ORDER DIRECTED TO BETH KIRKPATRICK, OWNER OF PLACE.

MARSHAL FINDS PLACE HAS CHANGED HANDS

Injunction issued by Judge Wm. H. Atwell of U. S. District Court.

A copy of a decree was received Monday from the United States district court at Fort Worth ordering that the doors of the White Elephant, formerly a shrine of Bacchus, but later transferred into a port of entry, be closed.

The order, which is in the form of a temporary injunction, was directed to Beth Kirkpatrick, the owner and proprietor. When U. S. Deputy Marshal John Scott went to serve the papers early Monday morning and close the doors of the establishment he learned that Kirkpatrick had departed for California to another man and that Kirkpatrick was in California.

U. S. Marshal Scott went to the place and was secured on him by the fact that the place has changed hands. The U. S. deputy marshal did not close the doors.

The "White Elephant," under the management of Beth Kirkpatrick, was declared by United States District Attorney Henry Szwed to be a nuisance in his application for the writ of injunction. He set forth that five arrests had been made in the establishment, located at Seventh and Ohio streets, during the past year and that one conviction of the proprietor had been secured.

The order, as directed to Kirkpatrick and issued by Judge Wm. H. Atwell, recites that the defendant be restrained from selling, keeping, harboring or storing, maintaining or disposing of any intoxicating liquors on the premises or removing or molesting any furniture, fixtures or liquors now located on the premises and that the doors of the establishment be closed until final hearing can be had.

The case was set down for final hearing at 11 o'clock Monday morning, October 7.

NEARLY \$1,000,000 IN TAXES APPEAR ON THE ROLL COMPLETED.

MEANS NEARLY \$300,000 TO WICHITA COUNTY

Stupendous Task Required Over Six Months' Work With Cost of \$100.

Guy C. Raley, county tax collector, has just completed the completed delinquent tax roll of Wichita county, which comprises all delinquent taxes from the year 1905 to 1923.

The roll contains a total of \$1,975,333 in delinquent taxes which are due the county, plus the penalty and interest attached for each year from the date of delinquency. The collection of the year in which the tax became delinquent.

This total does not include approximately \$110,000 which is delinquent on all leases in the county, nor the \$1,900,000 delinquent taxes which appear as supplements for the 1923 tax rolls just completed for the county.

It is conservatively estimated that to Wichita county alone this completed delinquent tax roll, just completed by Mr. Raley, will mean nearly \$300,000.

The work of compiling the roll began six months ago and since that time nearly 170 men have been at work on the roll. Although the roll will mean nearly \$300,000 to the county, it has cost the county less than \$100.

The penalties as shown in the above list only including the penalty for the year in which the tax became delinquent. The total penalty for many years will be double and triple and the original amount of tax because some of the taxes have been due since 1905 and every year since that time.

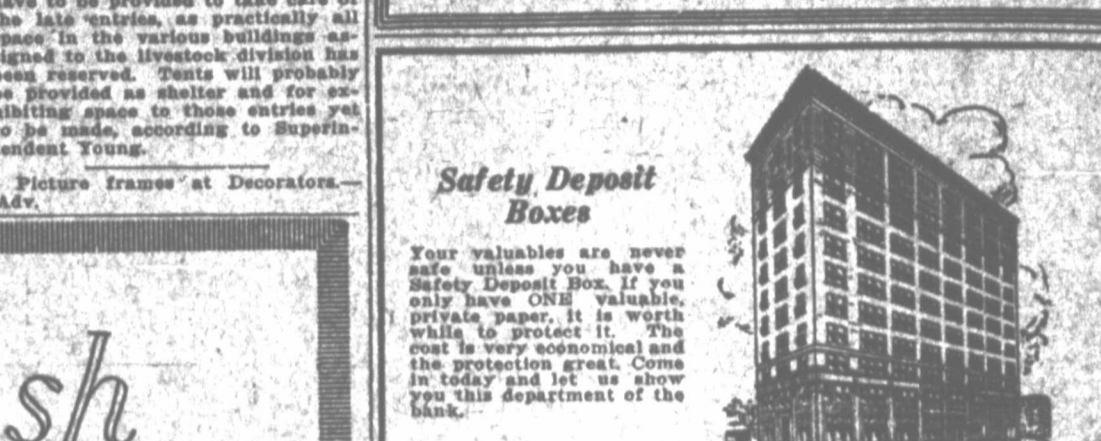
