

CORPORATION TO GROW COTTON UNDER IRRIGATION URGED

WOULD AFFORD PROFITS AND DEMONSTRATE IRRIGATION ADVANTAGES.

BUSINESS COUNCIL HEARS SUGGESTION

Body Hears Reports of Several Committees at Weekly Luncheon.

Agitation which will probably lead to the organization of a company to promote the development and irrigation of a large tract of land in the Wichita valley is a demonstration scheme to encourage colonization, was launched at the weekly meeting of the business council of the Kemp hotel Friday.

C. H. Clark outlined the plan as it has been discussed among a group of citizens, which provided for the cultivation of 1,500 acres of irrigated land in cotton. It was Mr. Clark's opinion that the land could be secured by donation or at a very favorable sum, and that with the management of six experienced irrigation farmers, the project could be made to double the investment of the first year. The tentative plan, as outlined, suggested a corporation to be capitalized at \$25,000; stock to be sold to individuals and citizens who believe in the project at an investment of five hundred dollars each was suggested as the maximum amount of stock to be sold to individuals.

MAKE PREPARATIONS FOR REMOVING TONS FROM "TUT" TOMB

LUXOR, Egypt, Oct. 15. (AP)—Preparations for lifting the 1,600 tons of earth, stone and wooden joists that now rest over the tomb of Tutankhamun are proceeding apace. Howard Carter and his American associates, Messers. Chandler and Burton, have established themselves in their lonely concrete domiciles on the entrance of the Valley of Kings and have made a preliminary survey of the vast heap of rubbish that now shields the king from the outside world. It is possible that a narrow gauge railroad loaned by the American archaeological mission will be used to hasten the work.

Nearly 100 of the native excavators who helped Mr. Carter uncover the tomb last summer have been engaged at stipends which make American wages look like fortunes. Each digger is to receive 15 cents a day, but some of them are grown men who support two or three wives on this slender remuneration. It is probable that Pharaoh Tutankhamun will be undisturbed for many weeks as the dismantling of his multiple tabernacles of gold will require the most patient taking labor and skill. The delicate parts of the outer and inner shells will have to be treated chemically and the utmost care taken to guard them against breakage. In addition to this, the entire wall surrounding the sarcophagus from the other chambers probably will have to be demolished so as to permit the archaeologists sufficient room in which to work.

URGENT ADOPTION OF JOINT ARMY-NAVY AIR SERVICE PLAN

RECOMMENDED IN REPORT OF SPECIAL BOARD OF ARMY OFFICERS.

ALARMING CONDITION IS FOUND TO EXIST

Eighty Per Cent of Equipment is Obsolete Training Type of Planes.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—Adoption of a joint army-navy air service development program to be completed in 10 years is recommended in the report of a special board of general officers of the army made public today. Unless measures are taken immediately to provide for the upbuilding of the air service and the airplane industry, the report said, the army air service will have been "practically demobilized" and the American aircraft industry virtually disappear within a few years.

The board recommended that the army air service program be formed to provide for the expenditure of approximately \$250,000,000 during the 10-year development period at the rate of \$25,000,000 a year. Of that amount the board said the first few years should see \$10,000,000 a year devoted to operating expense and \$15,000,000 to the purchase of new aircraft.

The board found that an alarming condition existed in the army air service due to shortage of flying personnel and equipment and to the failure of the air craft industry to develop commercial industry. Airplanes manufactured during the war were being used up and deterioration and loss of these planes has now reached a point where the situation is "critical," the board said, and there will be available by July, 1925, less than 300 serviceable airplanes to meet a requirement of over five times that number.

Eighty per cent of the existing equipment of the army air service is composed largely of obsolete training types of planes "unsuitable for combat use," the report said.

FLYERS TO BEGIN BORDER TO BORDER NON-STOP FLIGHT

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 19.—First Lieutenants L. H. Smith and J. T. Richter of the army air service are on the way north from here today in their respective airplanes to attempt a border to border non-stop flight from a suitable field on the Canadian border to Tia Juana, Mexico.

They were accompanied by First Lieutenants F. W. Delaney and Virgil Higgs, who will fuel them in midair during the flight.

The date for the beginning of the flight will depend upon weather and atmospheric conditions.

CHARGES AGAINST GOVERNOR WALTON READY BY MONDAY

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 19.—The house investigating committee worked at top speed today to complete a report by Monday of its inquiry into impeachment charges against Governor J. C. Walton.

It had been expected that the report would be presented to the lower house of the state legislature today, but Representative W. E. Disney of Muskogee, committee chairman, announced it would be impossible to finish the work until Monday because of much new evidence brought to light.

At least 12 charges will be made in the report, Representative Disney added, all of which will form grounds for impeachment. Should the report be filed Monday it is believed a roll call vote will be taken on it the following day. If the house adopts it the measure then would go to the senate for review as a formal bill of impeachment. A majority vote is necessary for adoption.

The legislature is to meet again today, but the session is expected to be brief.

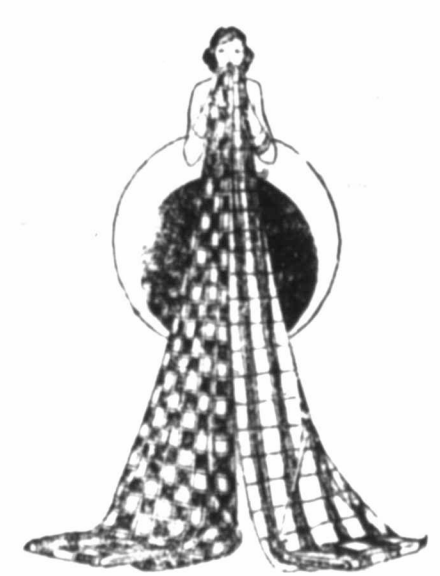

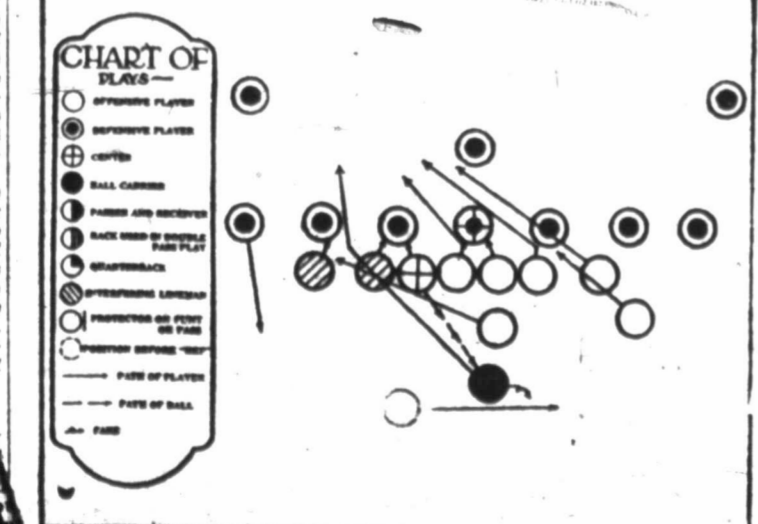

Autumn Vegetables Contain Added Richness; Lima Beans Heartier Food

By SISTER MARY Lima Beans. With the coming of autumn the vegetables gain a certain substantialness and richness not found in the more delicate summer vegetables. It's probably just a bit of old mother nature's eternal vigilance that as we need heartier food to prepare for cold weather it is forthcoming.

Lima beans are a heartier food than the string beans of early summer and to my way of thinking twice as delicious. They must be gathered before the milk inside the tender shell covering "pois." Then the wonderful creaminess of the vegetable is preserved in the cooking. It is this creaminess that gives them their name.

There are several varieties of lima beans, the green ones, large green ones and large flat white ones. As the beans ripen the cooking grows hard and difficult to digest and the center becomes firm and dry. No matter how long the beans are cooked, these conditions cannot be altered.

Beans are lacking in fat, so this should be supplied in the dressing. One pint of shelled lima beans will serve four persons.

Lima Beans in Cream. One pint lima beans, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 cup cream, 1 teaspoon pepper. Wash beans and drain. Drop in boiling water and cook 30 to 40 minutes. When the beans are half cooked add salt. Let the water cook away. Add cream and pepper and bring to the boiling point, but do not let boil. Serve at once. If cream is out of the question try this sauce:

Two tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon flour, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 teaspoon sugar. Cook beans as in preceding recipe. Melt butter, stir in flour. Do not let the butter and flour turn color, but be sure they are perfectly blended. Slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Add sugar and pepper and bring to the boiling point. Add beans and serve. This will prevent the cloudy effect.

Dividing the Lima. When making fruit cake put half the dough into the pan, then the fruit, and then the remainder of the batter. This will secure a more equitable division of the plums. CHINESE DISCARD NATIVE SHOES FOR LEATHER. PEKING, Oct. 15 (AP)—Chinese are gradually taking to the use of leather shoes, according to J. C. Huston, American consul. Chinese who have not adapted the foreign style of footwear are beginning to use chrome leather soles with their native cloth uppers.

DECREASE SHOWN IN GERMAN BIRTH AND MORTALITY RATES. BERLIN, Oct. 15 (AP)—Germany's birth rate for the second quarter of 1923 shows a decided decline, according to official figures for 48 German cities. In the corresponding quarter of 1922 there were 75,728 children born, as against 65,274 this year. For the first quarter of 1923 the number of children born was 65,630. The birth rate is now down almost to the lowest level of the war period. Commenting on the figure the medical weekly says: "As there is a firm ratio between the birth rate and the birth statistics, a further big decline is expected." On the other hand the mortality rate is not so high for the second quarter of this year as it was in 1922. There were only 12,448 deaths in the second quarter of this year as compared with 15,245 for the same period last year.

HOUSEHOLD SUGGESTIONS.

Liquids Yeast. If you use liquid yeast, remember a cupful is equivalent to about half a cake of the compressed variety of a whole cake of the dry.



Frying Grease. Never put a frying pan or skillet over the flame without first putting in the butter at least, and do not put your pan over until it is required for use. Frying grease always leaves that unpleasant odor of cooking.

Grinding Bread. When grinding bread or cracker crumbs put a paper bag over the open end of the food grinder and secure it with a rubber band. This will prevent the crumbs from flying out and littering the floor.

Put in Some Salt. If you put salt in the gasoline you use for cleaning your clothes there will be no objectionable ring.

Take Out Stain. Before washing glasses in which milk has stood rinse in cold water. This will prevent the cloudy effect.

The organization has designated that period as children's week in the Sunday schools of the United States, the ninth annual observance. Dr. Walter G. Clippinger, chairman of the children's division of the International association, said today that at least 12,500,000 of the 25,000,000 children under 12 years of age in the country are not receiving any religious education. "It is admitted universally that our national life and prosperity can be promoted only as it is established upon a healthy religious idealism. It is to help change these conditions and make it possible for all children to receive religious training that this movement is being promoted," Dr. Clippinger said. The program of the week will consist of meetings of parents and Sunday school teachers, holding of Sunday school exhibits and institute and house-to-house visitation.

GAS IS NOW USED IN REFRIGERATORS OF ICE IN REFRIGERATORS. ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 15.—Refrigeration produced by the intense heat of a gas flame will soon replace ice-cooled refrigerators, was the prediction made today by H. DeWitt Valentine of the Peoples Gas, Light and Coke Company of Chicago, at the convention of the American Gas Association. According to Mr. Valentine the form of refrigeration produced by a gas flame gives a uniform temperature approximately ten degrees below that obtained with ice. "In the apartment building," Mr. Valentine said, "the gas-fired ice unit is placed in the basement and is connected to the refrigerator in each apartment on the floors above. It operates automatically and has no motor, compressor or other movable parts." When the machine was recently introduced in Chicago he said the gas company was besieged with such questions as "Does the gas freeze?" CITY OF ELECTRA GRANTS FRANCHISE TO GAS COMPANY

ELECTRA, Texas, Oct. 18.—At a special session Wednesday night the city commissioners granted a franchise to a company composed of local men for furnishing gas for domestic use in this city. The new company was organized and named by A. T. McDannald, W. T. Cross, W. E. Lincoln and R. T. Smith.

Within the next few days a crew of workmen will start the work of laying pipe lines. Practically all the equipment is already on hand and no time will be lost in getting the gas system into operation. Provided there are no unforeseen delays, the company plans to furnish gas to some sections of the city within six weeks. The entire system will probably be completed in three months.

Arrangements have been made with The Texas Company for the gas supply. The franchise granted by this company will produce approximately 1,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily under conditions now existing. According to Mr. McDannald, the maximum needs of the city during the coldest part of the winter will not exceed 400,000 cubic feet. At that rate an adequate supply of gas will be assured for the next five years or more.

The new company plans to spend in the neighborhood of \$45,000 in installing the gas system. The work of laying the mains from The Texas Company field will begin at once. The gas will be brought under high pressure to the city limits, where regulators will reduce the pressure sufficiently for domestic purposes.

STAMFORD, Texas, Oct. 18.—The recent heavy rains in west Texas indicate that this year 1934 is likely to establish a record for rainfall in the west. According to the records of the United States weather bureau at Abilene the heaviest rainfall in any one year in west Texas since 1888 or during a period of 46 years was the precipitation of 1914, which amounted to 61.90 and during that year west Texas received what almost amounted to an unprecedented flood in August, when the precipitation amounted to 18.70 inches. The next heaviest rainfall during the 46 years was recorded in 1928 when the precipitation amounted to 35.77 inches.

The precipitation in 1932 was 25.46 in 1933 it was 24.97, and in 1934 it was 39.55 inches. The precipitation for 1933 to date up to and including October 18, is 28.50 inches.

The years of extraordinary minimum rainfall in west Texas during this period of time were 1917, when the annual rainfall was only 10.55 inches, the smallest on record. The next smallest was in 1929, 14.97 inches. The next smallest heaviest rainfall during the entire period of time was 21.11 inches. The rainfall record for the 27 years of time shows unequivocally that on an average west Texas received by far its heaviest rainfall during the months of April, May, June, July and August of each year. January records the lowest average annual rainfall, followed by February and March by December.

These figures were made by the statistical bureau of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

HEAVY RAINFALL IN WEST EXPECTED TO ESTABLISH RECORD

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Oct. 19.—With six persons known to be dead, several missing and damage to property estimated in the millions, Oklahoma today watched the recession in flood waters which have inundated many sections of the state for nearly a week.

As the crest of the high water passed gradually eastward reconstruction measures took shape rapidly. In an effort to resume train service by the end of the week the railroads, which suffered damage second only to farming lands, have dispatched working crews to repair the countless bridges and miles of track destroyed by the torrent.

Lines of communication are being restored to numerous localities completely isolated by the flood and public utilities hastily are reweaving badly impaired services.

Scores of acres of lowlands in the central and eastern part of the state still are covered with water, but with the rivers and smaller streams falling rapidly, all danger is believed to have passed.

Less than 100 persons of the thousands driven from their homes by the flood now are dependent upon relief agencies.

The drowning of two youths near Chickasha and the recovery of the bodies of two more flood victims here—a woman, a volunteer fire worker and an unidentified man—brought the total known death toll to six last night. Search is being made for five others who are unaccounted for.

SIX KNOWN DEAD RESULT OF FLOOD OVER OKLAHOMA

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 18.—When the 12,000 refrigerated cars of produce now in process of being moved eastward from southern California have reached their destination, their consumption of ice to keep their perishable contents fresh will total 3,000,000,000 pounds, according to semi-official survey completed here.

For every car of fruits and vegetables that leaves this section, eight tons of ice are required for the initial trip. Between Los Angeles and Chicago another seven tons are used. If a car goes farther, to New York or some other Atlantic seaboard point, four more tons must be added.

An unusual type of shipment being handled in completely lost cars is ice. In order to move a carload of the heavy-making material, it is necessary to lower the temperature of the car to offset the heat lost caused by the millions of busy insects and thus maintain life by bringing about what might be termed artificial hibernation.

VERA CRUZ, Oct. 18.—The general strike that has grown out of the controversy between the maritime workers and the railway terminal employees has continued one week without prospect of a settlement. The government has intervened only to assure the movement of fruit.

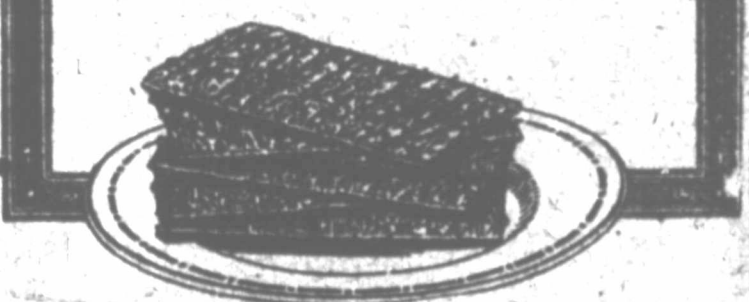

Brooklyn Fire Is Strange Crime of Family Vengeance

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—A strange crime of family vengeance which took the lives of five innocent persons besides that of the intended victim was unearthed by Fire Marshal Thomas Brophy, in the alleged confession of Raymond Anderson, 18, of his part in setting a blaze which killed the six victims in Bath Beach early last Monday.

Wm. M. Ford, real estate broker, and Anderson are held on charges of murder and arson, and a third man is being sought. It was Ford's hatred of his father-in-law, Geo. F. Keim, playwright and author of "Ginger," his first Broadway success, that led to the crime, Anderson is said to have told the fire marshal.

"All right, I'll tell the truth. I haven't eaten since Monday. This thing has broken my heart," Anderson said to have cried when Fire Marshal Brophy came to his home and hinted that the cause of the fire was known.

Anderson, an unemployed youth, who did odd jobs for Ford, then told his strange story, winding it up with the statement that Ford said to him after the result of the fire was known:

Anderson told the police and the first marshal that he had refused to eat since the fire and that Ford and the other man started the fire while he sat in Ford's automobile and waited for them.

Brophy said he had secured the testimony of Dorothy and Gertrude Johns, telephone operators, who took an automobile ride with Ford and Anderson shortly before the fire, and of a waiter in a Bath Beach restaurant to back up in every detail the story of Anderson regarding the movements of himself, Ford and the other man immediately before the fire.

He said they also obtained legal records in an assault case brought by Keim against Ford some time ago, to show that Ford had threatened to kill Keim.

First Man May Have Been Woman Says Professor

NEW YORK, Oct. 12. (AP)—The first man may have been a woman. This is the opinion expressed by Professor J. H. McGregor, research associate in human anatomy at the American Museum of Natural History, who recently returned from Europe, where he studied the fossil remains of Pithecanthropus erectus, or the man-ape.

The specimen was discovered at Trinil, Java, 1891-92, by Professor Eugene Dubois of the University of Amsterdam. Many experts have written about the "missing link" with the man-ape as their subject.

Professor McGregor said the idea that the man-ape may have been a "woman-ape" is based on measurements of the left thigh bone. Instead of being straight up and down like a man's, it has an obliquity of form similar to a woman's.

Professor McGregor said he was of the opinion that the specimen was close to man, although not necessarily ancestral.

"As some one has well expressed it," he said, "it may be a great uncle rather than a grandfather."

Says Ford Can Head Dry Ticket If He Wants To

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 12. (AP)—The prohibition party's nomination for president in 1934 is Henry Ford if he wants it, according to a statement issued here by Virgil G. Hinshaw of Washington, D. C., chairman of the prohibition national committee.

Mr. Ford looked favorably on the offer of the prohibition party to give him the nomination in 1934 and would have accepted it had he not been persuaded by followers of Woodrow Wilson to stay out of the race, Mr. Hinshaw asserted. Prohibitionists generally favor Ford more than any other man discussed for the presidency, according to opinions expressed at a conference yesterday between Mr. Hinshaw and dry leaders and will be willing to compromise with other parties to secure an agreement on his nomination.

In connection with his statement the national committee chairman issued a call for a national conference at Washington, December 12. The two-fold purpose of which will be to "analyze and remedy present conditions as to the enforcement of prohibition laws and to arrange the time and place of meeting of the national convention in 1934."

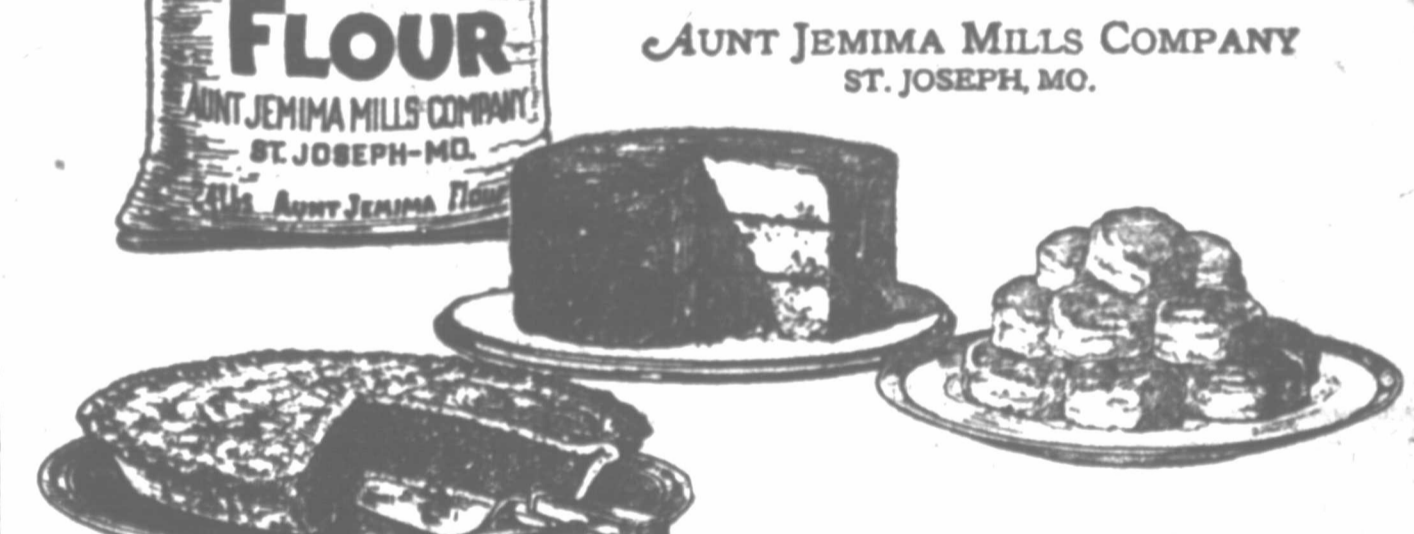

CROP CONDITION IN TEXAS BETTER THAN LAST YEAR

HOUSTON, Texas, Oct. 18.—General crop conditions in Texas are better as a whole than at the same time last year, according to the bi-weekly crop and weather summary issued today by the U. S. Division of Crop and Livestock Estimates here. Despite the generally favorable conditions, much feed for stock will likely have to be shipped in, the report states. The summary covers conditions up to October 15.

Wheat has retarded the picking and lowered the grade of the cotton, the report declares. Leaf-worms, bollworms and weevils continue active. Most of the cotton is being marketed very promptly upon picking, according to the report.

The weather was favorable for the picking of the cotton, and for the planting of a fine ground for winter wheat in the spring, according to the summary. Heavy rains of recent date damaged the cotton crop, however.

Summary of conditions of the various crops follows:

Corn: Most of the crop is maturing and gathered; where cotton picking is finished, time has become available for gathering corn. There will be but little surplus for sale.

Hay: Bermuda and orchards are being cut for another cutting; rains have helped quantity, but injured quality of harvest.

Wheat: Crop is being headed or shocked. Much of the surplus will go to deficient corn counties.

Peanuts: Conditions continue to improve; some harvesting under way.

Wheat, oats, rye: Preparation of land is active; growing is well along.

Produce: Harvest continues; prices unsteady.

Potatoes: Harvest is gaining momentum; prices are falling. Some curing houses will not operate this season.

Livestock and pasture: Stock of all kinds is fattening rapidly and will go into winter in good condition; grain abundant almost everywhere.

Seize Three Truck Loads of Beer In Charge of Prohibition Agents Who Had Been Successfully Bribed

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—The anti-liquor in the federal government's double barreled volley fired yesterday into the wet forces of New Jersey and New York came last night with the seizure of three truck loads of beer entering New York from the Jersey shore in charge of two prohibition agents, thought by the alleged owners of the liquor to have been successfully bribed.

The agents after having accepted money offered as a bribe accompanied the beer to "ward off the police" and permitted the three trucks to get well into the city before the seizure was made. Six men were arrested.

Chief Enforcement Officer Yelawich said this cargo was only the first of several hundred the New Jersey liquor men thought they were going to get into New York under the protection of agents.

Earlier in the day federal agents working under direct orders from Washington bagged 11 alleged conspirators in the Hotel Pennsylvania and elsewhere who were alleged to have used \$50,000 to bribe agents not to stop brewing in Jersey City under the protection of agents.

The alleged conspirators were met at the hotel by appointment one at a time and arrested.

United States Attorney Hayward said the government had confiscated \$50,000 given to agents as bribes and declared that probably \$750,000 had been given in bribes since the conspiracy originated.

"Part of the alleged conspiracy revealed a shocking and sensational state of affairs in New Jersey and possibly Pennsylvania," Mr. Hayward stated. "State and other officials, politicians and persons high in social standing were in league with the bootleggers conspirators."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Solicitor General James M. Beck, who tries all government cases before the supreme court, was not overjoyed to have before him the constitution to provide that more than a bare majority of the court be required to invalidate laws on the grounds that they are unconstitutional.

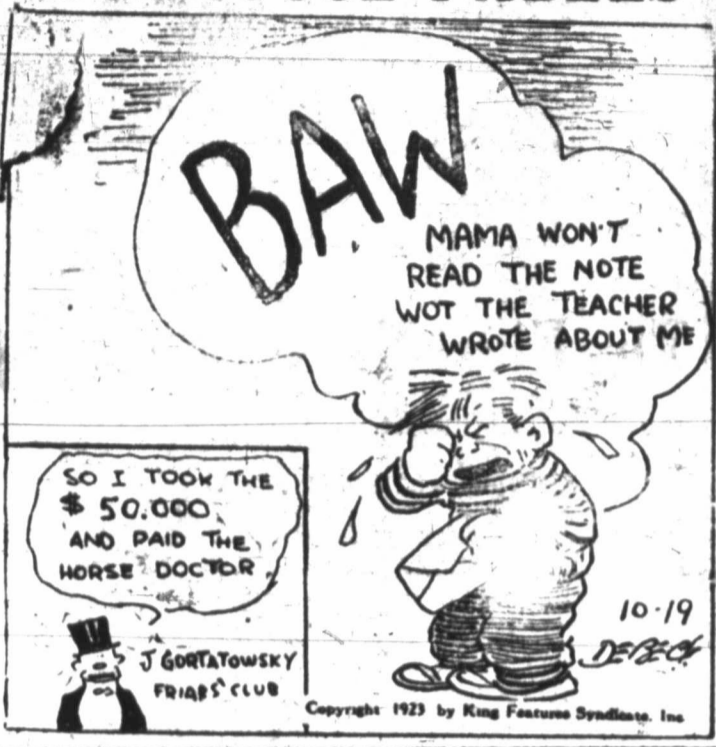

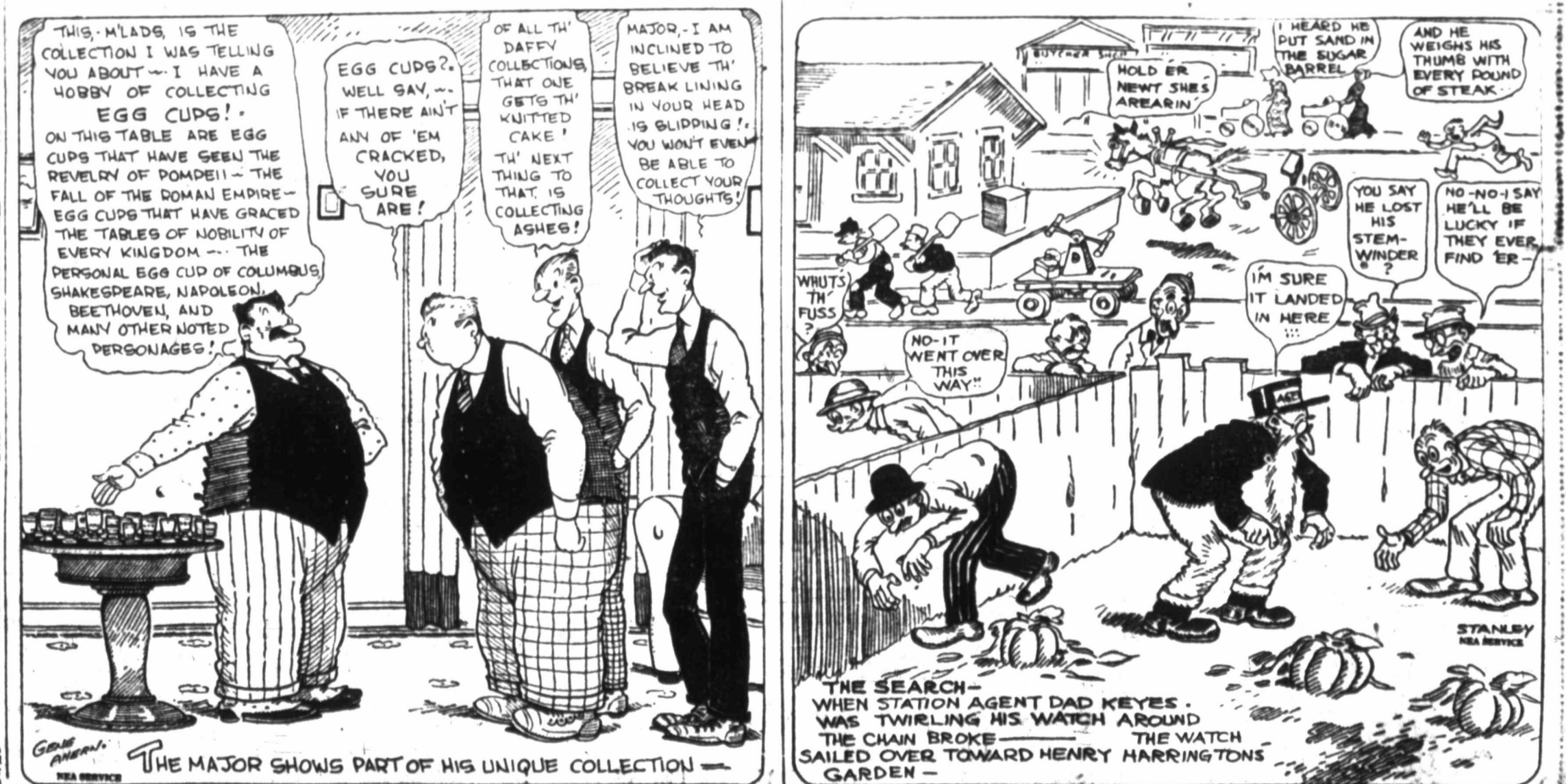
