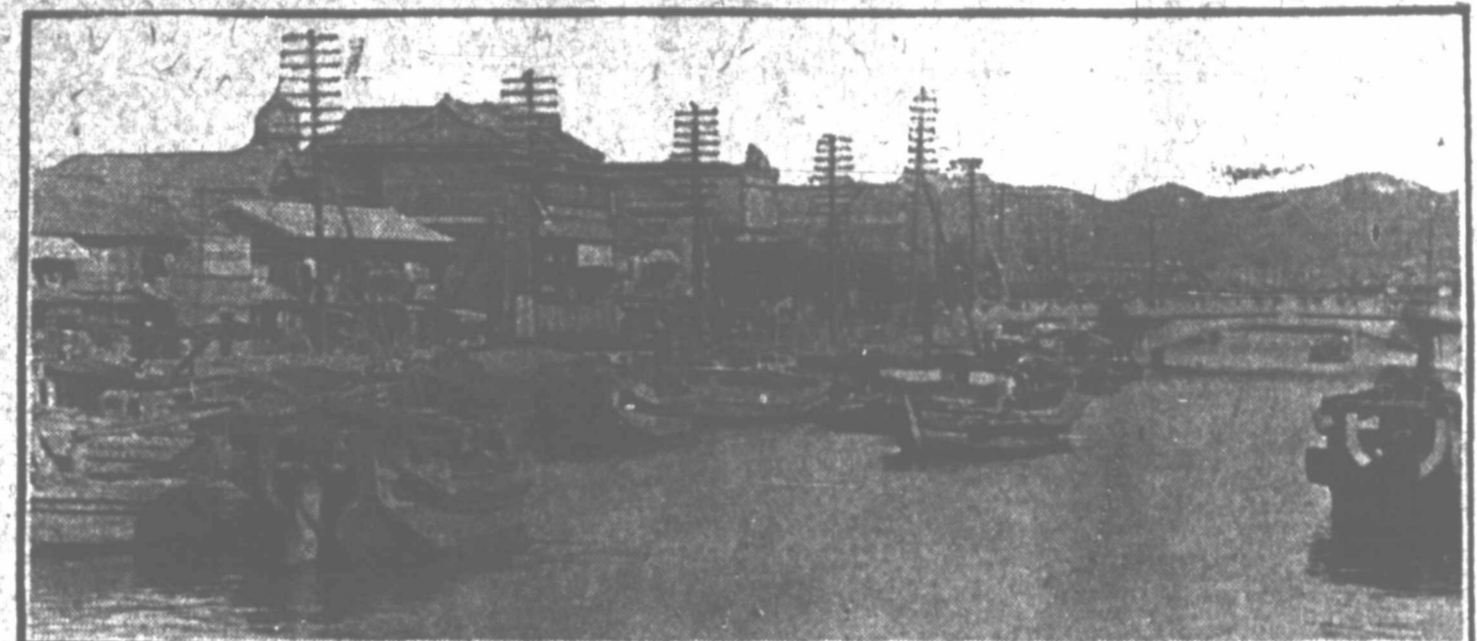

TOKYO STILL BURNING WITH TOTAL PROPERTY DAMAGE \$250,000,000

PEKING, Sept. 4.—A Moscow wireless message received here today from Japan estimated the total casualties at Tokio at 500,000 and said the property loss was incalculable. The message said the American embassy had burned. The imperial hotel was little damaged, it said, and has been assigned as a refuge for foreign sufferers.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 4.—Tokio still is in flames, loss of life there alone is at least 150,000, damage perhaps half a billion yen (about \$250,000,000).

RIO BRAVO OIL CO. 40,000 BARREL TANK OF CRUDE BURNING

GALVESTON, Texas, Sept. 4 (AP)—Damage to the tank of about \$50,000 was estimated here today when lightning struck a crude oil storage tank of the Rio Bravo Oil Company. The fire was confined to the tank. Part of the 40,000 barrels of oil in the tank was drawn off.

GALVESTON, Texas, Sept. 4 (AP)—A 40,000-barrel oil storage tank belonging to the Southern Pacific and operated by the Rio Bravo Oil Company was struck by lightning at 4 o'clock this morning and at 5 o'clock was still burning. Another tank nearby was in danger.

The Rio Bravo Oil Company is a subsidiary of the Southern Pacific and Morgan line steamers. The burning oil is crude petroleum brought from the Gulf of Mexico. A general alarm was turned in and city fire fighting apparatus, including the fire boat Charles Clarke, was rushed to the scene, supplementing the railway fire fighting force.

Pony Express Is Reeling Off Miles Through Colorado

CRAGO, Colo., Sept. 4 (AP)—Four hours ahead of schedule crossing the continental divide, the Pony Express, which left St. Joseph, Mo., at 11 o'clock, was reeling off miles as they pumbed through western Colorado last night and early this morning.

Dashing into Steamboat Springs at midnight last night, far ahead of schedule Charles Ripston, famous range rider of the northwest, was riding the pony express on an official mail line miles from Steamboat shortly before 9 o'clock last night. He had a hard trip westward to the divide, but he had ridden approximately 60 miles to this point, but as he swung to a fresh mount he realized that he would reach Craig, Colo., 50 miles further west, by 5 o'clock, mountain time, this morning.

ESTIMATE JAPANESE CASUALTIES 500,000

greatest disaster in the history of Japan. The first problem is that of providing food, shelter and clothing for more than 5,000,000 people in Tokio and for many additional millions in the other cities and district affected. The emergency commanding staff will enable the authorities to requisition the necessary supplies and labor. The relief work is being organized throughout the nation.

The second problem is that of maintaining order and order in Tokio and other cities where already looting and violence are reported. Martial law has been invoked and other military measures have been adopted to cope with this situation.

The third problem is that of reconstructing the railway lines, the telephone lines, and telegraph and other lines. It is estimated that at least one billion pounds sterling will be required for this work.

REPORT AMERICAN CONSUL GENERAL AT YOKOHAMA KILLED

YOKOHAMA, Sept. 4. (AP)—The United States consul general at Yokohama and his wife were killed in the disaster, according to radio messages from the steamship President Johnson at Yokohama. Their names were not given. Reports received here today said victims included the destroyed Japanese cities. Two hundred Koreans, fleeing from the rioting, are reported to have been killed. The Japanese consul general at Yokohama, near the capital, and several other officials and citizens were among the victims, according to a Japanese news agency which stated that the rioting Koreans had connections between Tokyo and Yokohama.

ACTING CONSUL GENERAL FROM WATERBURY, CONN.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4. (AP)—The report from Shanghai that the American consul general by state department officials to refer to Max D. Kirjassoff of Waterbury, Conn., the consul there who has been acting as consul general since the death last year of Consul General George H. Seligson of Wisconsin. Consul Kirjassoff, a native of Russia, entered the consular service in 1914 after completing his education at Yale, Harvard and the Johns Hopkins university at Baltimore. He was appointed to the United States as a consul in 1917, his father becoming naturalized during his minority. He was assigned to Tokyo February 25, 1922.

Will Test Power Of Gov. Walton in Courts of State

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Sept. 4. (AP)—A test of Governor J. C. Walton's power to suspend the writ of habeas corpus under martial law is anticipated here. It was indicated at the capital today that the executive is fully prepared to issue the writ.

Under the provisions of the governor's martial law proclamation being enforced in Tulsa, county where a military investigation of mob-floggings is under way, a prisoner seized by the military may be held indefinitely without recourse to habeas corpus proceedings. Governor Walton contends that he has ample legal authority for his course of action, holding that all civil agencies, including the courts, are entirely subservient to the military when martial law is declared at the demand of the public safety. On the other hand those who disagree with the governor cite a section of the state constitution which reads: "The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended by the authorities of this state."

Only Two Seek To Be Excused From Jury Work

In impaneling the jury for the week Tuesday morning only two men offered excuses and both were granted. This is far below the number which ordinarily ask to be permitted to serve at some other time.

Judge F. A. Martin of the 39th district court swore in the jury members and directed his clerk to call for the week, asking that attorneys specify whether a jury was wanted in the cases on call. Twelve of the members of the grand jury were ordered to report to Judge Guy Rogers of the county court at law. The jury sworn in Tuesday morning is the first for the past month and the court house again assumed an air of activity after two months of rest.

BEGIN HEARINGS ON READJUSTMENT OF FREIGHT RATES

AUBURN, Sept. 4. (AP)—Hearings began today before the state railroad commission on three applications for readjustment of freight rates on cotton shipments in Texas. The applications include one from the "Big South" for an increase of rates ranging to high as 23 cents per 100 pounds, and one from the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association asking for a reduction of from 1 to 7 cents per 100 pounds. Approximately 75 attorneys and representatives of various organizations were present at the hearing. The railroad application specifically affects rates on uncompressed cotton and cotton lint. The carriers seek to assess charges for compressing cotton in transit upon shippers. The Farm Bureau Cotton Association contends that the practice of compressing cotton out of line involving back hauls without additional charges should be discontinued and that rates be established for such service depending on additional mileage. The application of the Galveston Commodity Association for a reduction of cotton rates to Houston the same as those to Houston also was up for consideration.

JUDGE WILLIAM VAN FLEET DIES AT SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 4. (AP)—Judge William C. Van Fleet of the United States district court here died at his home yesterday after a brief illness. A little more than a year ago Judge Van Fleet went to Phoenix, Ariz., and presided over a hearing on indictments against United States Senator Ralph Cameron involving alleged irregularities in campaign receipts and expenditures. The judge was 71 years old.

REPUBLIC OF FRANCE HAS AUTOMATICALLY RECOGNIZED MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 4. (AP)—The republic of France automatically recognized Mexico yesterday when Jules Bonomi, acting foreign minister, announced the foreign minister Jean Perler, the present French envoy extraordinary in London, would be acceptable as minister to this country. Mexico and the United States resumed relations on Monday when George T. Sumner, counselor of the United States embassy, presented his credentials as chargé d'affaires to Foreign Minister Pando. The Great Britain, Belgium and Switzerland have as yet taken no steps toward recognition. "The outcome and extradition treaty between the United States and the republic have been resumed. It is announced that Washington will demand the extradition of several Americans who escaped to this country to avoid arrest."

TOTAL OF \$3,550,000 IS ADDED PERMANENT FUNDS 28 COLLEGES AND SCHOOLS

COLORADO SPRINGS, Sept. 4. (AP)—A total of \$3,550,000 was added last year to the permanent funds of 28 colleges and schools cooperating under the direction of the board of education of the Division of Education of the State of Colorado. Dr. H. O. Pritchard, secretary of the board, made public today of the annual report of the division. The permanent funds of the colleges here. Colleges included are Bethany, Butler, Calver-Stockton, Central, Colorado, Denver, Evansville, and Texas Christian University. Receipts this year from churches and their auxiliaries were \$1,748,798, a gain of 79 per cent over last year. Dr. Pritchard said. The Central Church, Austin, Texas, and the South Church, Houston, Texas, each gave more than \$50,000. Student enrollment in the colleges is 9,877, of which 594 are preparing for the Christian ministry; the report said.

Upham, treasurer of the national Republican committee who let it be known on returning yesterday from abroad that Chicago, "being the geographically logical place for it," probably would be the scene of the next Republican national convention. CHOICE OF A MAJORITY OF THE COMMITTEE

DROP IN JAPANESE BONDS ON MARKET RESULT DISASTER

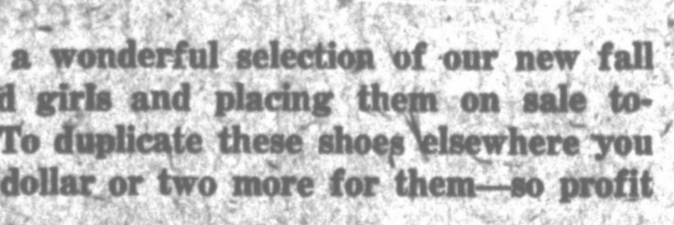

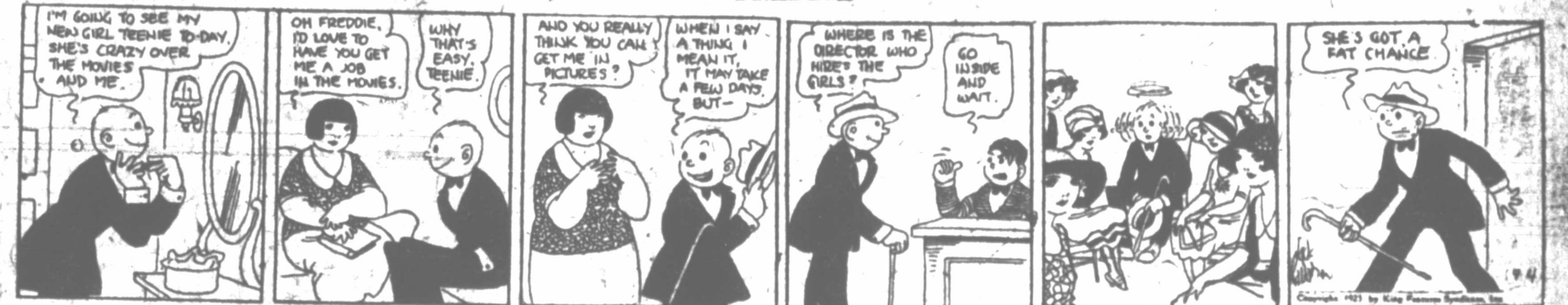

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—In Washington the closest students of the coal situation during the past week were at no time greatly cheered by the federal government's proposals.

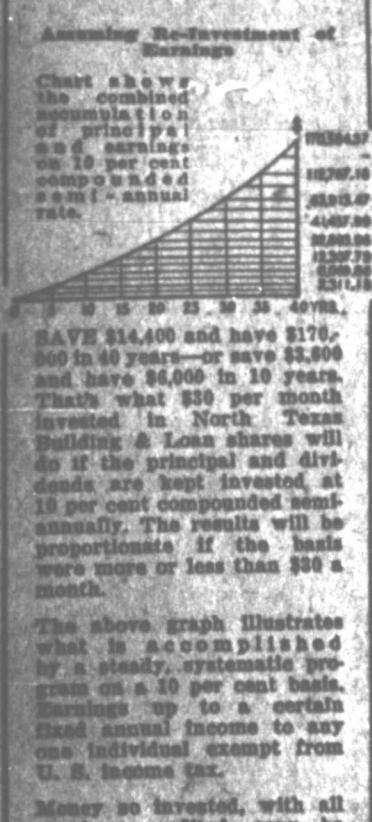

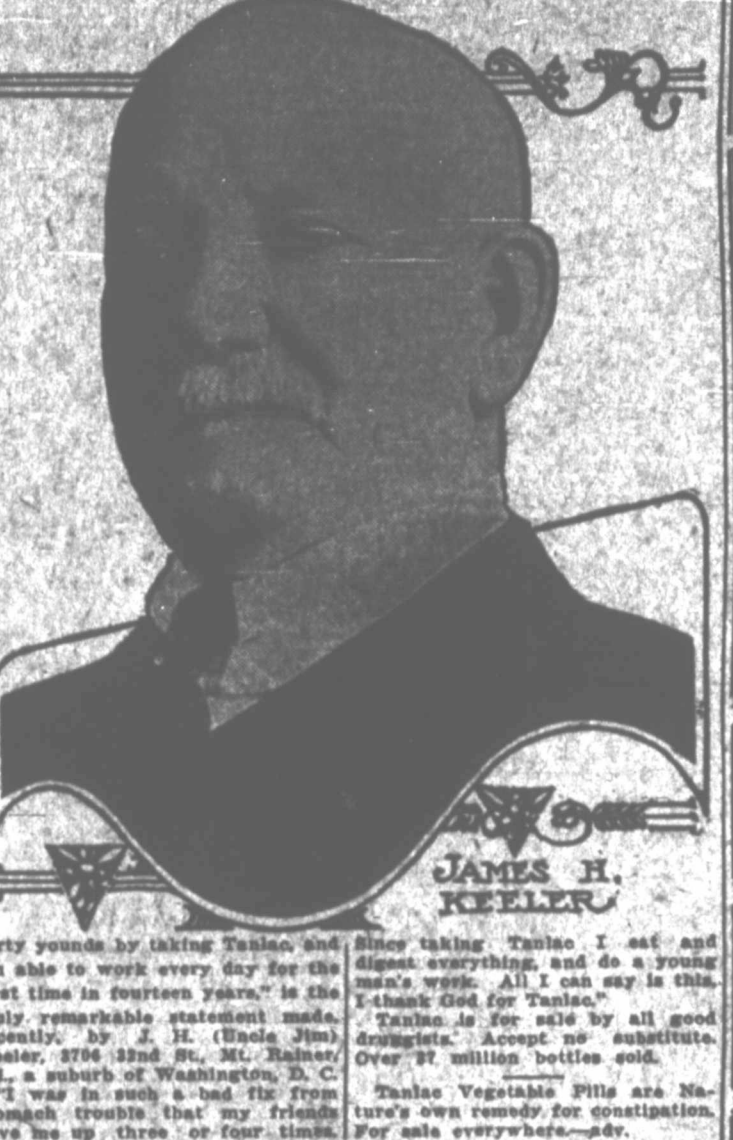
