HAVE TWO VACANCIES; PLAN OTHER CHANGES

Fight Will Be Made Largely On Alleged Excessive Expenditures

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—It will be at least three weeks before members of the senate committee on privileges and elections will take up for consideration the contest over the seat of Senator Mayfield of Texas. This is the opinion of a Republican member of that committee. He pointed out that there are two vacancies existing on the committee, one occasioned by the death of Senator Crampton of Vermont and another through the defeat of Senator Pomeroy, Democrat, of Ohio, and, moreover, it is understood that Senator Walsh, Democrat, of Missouri, probably will not be on the committee as re-constituted in this congress.

It is understood that a tentative agreement has been reached between leaders in the senate that the Mayfield contest will be postponed entirely upon the basis of alleged excessive expenditures. While it is probable that the Ku Klux Klan will be injected into it, efforts will be made to keep it out of the main issue.

Daniel Smith Testifies A. C. Golden Was Member of Party That Abducted And Flogged Him, September 13, 1922

"You'll find out what we are going to do with you before you get out tonight, You're right," they did pour it on a fellow named Daniel Smith the other night and there are about 5,000 of us in this county too," is what one of Daniel Smith's abductors and floggers told him on the night of September 13, 1922, as testified on the witness stand in the 59th district court Tuesday morning.

The young fellow, who said he was 22 years of age, was the fifth witness called in the trial of A. C. Golden, Iowa Park banker, who is on trial on a charge of perjury, in connection with the abduction and alleged to have made before the grand jury while an investigation was being made regarding the Smith flogging.

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"They took me to the center of the automobile ring and there was a man named Smith. It is a fact that you paid a fine in Wichita Falls for being out with a married woman," I answered them that it was true that I had paid a fine.

"They then held a conference, short distance away. I could not hear anything that was said. "A short time later they came back and some one said to me 'Smith we've decided to give you a good whipping'."

"Another man came up and said, 'Pour it on that—' Pour it on him," he got tired a third man took up the whipping."

He told them that the woman remained on his back a couple of days. "These requests for a continuance were refused by the court."

DEMOCRATIC LEADER IN SENATE IS SKILLED IN PARLIAMENTARY TACTICS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Joseph Taylor Robinson of Arkansas, who has become Democratic leader in the senate this session, succeeding Democrat Charles McNary, owes his selection for this important post to the fight he made against ratification of the four power treaty and other pacifist treaties by the armistice conference.

Robinson is one of the most forceful debaters in the senate, skilled in parliamentary tactics and exceedingly resourceful in all the methods of harassing an opposition committed to policies distasteful to the majority.

His views are known to the senate distinctly by every one in chamber, and his utterances never leave any doubt as to what his own position on a certain question is.

The new Democratic leader is 41 years old and served one term in the Arkansas legislature and five terms in the house of representatives before becoming senator.

ANNUAL REPORT OF GRAND MASTER OF MASONS SUBMITTED

SCHOOL AND IMPROVEMENTS MADE.

REPORTS DEATH OF FOUR OF PAST GRAND OFFICERS

Paragraph of Report Discusses Attitude Toward the Ku Klux Klan.

WACO, Texas, Dec. 4. (AP)—The 85th annual communication of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Texas, A. F. & A. M., was called to order here this morning at 10 o'clock by Grand Master Mike H. Thomas of Dallas, who submitted his report of the year's activities.

One of the first items in the grand master's report dealt with the Masonic home and school and the improvements under way at that institution. Contracts have been let for additional buildings at a cost of \$174,000.

Attention of the grand lodge was called by the grand master to his cooperation with the Masonic service and education committee, which work he heartily approved.

Death has removed from the ranks of Masonry four past grand officers during the past year, the report revealed. These are Thomas C. Yantis, Albert Bacon Watkins, William James, past grand masters, and French W. Simpson, past grand treasurer.

Five lodges in the Texas jurisdiction had demised during the year, the report revealed.

One of the items in the grand master's report said: "In all cases of this kind that have come to me I have declined to be influenced by personal leaning, but have adopted the position always that as one individual was entitled to disagree with the klan, so was another privileged to agree with it, and vice versa; that discussions of the subject had no place in Masonry; that Masonry had no right to condemn it or accept it, any more than it would some other fraternal order, religious, social or political party, until before the courts of the United States, that it was immoral, and that it was equally un-Masonic to use Masonry to tear this or any other order down, as it was to use Masonry to build another order up."

Fifteen new lodges were constituted and set to work during the past year.

The annual report of Grand Secretary W. B. Pearson showed the grand lodge in a most prosperous condition. A Masonic membership in Texas of 132,979 was shown, or a net gain during the year of 5,267.

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FARMERS MUST OPEN UP FOREIGN MARKETS

PIERRE, S. D., Dec. 4.—The only way to give farmers immediate relief from their present strained financial condition "is to find and open up foreign markets for their products," said Carl Vrooman of Chicago.

"This can be done," he said, "first, by a revision of our tariff in the interest of the whole nation rather than of a few protecting industries; second, by adopting a foreign policy that alone and the same time will promote our national prosperity and help to put Europe on its feet; and third, and most quickly, by dumping the farmers' surplus crop abroad on credit."

The farmer is asking neither for handout nor for "easy money" and looks nothing like the government except that it help him to help himself, Mr. Vrooman declared.

"Our manufacturing industries began by merely asking for free milk to nourish infant industries," but have gradually worked up to an arrogant demand which the present administration has granted through the Fordney tariff act, for the very life blood of the farmers and the rest of the consuming public who are forced to buy their products, Mr. Vrooman declared.

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LIGHT WINES AND BEER PETITION.

A representative of the Sanity League of America has been in Dallas obtaining signatures to a petition urging an amendment to the Volstead act to permit the sale of light wines and beer.

A petition with 17,000 or 18,000 names is a formidable one, it must be admitted, and indicates a strong sentiment for a loosening of the prohibition regulations that had been thought existed in any Texas community.

Our own opinion has been that the people were unwilling to take chances in loosening up the prohibition regulations. Despite the prevalence of bootlegging and the many violations of the liquor laws the conviction is growing that the people have the liquor traffic down and they want to keep it there and want rather a tightening of the laws regulating the handling of liquor than a loosening of them to permit the sale of light wines and beer.

It is not unlikely that a petition to this end would get many more signatures in Dallas than the 17,000 to 18,000 claimed by the wine and beer advocates.

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NATION'S BUSINESS OUTLINES NATIONAL CAMPAIGN ISSUES

TAXATION AND TRANSPORTATION ARE GIVEN GREATEST PROMINENCE.

MERCHANT MARINE AND IMMIGRATION INCLUDED

International Relations Also to Be Issues, Writes Julius M. Barnes.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Taxation, transportation, the merchant marine, immigration and international relations are listed in the forthcoming issue of the Nation's Business, by Julius M. Barnes, president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, as the most important questions, in the order named, before the present congress.

Mr. Barnes finds "clear agreement" among business men that the "tax burden could be lightened by between 100 and 150 million dollars if there are avoided such drains on the national treasury as the proposed bonus bill."

Warning against new transportation legislation "to set in motion theories which in the past have restricted credit, checked expansion of facilities, deprived industry and the farm of ready markets, slowed up employment," he urges that the transportation act, under which the "great revival of transportation service has been registered" in the last year be "altered with exceeding caution, if at all."

He endorses "in the interest of fair play" a merchant marine policy "of reimbursing private owners for the handicaps" of competition based upon nationally framed shipping laws and the policy of protection which invite higher labor costs in both construction and operation.

With reference to restraining immigration he favors a policy of selection which would take "due notice of individual health and character of the alien seeking admission together with the changing needs of the various types of industry."

Mr. Barnes also advocates that congress "invest its administrative officers for the handling of the world credit and allied debt questions and international relations with the same confidence and the same freedom of action which intelligent and successful private industry would do in solving problems which are largely economic in character."

Diver Attacked By Huge Octopus Is Cut to Pieces

TOULON, France, Dec. 4.—A diver working on the submerged wreck of the French battleship Edouard Belin was attacked yesterday by a huge octopus which did not relinquish its manifold embrace until the man's comrades had cut it to pieces.

The diver, Jean Negri, fought desperately with the monster, under water for some time. He was finally able to free one arm and plunged his trident into the body of the creature. The octopus, however, held fast, whereupon Negri gave the signal to be hauled up. When his companions saw the writhing monster emerge they were panic stricken, but the plight of their comrade appeared so serious that they went to his aid and freed him with their knives.

POLICEMEN MUST NOT HIT MAN IN MOUTH

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 4.—If a policeman has to hit a prisoner to subdue him when he becomes unruly he must not hit him in the mouth. That is the order issued today by Dr. L. C. Chamberlain, physician and surgeon to the Orleans police department.

The serious condition of Corporal Arthur Hattier of the ninth precinct, in charity hospital suffering from blood poisoning, prompted the order. The corporal saw a negro hit a white man two weeks ago and started to intervene when the assailant turned upon him. Hattier struck the negro in the mouth and in doing so cut his hand on the negro's teeth. Blood poisoning resulted and surgeons now are striving to save his right arm.

One lone doughboy still remains at the watch on the Rhine. He was left behind to clean up some investigations.

PLAN EXHAUSTIVE STUDY OF RECORDS AS AID TO FLIGHT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—An exhaustive study of the records of various Arctic expeditions and other scientific data is to be started shortly by a special board of naval officers appointed to work out a detailed plan for a flight next summer to the North Pole.

Extensive exploration over unknown regions adjacent to the pole is to be undertaken and President Coolidge in a letter giving formal approval to the proposal expressed the opinion that the expedition "will be of great practical value." No additional appropriation from congress, it is thought, would be needed to carry out the plan. The project is the outgrowth of a suggestion made to Secretary Denby some months ago by Robert A. Bartlett, who sailed with Rear Admiral Peary on the successful polar expedition in the steamer Roosevelt.

NIGHT SCHOOL WILL INSTRUCT IN MANY USEFUL SUBJECTS

An enrollment of 84 students was the first session of the night school held at the local high school building Monday night. It is expected that many others will enroll within the next week. The night school has become popular here within the past few years, and last winter an enrollment of almost 100 students was recorded.

Of the subjects decided upon Monday night, bookkeeping, typewriting and shorthand are the most popular. Reading, writing, spelling, and arithmetic have been asked for and it is probable that Americanization will be taught.

Americanization is for foreigners, night school officials stated, and since very few of them can read the papers, announcement of the curriculum could be made only through the few who attended the first night. This subject, in which text books are put out by the government, not only teaches the foreigner to read and write the English language, but weaves the spirit of Americanism into the lessons. It brings before the foreigner the greatest American statesmen and the patriotic works of the foremost American authors. The last part of the course is a study of the Constitution of the United States.

Other subjects, such as Spanish, advanced English and others, may be added to the course from time to time as the demand increases.

K. F. Prosser, principal of the school, announced. The foundation subjects will be given free, except for the cost of the textbooks, while a small fee will be charged for the organization of new classes. Ten stipends will form such a class, Mr. Prosser announced.

At present, five teachers have been secured. J. T. Rudell, J. E. Parks, F. N. Hall, Miss Gladys Williams and Mrs. Prosser will constitute the original staff of the night school, although it is probable that other faculty members will be recruited as the enrollment of students requires. Night school will be held from 7 to 9 o'clock on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights.

No action was taken by the council at the Monday night meeting, but it was intimated that some disposition of the matter would be made at an early meeting.

Police Commissioner Young was authorized to close a negro restaurant which has been opened in the downtown section by a white proprietor. The owner appeared before the council last Monday night and requested permission to operate the place; he was promised an investigation by Commissioners Young and Patton. Their report to the council Monday night was not favorable and the council ordered the place closed. The objection grew out of the segregation ruling which is in force here.
