

UNCLE SAM NOT NIGGARDLY.

Your Uncle Sam hasn't meant to be niggardly in his treatment of the veterans of the world war if figures that have been compiled by the government anything, 'These figures shows that he has paid out for the relief and benefit of the veterans and their families since 1918 the huge total of \$2,112,283, 644.19. This sum includes military and naval family allowances, compensation for death or disability, verational rehabilitation, medical and hospital services, salaries and expenses of war risk and veterans' bureaus, insurance losses and other items, including the bonus of 1920.

There has been inefficiency and waste and exravagance in connection with the spending of some of this money but perhaps not more than in governnent affairs generally. The greater part of the huge total of more than two billion dollars has gone to the direct benefit of the veterans.

And expenditures for the relief and benefit of vet-

erans of the world war have scarcely begun. We stion this not as begrudging such expenditures but simply pointing to history and to facts. The American government is the most prodigal in all the world in its treatment of veterans of its wars.

Louis Ludlow, Washington correspondent for the Columbus, O., Dispatch tells the readers of that paper that about seventeen times as many Ohioans were paid pensions during the fiscal year 1923 as frew pensions from all of the other countries of the world combined and the amount paid to Ohio pensoners was about twenty times the amount paid to all other pensioners on the globe.

In 1922 there were 535,932 pensioners in the Talted States. Of that number 51,366 lived in Ohio. Mr. Ludlow goes on to say:

"Pennsylvania ranks second with 49,678 pensioners. New York ranks third with 42,894, minois fourth with 36,392 and Indiana fifth with 32,959. The other states that have in excess of 20,000 pensioners are: California, 26,213; Missouri, 25,832; Michigan, 21,760; Massachusetts, 21,092; Kansas, 20,305. The state having the smallest number of pen-

mera is Nevada with 483 on the roll whod rew \$350,-BSE.51 from the government during the year ended June 20 last. Although most of the pensioners are maid on account of service rendered to the union cause during the civil war, all of the southern states are represented on the roll. Georgia, through which state Sherman sent his legions on their devastating arch to the sea, has 2536 pensioners who drew \$1,-360,343.62 during the last fiscal year. Mississippi, the state of Jefferson Davis, has 2340, who are paid during the year the sum of \$1,286,157.80, Florida has 4069, Louisiana has 3400, North Carolina has 2781. South Carolina has 1270 and Kentucky has 14,160.

"The pension bureau pays the pensions that have been granted on account of all the wars prior to the world war. Forty claimants on account of the war of 1812 are still on the rolls. All of them are widows of soldiers who fought in that war. This is a decrease of nine during the last year. Forty-nine veterans who fought in the war with Mexico are still on the rolls as against 73 a year ago and 1636 widows of Mexican war soldiers are drawing pensions as against 1877 a year ago.

"Although it has been \$8 years since the civil mr ended, the total of \$263,013,500.18 paid in pensions during the fiscal year ended June 30 last was the largest annual payment in the history of the penon system. 


