Reduced From 15 to 70 Cents and Radical Change in Classification
By Prairie Oil & Gas Company

TULSA, Okla., Sept. 19. 09-A drastic cut in the price of midcon tinent crude oil prices and a radical change in the classification of the grades heretofore used was announced today by the Prairie Oil & Gas Company, which posted a new schedule reducing former prices from 15 to 70 cents a barrel and cutting the number of grades from eight

The new quotations are: Below 33 degrees, 90 cents; 33 to 39.5. \$1.30; 40 degrees and above, \$1.75. While a cut in crude by the Prairie has been expected in oil circles, due to recent reductions by the Magnolia and other purchasers, the reduction was not expected to be so large and the change in grades was not looked for.

CHICAGO, Sept. 19. (F)—Cute of from 15 to 75 cents a barrel in the price of midcontinent crude oil by the Prairie Oil & Gas Company, an-nonnced today, has been met by the Sinclair Crude Oil Purchasing Company and will be generally met. It was indicated in oil circles here. Whether there will be further cuts was not forecast, but was believed the reductions would stimulate buy-ing which has been of better volume in the jobbing markets here, it was said, with an accompanying in-crease of one-fourth cent a gallon for gaspiine.

The cut in crude, it was believed generally, would not affect the refail gasoline market, and no un-usual affect on the industry was anticipated as crude reductions have been agitated in some quarters for several weeks.
