ALL TOWNS BETWEEN HERE AND SEYMOUR TO BE GIVEN POWER

Metropolitan electric lighting and power service will soon be available for all towns on the Wichita Valley railroad between Wichita Falls and Seymour, E. A. Rogers, general manager of the Wichita Falls Electric Company, stated Monday.

A contract between the local company and the city of Seymour took effect November 1, and a small station, operated by oil in being used at present to furnish power to that city. Materials have been ordered and upon their arrival a high voltage line will connect Seymour with the large power plant of the Wichita Falls Electric Company near Holiday and Dundas. This line will also be furnished power and lights from the line when it is constructed. Plans are under way to extend the present line of power materials needed for the Wichita Falls plant to furnish power and lights to all parts of northwest Texas. It is possible that the line from this city to Seymour will soon be extended to other points in that vicinity.

(Continued from Page One.) could not give its approval to any further occupation of Germany and which was followed by a resolution approving the government's foreign policy, has averted such attention here and in other European capitals.

The premier discussed at length the relations between Italy, France and Great Britain as to Germany and he outlined the position in such a way as to avert any further attention here and in other European capitals.

"I must note," he said, "that Great Britain and France are withdrawing their troops from German soil; do you wish Italy to withdraw her contingents from Italy? This would be in no way modify France's policy."

Possibly you wish Italy to break with France and thus ally and definitely desert her allies of the war and in a certain sense take the initiative and responsibility of annulling the Versailles treaty.

"To understand the extreme gravity of such an action it suffices to say that it would provoke a new European conflagration."

With reference to the Corfu incident Mussolini declared: "Italy occupied Corfu to save her prestige."

He also declared: "Italy was the battle of Geneva; the League of Nations confirmed the Italian demands."

He characterized the League of Nations as "France-Britain dualism" and gave figures to show that Great Britain and France have more employees in the organization than all other countries combined and added: "Italy will not leave the League of Nations because of her consideration for the Versailles treaty, but she will not stand for the conditions of inferiority prevalent today."

LARGE DECREASE IN TOTAL COTTON SEED CRUSHED TO OCT. 31

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18. (AP)—Cotton seed crushed in the three-month period August 1 to October 31, totaled 851,007 tons, compared with 974,312 tons in the same period last year and cotton seed on hand at mills October 31, totaled 731,281 tons, compared with 738,977 tons a year ago, the census bureau announced today.

Cotton seed products manufactured in the three-month period and on hand October 31, included: Crude oil, produced 27,254,644 pounds, compared with 23,468,429 for the same period last year and on hand 23,444,093 pounds compared with 19,124,817.

Refined oil produced 174,159,629 pounds compared with 78,961,127 and on hand 78,961,127 pounds compared with 84,970,925.

Cake and meal produced 484,429 tons compared with 449,974 and on hand 114,647 tons compared with 111,221.

Linters produced 187,434 bales compared with 78,549. Exports of linters for the three months were 11,951 bales compared with 8,927.

HOG RAISERS ARE LOSING AS RESULT RUSH FOR MARKET

CHICAGO, Nov. 18. (AP)—Livestock producers and shippers were receiving warning today from the National Livestock Producers' Association that the flooding of the hog market is causing a serious loss to producers in Iowa, Illinois, Missouri, Nebraska and Indiana. They are urged in the warning sent out by John G. Brown, president of the association, to hold back light and immature hogs, which, being forced on the market at the present rate, are entering into the dressed meat trade at a price reflecting a lower price on beef and mutton.

A report bulletin by the American Farm Bureau Federation attributes the cause of the reported flood of hogs to the high price of corn. Farmers are selling their corn to the advantage of their hogs rather than feed them on high priced corn, the bureau says.

The result, according to Mr. Brown, is that "light and immature hogs are flooding the market to the serious detriment of all livestock producers." He estimates that the market has been depressed \$1 per hundredweight by the heavy shipment. He points out further that the hog supply of next year is seriously menaced.

CHEER STRESSEMAN'S DEFENSE OF ACTION IN CROWN PRINCE RETURN

BERLIN, Nov. 18. (AP)—Chancellor Stresemann in a lengthy defense of his policy to his party executives last evening said with reference to the crown prince's return: "We are threatened with further penalties on account of the return of the crown prince. I hold it, however, better to suffer new French brutalities than to bear the reproach that the last German war fought in the great war should remain unhealed beyond, far from his family."

"Cheers greeted the chancellor's statement."

"All this burden must be borne by us," he continued. "In addition to our political burden, we shall probably be faced with a demand for the surrender of the crown prince and of course will reject that demand. (Cheers.) Nevertheless these impending additional political difficulties will remain a grave weight upon us and any increase of them through the creation of a dictatorship and an anti-constitutional government would be unbearable."
