### ANDREW BONAR LAW GREAT BRITAIN DIES

(Continued from Page One.)

1922, met and decided to withhold support from the Coalition government, which, it was felt, had outlived its emergency for which it was created. Despite his falling health, he was considered the logical successor to Lloyd George, and when the king asked him to form a ministry, he found no words behind which to couch a refusal.

He managed to conduct the affairs of his strenuous office for seven months before it became public that he was ill. In May, 1921, it was announced that the premier was suffering from a serious throat affection, and that his resignation was imminent. A few days later his formal resignation was filed with the king and Stanley Baldwin, chancellor of the exchequer, was named to succeed him.

In contrast to the spocial period during the war, the armistice and the era of reconstruction subsequent to the ending of hostilities the government of Bonar Law was difficult in importance, although it dealt with several problems of great domestic and international importance. Among these was the Irish question, the French invasion of the Ruhr Valley, which placed England in an extremely delicate position; the funding of the American debt, and the difficulties with Soviet Russia over the treatment of British subjects in the near east.

**Few Political Enemies.**

A statesman with few political enemies, the career of Bonar Law was singular. He was 43 years of age before he entered politics. A successful Glasgow iron merchant who had been born and educated in Canada, his rise to eminence in the British parliament began with his election in 1909 as a Unionist from the Blackfriars Division of Glasgow. Strong for tariff reform, he soon became noted for his clear reasoning on that subject, and as a result was made parliamentary secretary of the House of Commons. He succeeded Lloyd George as leader of the Unionist, or opposition party in the House of Commons, secretary of state for the colonies, chancellor of the exchequer, lord of the privy seal, and finally premier.

Primarily a business man, he employed the tactics of business rather than the strategy of politics in dealing with national problems. With the advent of Lloyd George as premier he became the Welshman's "John Bull," and was referred to as his "John Bull." As a member of the cabinet, as a chancellor, and as the Coalition government's leader in the House of Commons, he enjoyed the fullest confidence of his famous chief.

He interpreted administration measures, parried thrusts against the government and answered interpolations from the floor. A lithe, slim figure of a man, scarcely five feet in height, with a brilliant, mustache, bright, active eyes, and a determined set to his mouth and chin, he was a typical hard-headed Scotch business man. In addition, he was something of an orator, quick of thought and speech, using short, sharp sentences that often smacked of that bitter, cutting sarcasm for which he was famous.

It was his persistency that brought about the resumption of Gallipoli, of ill-starred Dardanelles campaign and the removal of more than 150,000 soldiers from the front, and the removal of an untenable position. His services as government leader in the House of Commons, a more

difficult and chamberless position than that of the leader of the opposition, placed Bonar Law high among his illustrious predecessors. Disraeli, Chamberlain, Balfour and A. J. Balfour.

News of his retirement due to ill health in the spring of 1921, came as a shock to his colleagues and critics to his work were paid even by former opponents. Forster, Premier Aquin said: "I have for many years been engaged in giving and taking blows from Mr. Bonar Law but they never left any scars behind them." Lloyd George, in eulogizing the retiring chancellor's lot of resignation, repeatedly choked back sobs and expressed the hope that his friend might return to his duties after a prolonged rest.

Finally the premier, who had been so courageous and powerful in the conduct of the war, sank back into his seat with features indicating his inability to continue.

**Breakdown in 1920.**

Bonar Law's breakdown, dated from shortly before the Paris peace conference of 1919, which he attended as one of the British delegates.

The disposition of Bonar Law to take the most positive stand on grave public questions caused him some embarrassment before his first retirement. He was an uncompromising foe to the Irish republican movement and when Lord Mayor MacSwiney of Cork lay dying, a hunger striker in British prison, James Henry Thomas, president of the Union Congress, representing 6,500,000 British workers, blamed Bonar Law as "the one man more than any other who has justified in Ulster and in parliament in the spirit of rebellion." In a speech in Edinburgh the chancellor prophesied that the British would fail unless it was "firm" in dealing with Sinn Fein.

The desire of Lord George and Bonar Law to resume trade relations with Russia through the soviet government also met with determined resistance from Earl Curzon, the foreign secretary. Winston Churchill, then secretary for war, and Austro-Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer. The difficulty of the situation was made greater by the attitude of France and America, where there was much opposition to the British plan.

Bonar Law was born in New Brunswick, September 13, 1858, the son of the Rev. James Law, M. A., of New Brunswick. In early youth he was taken to Glasgow where he attended high school, and finally became bookkeeper for an iron firm. Later he was made a member of the Union Congress, representing the iron workers. He retired from business to enter politics was one of the biggest iron merchants of Scotland. Golf and chess were his favorite recreations.

Nine years before his election to parliament he married Miss Annie Finlay, daughter of Glasgow, who died in 1908. Four children were born to them, two sons and two daughters. One daughter, Isabelle, became the bride of Lord Curzon, Frederick Sykes in London in 1920. Two sons, Anthony and Lieutenant T. Bonar Law were lost in the war.

**PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 25 (AP).**—Word of the death of Bonar Law was received with deep regret by David Lloyd George upon his arrival here today. News of the passing away of the British statesman was heart-felt from Mr. Lloyd George by his associates until he had finished speaking at the funeral service. He then dispatched a message to the daughter of the late premier and in a statement to the press said: "I have never known the man with deep regret tinged with relief that the long and severe suffering has at last come to a peaceful end. ### ONLY 39 CENTS OUT OF DOLLAR WILL BE USED IN OPERATION

Only 39 cents out of each dollar collected for city taxes, or a total of only \$18,745.31, will be used for the operating expenses of the city over the 1933-34 season, according to figures compiled in the tax office from the city budget. The remainder of the total city taxes—amounting in all to \$471,448.19—of \$452,702.88, will go to pay the interest on the city sinking fund. This amount will be used to pay interest on \$4,700,000 bonded indebtedness and \$540,000 in warrent notes.

In 1932 39 cents out of each dollar collected in city taxes was used to meet operating expenses. The reduction of approximately two and one-half million dollars in the city valuation in 1933 and a lower tax rate has brought about the difference in the division of the funds, it was explained.

"Last year approximately one-half million dollars in excess of the budget has been brought about the difference between the total amount of city taxes, or \$338,000, was being spent for operating expenses; this year the budget for the operation of each of the city departments shows a loss of \$482,474.18, when compared with that of the previous year.

The reduction in valuations and the cut in the city tax rate were brought about with the hope that

the collection percentage of current taxes would run well above the average. In previous years, the collection of current taxes has run about 39 per cent of the full amount; figures compiled by city officials show a slight advance over that collection this year, as well above that figure in order to avoid embarrassment for the city and operation of improved funds.

NEW YORK—Every wage-earner in the country contributes approximately \$11 a year toward the salaries of government employees. Figures just compiled by the National Industrial Conference Board show Uncle Sam's payroll—total—\$444,000,000. This represents an annual appropriation of \$2,899,000,000.

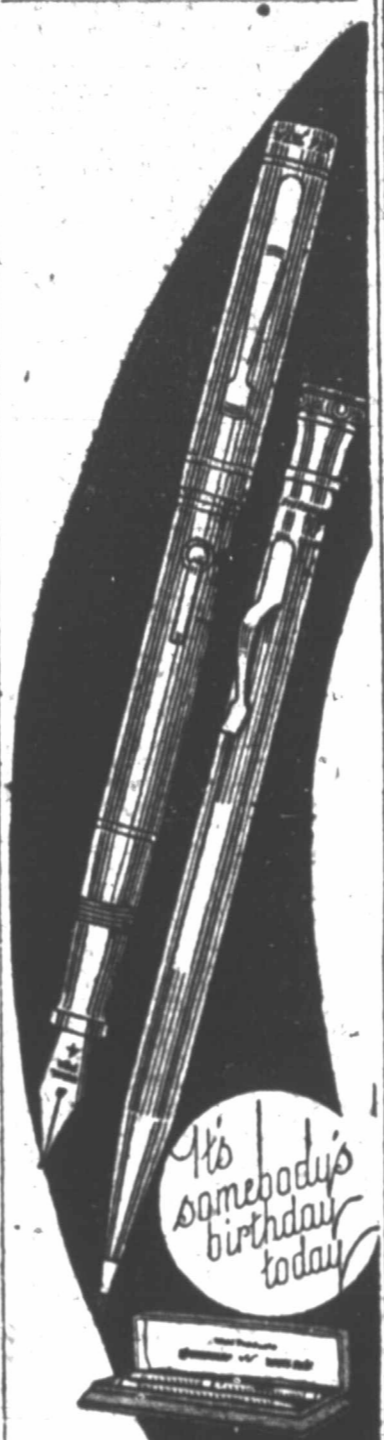

# FORTY-ONE BILLION GALLONS OF WATER ARE IN LAKE KEMP

More than 41-billion gallons of water was in Lake Kemp Tuesday and this supply would last the city of Wichita Falls for at least fifteen years without another rain or would irrigate all lands contemplated by the irrigation plans and supply the city with water for a period exceeding three years, according to the estimates of engineers for the Wichita County Water Improvement District.

Before the rain which began Friday midnight, the water in the dam was 56 feet deep and when measured Tuesday morning there was 59 and one-half feet of water in the lake at the dam. J. L. Lockridge, resident engineer of the Wichita County Water Improvement District No. 1, explained that this was more than 11,000 acre feet, or more than five billion cubic feet of water. Figuring 7 and one-half gallons to the cubic foot, which is customary in engineering, there are 41,418,000 gallons of water in Lake Kemp.

The lake is now about one-fourth full of water, according to the engineers, and it has risen rapidly following the recent heavy rains in this section.

No damage was reported to the Wichita County Water Improvement District from recent rains.

It is said that Lake Kemp is almost full of water, and that when the diversion dam is completed, with a few more heavy rains like those which have been experienced here during the last month, that reservoir will be filled.

# Excavations of Human Remains Believed Proof That Paleolithic Man Lived In U. S. 25,000 Years Ago

**SANTA BARBARA, Calif., Oct. 29.**—Proof that paleolithic man lived on the southern California coast at least 25,000 years ago is afforded by recent excavations of human remains near Santa Barbara, Calif., in the belief of Dr. J. H. Harrington, head of a party of Smithsonian Institute investigators which made the find.

Dr. Harrington said the discovery proved theories formerly held by scientists to be incorrect by at least 15,000 years and possibly more. That the Santa Barbara man was an inhabitant of the Pacific coast at the same time if not earlier than the Neanderthal man is established.

according to Dr. Harrington, by a number of features of the skulls found here. Chief of these is the thickness of the skull, the almost complete absence of forehead, the bovine characteristics of the teeth and the construction of upper and lower jaws, which resembles that evident in the lower orders.

The skull of the Santa Barbara man possessed a pronounced supra-orbital ridge without depression between the eyes as does the Neanderthal man. The thickness of the skull, more than one half inch, is almost the same.

Even more striking proof of the Santa Barbara man's age, according to Dr. Harrington, is the discovery of a number of features of the skulls found here. Chief of these is the thickness of the skull, the almost complete absence of forehead, the bovine characteristics of the teeth and the construction of upper and lower jaws, which resembles that evident in the lower orders.

The discovery of the skulls, he said, will bring about a complete revision of the theory now held by scientists as to the date of man's first appearance on the north American continent. Hitherto it has been accepted as a fact that primitive man originally came to North America from Asia via the Bering strait, about 15,000 years ago, and gradually worked his way south. The discovery of the Santa Barbara man, according to Dr. Harrington, established the fact that Burton's mound, some of the excavations and once the site of a fashionable sea side hotel, felt the tread of man 15,000 years earlier.

The spot where the primitive

skulls were found was made available for excavation by the burning of the hotel two years ago.

### Says Victims at Mer Rouge Were 'Spread Eagles' On Cart Wheels and Heads Crushed Rolling Down Hill

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 26. (AP)—A section that J. J. Bracwell, a Ku Klux Klan investigator, had told him when he went to Bastrop, La., to investigate the disappearance of two men that "there was no use for him to go to Mer Rouge; that the two bodies found in the swamp were the spread eagles—jagged cart wheels and rolled down the hill and down the cart what crushed the heads off the two bodies." was included in a deposition made by R. N. Littlejohn and read today at the hearing in Fulton county court of the suit of E. M. Rittenhouse and others for recovery for the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

Littlejohn said that he was employed at the time as an investigator for the Ku Klux Klan. He was sent to Bastrop about January 13 to make investigation. There he met Bracwell, who he said advised him to go to Mer Rouge. Littlejohn said that he operated at Bastrop under the name of George K. Lawrence.

**MISERE OF EVANS IN CHARGES IN AFFIDAVITS**

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 26.—Charges of misdeeds of the Ku Klux Klan, fee-splitting and efforts to obtain the filing of a breach of promise suit against E. M. Rittenhouse, former head of the propagation department of the Klan, returned the reading in Fulton county court here of a series of affidavits filed in the suit of David M. Rittenhouse and others for a recovery for the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. Only a portion of the affidavits gathered by the plaintiffs were read today, Judge John D. Humphreys advising that tomorrow morning when the reading will be resumed.

Two affidavits made by Mrs. Helen Steele, who filed a suit for \$100,000 against Mr. Clark, charging him with breach of promise, were read in the affidavits. The affidavits made prior to the time of the filing of the suit tell of numerous meetings with Tom Clark, former head of the Klan, in which he endeavored to induce her to file suit against him.

Steele affidavits were the last read.

Preceding this affidavit by Colonel William Joseph Simmons, commander of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, was read charging that Dr. H. W. Evans was an imperial wizard last November through operation of a deliberate plot to prevent the Klan from being placed before the Klansmen, F. L. Savage, then head of the investigation department of the Klan, and another man had called on him and told him an attack on his character would be made in the meeting and that the men accused him of making the attack.

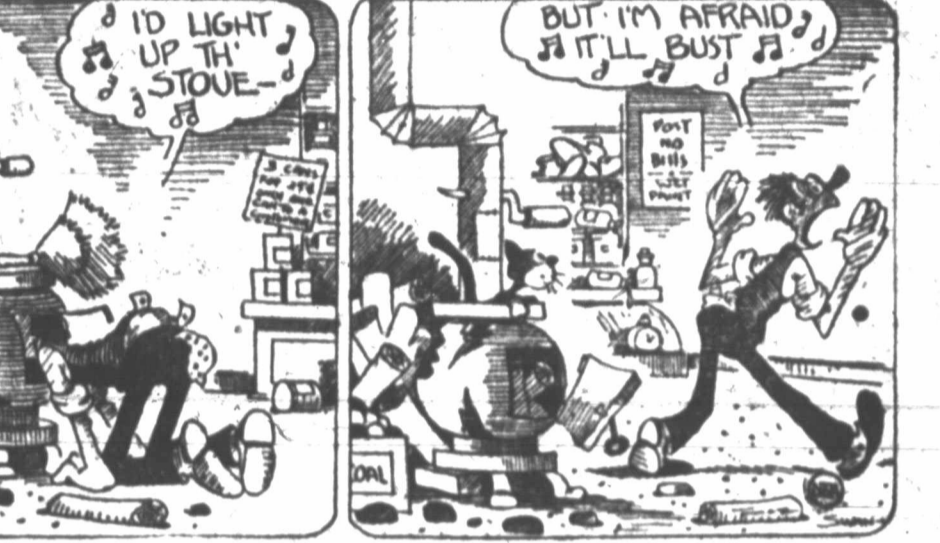

### Equipment of Library, Laboratories And Establishment of Night School At Junior College Almost Assured

Interest in adequate equipment for the library and laboratories of the new Junior College and in the establishment of a night school, was aroused at the weekly meeting of the University Club at noon Tuesday to the point where a library and other equipment were practical.

Dr. J. W. Cantwell, superintendent of city schools, spoke to the club and told of the problem which had been started. "Our chief trouble in financing the advanced program of public education which has been started in Wichita Falls, is the per cent of our maintenance fund being used to back up an extensive building program and a result small deficits are beginning to appear. Cantwell said the question is what to do with these deficits? How are we to continue in the way in which the splendid program has been started?" he continued.

"The board has to face a decrease of more than two million dollars in city revenues, a shortage of about \$1,000 in the state appropriation, an added expense of more than \$1,000 in caring for over 500 more students than were enrolled last year, and the arrangement of temporary quarters for the students," he said.

"In addition to this, they are facing the problem of a separate faculty for the Junior College, the equipment of laboratories and a library to order to carry on the program which will be recognized by the colleges and universities of the land," Dr. Cantwell continued, pointing out the importance of which the new Junior College would be equipped and operated and calling attention to the present condition of school facilities.

**Benefits of Junior College.**

"Wichita Falls has no present prospect to obtain denominational affiliation and only hope for an educational institution is for the continuation of the program started on the new Junior College. This program includes a junior college, which will be of untold benefit to the wellbeing and educational uplift of this section. I am enthusiastic for the completion of this program and want the college and business men of this city to examine our foundation and see if this thing is not important in the life of the community," Dr. Cantwell said. He called attention to what the institution will mean in both a financial and educational way and the tremendous benefits which will be derived by the entire section from its successful operation.

"Our present problem is a practical and substantial solution of the matter of equipping the college in a way that will be appealing and attractive to the students and to the school inspectors, who establish our educational rating. I am pleased that the University Club and other organizations feel an active interest in the institution and believe with this spirit that the work will continue as was originally planned," a speaker concluded.

Ira L. Cain of San Angelo, a visitor to the club, was introduced and spoke briefly. Before taking his seat, Mr. Cain offered to donate to the Junior College library a number of valuable volumes from his personal library and asked that Dr. Cantwell supply him with a list of the books needed. He was followed with offers and contributions of books and money by J. F. Marx, W. R. Chauncey, Dr. C. M. Simpson, Dr. N. F. Gratton and others.

**Resumes of Library.**

At the end of the discussion the Junior college had received donations which will furnish the nucleus of the library. Dr. Cantwell was of the opinion that the state requirements could be met with a library of 1,000 specified volumes; he estimated the expense of financing the library at \$2,500. W. B. Chauncey said that the amount could be raised by public subscription in three hours and started the donation with \$100.

Dr. N. F. Gratton, chairman of the First Presbyterian church, presented the proposition of a library for students above the scholastic age. Dr. Gratton stated that the matter was being taken up with seven civic organizations in the city with the hope that it could be financed by public subscription. He will report at the next meeting.

Last year a night school of 275 students was operated at the expense of the school board, with an expenditure of approximately \$4,000, Dr. Gratton said. He insisted that a phase of school work of this importance could be maintained on account of shortage of funds in the school treasury.

Other speakers who discussed the school problems were Mrs. M. A. Adickes, Mrs. L. R. Buchanan, W. R. Chauncey, E. R. Goodrich, Dr. G. M. Simpson and Dr. M. A. Adickes.

Committees to investigate the financing of the library and the night school were appointed and will report at the next meeting. C. A. Rogers, Dr. N. F. Gratton and County Judge B. D. Sartis will act as the committee for the night school. Dr. C. M. Simpson, P. A. Rogers and R. O. Kenley will serve on the library committee.

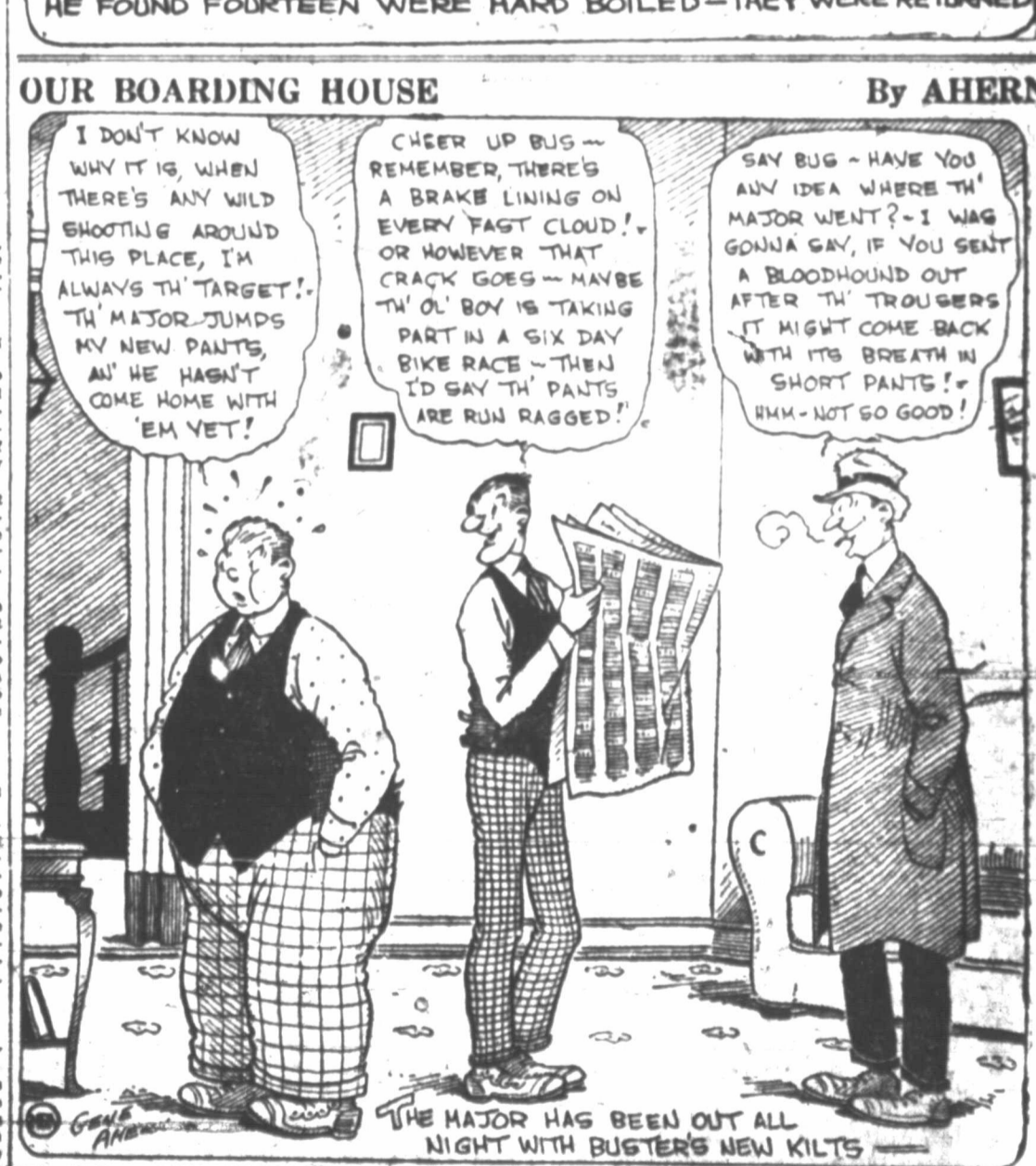

### Condemn Action Sending Rangers To San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 26. (AP)—Declarations that statements attributed to Adjutant General Thomas D. Barton, that San Antonio needs martial law, were "ridiculous," condemnation of Texas county officers for their efforts in law enforcement and unsolicited condemnation of the sending of rangers to this city are contained in a written report submitted by the 84th district court Grand Jury Tuesday.

Emil Mueller, in a minority report, declares that the rangers were ordered here by Governor Nelson and that if the rangers are criticized the law is criticized. The work done by the rangers here, he insisted, shows that local officers have not put all the liquor violators out of business.

DUESSELDORF, Oct. 26. (AP)—Hugo Stinnes and a party of industrial associates arrived in Düsseldorf today and immediately went into conference with M. Franzen, head of the inter-allied mine and factory control commission.

The conference was secret, but there were rumors that the members of the Stinnes group had come prepared to sign an agreement for the resumption of reparation deliveries.

Among the rumored terms of the proposed accord is an agreement by the industrialists to begin deliveries at once, Berlin agreeing to reimburse the operators for such deliveries after April next and also for the intervening period at some future date not yet fixed.
