So far as Fourth of July oratory goes he was a complete faffure, but in that realm of discovery and invention, which knows so artificial

"He offered his services to Lenine. Does that classify him as lacking in patriotism toward this, his adopted country, or does it disclose him as a

It is probplly true that the forts on the border have larger garrisons than are necessary to maintain them and to provide for the emergencies that may arise, but they are used partly as training grounds for the small regular army which this country must maintain, so that all the cost cannot be counted up for protection against Mexico.

In recent years these forts and these soldiers have been needed and but for them there doubtless would have been deadly and destructive forays across the border. Even with the many forts and the large garrisons raiding bands did succeed in slipping across the border taking toll of life and soperty. Happily, conditions are now more stable in Mexico at this time, but the character of the country and of the people who inhabit it make it necessary for precautionary measures such as are provided by the forts and their garrisons.

The day will come, we hope, when the forts can be rased and their garrisons discharged. This will come with the enlightenment of the people of Mexico and the establishment of better communication between all sections of that republic. Then it will be no more necessary to have forts on our southern border than on our northern where two nations adjoin for a stretch of thousands of miles without the necessity of a fort or cannon the whole distance.







## Lord Kingsborough's "Antiquities Of Mexico," Very Rare Work, Given University of Texas By Wichitan

One of the greatest acquisitions of literature ever presented to the library of the University of Texas was made several days ago by a public spirited citizen of Wichits Palls, who expended time and money in procuring the works of a famous writer for the library. At present only two copies of the work are in Texas and both sets are much sought as only a very few sets are extant in the United States.

Lord Kingaborough's "Antiquities of Mexico" in nine volumes, which was published in Lendon between 1819 and 1848, was presented to the library hy the Wichita Palls resident who conducted a search of the United States and the literary centers of Europe in his determined of fort to gain possession of a complete set of the work for the University of Texas library.

Considerable investigation was made by the Wichita Falls citizen by communication with some of the largest second hand book dealers in the United States, the congressional library at Washington and three large dealers in London. From all reports obtained the volumes purchased for the library constituted the only set for sale in the United States.

In his grateful acknowledgement of the receipt of the work, R. W. Winkler, librarian of the University

of the receipt of the work. E. W. Winkler, librarian of the University of Texas says:

Librarian's Lefter.

"It is not often that so pleasant a duty falls on a librarian as the one laid upon me by your generosity. Lord Klagsborough's "Antiquities of Mexico" (9 vols. London 1830-1848) arrived in good condition. It is one of the two copies now in Texas. I believe. It is a work that has been wanted for many years by hembers of the faculty of the university and it fits exactly if so the very good collection on Maxico (The Garcia collection) in this 'thrary, and is appreciated like something that has been wanted for a long time. In my estimation, there is only one other work whose acquisition would produce as much genuine pleasure as that occasioned by this gift: I refer to Aughton's "Birds of America." On behalf of the board of regents and the patrons of this library. It appears that much money had been spent by the author and his associates in collecting and composing the data and he got into diffiguities with some of the persons with whom he dealt, particularly a calchrated paper manufacturer.
