CITIZENS RIDICULE CANDIDACY OF FORD IN DETROIT SPEECH

QUESTIONS MOTIVES OF HIS NEGOTIATIONS FOR MUSCLE SHOALS.

TWO MEN HAVE BEEN FRIENDS MANY YEARS

Ford Has Made More Unfulfilled Promises Than Any Man in U. S.

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 1. (AP)—The candidacy of Henry Ford for the presidency and questioning the motives of the Detroit manufacturer in his negotiations for Muscle Shoals, United States Senator Couzens answered a recent criticism of Ford on the senator's stand on five points today.

"Ford wants to be president," Senator Couzens said. "His failure to withdraw his name from the Nebraska primary proves that."

"Why does Henry Ford refrain from announcing his candidacy for presidency of the United States?" the senator asked. "He is afraid it would be as big a fiasco as his peace ship."

"Fording his Ford's criticism of Couzens' stand for five per cent, the senator declared the manufacturer has 'challenged my integrity and sincerity.'"

FOUR MEN ARRESTED IN CONNECTION WITH COUNTERFEITING PLOT

CHICAGO, Nov. 1. (AP)—A confession alleged by secret service operatives to have been made by Edward C. Bronson, one of the four men arrested here yesterday, has strengthened the belief of detectives that they have reached the source of \$1,000,000 worth of counterfeit \$20 bills circulated during the past few months in Chicago, St. Louis, New York, Milwaukee, Omaha, Denver and other cities.

The men under arrest are: Ralph Oldham, said to be a former park policeman; Bobbitt, alias E. J. Edwards, advertising solicitor; Lewis Kettler, said to be a former fur goods dealer; and Bronson.

Remnants of the alleged counterfeit were found on the men when arrested.

Engravers of the plates and those who did the printing are being sought today.

THREE OFFICERS ON DELPHI BLAMED FOR ACCIDENT TO BOATS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1. (AP)—Fixing "complete responsibility" for the loss of seven destroyers and 23 lives at Honda Point, Calif., September 1, on three officers attached to the destroyer Delphi, the findings of the naval board of inquiry on which a court martial has been ordered charged them with "culpable inefficiency in the performance of duty."

Might other officers who commanded destroyers in the group which crashed on the rocks after miscalculation of position will face trial on charges of negligence. The report of the board, published today, said it saw no "excuse for the circumstances" in the case of the squadron commander, Captain Edward J. Watson, the commander of the Delphi, Lieutenant Commander Donald P. Hunter, and the navigating officer, Lieutenant Lawrence J. Blodgett, to excuse them from accepting "full responsibility for the accident."

It was held to be "directly attributable to bad judgment and faulty navigation on their part."

The board highly commended the morale shown by the personnel of the destroyers in the emergency of the crash, declaring it was due to "this perfect discipline that the loss of life was so small." It cited more than a dozen officers and men whom it thought should be commended by Secretary Denby.

COURT MARTIAL HAVE OFFICERS IS POSTPONED

SAN DIEGO, CALIF., Nov. 1. (AP)—At the request of the defendants in court martial of 11 officers of the United States navy involved in the wreck of seven destroyers at Point Honda, scheduled to open today, will be delayed for several days, according to Rear Admiral Henry Wiley, who will preside at the hearing.

The request for the postponement was granted, he said, to give the officers time in which to prepare their defense.

BELIEVED WOMAN POISONED CHILDREN TO OBTAIN FORTUNE

FRESNO, CALIF., Nov. 1. (AP)—A desire to come into complete possession of a fortune will be the step children is believed to have prompted Mrs. Louise Pottinger to poison them, according to authorities who announced last night that Mrs. Pottinger had confessed to administering a lethal drug which caused the death of her stepdaughter, Miss Margaret Pottinger, 12, who died Tuesday after a prolonged illness.

The other children recovered after Mrs. Pottinger relented and called a doctor to give them a antidote, according to police. She is being held on a charge of murder.

The children were left the estate of their father when he died here last summer. His widow bequeathed only a life interest in the legacy. In her confession Mrs. Pottinger is said by authorities to have declared that the decision to kill the children was reported after 40 days of prayer. The poison was fed to them in food over a period of two months and she took some of it herself, according to her reported confession.

GARNISHEE 435 BALES OF COTTON OWNED BY STATE

AUSTIN, Nov. 1. (AP)—Fear that the state prison commission was about to dissipate funds inspired garnishment proceedings against 435 bales of cotton belonging to the commission, Attorney W. L. Hill of Houston told the state supreme court today in the contempt proceedings in which Mr. Hill Judge J. D. Harvey of the 10th judicial district, H. S. Fox Jr., president of the Houston National Bank, and others are defendants.

The issuance of the garnishment writ by Judge Harvey at the request of the bank caused the supreme court to cite all the principals in the transaction for contempt.

Testifying in his own behalf, last night, Hill said he had no intention of violating an order of the supreme court and that in his thirty three years of practice he had never before been cited for contempt.

Judge W. W. Caves, assistant attorney general, who is assisting in prosecution of the case, testified he had written opinions on the legal phases of the prison notes case, but not on the business end of the transactions.

PLACES LIBERAL CONSTRUCTION ON OIL LEASE FORMS

AMARILLO, Texas, Nov. 1.—Liberal construction placed on oil lease forms by the court of appeals of Texas favorable to oil operators and lease holders, in a suit styled, R. B. Masterson vs. Amarillo Oil Company, has been reported.

A suit filed in the Potter county district court by Masterson for the recovery of approximately 14,000 acres in leases on the Masterson ranch in north Potter county, which plaintiff contended had been forfeited due to failure of defendants to market the product of the well drilled on the lease according to the terms of the lease, was decided favorably to the defendants by the district court and court of appeals. A motion for writ of error to the supreme court by plaintiff was denied.

Plaintiff Masterson contended that the production of a six million foot gas well was not being marketed by defendants (Amarillo Oil Co.) at the end of the four year exploratory period as required in the lease. Defendants won the decision on the grounds principally that the well was completed in a "wild-cat" area, near the end of the exploratory period, at a time when there was no market for the production of 140 million feet of gas in the field.

Amarillo Oil Company owns in perpetuity leases throughout the Amarillo oil and gas area, approximately 58,000 acres, principally in the R. B. Masterson and Lee Bivins ranches in north Potter county. Oil operators in general throughout the state will be benefited by the decision. Wild-cat operators may now continue the development of unexplored lands more freely, with the possibility of holding the lease for further development after a discovery of oil or gas should there be no market for the production of the wells, available, at the end of the exploratory period of the lease; after spending a large amount of money in the development of a well.

POSTED PRICE OF GASOLINE ISSUE IN CONTRACT SUIT

The posted price of casinghead gasoline and alleged failure to make tests of the amount of gasoline contained in 1,000 cubic feet of gas at such times as requested, are two issues involved in the trial of Leall Oil Corporation against the Tidal Western Oil Corporation. The case is on trial in the 17th district court before Judge E. W. Napier and a jury.

The plaintiff has brought suit asking judgment of \$4,000, contending that although they had often requested the defendants to make tests of the gas at the wells, that they had failed to do so.

DAILY AVERAGE OIL PRODUCTION SHOWS GAIN 2450 BARRELS

NEW YORK, Nov. 1. (AP)—The daily average crude oil production of the United States increased 2,450 barrels for the week ending October 27, totalling 2,208,500 barrels, according to the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute. An increase of 17,000 barrels in the daily average production of the Powell field in Texas virtually was offset by decrease in other fields. The daily average production east of the Rock mountains was 1,444,500 barrels, an increase of 21,500. California production was 281,000, a decrease of 19,000 barrels.

Oklahoma showed a daily average production of 229,700 barrels, decrease 1,500; Kansas, 18,000, decrease 650; North Texas, 46,000, decrease 1,100; Central Texas, 400,500, increase 41,100; North Louisiana, 63,500, increase 1,000; Louisiana, 329,500, decrease 3,000; Gulf coast, 28,400, decrease 1,400; Eastern, 107,500, increase 500; and Wyoming and Montana, 145,200, decrease, 13,000 barrels.

Daily average imports of petroleum at principal ports were 193,714 barrels, compared with 232,412 for the previous week.

There were no changes reported in crude oil prices for the major districts—mid-continent, 1.15 a barrel, according to the gravity of the oil, although some purchasing companies have made further reductions. Pennsylvania crude, Bradford district, 297.5 a barrel, and all other grades 1.50, and gulf coast, 31.00 a barrel.

More Than 500 German Girls In White Slave Deal

BRUSSELS, Nov. 1. (AP)—A discovery of a vast white slave enterprise through which more than 500 girls are reported to have been shipped to the United States has led to the increased vigilance of the American immigration authorities whose representatives in Antwerp, the Belgian police say, have definite proof of the affair. The principal in the plot named Brown was president of a girls' protection society in Berlin who sent the girls via Antwerp, Hamburg and Rotterdam to the United States where they fell into the hands of his confederates. When the traffic was discovered as the result of numerous complaints Brown fled from Germany. The Belgian authorities regard as curious the fact that they have received no request for Brown's arrest from the German authorities. They suggest that this is perhaps due to the fact that during the war Brown was reported to have been one of the most active members of the German espionage system and the Germans are afraid that were he arrested in Belgium he would make startling revelations regarding the war-time activities of German spies.

WRITE NEW CHAPTER IN GUNNERY OF NAVY ON FLOATING TARGETS

ABOARD THE U. S. S. MARYLAND Off San Pedro, Calif., Nov. 1. (AP)—A new chapter in the history of naval gunnery was written on floating targets yesterday by projectiles from the superdreadnought Maryland's 16-inch rifles, fired for the first time in actual battle practices. Gunnery of the Maryland celebrated the initial firing of the big rifles by hurling a 2,000-pound projectile straight through the bull's-eye of the distant target, their second shot splitting the target squarely in the middle.

DECLARES REPORT OF PATHOLOGISTS HAS NO BEARING

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 1. (AP)—Attorney General Cocco today reiterated his statement that the declaration of the two pathologists who performed autopsies on the bodies found in a Morehouse parish house last December and identified as those of Walt Daniel and E. F. Richard, had not been in the water more than 48 hours when found, had no bearing on the state's case one way or the other.

This statement of the pathologists was corroborated by Henry W. Fontana, formerly technician and laboratory expert at Charity Hospital here, who examined many of the fractured bones sent to him by the pathologists following the autopsy. Mr. Fontana declared the state of preservation of the bodies indicated that they could not have been in the open air, in water or buried for four months. He said that because of disinfectants used by an undertaker before the autopsies he could not determine if the bodies had been embalmed. The only other solution, in absence of this, was that they might have been kept in an ice box, he said.

Attorney General Cocco said the question of how long the bodies had been in the water never was considered by the state during the open hearing at Eastrop last January. "Our object was to establish the fact that the two missing men were dead and that the bodies found were those of the missing men. When this was done we were satisfied," he said.

The attorney general took occasion to say that the developments of the last few days would in no wise affect the trial at Eastrop Monday of Captain J. K. Skipwith, exalted cyclops of the Morehouse parish Ks Klux Klan and others charged with misdemeanors in connection with hooded band activities in the parish last summer when Daniel and Richard were kidnaped.

Send Photograph Through Air for 9000 Mile Trip

NEW YORK, Nov. 1. (AP)—Officials of the Radio Corporation of America said today that they had recently sent a photograph of Major General James G. Harbord through the air to Warsaw and back, a distance of 9,000 miles.

The transmission was made by means of an invention of E. F. W. Alexanderson, who says American publication of photographs of European events a few hours after they happen is within the realm of possibility of a few months.

He thinks that a secondary commercial value of the invention will be the comparison of signatures.

The radio corporation is preparing for a public demonstration when spectators will be permitted to see a photograph translated first into electrical waves and later into wireless impulses. These will be transmitted to the Warsaw station 4,500 miles away and automatically retransmitted, returned in a fraction of a second after being sent from here.

Every variation of light and shade on the original photograph is captured by the mechanism. Dr. Alexanderson said, and converted into punctures of ticker tape which is drawn at high speed through the transmitter. The wireless impulses are thus made to assume a pattern corresponding to that of the photograph.

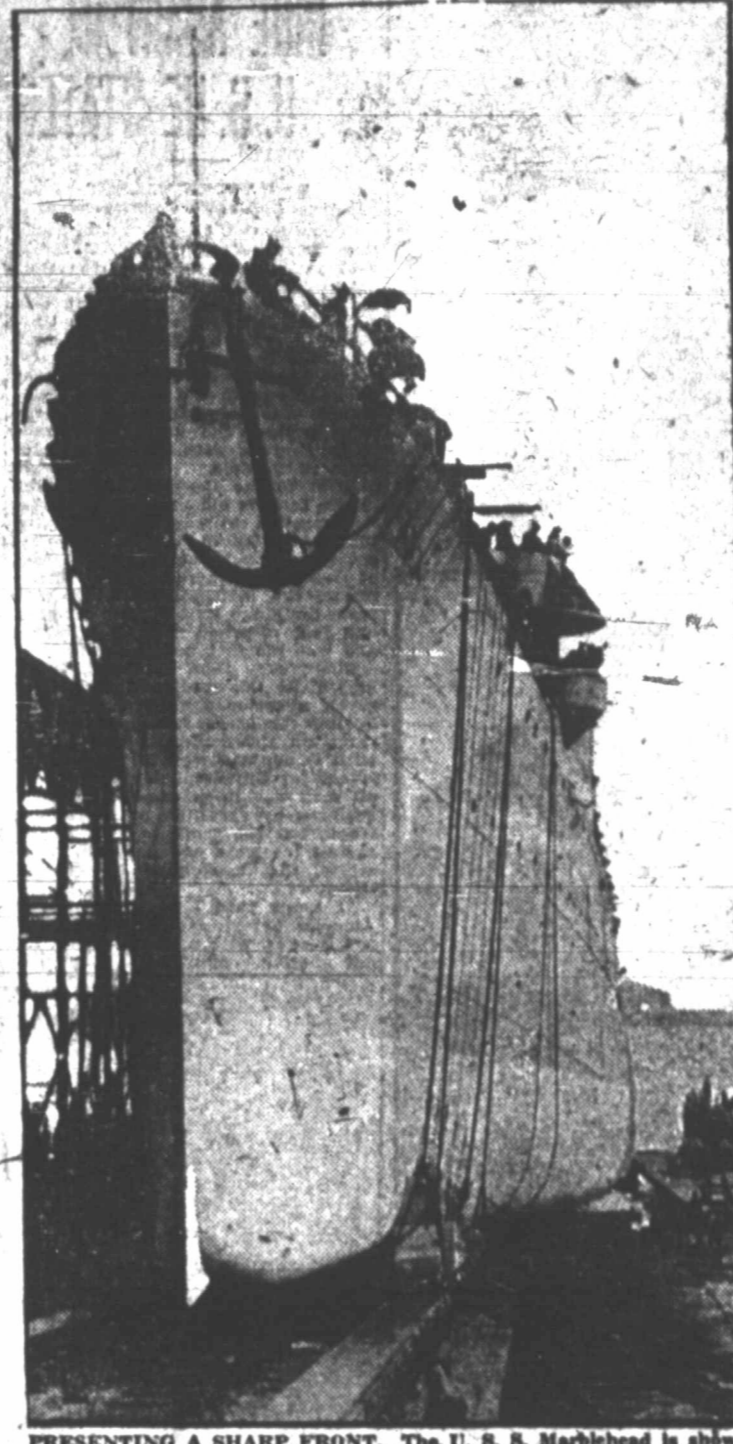

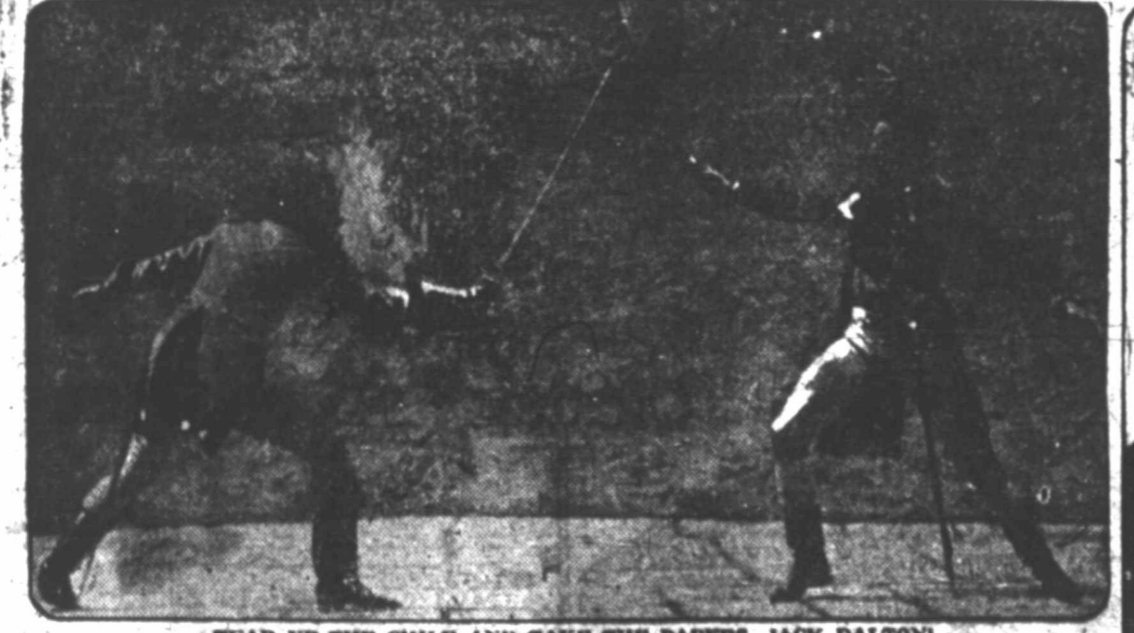

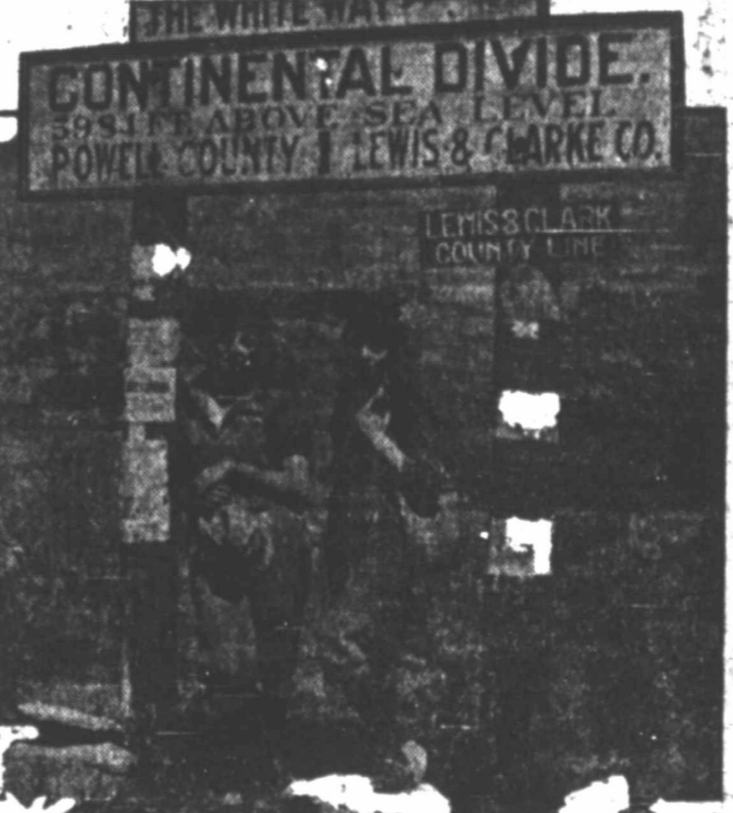

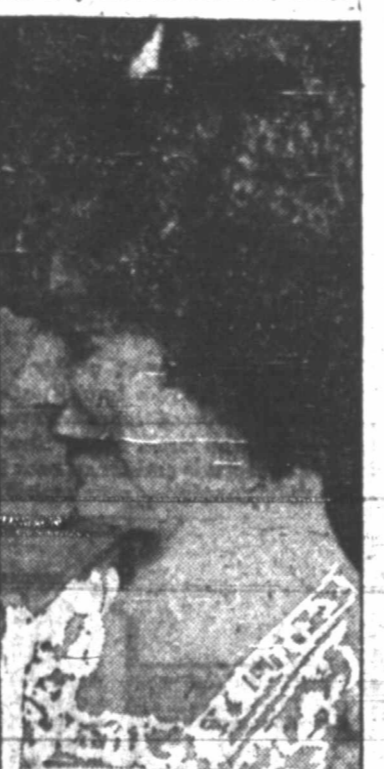
