

CONFERENCE CONSIDERS **SMUGGLING OF LIQUOR**

AT CANADIAN BORDER OTTAWA, Nov. 28. 63—Canadian d United States officials attendng the international conference on iquor smuggling expected today to set down to hard facts in their disussion of methods proposed by the merican government to end ex-ertation of rum across the border. Although strict secrecy was main-sined, it was believed little was one at the opening of the confernce yesterday other than for the Canadians to receive the United States proposals which, in effect, were thought to be the same as hose outlined in Washington before he conference opened. These pro-osals, it has been indicated, will ind little favor in the eyes of cominion officials.

Jacques Bureau, minister of cusoms and excise, whose department interested primarily in the pro-osals, will make his first appear-nce at the conference today. Cleans the Gas

NATURAL gas is an oil product. It is probably caused by the breaking up of crude petroleum under heat, just as gas is made today artificially. Because it is a petroleum

product, it is never in a pure state when it comes from the wells. It is technically known as "wet gas." Big absorption plants are

built to remove the various vapors from it and the gas as delivered to patrons is called "dry gas." These vapors consist of water, oils of various kinds and gasoline. The effect of putting them directly in the pipes would be that in their journey they would condense, form a fluid that would naturally flow to

the low parts of the pipe and block it. Then, too, the oils and gasoline would make more difficult the problem of stopping the leakage, because gasoline destroys rubber.

In the long journey the gas takes to reach the consumer, none of these vapors could get to his burners, but in the early days of the natural gas industry they




