





TEXAS HAS LARGEST RURAL POPULATION.

Texas has the largest rural population of any of

the 48 states, and in the past 20 years has increased this population at the rate of 67 per cent, according an analysis of census figures by the Liberty Central Trust Company, of St. Louis. "Rural" population, as used here, refers to persons living outside incorporated places of 2500 or more inhabitants,

The five states having the largest rural populs ion are, in order, Texas, Pennsylvania, Georgia, Ohio md Illinois. Since 1390, Texas shows the largest gain of any of these five. In Illinois and Ohio there were

As might be expected, the number of persons living in cities, especially large cities, has gained much ore rapidly than the number of country dwellers. Between 1890 and 1920, the total population of the United States increased 68.0 per cent. The number of persons living in cities of 500,000 population or ever, increased 266.2 per cent, while other gains were as follows: all "urban" territory (incorporated places of 2500 or more population), 26.5 per cent; rural territory, omitting all incorporated places, of whatever Biss, only 18.7 per cent. **********

In the 20 year period in question, rural population increased in all states except eleven-New York, Ohlo, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts and Rhode Island. It is noteworthy that the list includes all New England except Connecticut, In nine states, mainly in the west, the increase has been more than two fold; among these nine there are four in which the rural population has trebled, and one other, Oklahoma, in which the number of country dwellers in 1926 was nearly six times the total for 1890.

That is what our public playgrounds provide.

We are glad to note the installation of playground equipment in many of the rural schools of Wichita unity. The country boy or girl perhaps needs this kind of play less than his cousin in town, for the country boy and his sister 100, have the animals of the farm and the boy has his dog and gun, but it is ortant that the country boy and girl learn to play gether in groups, to follow leadership, to adjust heir actions to the wants and wishes of others. This elps to fit them for citizenship and for life. It is a training they could hardly find anywhere else than on the playground,






