ZONED CITIES HAVE FORTY PER CENT OF URBAN POPULATION

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 2. (AP)—More than 22,000,000 people, comprising 40 per cent of the urban population of the United States, live in 183 zoned cities, towns and villages, according to a statement made public today by the division of building and housing of the department of commerce.

During the first eight months of this year, the division, with more than 4,500,000 population, have adopted zoning ordinances. This indicates the greatest progress in zoning the United States has ever had during a similar period. More than two-thirds of the 183 zoned municipalities have been zoned since September, 1921.

Neighborhoods in the use of land is said to be the keynote of zoning. The home area is protected from the intrusion of the junk yard which for no good reason might be moved into the neighborhood, and business and manufacturing districts are protected against noisy factories.

Revised figures show that on January 1, 1923, 129 municipalities had zoning regulations. During the year 54 more were added, and some small, located north, south, east and west, have been added. Of the 183 zoned cities in the United States with over 100,000 population, 80 have zoning ordinances.

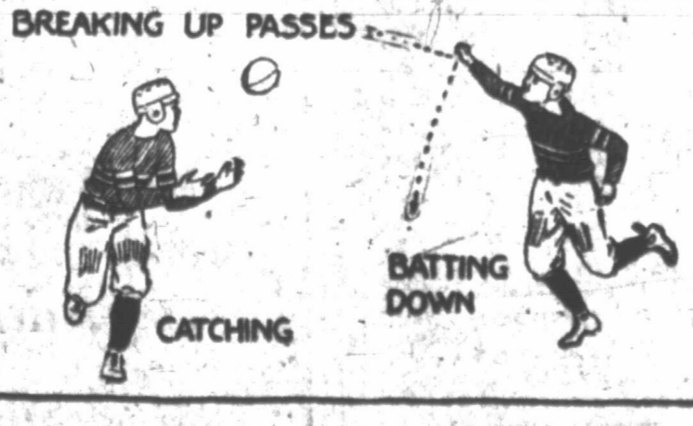

## FOOTBALL A LESSON IN BREAKING UP PASSES

(This is one of a series of twelve lessons which bring out the most important points which every boy should know who wants to learn to play football right.)

It isn't always true that when a forward pass is thrown the defensive side should try to catch it, though in most cases the best way of breaking up a pass, of course, is to get out under the ball and attempt to catch it as a punt is caught.

However, there are certain times when it should be batted down. When the game is close, the pass should not be caught upon fourth down, because by letting it be grounded or batted it down the pass becomes incomplete and the offensive side loses the ball on Quarter-back.)

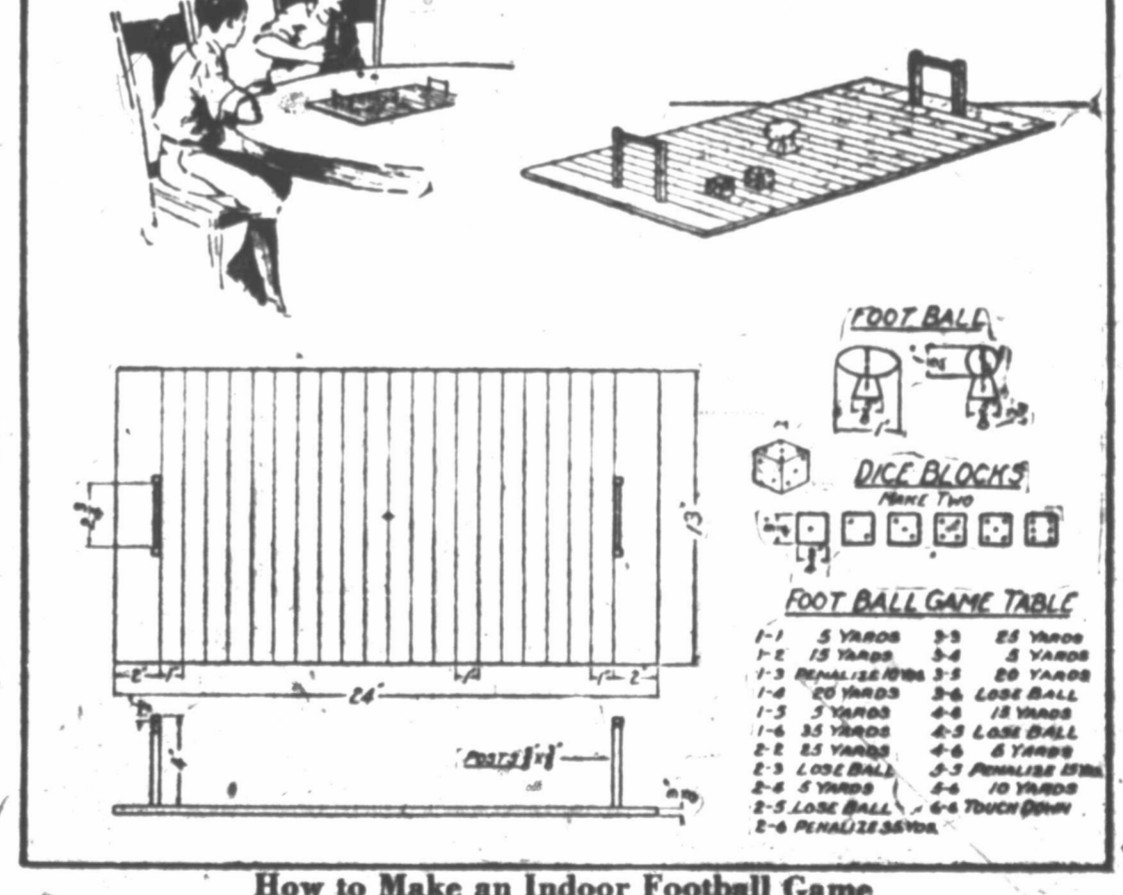

There is no Rogue's Gallery where the faces of criminals are exhibited to the world that can equal in size a new kind of Rogue's Gallery kept by scientists of the United States Government. Agricultural experiment stations established over the country are continually at work seeking out the insects that destroy crops, that breed plant diseases and injure fruits and vegetables. When such an insect is discovered, his life habits are carefully studied and he is mounted and put on display where people may view him and learn his harmful characteristics. Thus the greatest Rogue's Gallery is a gallery of pests—criminals of the insect world.

The Department of Agriculture each year sends out the finest of scientific detectives to hunt down the pests. Their discoveries mean the annual saving of thousands of dollars to the farmer.

The scientists have gone a step farther when they have recently begun investigations in some foreign countries from which the United States receives shipments of fruit. A fly of Mexico which is the cause of much of the spoilage of fruit before it reaches American markets is a late discovery.



## SAFE EXPERIMENTS IN SCIENCE

(These Are Little Laboratory Exercises For Boys and Girls to Perform At Home With Materials in Everyday Use.)



An example of air pressure is shown in the second figure in the diagram. Place a sheet of writing paper or cardboard over the top of a tumbler that is either partly or wholly filled with water. Hold on the cover tightly with the left hand while you quickly invert the tumbler with the right. Don't let any water run out at the edge during the turn. When it is fully inverted, you can take away your left hand and the sheet of paper will stay against the tumbler and no water will run out. You can tip the tumbler any way you wish without affecting the cardboard because the air all around the tumbler presses hard enough to overbalance the weight of the water in the glass.

Glass-raising is produced by creating a vacuum under the hand. Put the glass filled with water on the table, and over the top place the palm of the hand, taking care that the four fingers are bent almost at right angles as shown in the third figure. If, as you continue to press the palm of the hand on the edge of the glass, you raise the four fingers quickly, thus having the palm stretched out, you will force the air gradually works its way down into the center of the ice. But as it descends, the groove above the wire is observed to begin to freeze over. This is possible because, as the wire sinks through the layer of water thus formed, the pressure on the water is relieved and it immediately expands and freezes over again.

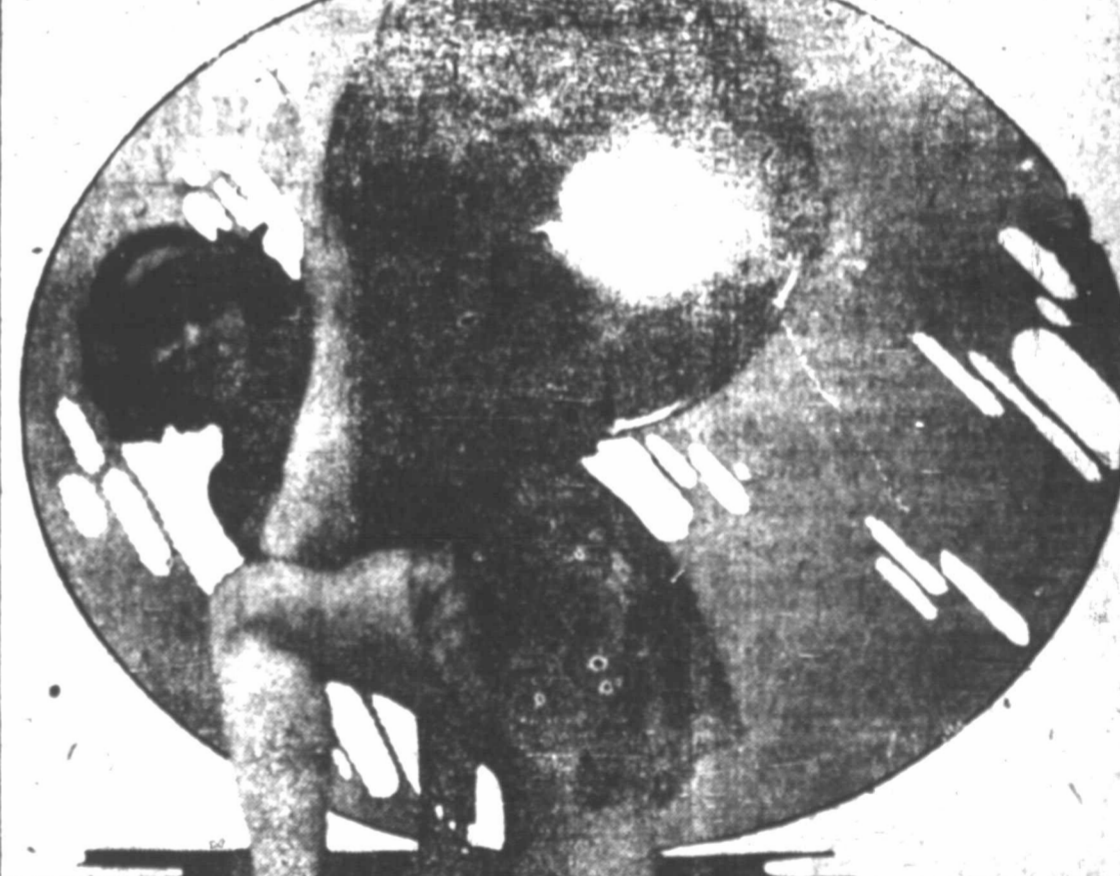
