RAIN STOPS AND TEMPERATURE RISES HERE

Heaviest Rainfall of Many Years, Totalling Almost Six Inches, Ends Tuesday Morning; Rivers Falling

Flood danger is over in northwestern Texas and southern Oklahoma, as the rivers are receding and the rain stopped early Tuesday morning.

The rain is declared to be the heaviest recorded here in several years.

The Red river is receding, according to railway dispatches, falling more than two feet Monday night.

Although large losses were suffered by all railroads operating out of Wichita Falls, service will soon be normal again.

Several trains were stranded by the rain in the Fort Worth and Denver railroads. The Missouri, Kansas and Texas lines suffered the greatest damage.

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Doc Cook Guilty Only of Honest Effort to Rebuild Oil Companies Defense Says

PARADE FEATURES TUESDAY MEETING AMERICAN LEGION

FORT WORTH, Texas, Oct. 14 (AP)—An honest effort through a series of mergers to take hold of approximately a dozen oil companies, termed as "broken down oil companies" and rebuild them into paying institutions for the benefit of the stockholders, is the only thing that Dr. Frederick A. Cook, international known Arctic explorer, is guilty of.

This in substance will be the defense of Dr. Cook and his thirteen associates, on trial before Judge John H. Kilgus in federal court on charges of using the United States mails to defraud in connection with the oil promotion scheme.

The defense, he said, "will show that Dr. Cook formed the Petroleum Promoters' association to take over a few run-down companies, rebuild them and put them on an operating basis. Cook is not guilty of any fraudulent scheme of oil promotion as the government charges."

He admitted that he and his associates which were taken in by companies which had been organized when oil was selling at \$2 a barrel, but he said that he was not guilty of any crime in the oil business.

Dr. Cook would have made a success of this enterprise had not the government come along and interfered when it did, Bailey asserted.

The program called for greetings from the oil companies, including the world war and earlier conflicts.

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RED RIVER FALLING; WICHITA VALLEY ALTERS SCHEDULE

A pile driver from the Denver shops at Childress is expected to arrive at Byers tomorrow and will be used to replace the one washed out.

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"KLAN" RESOLUTION MAY COME BEFORE OKLA. LEGISLATURE

PROVIDES FOR INVESTIGATION OF AFFILIATION BY MEMBERS.

RESOLUTION TABLED AT MEETING ON MONDAY

Expect Consideration When House Reopens On Wednesday.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 15. (AP)—A resolution providing for an investigation of every member of the lowest house of the Oklahoma legislature to determine whether he belonged to the Ku Klux Klan and authorizing the summary expulsion of all members found to be Klansmen probably will come up for consideration by that body at its next session Wednesday.

The resolution, introduced by E. P. White, Democrat, Bryan county, yesterday, was before the house just three minutes, being tabled through a suspension of the rules providing that all resolutions shall be carried over one day before being considered.

Representative White's resolution declared the Klan abridges the constitutional right of freedom of religion.

Only the senate was scheduled to meet today. It had no business before it and is expected to follow its custom of meeting and adjourning at once which it has followed since the opening of the session while awaiting completion of an impeachment investigation by the house.

A house subcommittee is in Mead to investigate affairs of the state penitentiary. Other subcommittee members will investigate the official conduct of the members of the house and several other institutions.

Judge George W. Clark, instructing a district court grand jury which began yesterday its investigation of charges that Governor Walton had made improper use of state funds, ordered that body to investigate particularly violations of statutes forbidding unlawful expenditures of public funds, issuance of state warrants and "falsely assuming to be an officer."

Order Removal Storm Warnings On Texas Coast

BEAUMONT, Texas, Oct. 15. (AP)—Instructions to take down storm warnings along the Texas coast were received by United States Weather Observer Carson at 9:00 o'clock at Port Arthur this morning.

The barometer reading at Port Arthur, which dropped to 29.32 during the night, had risen to 29.48 at 9:00 o'clock this morning and was still rising, indicating, according to Mr. Carson, that the danger point is passed here.

A telephone message from Adeline in the area pointed out as probably within the path of the storm, was received at 1:30 this morning with the effect that the weather is clear there with no wind or other signs of storm.

HIGH WATER SWEEPING LARGE AREA OF CITY

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 15. (AP)—The gulf disturbance reported yesterday 200 miles off the Texas coast was reaching this morning the Gulf of Mexico coast and, according to warnings issued by the weather bureau at Washington, would strike the mainland at about longitude 91 west and move northeast.

The warnings stated that the storm has reached hurricane intensity. It was believed here that this would place several parishes west of New Orleans in the immediate path of the storm and that its center would be close to Morgan City, 15 miles west of here.

Practically the entire Louisiana coast was being swept by strong winds, which in some instances had reached gale proportions. High tides were reported from all points.

Last reports from points near the mouth of the Mississippi river stated that the wind was blowing at the rate of 45 miles an hour. Spanish Fort, an amusement park, and Milneburg, a fishing resort, both on Lake Pontchartrain, were reported early today to be partly flooded and families living at the latter place were reported moving out.

A telephone message received early today from Houma, La., 40 miles west of New Orleans, stated that the strong wind was blowing at the rate of 45 miles an hour. Morgan City reported that the wind had put all railroad telegraph wires out of commission.

RIISING BAROMETER IS REPORTED BY BUREAU

GALVESTON, Texas, Oct. 15. (AP)—A steadily rising barometer was reported this morning by the weather bureau here.

The barometer stood at 29.51 and the wind was 11 miles an hour from the north. At 1:00 o'clock this morning the barometer reading was 29.42.

Advice from Port Arthur gave the barometer reading at 7:00 o'clock as 29.44 and a 10-mile wind from the northwest. New Orleans reported a reading of 29.44 at 7:00 o'clock and a 10-mile wind from the southwest.

The tide here was 3.5 above normal at 1:30 and 1.4 feet above normal at 4:00 o'clock this morning.

From Chicago on Thursday morning he will go to Springfield to visit Lincoln's tomb and deliver an address.

SEVEN JURORS ARE SELECTED IN TRIAL OF FLETCHER CASE

Special to The Times: ARCHER CITY, Texas, Oct. 15.—Seven jurors had been selected in the murder case of the state against Robert Fletcher at 11 o'clock this morning, when Judge H. E. Wilson of the 20th district court ordered an adjournment until 1:30 o'clock this afternoon.

Fifty-two members of the special venire of 95 have been examined Monday and today, exhausting the total number of names that have appeared. The balance has been excused because of illness or other cause, or have been so far unable to appear as to be excused because of the deplorable condition of the highways as a consequence of the recent rains. Four jurors were accepted Monday and three this morning.

The seven now in the jury box are: J. W. Hasselwood, Megargel; C. J. Lester, Megargel; Ed Maga Huff; H. F. Harmel, Megargel; G. W. Melvor, Megargel; J. H. Hardegre, Megargel; and F. C. Green, Archer.

The courtroom was crowded during the sessions Monday and today, much interest having been aroused because of the peculiar nature of the case and because W. M. Baylor, one of those whom the defendant is alleged to have murdered, was well known in this community. No additional venire has been summoned, as it is believed that a sufficient number of those originally called will report to complete the jury today or Wednesday. It is not now anticipated, however, that it will be possible to begin the testimony before Thursday morning.

FRENCH NOT DISPOSED TO SUGGEST PLAN FOR REPARATIONS PAYMENT

PARIS, Oct. 15. (AP)—The French government is not disposed to provide the British and other allied governments with a specific plan as suggested by Lord Curzon in his speech to the imperial conference, telling Germany how she should collect reparation funds from her own people. The French idea, as explained authoritatively today, is that it is for Germany to pay and to provide her own means of payment.

It was recalled that when the Prussian troops were occupying parts of France until the indemnity for the Franco-Prussian war was paid the German government did not tell the French government it was very sorry that it was unable to pay, but that it would arrange the indemnity in this or that manner, but left it to France to choose her own method of raising money, demanding only that she pay promptly.

The French government, however, has "twenty or thirty plans of various sorts," as one official remarked, so that if Germany or the allies were in need of a plan one could easily be found.

ACCUMULATED STORES OF INDIAN OIL CAN BE SOLD AT POSTED PRICE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15. (AP)—Accumulated stores of oil representing the royalty interest of the Osage Indians can be sold, Secretary Work ruled today at the highest posted market price by operators holding leases of oil lands on the Osage reservation in Oklahoma.

The secretary held that upper terms which obligated the lessees to pay one-sixth of their less proceeds of the sale of oil had no authority without the consent of the Osage tribe to permit the deduction of a storage charge of two cents per barrel per month for the time the oil was in storage.

Interest of the Indians accumulated stocks was estimated at 500,000 barrels which is being increased at the rate of 6,000 barrels a day in royalty. The Osage Indian council recently requested that the Indians share be held if possible at the present market price despite the unfavorable market situation.

blared forth their warning signals and evacuation of the entire area in the flood's path. At the sound of the first siren streets south of Grand avenue, principal business thoroughfares, became choked with refugees.

Relief stations were set up and personal warnings were broadcast by the local telephone company to each of its subscribers in the threatened district.

As doctors, pressed into service by the city administration, gathered from all parts of the city at points of concentration, ambulances from every hospital and fire trucks changed their way through congested traffic lines, rushing into the danger zone for refugees or dashing back from there with human cargoes of terror-stricken residents of the lowlands.

Street cars and volunteer motorists ventured into the very edge of the advancing water, aided in bringing the helpless and crippled to havens of safety provided by

Quinn Freed Redcross. A stream of grim faced refugees trudged so fast, backs bent under the burden of pitiful little bundles of belongings snatched frantically from their homes, which only a few minutes later were submerged by the swirling waters.

Pandemonium reigned for a time. Crowds of curious persons milled and pushed on down town corners while automobiles and horse drawn vehicles clogged the traffic ways leading to the river bottoms.

A cold drizzle of rain added to the confusion. The situation was later taken in hand by the military and civil authorities, who forced all except the needed workers off the streets.

Capitol Hill, a residential section in the southern end of the city, and Packintown, the packing center to the southwest, are completely isolated. Looking Is Reported. Following a report at police head-

quarters that a band of from 75 to 100 men were looting homes deserted by refugees, a force of specially deputized police were dispatched to the scene with orders issued by Mayor O. A. Carrell to shoot to kill any person found pillaging.

With the coming of a cold gray dawn the homeless ventured from their makeshift shelters and the streets were filled with them. Bread and coffee lines were opened by the city's two largest hotels and restau-

rant relief centers were early receiving truck loads of food from the city's wholesale district.

Virtually every church in the city had been pressed into service as well as many lodge rooms and business buildings. Among the latter was the federal systems bank building, the marble lobby of which was littered with the tragic little bundles of the homeless.

Every hospital in the city was filled to overflowing long before day break as sick were taken from

Lake Kemp, the great body of water created by the storage dam of the Wichita irrigation project, had reached a depth of 143 feet and covered an area of approximately 5,200 acres at noon Tuesday, according to an announcement made by J. L. Lockridge, resident engineer of the Wichita County Water Improvement District No. 1.

This is the greatest depth and area ever reported for the great lake, which is destined to be one of the largest in the southwest.

About ten feet were added to its depth by the torrential rains of the past few days. At no time during the flood conditions, however, has the great storage dam been in any danger of breaking. The irrigation district engineers reported.

On the contrary, it has been a source of protection to Wichita Falls and all the land bordering the Wichita river below the dam, which would undoubtedly have been flooded to a much greater extent if the big dam had not fulfilled its duty and impounded a vast quantity of water.

### Scientific Investigations Made In Connection With Boundary Suit Contained In University Bulletin

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 15.—Scientific investigations made in connection with the Texas-Oklahoma boundary suit are contained in a bulletin of 174 pages which has just been issued by the University of Texas.

The authors are Dr. E. H. Sellards, chief geologist in the Bureau of Economic Geology; Prof. B. C. Tharp of the department of botany; and Dr. E. T. Hill, formerly of the University of Texas. The bulletin was published by the Bureau of Economic Geology of the University, a special fund for preparing the maps having been provided by the board of regents. A list of maps included in the bulletin shows that 49 original maps and drawings have been prepared by the state of Texas to illustrate testimony submitted; of these six maps and two drawings were reproduced in the publication. Of 230 photographs submitted, 16 have been reproduced.

The boundary suit which was instituted by Oklahoma, the United States becoming intervenor, was for the purpose of defining more exactly the boundary line of the Red River between Oklahoma and Texas. Although somewhat indefinitely defined by a treaty made in 1819 between the United States and Spain, the actual boundary line on the Red River had never been marked on the ground. The United States and Oklahoma claimed under this treaty all of the river valley land to the foot of the Texas bluff as a part of the state of Oklahoma, to which Texas citizens now living on the land had no legal claim. This extension of the boundary line to the foot of the Texas bluff would have included as a part of Oklahoma valuable oil lands as well as the homes and farms of Texas citizens.

Investigations made by Texas were directed particularly to a determination of the age of the river valleys and to the habits of the river in building the valley lands. As a result of these investigations, it is shown in the bulletin that the valleys of the river are far the most part more than 100 years old, and hence were in existence 100 years ago when the treaty was made with Spain and thus are a part of the state of Texas.

In the determination of the age of the river valleys, the evidence was obtained from the timber and plant growth in the valleys, from the thickness, diversity and character of the soils, from the methods of the accumulation of sand dunes, and from the fossil bones remaining in the valleys. The habits of the river in building its valley lands are likewise fully described in the bulletin.

The decision of the supreme court rejects the "island building" theory advanced by the United States and Oklahoma, and accepts evidence as to the methods of land building and age of the land presented by Texas. Under this decision all of the river valley lands on the Texas side including grazing and farm lands and homes remain in the state of Texas.

Stribling, however, outpointed Burns in every round. Burns forced the fighting in the last two rounds but could not compare in cleverness with the southerner.

Several times Stribling showed wonderful bursts of speed and hit Burns with everything he had. Burns was game to the core and bored in for more punishment.

### AGED COUPLE FOUND WITH SKULLS CRUSHED

HAGERSTOWN, Md., Oct. 14.—John Cline and his wife, Rebecca, an aged couple residing on a small farm near here, were found dead in the cellar of their house today, their skulls crushed as with a heavy iron bar in the hands of an assailant who left no clue behind.

The tragedy was reported to the police by their son, Harry Cline, who said he found the bodies when he came from a neighboring farm for his noon day meal. He was taken into custody pending investigation.
