### CIRCUS IS COMING SATURDAY



Many residents of Wichita Falls are arranging parties and planning to be at the M. K. & T. railroad depot, where the circus special train, bearing the paraphernalia and animals of the Carl Hagenbeck-Walton circus arrives here early tomorrow morning from Galveston for exhibition that afternoon and night. This is one of the most interesting of all incidents of the day and in all of the cities where the Hagenbeck circus has exhibited this year, thousands have witnessed the arrival and unloading. One must be a spectator at the unloading of these numerous cars to realize the business and size of the Hagenbeck show, as the amount of paraphernalia carried is almost unbelievable. Every car on the three sections is loaded from top to bottom, and the townspeople scarcely believe that the trains could move with all the tonnage carried. Much skill and system is necessary in the loading and packing of the cars. Every animal cage, every wagon, every trunk, every tent and every piece of material must be placed in its exact location. To have an article vary one or two inches requires the reloading of the car, it is said. Every workman has his exact duty to perform and it must be done like clock-work. There must be no delays. The exhibitions here will be given on the circus grounds at ball park and for the convenience of the public a downtown ticket office will be open all day at Tipton's drug store, where reserved seats can be obtained at the same price as charged on the grounds. The street parade is announced for 11 a. m. and it is to take place with the Hagenbeck management to be exactly on the minute.

### Somer System of Taxation May Be Installed Here

Should the proposal to install the unit block system of taxation meet with the approval of the school authorities, it is probable that the Somer system will be installed in the city tax office before assessments are made for the next year. George G. Ehrenborg, southwestern representative of the Manufacturers Appraisal Company, owners of the Somer system of taxation, is in the city conferring with city and school officials with reference to the installation of the system. It is known that sentiment among the councilmen is in favor of the system and if the cooperation of the school board in financing the installation can be obtained, it is probable that steps will be taken for its installation. It is estimated that the system could be installed locally at an expense of \$10,000. The installation of the Somer system would result in an entire readjustment of tax values on all city property and would bring more money into the city treasury at a lower rate, it was explained by city tax officials. Small taxpayers' valuations would be equalized and they would pay on the same basis as their adjoining neighbors while the larger taxpayers' property would be appraised and conditions would be made on the same basis as in the case of the smaller property owners. It was added. The system is being successfully used in Dallas, Waco, Beaumont, Houston and other Texas cities, according to answers to inquiries received at the city clerk's office.

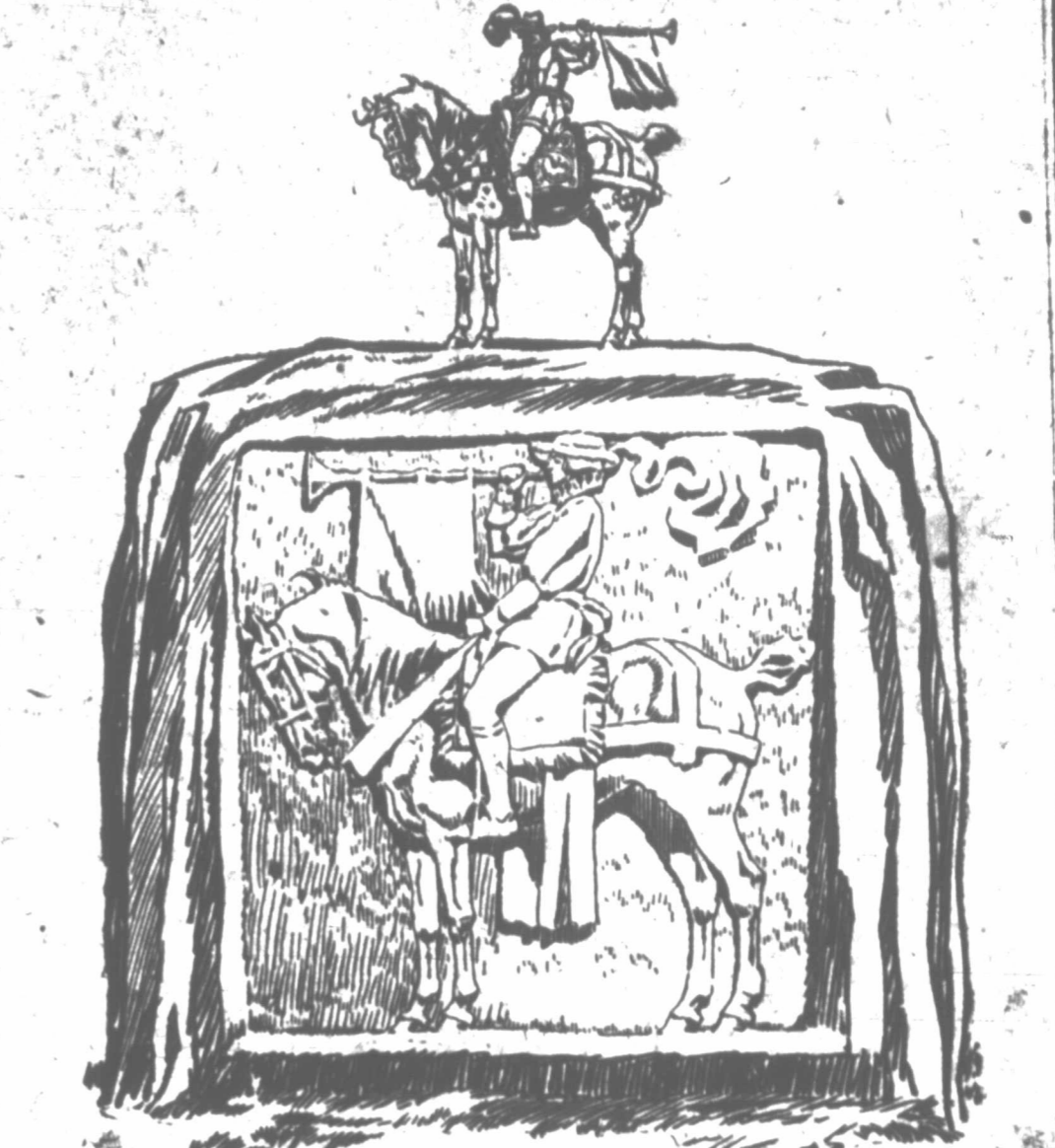

Cotton spinners active during August were 21,765,467 as compared with 21,292,817 in July this year and 21,491,457 during August last year.

Imports during August totaled 244,415 bales, including 21,231 bales of linters, compared with 171,460 bales, including 3,611 of linters, during July, and with 372,503 bales, including 4,499 of linters, during August last year.

"I was talking to a friend in front of the bank when they grabbed me," Bagby testified.

"They searched me for a gun. Then they drew a blanket over me and dumped me into an automobile. They drove off up the country and blindfolded me. The blindfold was had and I could recognize all of the men. After a while they stopped the car, yanked me out, tore off my clothes and strapped me to a tree. Then they whipped me about 20 or 30 times, I guess. The whip had lots of lathes, although I don't know what kind it was. Marshal Moore (the defendant) did it," the witness concluded.

### ALLEGED CONFESSION OF CYCLOPS IS MADE PUBLIC

SHAWNEE, Okla., Sept. 14. (AP)—Dr. J. A. Walker, reputed to be the exalted cyclops of the Shawnee Ku Klux Klan, and C. M. Reber, former major in the Oklahoma national guard, were charged with riot in an information filed here by County Attorney Claude Hendon.

The information alleges that Dr. Walker and Reber advised the flogging of Frank Cole, Claude McCannan, Will Cole and George Jones. Others charged in the information are: Malcolm Couch, former chief of the Shawnee fire department; Clay Bell and Lloyd E. Graves.

Both Reber and Couch were arrested on other charges growing out of the alleged flogging of Cole and McCannan.

Warrants were issued for the defendants, but last night the arrests had not been made. Reber and Couch are already under bond. Dr. Walker is said to be out of the city.

County Attorney Hendon made public an alleged confession of a member of the Shawnee Klan, upon which he said, he based his charges that Dr. Walker and Reber "advised a riot." The alleged confession stated that about 100 members of the Klan were present when arrangements were made for the whipping, and that a report was made by the floggers afterwards to Dr. Walker as exalted cyclops.

**Alleged Confession.**

The alleged confession was given out by the county attorney, following in part:

Q—(County Attorney Hendon questioning the questioning)—Did the proposition of whipping these four boys, Frank Cole, Claude McCannan, Will Cole and George Jones ever been discussed in the official hall of the Ku Klux Klan before?

"A—Yes, s'."

Q—By whom?

"Dr. J. A. Walker."

"What did Dr. Walker say about it?"

"He said, 'Gentlemen, we have got to give them a good spanking.'"

"Was he presiding as exalted cyclops at the time?"

"Yes, sir."

"The night that the instructions were given by Dr. Walker to whip these four boys, including Frank Cole, tell what orders, if any, Dr. Walker gave in the Ku Klux Klan hall."

**Walker Statement.**

"To the whole body of about 100 men, Dr. Walker made this statement from the position of exalted cyclops: 'Gentlemen, there are four men of this city that we have got to spank and we have got to spank hard, and do it as soon as possible because they are members of what is known as the anti-Ku Klux Klan, and gentlemen, while you spank 'em, speak 'em hard.' At which time he received unanimous applause. Following which—jumped up and exhorted the cyclops for permission to speak and stated that, 'Yes, it must be done and I am the guy that can do it.'"

"After which Park Wyatt, the legal adviser for the Ku Klux Klan, gained the floor and in a speech to the entire body he stated that it must be done and done right away and done right, for the reason that they were members of the anti-Ku Klux Klan and if they were not looked after they would get the upper hand of the Klan."

### PROSECUTION TO CONTEST CENSORSHIP IN COURTS

TULSA, Okla., Sept. 14. (AP)—The Tulsa Tribune announced today it would apply for an injunction in United States district court to prevent Governor Walton from interfering with publication of the paper by the executive carries out his threat to establish military censorship over its news columns.

No censor had appeared at the Tribune office this morning by the time the first edition went to press, although Adjutant General Markham, commanding Oklahoma national guard troops enforcing martial law here, said one would be placed on duty later in the day in conformance with the governor's order.

The Tribune denies Governor Walton's charges that the newspaper has "instigated against the state's military investigation of masked activities in Tulsa county."

The Tribune recently began publication of the "Story of Walton," a review of some of the official acts of the executive. One "chapter" of this story appeared simultaneously with the installment of the "Story of Tulsa," written by Aldrich Blake, the executive counselor, at the direction of Governor Walton. The latter was in the form of an exposure of conditions in Tulsa county growing out of scores of alleged cases of mob violence.

No word has been received here today as to whether the governor had carried out his threat to establish a military censor over the Oklahoma City Daily Oklahoman and the Muskogee Daily Phoenix, two of the largest newspapers in the state.

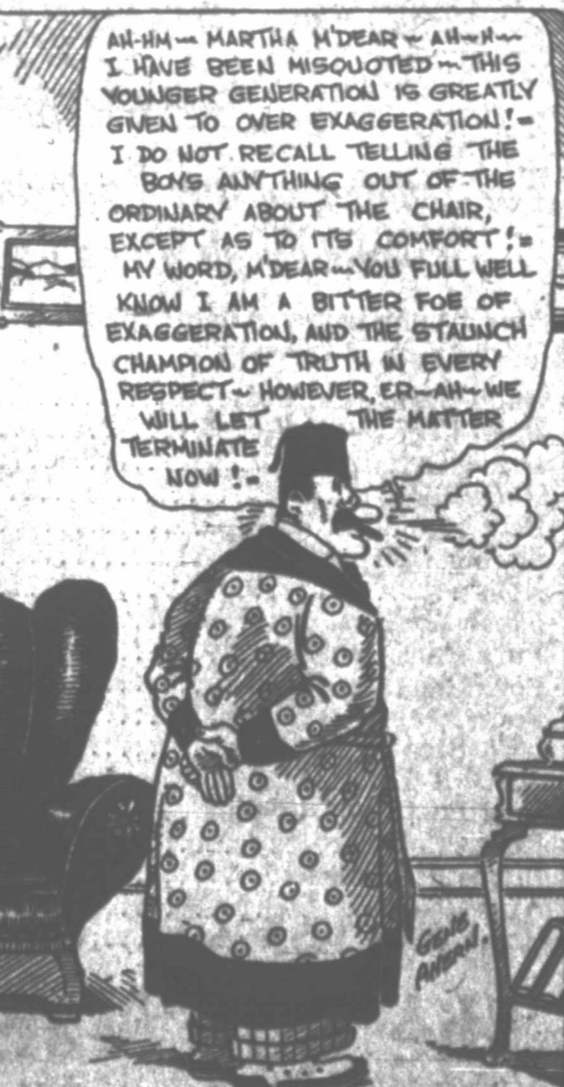
