The hearing, which began at 1 o'clock Thursday morning, is being held to determine whether the ap-plication of the gas company to place & 50 cent monthly "ready-to-

serve" charge on every meter in Wichita Fulls should be allowed. The application for this additional revenue was filed with the city council on June 25, 1822. The coun-cil never took any action on the matter and accordingly the law provides that in such cases after sixty days clapse a hearing can be had before the railroad commission. The hearing now in progress in the 30th district court room at the court house is in the nature of an appeal. it being inferred that the failure of the city council to take action was a denial of the gas companies






