REPUBLICANS ARE CONCERNED ABOUT ORGANIZING 88TH

BALANCE BETWEEN THE TWO DOMINANT PARTIES BELIEVED

PROGRESSIVES HOLDING WHIP HAND IN CONGRESS

Can Block Election of Both Speaker of House and President of Senate

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—Whether the Republicans will be able to originate the house and senate immediately upon the convening of the 88th congress is a subject of concern to some of their leaders.

The balance between the two dominant parties in both houses is believed to be a small group of Republican progressives and the

majority of the Democrats. It is the opinion of both the speaker of the house and the president of the senate.

This situation gives the progressives a strategic point from which they are expected to avoid their demands as to the character of organization and legislation.

A majority of the members in necessary for the organization of each house. The Republicans will have not to exceed 41 members in the senate—one seat normally held by a Republican.

Members constitute a majority. The three progressives could prevent an election unless the Republican state could draw support from the Democrats.

The Democrats a possibility which is not now receiving serious consideration.

In the house the Republicans will have a majority and to succeed their plan and so it will be possible for the delegation from a single Republican state, such as Wisconsin, to hold up the organization program.

The progressives of the house, organized and militant, are preparing to take advantage of this situation and it is believed now that they will undertake to force compromise from the majority leadership, particularly with reference to committee assignments and considerations for their support of the party.

FORD SUPPORTERS PLAN TO ORGANIZE POLITICAL PARTY

DETROIT, Oct. 22.—Formation of a new national political party with Henry Ford as its standard bearer will be undertaken by a national organization conference of all Ford for President Clubs to be held here December 12, 13 and 14.

The call for the organization conference was decided upon at a meeting last night of several Michigan Ford clubs.

The conference, according to leaders from several states, will plan a date and place for holding a nominating convention this spring.

The call for the conference will go out in a few days, it was stated by William Kronberg, secretary of the Dearborn Ford for President Club.

The Dearborn club, he said, had been inactive for some time owing to the inability to obtain from Henry Ford any statement as to whether he would accept nomination by a party the club might organize.

Mr. Kronberg estimated the number of Ford clubs now in existence at between 250 and 400 and added that he was advised the organization conference would attract at least 3,000 delegates and visitors.

Sessions of the organization conference, he said, would be held in the auditorium at Dearborn, home of Henry Ford.

DENY THAT FRANCE IS RESPONSIBLE FOR MOVE IN RHINELAND

PARIS, Oct. 22.—There is absolutely no foundation for the assertion made by former Prime Minister Lloyd George as quoted in messages received from the United States that French money was behind the Rhineland separatist movement.

It was said at the French foreign office today. Mr. Lloyd George himself, it was added, furnished the refutation of his own assertion when he remarked that one of the consequences of separation would be that France would find it more difficult to collect reparations.

That, it was remarked, was one of the reasons why the French were entirely disinclined to the promotion of the venture. Another reason was that there was little reason to believe the movement general and likely to succeed.

Two of British Missionaries In Pitiful Plight

PERKINS, Oct. 22.—The pitiful plight of two British missionaries, the Misses Mary Darroch of Glasgow, Scotland, and Mary Harp of Hill Crest, South Australia, who were captured by bandits in Honan province last month and are being held in the mountainous straits of the southwest, is described in dispatches from Kailang.

F. H. Joyce, another missionary, who has been trading the border in the hope of procuring the release of the women, reported that he has just interviewed a messenger from the bandits who told of the extreme suffering and hardships undergone by the women since their capture.

He said they had been dragged from place to place in the mountainous country of Honan and were clad only in thin ragged garments.

The captives, the messenger stated, are given but little to eat and are in a wretched condition.

The messenger said that the leaders of the bandits sent him out for urgent necessities, giving him money to purchase them. He said he was assembling these supplies in the hope of relieving the suffering of the captives.

Reports from Honan indicate utter lack of official cooperation in the efforts to rescue the women.

Young County Is Enjoying Benefit Of Diversification

GRAHAM, Texas, Oct. 22.—Graham has not suffered the bank set that most oil towns have felt during the present depression. This is due to the fact that Graham and Young county do not have to depend solely on oil for support. Some of the best small grain land and some of the very best cotton land in Texas is located in Young county, and with favorable seasons, like we have had this year, the value of the crops has been unusually good with prices modern. The cotton crop is good, much better than expected, and the price has been sufficient to turn loose a volume of money in Graham and Young county which is reflected in every line of business.

Aside from agriculture, the livestock industry has always received attention in this county, and in addition to this, plans are being closed up for a first class, thoroughly equipped creamery which will be in operation in 60 days. This, added to our other resources, will put the community on a very substantial basis. With cream checks for running expenses, the farmer will feed his skimmed milk to fine bred hogs and chickens which will be a substantial and dependable market, will find himself growing rich.

It must be remembered that as an oil field Young county is just in its infancy, barely two years old. We have the largest potential oil field in north Texas, and with the first glimpse of improved conditions, the drills will start down on locations already made north, south, east and west from Graham.

THIRTY MEMBERS ATTEND MEETING OF H-I-Y CLUB

Matters of importance were discussed and voted upon at the regular weekly meeting of the local H-I-Y club at the First Methodist church, South, Monday night. About 30 members were in attendance. Three new members were elected by the club and it was also voted to suspend the taking in of new members for a period of five weeks. As to the amount of fines, it was decided to assess a fine of 25 cents for disorderly conduct, with a three week suspension after being fined as much as 40 cents for this offense. The members also decided on a 25-cent fine for failure to appear on the program without a reasonable excuse.

CITY COUNCIL DISCUSSES MATTER OF COLLECTING PAST DUE SEWERAGE TAXES

Burton Stuyveson, public utilities commissioner, Monday night at the city council meeting launched an effort to collect \$18,574 in delinquent funds due on city sewerage taxes. He declared that \$31,752 had been collected by the city water department on the sewerage taxes since the collection was turned over to that department about a year ago. At that time the city bills for sewerage were transferred from the city tax assessor's office to the office of the water superintendent. R. E. Shepherd, finance commissioner, declared that the money was badly needed and that immediate collections would be a means of raising money for the operation of the city.

ACTION DEFERRED ON OHIO AVENUE PAVING UNTIL NEXT MEETING

The city council opened bids on the paving of Ohio avenue from Sixth to Tenth street at the regular weekly meeting Monday night. The bids were opened and the contractor was selected by the city. The matter will be discussed and thrashed out with the contractor officials as to their part in repaving the tracks and installing new foundations and their part of the paving expense before action is taken by the council.

KATY CITY TAXES ARE REDUCED BY COUNCIL

At the regular weekly meeting of the city council Monday night the city fathers agreed to reduce the city taxes against the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad to a sum equal that paid by the Fort Worth & Denver railroad. A complaint was filed before the council some time ago by the Katy and their representative at that time declared that a representative had not been called before the equalization tax board.

Katy properties in Wichita Falls were taxed \$252 by the board and at the Monday night meeting the tax was reduced to \$212.50, the same as the tax of the Fort Worth & Denver.

The hearing on the paving of Eighth street between Van Buren and Denver streets has been continued by the city council. It will probably be taken up at the next meeting. The proposition has been under consideration for some time.

Lloyd George Praises U. S. Army And Makes Eloquent Appeal for Cooperation to Bring About Peace

CADLE TABERNACLE, INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 22.—Before an audience largely composed of veterans of the world war, in the state which gave birth to the man who fired the first American shot and to one who was the first to fall after America entered the struggle, David Lloyd George, leader of Britain's war forces, made his greatest appeal for world peace.

The speech, urging cooperation between English speaking nations to end war, was the most forceful, the most eloquent, the most brilliant, he has delivered on his American tour.

Inspired by the presence of the American Legionnaires and of the flag they carried across to France, the former premier rose to oratorical heights which lifted the audience to responsive enthusiasm.

Reciting the ghastly horrors of war and the ghastly part he had in it, Lloyd George, in tragic tones exclaimed:

"I don't want to do it again! I don't want anyone else to do it again!"

"As long as I live," he added, "this shall be my plea, that there shall be no more war, but that your nation and our nation should unite to clear the way for the Angel of Peace with its message of peace on earth, good will to men!"

Defensive Applause.

This was greeted with deafening applause.

In another portion of his speech Lloyd George indirectly criticized the policy which France is now pursuing toward Germany, declaring that Germany is crushed and vanquished and should not be whipped while she is down. He dropped into the vernacular of the prize ring in saying this and apologized for it, explaining that in other language could better explain his meaning. He said the policy of Abraham Lincoln of "non-resistance, not vengeance," should be adopted to the cause of Germany.

The speech was delivered in Cadle Tabernacle, estimated to seat 10,000. Hundreds were turned away. A section of the hall was reserved for veterans of the world war. American Legion members marched into the hall and placed their flags on the platform at the left of the speaker. Senator Ralston, some times mentioned as a possible nominee of the Democrats for president, got a big cheer when he came in and seated himself on the platform.

Lloyd George was half an hour late in reaching the hall. When he entered at 8:20, accompanied by Dame Margaret and Miss Megan Lloyd George, and others in his party, he was given a two minute ovation.

Present Medallion.

A medallion was presented to him on behalf of the state.

Beginning his speech with an expression of thanks for the cordiality of Indiana's greeting, Lloyd George said it was an honor to receive a welcome from a state which

had taken such an honored part in every struggle in which the country was engaged. It was a pleasure, he said, to be present at a meeting organized by the American Legion, adding that he regretted he could not attend their convention recently held in San Francisco.

"We were glad to see them some years ago," he added with a smile. "The first sight we had of their uniforms give us a thrill of relief and hope and courage which is difficult for us to appreciate. Things were not going very well in Europe at that time. The greatest army the world has ever seen, were the words I heard General Foch use about the German army that marched through Belgium. Millions were dead, many more millions were wounded, our hospitals were filled and the prospect was not a promising one."

"Just then the great republic of the west sprang into the arena with its sword drawn to fight the battle of right in the field of Europe. When we saw you from the west with your soldiers marching in the streets of London and on to France, what a thrill it gave us."

Response Was Prompt.

"When the great peril came in March, 1918, when our lines were broken, when Russian war practically out of the fighting and Germany was able to bring her army from the eastern front and throw it in against the green army of the allies on the west, I remember sending a telegram to your president asking him to send even a small detachment over to give spirit and courage to those broken lines. And his response was prompt. The Americans began to come and the very fact that they were coming gave courage to the allies all along those shattered fronts."

"At the battle of Chateau Thierry the American army won a signal victory and that no doubt helped to restore the fullest confidence among the allied forces. When I saw that you from the west with your back to me the thrill that I had in those days when they came across to join in the fight for liberty."

Lloyd George recited the steps today in 1918 to bring about a united command for the allied armies. He paid tribute to General Pershing "for the help he gave at a critical moment in establishing unity of command" and also praised General Bliss for the support given him in the fight to have a central command.

Indiana's Fine Record.

Calling attention to the fact that Indiana had the largest number in proportion to population of all the states, he said this was a fine record.

"Burke, Chatham and North all opposed the policy which brought about the American revolution," Lloyd George said, "and there is not a school book in England today which does not teach the folly of that policy. George Washington was the founder of the present British Empire, America was great when she fought for liberty, but I think she was greater when she sent her bravest sons across the sea to fight autocracy. In its fair

Lloyd George provoked a wave of applause by asking the question: "Who won the war?" and then answering it as follows:

"There are many claimants, but I'll tell you who won the war. It was the humble man in the steel helmet. It was the man who faced the steel arrows and the bullets without flinching. God bless the man in the steel helmet, and his children!"

No selfish interest.

Britain had no selfish interest in the war, Lloyd George said, adding that Germany was England's best customer.

"Why did we do it?" he asked. "I'll tell you. Because Germany was attempting to crush a little nation which we had vowed to protect. It was because we stood for a square deal among nations."

Urging cooperation between Britain and the United States to restore peace, the former premier said if the two nations were not willing to do this he feared for the outcome.

"The next thing is the Lincoln touch," he declared. "What do I mean? It is conciliation and not vengeance. His lesson is the lesson to the world at this hour. In the language of the prize ring where a man is counted out it isn't sportsmanlike to go and kick him while he is down. Having beaten the autocracy that threatened us, having overthrown it, it is a broken creature at our feet. Having overthrown the autocracy let us not undertake to crush a nation. Let us have peace among nations. Vengeance is a poor thing in the world. Eighteen fifteen produced a war; 1870 produced another; let not the great war of 1914-18 produce another. Let us have the doctrine of Lincoln for peace throughout the world."

Ten to fifteen million of the best young men of Europe slaughtered! Is that to be repeated? Do not let the altar upon which they were set up, the altar upon which they were sacrificed, be set up again.

"My plea here is as one who saw the war from the beginning right through to the end for four and a half years manufacturing the weapons of slaughter. I don't want to do it again. I don't want anyone else to do it again—and as long as I live this shall be my plea, that there shall be no more war, but that your nation and our nation should unite to clear the way for the Angel of Peace with its message of peace on earth, good will to men."

After the speech ended, the "Star Spangled Banner" was sung, in which Lloyd George joined heartily. The party then left for Cleveland, with a stop early Tuesday morning at Marion, Ohio, where a wreath will be laid on the tomb of President Harding as part of the day's program.

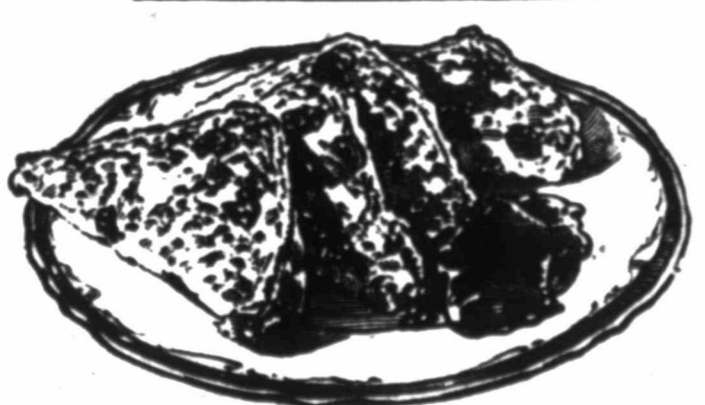

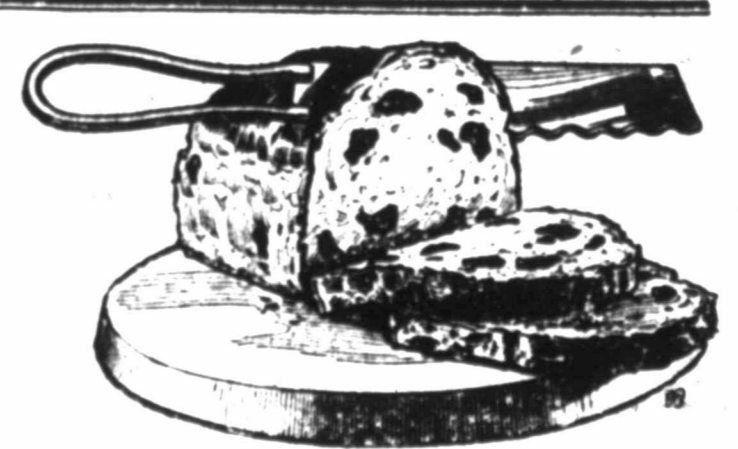

TRADING PAST WEEK FEATURED BY LIQUIDATION TIRE ISSUES.

OVERPRODUCTION OF OIL REFLECTED IN PRICES

Business Expected to Continue Good Through Remainder of This Year.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—The new week opens with a large short interest in the stock market, although trading was featured by liquidation in the tire issues, because of the approach of cold weather which should tend to some degree to a slackening of pleasure trips. Reduction in the price of tires may mean that the big companies desire to reduce stocks for the winter months. A large amount of tires were produced in the first quarter of the year as was the case in oil and copper. Overproduction of oil has been reflected in the last week in crude and gasoline prices.

The proposed reduction in freight rates on wheat is another factor making for lower costs to the wheat grower. On the other hand, it is likely that the automobile companies are placing more orders at this time than usual.

A large amount of money seeking investment is reported by bankers, particularly in tax exempt securities. This was evident, it was pointed out, by the quick sales of federal land bank bonds, and the state of Illinois issue.

Easier money rates would mean a slackening in business which is not looked for by certain leading industry who are now predicting good business for next spring. Construction has fallen off a little in September and any reduction in steel prices it is held would stimulate the demand for construction steel and railroad equipment.

LONDON MARKET INFLUENCED BY EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

LONDON, Oct. 22.—Business in the stock market has been generally disinclined to be influenced by the government's announcement of its intention to spend \$5,000,000 pounds on public works to give employment to the idle, and the definite disavowal of a policy of gradual inflation of currency to stimulate trade.

The announcement was generally approved as the rumor of the proposed inflation had done great mischief to British credit abroad. Industrials generally were benefited by the government's announced intention to form a committee to investigate the Franco-German situation.

The gilt edge market saw one of the few flashes of modern times, the underwriters being left with 25 per cent of the new Nigerian four per cent loan issued at 22. A four per cent loan issued at the same time overtook the East African Light and Power preference issue.

The market remained steady, only the slightest reaction following the commonwealth loan and even making slight premiums. British rails were steady with few features, undergrounds attracting attention and registering rises. Argentine rails continued under the influence of exchange conditions.

Prices rallying at midweek on the improvement of the peso. United Havana rose a point, but Leopoldine and San Pablo suffered on setback of the Milreia. Iron, coal and steel all benefited by the government announcements as well as the companies providing building materials, prices improving throughout the day.

Textiles were all up as were also tobacco, insurance and banks were firm. Nitrates were active and better all around. Breweries were better. Copper broke throughout the week.

GOVERNMENT ISSUES STRUCTURE MAP OF TONKAWA OIL FIELD

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—An underground structure map and three engineering cross sections of the Tonkawa oil field, Kay and Noble counties, Oklahoma, have been prepared by petroleum engineers of the department of the interior, attached to the Bartlesville experimental station of the Bureau of Mines.

The geologic structure is shown by 10 foot contours drawn to represent the top of the Tonkawa sand, which is the thickest and most productive sand of the field. In addition to the structure contours, the map shows the property lines, correct locations, elevations and well numbers of wells that have been drilled and those that were drilled on September 1, 1922. The map is drawn to scale of 1,000 feet to one inch.

The three engineering cross sections should be of interest, not only to those operators in the field who may have experienced trouble in correlating the oil sands and choosing casing points for their wells, but also to those who are unfamiliar with this field and who desire to know the number, position and depth of the various oil sands.

One cross section is along a line running north and south through the center of the field on which was plotted, in respect to their correct locations, the logs of 84 wells, many of which are twins and triplicates producing from different sands. A second cross section is through a line of wells extending east and west in the northern part of the field.

Mainly for the purpose of correlating the principal sands and limestone beds, a third cross section was drawn diagonally northwest-southwest across the field and includes wells that were drilled some distance off the main structure.

The structure map and the three cross sections are now available to the public and may be obtained from the Bartlesville Chamber of Commerce, Bartlesville, Okla. To cover the cost of printing, a charge of 50 cents for the set is being made, postage stamps not acceptable.

Safety Work in Oil Field.
 H. C. Miller, associate petroleum engineer, department of the interior, attached to the San Francisco office of the Bureau of Mines, has completed the tabulation of 4,100 accidents occurring during 1921 and 1922 in the producing departments of ten representative oil companies operating in California. These were classified in 102 subdivisions under thirty-five divisions, showing extent and disability, part of the body affected, days lost, etc.

On tabulating the results it was found that machinery at drilling and producing wells caused 14.6 per cent of the accidents and 28.75 per cent

of the days lost in the field. Mr. Miller recently spent some time in the San Joaquin and southern California fields gathering photographs and data relative to safety appliances on the draw-works, rotary engines and rotary tables at drilling wells. He is now working on the first of a series of papers on "Safety and Safety Appliances in the Oil Fields." This first paper will be a statistical review of the 4,100 accidents and will contain a tentative set of safety suggestions for the California petroleum industry. Most of the work of drawing up these suggestions has been done by the California oil men and the California State Industrial Accident Commission and it is believed they embody a great many good ideas on this subject that will be helpful to other states which sooner or later will be called upon to draft a similar code.

Weathering of Oil Shale.
 A report test has been made at the Boulder, Colorado, office of the Bureau of Mines, department of the interior, on a sample of oil shale which had been exposed to the weather for four months. There was found to be practically no change in the quantity or quality of the oil produced from the shale before and after the period of exposure to the weather.

Delinquent Tax Payments to City Are On Increase

City Tax Collector Rizer was overjoyed Tuesday morning by the returns received from the second notices which have been mailed out to the number of delinquent tax payers of 1928. The records show that \$216,555 was paid the city for 1928 delinquent taxes Monday.

Rizer declared that the notices were causing much talk and that the response was better than expected the first day. Notices have been mailed to more than half of the 45,000 delinquent taxpayers by the delinquent tax office.

All possible efforts are being made by the delinquent office to collect back taxes. The city is in need of funds for operating expenses and the tax collector is attempting to raise the money by collecting from delinquents in order that it will not be necessary for the municipal board to borrow more money to pay operating expenses.

King Emperor Endorses Plan of Lloyd George

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Oct. 22.—Appreciation of the plan outlined by David Lloyd George for harmonizing and unifying Great Britain and the United States in purpose and ideals is expressed in a telegram received by the former British premier today from Atlanta and signed by "William Joseph Simmons, emperor of the Invisible Empire," of the Ku Klux Klan.

"May I not tender to you," the telegram said, "my deep appreciation of the plan you outlined for harmonizing and unifying Great Britain and the United States in purpose and ideals. The order of which I have the honor to be the founder and responsible head and composed of millions of native born white Protestant citizens of this country has as a part of its program of creating the unification of the two white English speaking nations of the world."

"Neither the League of Nations nor the international court can accomplish the ends so earnestly desired. A simple compact between sovereign nations dissimilar in color and creed and the end is maintained. The international court can not coerce and restrain the nations of the earth into harmonious and amicable relations."

"Your country and my country must be linked together by the ties of blood or sympathy of common destiny to preserve our Anglo-Saxon civilization and to safeguard the world against recurrence of war. In any event Great Britain and the United States must be united in the deeper and finer things of democracy and determined that white men shall never cease to be the dominant race in anywhere upon the face of the earth."

Revenue Agents Held In Jail for Theft of Liquor

DOYLESTOWN, Pa., Oct. 22.—Revenue agents arrested yesterday charged with systematic stealing liquor from the Philadelphia Pure Rye Whiskey Distilling Company's warehouse at Edgington, spent the night in the county jail, having been unable to obtain the bond for an accident at 4 o'clock Monday morning, when they were held after a preliminary hearing before a magistrate. The eighth man produced the bond and was released. All will be given another hearing Saturday.

The revenue officers who had been detailed to reorganize the 22,000 stock of liquor stored in the warehouse were arrested by members of the Pennsylvania state police as they were about to board a train for their homes in Philadelphia. According to police, they carried seven suit cases filled with whiskey.

Heavy Northeast Gale Is Lashing Virginia's Coast

NORFOLK, Va., Oct. 22.—Heavy northeast gale that has been lashing the Virginia coast for the last two days, continued with a gale force, causing heavy damage and forcing shipping not already at sea to remain in port. The Cape Charles lightship has been blown from her moorings, and this morning the principal business streets of this city were a foot under water at high tide.

The wind reached its highest velocity last night when the station at Cape Henry reported the gauge showed 46 miles an hour. The wind forced the tide into the Elizabeth river and into the city and street car service in the business section, was suspended.

PLANS ARE BEING MADE TO CUT OFF LIQUOR SUPPLIES

REINFORCED COAST GUARD FLEET WILL COMBAT SMUGGLING.

TO INSPECT BREWERIES AND THE DISTILLERIES

Will Require Additional Appropriations Over Total For Current Year.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—Plans are being laid by the treasury to check supplies of liquor reaching the illicit trade both at the seaport and possible domestic sources.

Reinforced coast guard fleet to combat smuggling and a system of inspection of breweries and distilleries are the proposed means.

Following the suggestions of Senator Pinchot of Pennsylvania on Monday as to means of drying up domestic liquor sources a statement issued by prohibition commissioner Hayes announced that "provision already has been made in treasury decision 2521" for "internal inspections" of breweries and distilleries by enforcement officials.

The plan, treasury officials said, will require additional appropriations over those for the current fiscal year, however, and there was no indication of when it might be put into effect.

It was said to be aimed chiefly at what officials described as a rapidly increasing supply of high power beer. Secretary Mellon was said to favor a return to the old arrangement of putting a treasury agent on guard at all breweries.

The plan for an augmented coast guard force would require additional appropriations by congress of approximately \$12,000,000. While it has not yet been placed before secretary Mellon, the tentative scheme of Hayes in charge of the service calls for the addition of more than a score of cutters and about 25 fast power boats to cope with offshore smuggling.

As to other suggestions in Governor Pinchot's statement Mr. Hayes announced that a policy of incorporating in federal permits for the manufacture, transportation and storage of liquor, the conditions to be observed had been in effect for several weeks. The penalty of revocation for discovered violations of the law, he said, was a permanent provision of the law.

His father gave a pint of blood in an effort to save his life, but he died at 3 o'clock Saturday morning.

The whole town of Rule is mourning the death of the young man. The accident is known lovingly by his friends as "Babe" was a town favorite. He was buried Sunday afternoon. Rev. J. H. Hayes of Murray, Texas, and Rev. Hredlove of the Rule pastor, conducted the service. Less than half of the crowd that came to pay their last tribute to this splendid boy could get into the church.

The father and mother are both prostrate over his death. They only have one other child, a son, who is attending McMurray College.

Certainly at the time the committee of the Jockey Club made its selection of the American color bearer in the match race, there still existed sufficient uncertainty as to whether Zev or My Own were the better horse to make the wisdom of the committee's choice most doubtful.

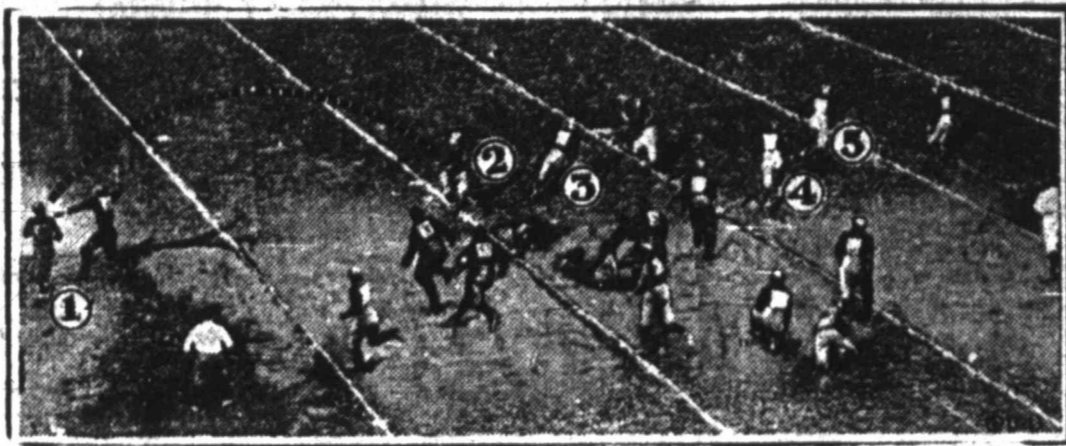

Fort Worth North Side High Is Suspended From League Until the Close of 1924 Football Season

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 22.—The Fort Worth North Side High School was suspended from the University Interscholastic League in football until the close of the 1924 football season, by action of the state executive committee of the league at its meeting here Thursday afternoon. The reasons for this suspension are outlined in a letter from Roy Bechtel, secretary of the committee, to Professor C. A. Gardner, principal of the North Side High School, Fort Worth, as follows:

"The Interscholastic League state executive committee on November 4, 1923, after due hearing in the respective cases, declared the following players on the North Side High School team of 1923 ineligible for further participation in interscholastic league athletic contests: Herman Clark, Pinner, Lefty Williams and Walter Hollander."

"At the meeting of the same committee on October 10, 1923, it being claimed that new evidence had been discovered, the case of Walter Hollander, upon motion of Professor H. J. Kettinger (who is a member of the committee and has been in conference with authorities of your school), was taken up for reconsideration. The committee at this meeting requested further information and testimony in this case before taking final action. You submitted additional testimony by wire October 11. Before the committee could act on this testimony, however, you used this player, Walter Hollander, in an inter-school game with North Dallas High School on October 12.

"The introduction of article eight of our constitution and rules which contains our eligibility rules, says: 'Member schools agree to observe these rules in all inter-school contests, whether a school is another member of the league or not.' 'Section 12, article eight, says: 'A school which continues to use contestants who have been declared ineligible shall be suspended from the league for a period of from one to three years in the event in which the infraction is made.' 'We have your acceptance of the football plan of the league and your membership fee, constituting an agreement upon your part to observe these rules in all inter-school contests, whether with another member of the league or not. 'The use of Hollander in the above-mentioned game is, in the opinion of the committee, a clear infraction of the rules in peculiar circumstances which leave no reasonable doubt that you and your school were on due notice of the rules of the league. Professor Kettinger informed the committee that he explicitly warned you of the rules of the league and that your school had been passed upon until his case had been passed upon. 'A copy of this letter is being sent to the respective principals of Fort Worth city schools. Since it is necessary for member schools to be advised of this suspension as quickly as possible, we shall give the press a statement of the case in the next day or two.'

CHAUFFEUR OF COUPLE IS WOUNDED SERIOUSLY

Chicago Man in Place Was Shot Six Times and Hit Arms Twice.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 23.—Mr. and Mrs. Richard Grant of Chicago were shot and killed in a dance hall in the western part of the city today.

Wilfred Stankner, their chauffeur, was shot in the chest and arm and taken to the hospital.

Grant was about 35 years old. He was shot six times and his wife twice.

The dance hall was in the rear of the "Plantation" club and Joseph Haraway, proprietor, named Charles Hutton and Sam Blaser, employees, told police the following story.

Grant and his wife had just arrived at the inn about 1:30 a. m. and took seats at a table in the dance hall.

A few minutes after the shooting they re-entered the place and saw Grant, his wife and Stankner lying on the floor of the dance hall.

Later Stankner retained consciousness and gave police the following account:

The Grant party was alone in the dance hall when the shooting started. Stankner struck the one nearest to him in an effort to knock her "revolver" from his hands.

The other two then opened fire. Stankner said he then lost consciousness.

S. O. S. Call Is Broadcast From British Vessel

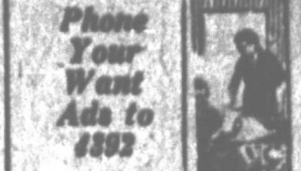
