





INCREASE STATE RANGER FORCE PROPOSED.

Texas needs 150 more Rangers, says Captain W. L. Aldrich, quarter master of the state Ranger force. Captain Aldrich says there is more lawlessness in the state now than there has been in the nine years he has been a member of the Ranger force. Prohigambling.

Captain Aldrich has indicated that the legislature will be asked to greatly increase its appropriation for the Ranger force. There are now fifty members of that organization, most of whom are on the Mexican border.

But Texas will need ten times 150 more Rangers and then some if the practice of using them for police duties that ought to be taken care of by cities and counties themselves is continued. There has been a like yours—that is keyed just a little higher, per- drugs. gradual change in the use to which the Ranger force of Texas is being put. FARM LAND VALUES.

The value of the farms of the United States in breased from \$16,000,000,000 in 1890 to \$78,000,000,000 in 1922, according to estimates. The rate of increase shown by these figures is more than 450 per cent.

But it is doubtful whether the weath of the farm owners has increased in anything like this proportion. It is true that in many instances farms have sold for four or five times the prices they would have brought and inflated. They will bring no adequate return on the higher values.

The period of 1914 to 1920 was one of high prices for most farm products. These high prices brought widespread speculation in farms. Prices for land were raised to a point where farmers could hardly afford to operate, even at the high prices commanded fell in the general deflation many farmers were left with high priced land on which they could not hope to produce enough to pay interest and taxes. That is one of the causes of political unrest in certain sections of the country where the farmers were the hardest hit.

The increase in the value of farm lands has no been an unmixed benefit. In many instances it has brought disaster. There will be distress among the farmers of the country until some of the water is queezed out of land values. Unfortunately this can land owners themselves.

There are many small economies that can be practiced in this course that do not require any extra time. Nor do they detract from the food value or beauty of the dish. Unless the salad is a lettuce salad,

use lettuce only as a garnish. Outside leaves of head lettuce or leaf lettuce cut in shreds will furnish the ecessary green at almost no cost Or parsley, broken in tiny sprigs and dropped over a fish or meat salad, adds the needed color without any lettuce. Celery tops, carefully looked over and crisped, take the place of lettuce. Or a fruit salad can be served in an apple or orange cup, doing away with any green ex-cept a thing slice of green cherry.
