TWO BOMB EXPLOSIONS IN PHILA

LEADER OF GERMAN PEOPLES PARTY TO FORM NEW CABINET

DRAMATIC DEBATE ON "KLAN" BILL IN OKLAHOMA SENATE

SENATOR GLASSER, OF ENID, LEADS ATTACK ON ORGANIZATION.

REVIEWS WAR RECORD JEWS AND CATHOLICS

Klan Emerges Victorious in First Test of Strength in the Senate.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Nov. 24. (AP)—Ku Klux Klan supporters emerged victorious in their first test of strength in the state senate when the upper house voted late yesterday to strike from the proposed anti-Klan measure a section which would have compelled secret organizations in Oklahoma to file their membership lists for public inspection.

Proponents of the section declared that by its defeat the senate would fail to enact anti-Klan legislation with "teeth" in it, although they took some consolation in the passage of a provision requiring officers of secret organizations to register their names with county authorities.

The action on the membership clause came at the close of a day filled with dramatic debate in which members of both factions came openly in support of their convictions, participating in verbal clashes necessitated in part by the present extraordinary session.

Senator Harry Glasser of Enid, who led the attack on the Klan, assailed the organization for its operations under the guise of a fraternal organization, and in an impassioned speech that no place in a democracy.

"I wonder," he said, "if the Jew and Catholic buddies of some of our senators here, giving their full measure of devotion in the mud and blood of France, thought that in five years their friends would be called un-American? There were 1,000 of them who died for American principles and American democracy."

More than half the army commanded by Washington and Lafayette at the birth of the republic was made up of Catholics, the Enid senator declared. He himself is a Protestant.

Chief of the Klan defenders was Senator Wash Hudson of Tulsa, majority floor leader, who declared that the Klan is a fraternal organization and that much of its effectiveness is gained from its secret membership.

LONDON, Nov. 24 (AP)—President Ebert has invited Herr Von Kandleroff, a member of the German people's party in the reichstag, to form a new German cabinet, says a news agency dispatch from Berlin this afternoon. It is anticipated that he will accept the message states.

STRESEMANN FALL TO AFFECT ALL OF EUROPE

LONDON, Nov. 24 (AP)—The downfall of the Stresemann government is viewed here as an event of the utmost significance, possibly involving developments that demand to have a deep and lasting effect on all Europe.

The fact that some of the morning newspapers out the British election campaign from first place to display Berlin dispatches on the reichstag's reelection of the chancellors and the situation in Germany generally indicates that the crisis is regarded as serious.

"The condition of Germany today is infinitely worse than it has been at any moment since Germany became an empire," says the Times. "The reichstag in the present circumstances is a mere form and fiction, and through it Stresemann's resignation and his associates and it is a very serious problem for all the world."

"The Times also calls attention to the loss of the Ruhr which forms a serious problem for the British government in Europe and the great tribulation of Russia in the background."

"France has had her way," asserts the writer. "Her curiosity as to the German parliamentary system and the next government of Germany is not without a certain interest in determining its foreign policy. He also referred with considerable feeling to the recent allied note concerning the formation of a new cabinet, the tone of which, he said, brought a flush of shame to the German people."

Dr. Stresemann again defended Frederick William, whom he described as a man with a strong sense of moral responsibility and great capacity.

The Berlin correspondent of the Daily Herald quotes the defeated chancellor as saying: "I was at the theater the other night and every time the band played 'You know why?' it was in protest against the interference of the signers in the home affairs of Germany. I protest against the abolition of military service. You do not remove sentiment based on traditions of more than a century."

Tear Bombs Used by Detectives When Oklahoma Man Barricades Himself in a Hotel in Chicago

CHICAGO, Nov. 24 (AP)—Guests of the Hotel Sherman, in all forms of negligence, scurried about last night while 30 policemen and detectives with tear bombs and revolvers assaulted a room on the fourth floor in which Roy Hendrickson of Shawnee, Okla., had barricaded himself.

Hendrickson, who says he was a member of former Governor Jack Walton's Oklahoma secret service, became suddenly deranged and fired several shots at the officers before the tear bombs thrown through the transom forced him to a window.

The officers broke open the door and took him, fighting and protesting, to a hospital.

Several hours before the shooting Hendrickson telephoned a Chicago newspaper and asked that a reporter be sent to get a story about his being robbed by a police captain.

When the reporter came to his room Hendrickson locked the door and told him he was to stay there all night because "something was going to happen."

DETECTIVES FRUSTRATE ATTEMPT TO SUICIDE

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 24 (AP)—Detectives late yesterday frustrated an attempt to commit suicide at the home of Edward E. Carleton, indicted with his bride of a few days, James, on a murder charge growing out of the slaying here Wednesday night of Special Deputy Sheriff Robert E. Magee and the serious wounding of Detective M. W. Luke.

Carleton while in his cell attempted to sever an artery in his arm with a knife he had fashioned from a tin cup handle. He was not seriously wounded.

According to police detectives Carleton said he had tried to kill himself because he could no longer endure separation from his wife. He was permitted to see her in the district attorney's office.

BRITISH SCHOONER WITH 865 CASES OF WHISKEY IS SEIZED

IS CAPTURED FIVE MILES OFF SAN LUIS PASS NEAR GALVESTON.

RESULT OF AGREEMENT EXTENDING THE LIMIT

Third Important Liquor Haul By Galveston Customs Force This Year.

GALVESTON, Texas, Nov. 24 (AP)—Concrete evidence to substantiate recent reports of rum running activity in the vicinity of Galveston Island in the shape of a British schooner, the Island Home, with 865 cases of whiskey and two barrels of beer on board, was moored alongside the docks here today while preparations were being made by Customs Collector Robert W. Humphreys to board the vessel to decide the status of the craft.

The Island Home was captured late yesterday five miles off San Luis Pass at the western tip of Galveston Island by the United States customs launch Kalita, under command of Inspector H. T. Beard. The schooner was towed into port last night.

The hatches of the Island Home were sealed and guards stationed on board while the crew otherwise was left in possession of the ship pending determination of their status.

Clearance papers of the Island Home show her home port to be in the Grand Canyons, a small island in the Caribbean Sea south of Cuba. The crew of nine includes seven British, one American and one Mexican.

This was the third important liquor haul made by the Galveston customs force this year. Last spring the launch Cherokee was seized in Offutt Bay just west of the city.

While the Kalita left in quest of the rum ship in response to a tip received by customs authorities, the Island Home was found lying at anchor at San Luis Pass. No resistance was offered.

GOVERNOR WALTON TO BE ARRAIGNED ON NOVEMBER 28

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Nov. 24 (AP)—Arraignment of J. C. Walton, former governor, indicted yesterday, was set today for November 28, before Judge George W. Clark in state district court.

Walton, who is held in the Oklahoma city jail, is charged with conspiracy to defraud the state treasury, and with receiving stolen property.

Walton's arrest was the result of a long investigation by the Oklahoma state police and the federal bureau of investigation.

Foreign Consulate Buildings and Many Other Houses Are Damaged, Scores of Persons Are Injured

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 24 (AP)—Two terrific bomb explosions in foreign consulates in the downtown district today injured scores of persons, damaged many houses and threw the southern section of the city into wild excitement. No one was seriously hurt so far as the police could learn.

The first explosion occurred at the Spanish consulate, 101 Pine street, about one o'clock, and the second at the Italian consulate, 100 Pine street, about two o'clock.

Without a thought of a deadly bomb concealed within he got out of bed and replaced the box on the doorsteps. A few minutes after returning to his room the explosion occurred, tearing out the entire front of the building and wrecking the consul's room on the second floor.

The Sons of Italy bank building was wrecked by the second explosion and a number of houses in the neighborhood were damaged. The fact that the Italian consulate was blown inside the hallway, led the police to believe that the same persons were responsible for the placing of both bombs.

Director of Public Safety Cortright assumed personal charge of the situation and ordered guards placed around all consulates in the city.

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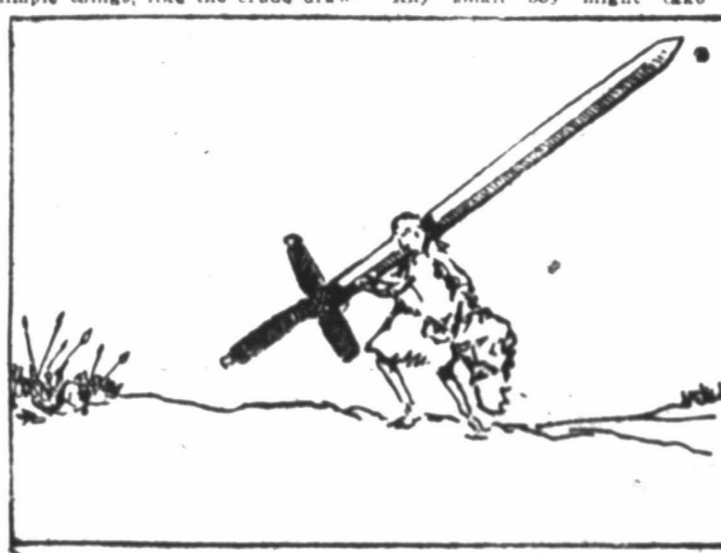

VAN LOON'S STORY OF BIBLE WILL BE MUCH DISCUSSED

Dean reviews the story of the Bible, by Hendrik Van Loon (Doubt, Liverlight).

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Hendrik Van Loon's "The Story of the Bible" within a few weeks probably will be the most discussed book in America.
Indeed, Van Loon says his book is "a strange piece of work" and that he is "afraid of it."
"I have patiently read all of the modern Bibles," he says, "and the almost endless 'children's Bibles' of the last 20 years and none satisfied me for my own needs or for those of my sons."
Thus Van Loon sits down to write his letters to his children.

This sense of intimacy is heightened further by 148 drawings which Van Loon drew. They are very simple things, like the crude draw-

ings Roosevelt made to illustrate his letters to his children.
Undoubtedly Van Loon's story will be analyzed and through this scrutiny will come charges that he has colored certain passages to meet his own interpretations. Others will say that Van Loon has made an honest effort to tell a story unaffected by any cant or creed.
To this reader it seems that Van Loon must be taken at his word. He is telling the story of the Bible in the way in which he believes will bring a better understanding to his boys. If his story contains any propaganda it is propaganda for the reading of the Bible. The first reaction on reading his tale is to turn to the Bible itself to make comparisons of certain passages.

Probably no passage in the Bible presents so vivid a picture to a boy's mind as the slaying of Goliath by David.
In the twelfth chapter of Samuel it is written:
"And David put his hand in his bag, and took the stone, and slung it, and smote the Philistine in his forehead, and the stone sunk into his forehead, and he fell upon his face."
"So David prevailed over the Philistine with a sling and with a stone, and smote the Philistine and slew him; and there was no sword in the hand of David."
"Therefore David ran and stood

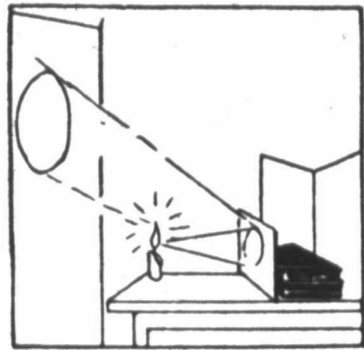

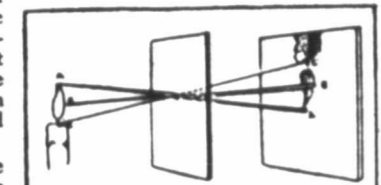

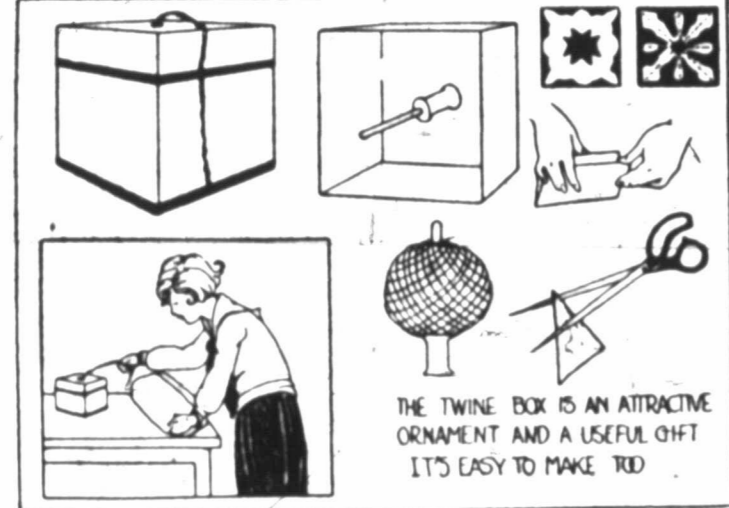
The Pinhole Camera

If you make a large-sized pinhole in a card held a few feet away from a gas or candle flame, a very fair inverted image of the flame may be obtained on a screen held a few inches behind the hole. Or, on a sunny day, let a hole about two inches in diameter be made in the curtain of a darkened room. A fairly distinct picture of opposite houses and trees may be seen on the wall opposite the hole. As the hole is made smaller the image becomes more distinct in outline but less bright. If the size of the hole is increased beyond a certain amount the image will vanish and only the bright wall will be seen.

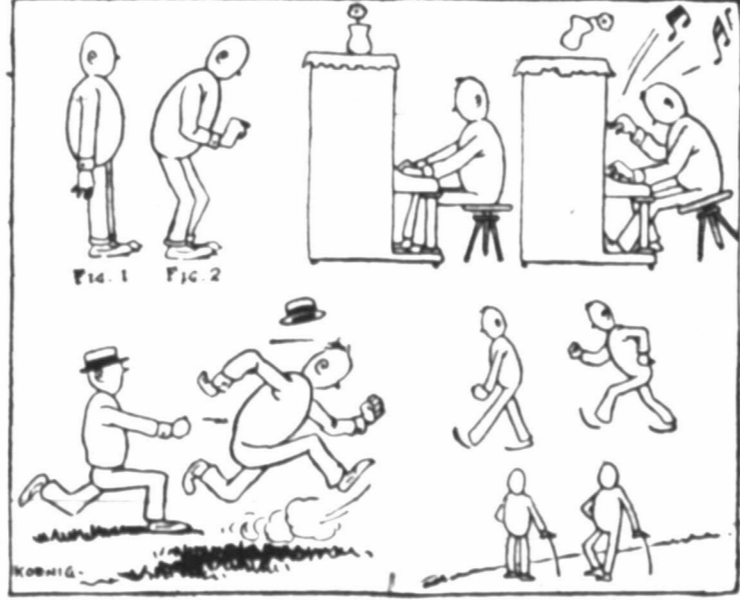

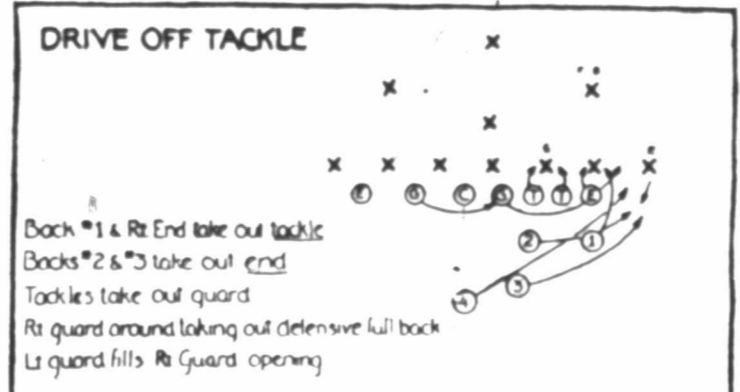

FOOTBALL



(This is one of a series of twelve lessons which bring out the most important points which every boy should know who wants to learn to play football right.)

For a steady ground gaining play in a football game a good one to use is the drive off tackle. Whenever this play is executed and the offensive line gets the charge on the defenders, even for a moment, there will be a gain. The play is worked so that two men can be assigned to every defensive line man involved, with two interferences left to take care of the defensive end. This means that if the play is to be stopped for less than a two or three yard gain, one forward must manage to stop two. This tackle thrust has a strength not found in any other combination of line plays, so long as the object is rather a sure short gain than a possible long one.

In addition to having a few good shifts worked out, the team should place its confidence in the following essentials of good play: 1. A strong, short end run outside opposing tackle; 2. A smashing buck inside the tackle; 3. A powerful rushing play to the short side (unbalanced line); 4. At least one dependable forward pass; 5. A good punt. Next in importance is a reliable drive through opposing center, another good forward pass or two, and, from punt formation, an end run, a buck, and several forward passes.

STORIES OF FUR AND FUR TRAPPING

The Color of Furs

"This otter," said the clever fur merchant, inspecting a skin, "bred north, the coming of winter turns in a clear, cold lake." The trapper showed some surprise that the merchant should be such a shrewd guesser, for the animal's pelt had been hanging on his rack for two months.

Climate Affects Color
That climate makes a difference in the color of some animals is illustrated by the little weasel. Animals caught south of the fortieth parallel, which is the one running through Philadelphia and west to make the line between Kansas and Nebraska, are usually brown the

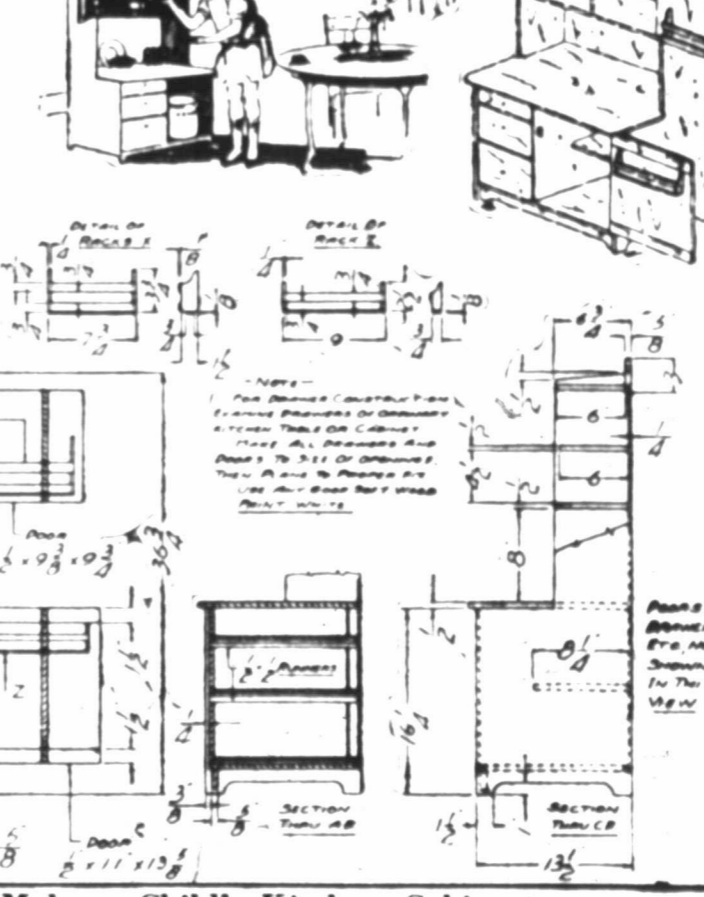

How to Make a Child's Kitchen Cabinet

A kitchen cabinet is just the thing to make for Little Sister's Christmas present. It is fitted up just like mother's large one, yet it is not a very complicated piece of work for the boy who likes to work with tools.

Use a good grade of soft wood. If possible, have one board wide enough to cut out the end pieces, which are 1 1/2" wide at the widest point. If this is not possible, glue two pieces together, using a plain joint. After getting the end pieces to shape, cut out the piece for the top. Then finish any other piece next, such as the shelves, bottom, top, etc. Shape these carefully, paying particular attention to square ends.

Notice that the back of the cabinet consists of quarter-inch stock removed to receive them. This is shown clearly in the view at the extreme right of the drawing. When the major parts of the cabinet have been finished, it is best to assemble them immediately. Use brads, testing frequently to see that all parts are square with each other, especially the drawer and door openings.

In making the drawers and doors, it will be best to bring them first to the dimensions of the actual openings, then trim them to secure the proper fits. The three doors of this cabinet are not paneled. The two upper ones are made from single pieces of stock, but the lower will result if they are. In the one, being larger, has two strips at the top and bottom. The drawers pieces are into the lower part of the are supported by strips a half inch top piece, a part of the latter being square, nailed to the sides.

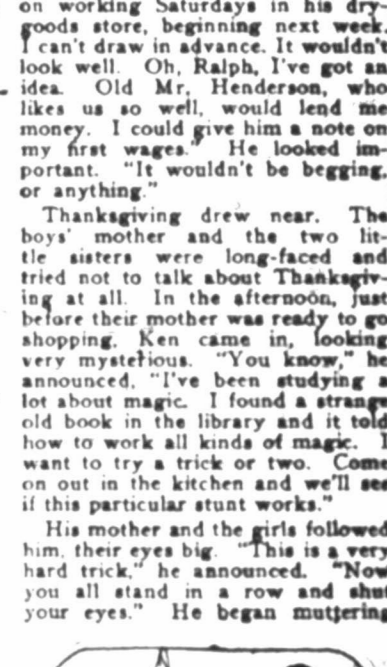

It was not until about six years after its first appearance that "Mother Machree" became famous. It originally had been written for Chas. O'Connell to be used in a play. The writer of the text was Rida Johnson Young, the author of the music and his collaborator was Ernest R. Ball, composer of a number of popular ballads. At the time it was written the song had the usual vogue of a featured number in a musical production. It was not until McCormack began to use it in his concerts and record it for the phonograph that the song became such a general favorite. 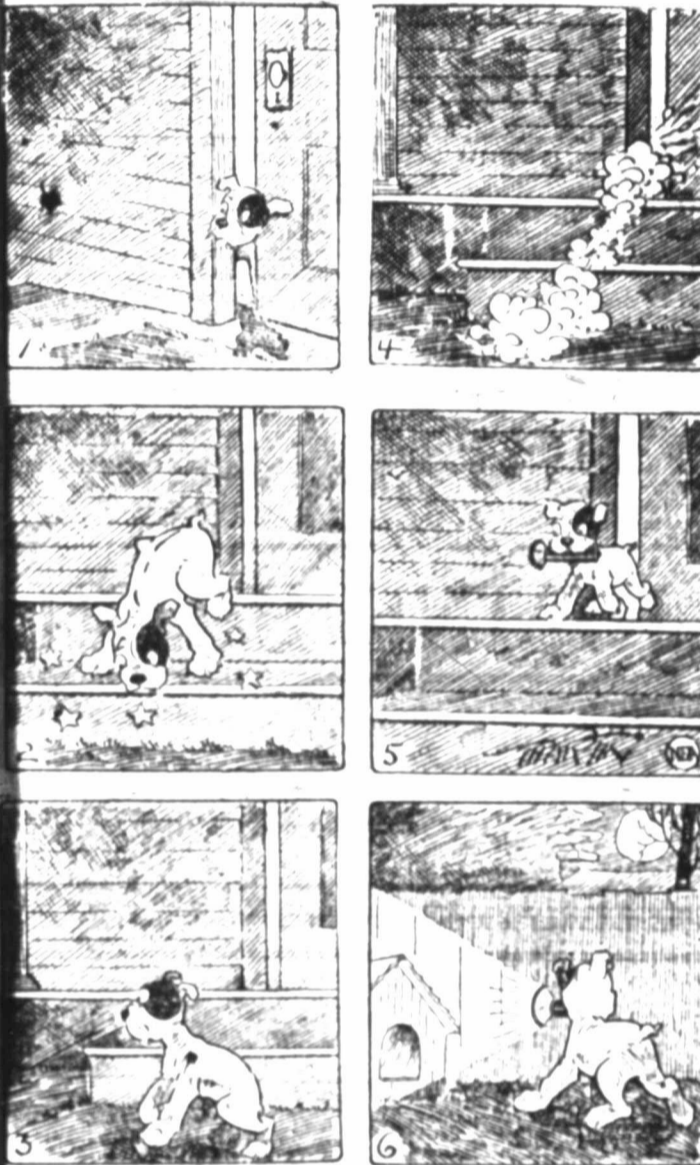

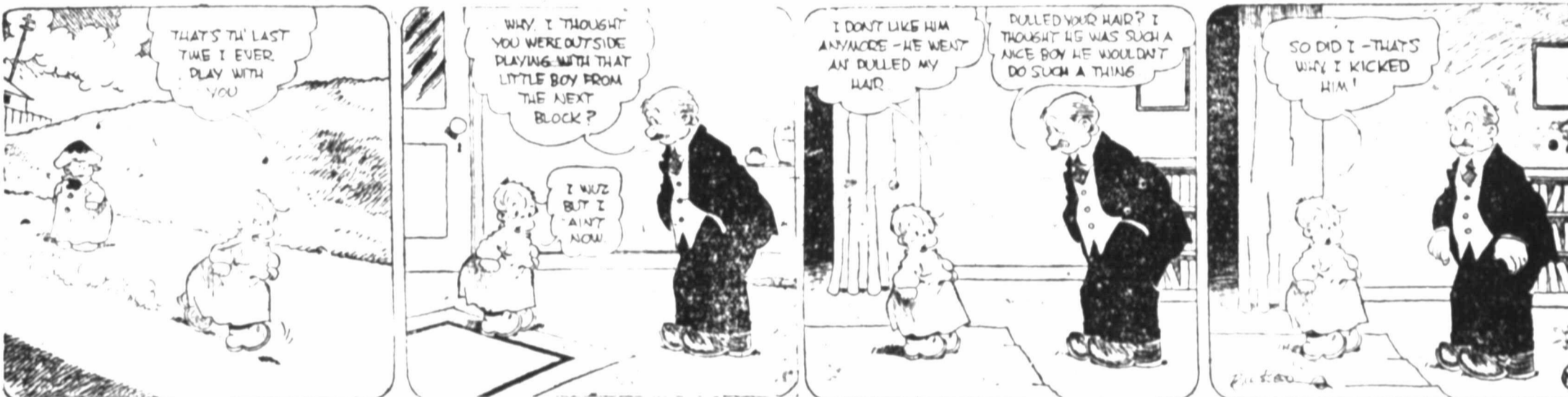
