FROM 50 TO 100 INJURED IN FIRE AT BERKELEY, CAL.

AMONG 2500 HOMELESS ARE 1200 STUDENTS AND 300 FACULTY FAMILIES

TOTAL PROPERTY LOSS IS ESTIMATED \$10,000,000

First step in reconstruct area destroyed is being taken by city officials.

BERKELEY, Cal., Sept. 18. (AP)—The first step in the reconstruction of the destroyed and rebuilt areas of Berkeley, Calif., Monday in the most disastrous fire in the city's history, will be taken today when workers will stack the flames-charred ruins with dynamite and wrecking tools.

While the 35 blocks or more away which the fire swept still lie blanketed with smoking ruins, surrounded by a cordon of police and army sentries, victims of the blast surveyed the extent of the disaster and immediately began making preparations for the rebuilding of their homes.

The real and personal property loss in the blaze was estimated at \$10,000,000 last yesterday by C. C. Emaley, president of the Berkeley board of fire underwriters, to whom 15 insurance adjusters reported after a complete survey of the fire zone.

Not more than \$4,000,000 was covered by insurance, he said. One hundred companies are sharing the loss and claims will be paid promptly, he declared.

The 2,500 homeless victims of the fire today had found shelter with friends or in homes thrown open to them. Among the homeless were 1,200 students of the University of California and 300 families of faculty members. It was officially announced.

The list of those who were injured either by the flames or in minor accidents resulting from frantic efforts to escape the homes, was the first of names published from the fire zone yesterday.

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LOCAL BURGLARIES BELIEVED SOLVED BY CONFESSION

HENRY BERRY MAKES COMPLETE CONFESSION IMPLICATING FIVE OTHERS

Statement of Officers Gives Details of All Recent Burglaries

Solution of 16 recent robberies and safe cracking jobs here was reached Wednesday morning when Chief of Police George Hodgins announced that Henry Berry, one of the men charged with the robbery of the Corsicana Coca-Cola Bottling Works safe, had made a complete confession of his guilt in the recent burglaries and safe cracking.

Several other persons were named in Berry's confession, and it is believed that the confession will lead to the recovery of some of the stolen goods and the identification of the other men who were involved in the robberies.

Berry admitted his participation in the burglary of 15 local houses, the cracking of eight safes, the theft for a time of several hundred dollars in money and merchandise.

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Party Gentlemen Adventurers Are Coming to Grief

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 18. (AP)—The 25 gentlemen adventurers who arrived here August 25 aboard the yacht Frontiersman on a trail-blazing voyage in the interests of a British airplane flight around the world next year, today were said to face the possibility of becoming longshoremen at the Los Angeles harbor.

Their yacht has been seized by federal officers for violation of the liquor law and labeled by commercial firms twice for alleged debts and their ship's surgeon has been attacked with malaria fever.

Many of the men aboard the ship who engaged in all kinds of positions for the adventure of the voyage are world war heroes and they have never worked as longshoremen, but they are said to consider that work as a probability.

PARADE FEATURES PROGRAM DOWNTOWN PRIOR TO OPENING

MUCH INTEREST SHOWN BY MERCHANTS OF CITY

Fashion Display is Scheduled for Wednesday Night if Rain Does Not Event

VERNON, Texas, Sept. 18.—Dulled by intermittent spasms of rain and an overcast sky the eleventh annual exposition of the Wilbarger County Fair Association got under way shortly before noon Wednesday to continue its career through the day.

Rain that started in light showers shortly after daylight settled into a steady downpour sufficient to make the streets a time for wading.

Despite the rain of Wednesday morning, Lon Byars, president of the fair association, and H. R. Coffey, manager, preside the greatest crowd in the 10 years history of the institution.

Early arrivals from all parts of this section indicate that the official prediction will be realized if the fair goes on for a half a dozen or more days.

Though the rain needed strong efforts to drive the elements from the grounds, the fair was fully as great as it annually has been.

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Reduced From 15 to 70 Cents and Radical Change in Classification By Prairie Oil & Gas Company

TULSA, Okla., Sept. 18. (AP)—A drastic cut in the price of midcontinent crude oil prices and a radical change in the classification of the grades heretofore used was announced today by the Prairie Oil & Gas Company, which posted a new schedule reducing former prices from 15 to 70 cents a barrel and cutting the number of grades from eight to three.

The new quotations are: Below 33 degrees, 30 cents; 33 to 35.9, \$1.80; 40 degrees and above, \$1.75.

While a cut in crude by the Prairie has been expected in oil circles, due to recent reductions by the Magnolia and other purchasers, the reduction was not expected to be so large and the change in grades was not looked for.

CHICAGO, Sept. 18. (AP)—Cuts of from 25 to 75 cents a barrel in the price of midcontinent crude oil by the Prairie Oil & Gas Company, has been met by the Sinclair Crude Oil Purchasing Company which was indicated in oil circles here.

Whether there will be further cuts was not forecast, but it was believed the reductions would stimulate buying in the jobbing markets here. It was said, with an accompanying increase of one-fourth cent a gallon for gasoline.

The cut in crude, it was believed generally, would not affect the retail gasoline market, and no unusual effect on the industry was anticipated as crude reductions have been anticipated in some quarters for several weeks.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18. (AP)—A meeting between George L. Berry of the International Printing Pressmen and Assistant Union and officers of the New York World Telegrams and Sun, called for noon today, offered virtually the only hope of settlement of the strike of pressmen which has materially curtailed publication of the city's leading daily newspapers.

The strike which began when workers on morning newspapers left their posts shortly after midnight yesterday morning, continued through yesterday and last night, with both afternoon and morning papers resorting to limited editions bearing the title "The Combines New York Newspaper" and carrying on the front page the name of each paper affected.

Mr. Berry, in a letter sent to the local union last night, ordered the men to return to work, declaring the strike was unwarranted and failure to comply immediately with his request would result in suspension of the union's charter.

Early this morning he had received no answer to that communication, but it was expected the reply would be delivered at the noon day conference.

The papers published this morning, with the exception of the New York World Telegrams and Sun, contained little or no advertising and no editorials. Features were curtailed and all of the leading stories on one front page were an account of the strike.

FIGHT ON BIG OIL COMPANIES LOOMS NEXT LEGISLATURE

AUSTIN, Sept. 18. (AP)—The fight against companies of large oil companies which it is claimed, are discriminating in price fixing and forcing them out of business will be carried to the legislature, W. G. Morgan, member of the legislature from Liberty county, stated here today.

Numerous complaints against activities of large oil companies are being filed with the state railroad commission, the Liberty county representative said. Recently he filed an application with the commission asking for a sweeping investigation of operations of big companies, but after investigation the commission announced it has no authority to conduct such an investigation.

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SEEK TO HOLD MAN TO CONTRACT FOR PURCHASING HOME

U. S. WANDERS FAR FROM CONSTITUTION SAYS R. E. L. SANER

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Sept. 15. (AP)—In an address here last night before the State Bar Association on "The Vision of Our Fathers and Present Day Visionaries" dealing with the constitution of the United States, Robert E. L. Saner of Dallas, Texas, president of the American Bar Association, declared that "in the last 10 or 15 years we have wandered far afield from the ideals and conceptions of the fathers as in constitutional government. Where railroads cross highways there are signs which read 'Stop! Look! Listen!' If the people and their representatives in our government to follow that admonition now."

Saner declared that at the present time "nestling in the archives of the various state legislatures and in the halls of congress there are some 40 different proposals for amendments to the constitution of the United States." These amendments have been introduced, he said, "not for the purpose of the betterment of the constitution, but for the purpose of momentarily riding into public office."

In the state of Wisconsin (if it still is a state in the Union) we have perhaps the most noteworthy example of the supreme demagogue, who, for the purpose of satisfying his own personal ambitions, outdemagogues the Robespierres, the Lenthens and the Trotzkys.

"One of the proposals as you will know is that every decision of the supreme court of the United States shall be submitted to congress for a straw vote and if congress agrees with the supreme court it shall become the law and if congress disagrees it shall not become the law."

ADMISSION OF DEFENSE COUNCIL ADDS INTEREST TO WALTER WARD TRIAL

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Sept. 15. (AP)—Interest in the trial of W. S. Ward, rich banker for the murder of Clarence Peters, former marine, increased today because of the admission of Beatrice Ward, chief counsel for the defense, that part of Ward's story could not be true. Ward in his first story to the authorities of the events leading up to the tragedy said Peters was with the mysterious "Red" and "Hogers" who have never been found, on the evening before the shooting. The state was said to have proof of the fact that on the night in question Peters was on a train somewhere between Richmond, Va., and Washington.

"Of course, I admit it was impossible. Peters could not have been with them the night before."

Meanwhile deputy sheriffs searched with a description of the man by the nun.

The nun, whose knowledge of English is slight, said she was near the hospital entrance when the man drove up an automobile in which was the body of the girl. She described him as about 30 years old, of medium build, dark hair, and light eyes.

He told an audience here last night he was the "jailbird" of the city and had ever been in and that he never wanted to see the inside of it again.

(AP)—Mayor Joseph Cauffiel, central figure in a controversy over his order directing all negroes residing in the city less than seven years to leave was eliminated as a candidate for reelection, returns from yesterday's primary indicate, in a field of seven candidates he was running fifth.

Mayor Cauffiel issued the order after three city policemen were killed in a fight with an alleged drink-crazed negro who also was killed.

LONDON, Sept. 15. (AP)—Late reports indicate that the uprising in Trans-Jordan is more serious than was indicated by the official statement covering the situation, says a Jerusalem dispatch to the Daily Mail. The movement involved two native tribes and about 15,000 troops.

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mexico, Sept. 15. (AP)—Salas Barragan, confessed slayer of Francisco Villa, was sentenced to 20 years in the penitentiary, was brought to this city yesterday under heavy guard by a large contingent of soldiers.
