 cents a barrel for hauling away the garbage will urge that householders insist that the garbage be carried to the city incinerator.

MONROE DOCTRINE IS DISCUSSED BY SECRETARY HUGHES

VITALLY RELATED TO SAFETY
AND PEACEFUL PROGRESS
OF UNITED STATES.

DECLARER DOCTRINE NOT POLICY OF AGGRESSION

Says America Intent Upon Aiding
From Political Strife
of Europe.

By Universal Service.

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 11.—The Monroe Doctrine as a cherished national policy, and one vital and vitally related to our own safety and to the peaceful progress of the peoples of this hemisphere, was discussed here last night by Secretary of State Hughes in addressing the American Bar Association.

Mr. Hughes pointed out that the American people "are still intent upon abstaining from participation in the political affairs of Europe." The American attitude, he explained, "is one of independence, not isolation."

In this connection Mr. Hughes said:

"Our people are not disposed to submit this government in advance to the use of its power in known contingencies preferring to reserve freedom of action in the confidence of our ability and readiness to respond to every future call of duty."

They have no desire to put their power in pledge, but they do not shirk cooperation with other nations whenever there is a sound basis for it and a consciousness of community of interest and aim. Our foreign policy is isolation, and it must persist."

Reviewing Developments.

Mr. Hughes reviewed the historical development of the Monroe Doctrine from the birth of the nation. Then, he said, "there was a deep-seated conviction that the opportunity now had been抓住 by the ambitions of European powers constantly seeking their own aggrandizement and that the peaceful aims of the new nation could be achieved only by keeping clear of the tolls of European politics and strife."

The secretary then took up the propagation of the doctrine by President Monroe. In message to Congress just a century ago, and sketched its development in later years. Outlining the doctrine as it exists to-day, he believed to be the following points:

Point One: The Monroe Doctrine is not a policy of aggression, but a policy of self defense.

Second, as the policy is distinctive, the policy of the United States is to remain neutral in disputes between itself and neutrals, interpretation and application.

Third, the doctrine "does not impose upon the peace and security of other American nations."

Fourth, interventions in Haiti and elsewhere were "not exercises of military and naval, but to help bring the forces of good—so-called stable and independent governments. Our interest is in having predominant peace and law abiding neighbors with whom we can cooperate for mutual advantage."

Fifth, the Monroe Doctrine does not mean the way of Pan-American cooperation, rather it affords the opportunity for that cooperation in the independence and security of American states.

Finally, Mr. Hughes concluded, it should be observed that the Monroe Doctrine is an obstacle to a wider understanding of the world beyond the limits of the American aims and interests, whenever that cooperation is congenial to American institutions."





Relishes and Sauces Prepared For Winter in Sister Mary's Kitchen

Frequent visitors and delectable relishes will glorify the cheapskate cut of meat and lift it out of the realm of everyday.

Wally-chew-chew—about a pintful of onions, a little bit of everything that grows in the garden is there is quite a success in combining the vegetables and gauging proportion.

Many of these relishes can be used gastronomically at the end of the session when the danger of frost has been harvested. Or you may just happen to have more than you know what to do with.

Two cups green pepper, 12 green peppers, 12 yellow peppers, 4 Bermuda onions, 1 cup salt, 1 cup vinegar, 3 cups brown sugar, 1 tablespoon celery seed, 1 tablespoon mustard seed, 1 cup whole mixed spices.

Tomatoes green or ripe, form the basis for Mixed Relish.

Six green tomatoes, 4 large sour apples, 4 small onions, 3 green peppers, 12 cups seeded raisins, 4 cups vinegar, 12 cups water, 2 cups brown sugar, 1 tablespoon salt, 1 cup whole mixed spices.

Wash tomatoes and chop fine. Pare and core apples and chop fine. Peel onions and chop fine. Put in hot water, boil off thin onions, remove seeds and white fiber and chop fine. Chop raisins. Put chopped vegetables and raisins in preserving kettle. Add remaining ingredients with the exception of salt and sugar. Boil well and boil one hour. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.

Unseeded Pickles.

One-half peck ripe tomatoes, 2 ripe green tomatoes, 1 onion, 1 green pepper, 1 Bermuda onion, 2 ounces white mustard seed, 1 tablespoon black pepper, 1 cup salt, 1 cup sugar, 3 cups vinegar.

Wash vegetables and tomatoes and remove seeds. Chop onions and other; chop celery; peel onion and remove seeds with vinegar and let stand until soft. Add salt and vinegar. Chop and add vegetables, pour over vinegar mixture. Store in an earthen jar in a dry cool place. Keep tightly covered with a heavy plate.

Soft-Green Relish.
