MORAL SUPPORT TO GERMANY FOR LOAN TO PURCHASE FOOD

CONCESSION IS AUTHORIZED UNDER THE TREATY OF VERDUN

MUST HAVE PRIORITY OVER FRENCH CLAIMS

Outcome of British Election May Have Bearing on Negotiations

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The government will give its moral support before the reparations commission to the German plan for financing an international loan to finance food purchases, it was learned authoritatively here today.

Germany, it is understood, will ask that the loan, which it has offered, be given priority over general reparations, a request which the reparations commission is authorized to grant under the treaty of Versailles.

There is some fear that the loan proposal may become entangled with the problems arising from the Franco-Belgian seizure of the Ruhr basin.

Paris is trying to obtain reimbursement for the costs of this military occupation out of German reparations before payments are credited to the reparations account.

This effort is opposed by Great Britain and Italy, both of which disapprove the Franco-Belgian military policy in the Ruhr. The United States also has indicated its belief that the Ruhr seizure would do more to destroy than to improve the prospect for realizing reparations.

Must Be Given Priority

If Premier Poincaré adheres to his determination to give the cost of the Ruhr venture priority over reparations payments, any proposed German food loan, it is felt, must be given priority over French claims for reimbursement.

Bankers in the United States and Great Britain, according to the prevailing belief here, would look with disfavor upon any bond issue which was a second lien on German resources while the cost of the French military policy remained a first lien.

The American government meanwhile, continues to insist on the word from Paris as to the exact scope of the inquiry into German finances proposed by Premier Poincaré. No resources for the French military participation on any investigating committee set up by the reparations commission have as yet been received.

Election Has Bearing

The outcome of the British election, it is said, is likely to call a halt to Anglo-French negotiations until a new government is set up in London.

Premier Poincaré, it is pointed out, made it a point of order just prior to election day in an obvious effort to strengthen the hand of Prime Minister Baldwin. France declined the request of Lloyd George for a position of power in the British government.

The failure of the Baldwin conservatives to obtain a majority in parliament is regarded here as a defeat not only for the British Tories but also for the French premier and his associates.

The Liberals and Laborites of Great Britain have little sympathy for the policy being pursued by France toward Germany, and are certain to make M. Poincaré's position in Europe increasingly difficult.

The background also is the determination of Mr. Lloyd George and his followers to win the sympathetic cooperation of the United States in the treatment of European problems.

RECEPTION FOR FORMER SECRETARY OF NAVY DANIELS

AUSTIN, Dec. 8.—A reception for Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy in the Wilson cabinet, was tendered by state officials in Governor Neff's office here today. Mr. Daniels stopped here on his way from Austin to Houston to visit the Governor Neff. He is on a lecture tour in Texas.

Unqualified approval of President Coolidge's pro-peace attitude to congress in reference to law enforcement was given by Mr. Daniels. Especially did he approve the president's stand on prohibition, declaring that enforcement of the 18th amendment was a special province of the national government as emphasized by Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania.

Mr. Daniels declared that since Prohibition's inception the prohibition has been enforced completely by the federal authorities more than had been accomplished in this connection than at any previous time.

Former Marshal Of German Court Now Ostracized

BERLIN, Dec. 8.—Count Robert Zoelitz, former marshal of the court of Emperor William II, has been read out of his own family and expelled from all the organizations of officers of the old German army because of his recent book, "Twelve Years at the German Court" in which he spoke disparagingly of Kaiser Wilhelm II, Marshal Von Hindenburg and other officers of high rank. He charged these officers with a waning attitude toward the Kaiser who was represented as treating them as if they were dogs and slaves.

GERALDINE

A Colonization Failure That Finally Succeeded As a Result of the Discovery of Liquid Gold

Where once stood a prosperous appearing frontier community, which boasted a population of more than 1,500 rugged American people, a spot which is now marked only by a few stumps and the debris of fallen chimneys, is now the location of the newest oil field of Texas. In the winter of 1904, at the time the American Tribune New Colony Company, the trading point of the colony being named Geraldine, after the founder. Engineers were sent to Texas to survey the lands and mark off the townsite in the land of the cactus and mesquite, six miles south of Holliday, Texas, in Archer County. Wide publicity was given the colony through the publication at Indianapolis and in two months time lands were ready to be sold. Excursions carried many people to the territory and auctioneers were employed to sell the parcels. People were attracted from all parts of Northern and Eastern states and John T. Young of Wichita Falls, who attended the auction, says that more than 5,000 people came to the great sale. Traveling by train to Holliday, the people were forced to ride from that point the distance of six miles in stage coaches to the new settlement.

The auction was a great success and more than half of the business and residential lots were sold for high prices. Although the promoter paid only 16 cents for the lands, some of the lots sold for as much as \$1,000. A five-acre tract of land was given to each purchaser of a lot in either the business or residential section to stimulate interest and bidding was brisk at the sale. Many people who came from Northern and Eastern cities to attend the sale brought their life savings to invest in the townsite. The business and residential sections were located on a 2,900-acre tract and 9,999 acres were devoted to five-acre tracts, which were given to the purchasers of property in the community.

Prosperity Arrives

Hardware, grocery, drug and other general mercantile stores, saloons, school buildings, churches, blacksmith shops and a two-story hotel immediately sprang up in Geraldine, a community of more than 1,500 people, and prosperity reigned for almost a year. Cisterns were dug and all permanent improvements desired by the strangers in the territory who purchased the lands on the promise of promoters were installed.

In mid-summer the usual drought in this section prevailed, crops failed and money became scarce in the community. The coarseness of the soil here still did not give up and two more similar seasons were experienced. Discouraged and without money to finance another crop, the colonists began to move from their lands, back to the cities of the East and North, whence they came. In 1906 not a store or building remained in Geraldine. Some of the excellently constructed houses and buildings were saved as far as Wichita Falls and Holliday and are still standing in those communities. A Scott street residence, now standing in Wichita Falls, was moved from Geraldine.

Claims were forgotten by the pioneers and they, by negligence, gradually permitted their lands to be sold for taxes or to return to Mr. Wilson, by foreclosure, because of the failure to meet their notes. Only six of the original settlers of Geraldine now live in Archer County.

After the falling of the colony, and with most of the lands again in his possession as the promoter had failed to meet his obligations, Mr. Wilson began the operation of one of the greatest cattle ranches of the Southwest and at times more than 6,000 cattle have been on the barren plains of this ranch. Modern barns and quarters were constructed and although the lands were worth only 34 an acre, the retired banker made his investment pay dividends.

Several months ago, after more than 190 wildcat guesses had failed, oil was discovered on the lands and land is now being leased for \$1,000 an acre for the mineral rights only, where the colony of Geraldine was once located. Only the debris of fallen stone chimneys and cisterns mark the location of the town and few people even attempt to find out the name of the abandoned community.

Oil development had been rapid in this section and only recently the retired banker, who is now 81 years of age, refused \$1,000,000 cash for 40,000 acres of his ranch. More than one hundred producing oil wells are located on the tract of The American Tribune New Colony Company.

Oil is found at 1,375 feet on the land and is of 40 gravity. Three pipe line companies have extended into the field and one of the most successful oil fields in the Southwest is being developed.

Laterals from the great Wichita Valley Irrigation system are withdrawn in close proximity to the extension of the laterals and great quantities of water can be obtained. The "set" rough now boasts one of the best daffies in Texas, a splendid hog ranch, and one of the best cattle ranches of the West. With irrigation the land is said to be very fertile and wheat, oats and cotton can be successfully grown.

Less than a sixty-five of the original purchasers of land in this section still hold titles to the property. Wealth is abundant since the discovery of oil and the possible irrigation.

Geraldine, named after the founder of the colony, is now attracting great interest in the oil fraternity and operators and producers are watching the new field with eagle eyes.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—An announcement that the invitation from Chicago for the Republican national convention of 1924 to be held in that city would be withdrawn was made here tonight by Fred W. Upham, treasurer of the Republican national committee.

The responsible administration leaders desired the convention to be held in Cleveland, Ohio, Mr. Upham added.

The announcement by Mr. Upham, who came here today with a delegation of Chicago business men to urge Chicago's claims for the convention, was said by Republican leaders virtually to assure the selection of Cleveland, as the convention city.

Hotel men who had intended heading the delegation of Chicago to Des Moines, San Francisco and Los Angeles, many Republican com-

mittee members, however, had favored either Chicago or Cleveland and the feeling was said to be general that with Chicago out of the race Cleveland would be an almost certain winner.

Mr. Upham conferred with President Coolidge today and said upon leaving the White House that the president was maintaining an impartial mind with reference to the selection of the convention city.

FORMER CROWN PRINCE IS AWARDED PROPERTY

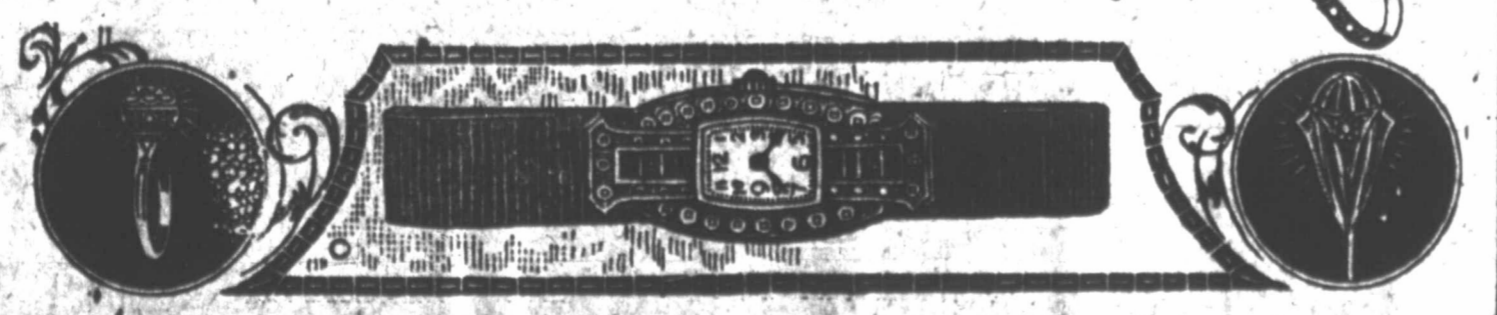

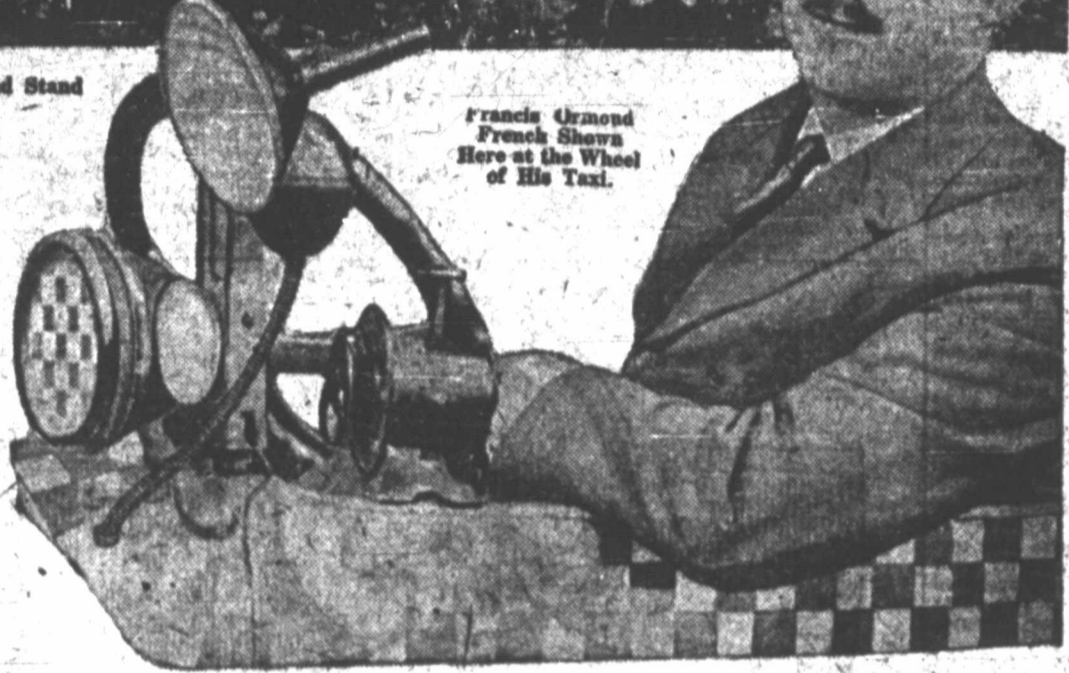

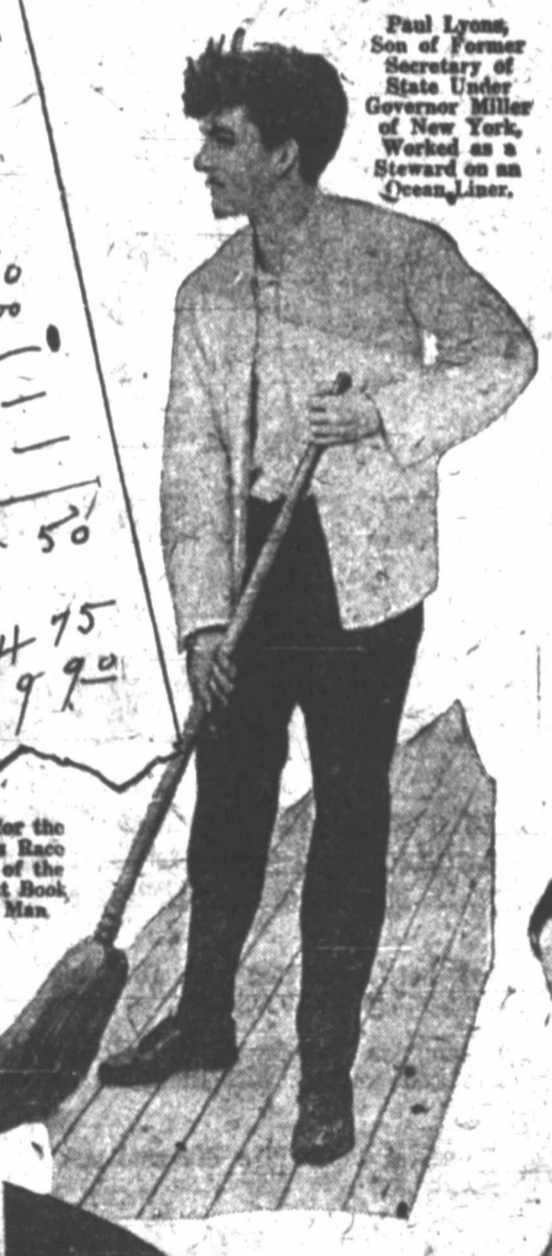

his present determination to put the issue to the test again.

Essentially, the happy mood in which Johnson was at the convention was responsible for his leaving the presidential good chance of reaching the white house by way of the vice-presidency. These two incidents are among the most dramatic episodes in American politics.

On one of the days of the convention, after it became clear that neither Johnson nor Lusk could win a group of Republican leaders determined to name the late Senator Knox of Pennsylvania, for president, with Johnson as his running-mate for vice-president. The leaders who had determined on this program went to get him to consent to it. One of the messages carried to Johnson came from the late Senator Penrose, of Pennsylvania. His message was to the effect: "Take it, Hiram—Knox is in bad health and won't last his term out." Johnson reacted to the offer, and the unity in which it was made, was claimed angrily: "They are trying to put a heart-heat between me and the white house." Johnson turned down the suggestion not merely coldly, but angrily. If he had accepted it, and if the program had gone through, would Penrose's prediction turn out to be correct. Knox died within a year and a half.

Again, when the leaders came their way clear to nominate Harding, they again considered the idea of putting on Johnson as the vice-presidential candidate. This again Johnson refused to consider. He was a candidate for the higher prize and he would not take the second one. Where Johnson would be today if he had been willing to go on the ticket with Harding needs only to be suggested.

Under all these circumstances it is not to be wondered if Johnson, during the past three years, whenever he has meditated in the silence of his closet, has felt that he, and not Harding, and not Coolidge ought to be in the white house. And if Johnson is a man strongly controlled by temperament, this mood has influenced a good many of his actions and attitudes.

When Harding died and Coolidge became president, Johnson was in Washington. Every other senator and public man in town hurried to the new president to pay his respects and promise his help. Johnson, however, was not among those who called. In the course of time the newspapers began to make allusions to Johnson's failure to drop around to the white house. Thereafter, Johnson called. Again the newspapers conveyed their notion of the spirit of the situation by pointing out that Johnson's call on Coolidge had lasted exactly three minutes.

Some of the newspaper men, who are an irreverent and ribald lot, invented for private circulation a supposition concerning the situation between Johnson and Coolidge on the occasion of this call of courtesy. According to this vicious and frankly untrue story Johnson is represented as striding into President Coolidge's room and saying: "Good morning, Mr. President. The fact that you are sitting in my chair and wearing my shoes, I have nothing whatever against you. It is intolerable and I shall take steps to see that it does not continue. Good-by, sir!"

To sum up the difference between Johnson's manner in 1919 and his present candidacy:

Then, Johnson's organization was composed of amateurs—amateurs in politics—and for the most part one rich man not active in business. Now, Johnson's personal organization includes some of the most energetic men in active business in America, and some of the most experienced professional politicians. (The professional politicians managing Johnson's present campaign are not the ones on the inside of power and they are rather the "outs" trying to get in.)

Then, Johnson had the earnest backing of the most powerful of the irreconcilables. Now, these same irreconcilables are indifferent to Johnson's campaign or actively hostile to it. They feel that the anti-League of Nations fight is the one to win, and speak of Johnson's present performance as dignifying the League corpse and kicking it around in public.

Then, Johnson was the only exponent of the Progressives and the New Deal following. Except General Wood in the race. To-day, practically all the old Progressive and Roosevelt leaders feel that Johnson no longer represents them. They are trying to get Gifford Pinchot to run in order to have a chance to express themselves. The way Johnson voted, or his failure to vote at all, on such questions as the Bush-Cunningham act, the expedition of Newberry from the senate, the ship subsidy and the tariff, is regarded by the Progressives as putting him definitely in the standard-patter class. They regard him as an apostate for ambition's sake.

All that, however, is material—material for another story.

PERSONAL REMINISCENCES OF SENATOR CHAS. A. CULBERSON

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—In October, 1917, I was admitted to the bar at Dallas, before Judge E. T. Eaton, district judge, and was examined by a committee composed of H. L. Crawford, F. A. Turbot and John A. Pascoe.

Judge Eaton was the father of United States judge for the eastern district of Texas.

I had great pleasure in joining with Senator Sheppard in recommending his appointment to this position by President Wilson.

I began the practice of law at Jefferson, Texas, as a member of my father's firm of Culberson & Armstrong, and remained in this firm for several years, when I withdrew from it and continued the practice at Jefferson alone.

Necessarily the practice was not confined to any particular branch of law and touched all character of cases, both civil and criminal, which were subjects of litigation in the courts of that section.

In the course of time I was employed on one side or the other in nearly all cases in the courts at Jefferson and in many cases in surrounding counties.

Perhaps the most notable case in which at this time I was involved was that of the United States vs. Israel Le Grand in the United States court at Jefferson. This case arose under what was known as the Ku Klux act of congress, and after trial before Judge Amos Morrill, United States district judge, in which I attached the constitutionality of the act, Le Grand was convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary for five years.

From this judgment I appealed to the United States circuit court and the appeal was heard before Associate Justice Woods of the supreme court of the United States, sitting as circuit judge at Dallas.

Justice Woods, after consideration of the case, reversed the judgment and dismissed the prosecution, holding the act of congress to be unconstitutional and void, as contained by me. The case will be found in the 11th Federal Reporter.

In writing me from Washington about the Le Grand case some time after the decision, my father said: "No such legal victory has been achieved in my day."

STATUTORY OFFENSE IS CHARGED AGAINST OKLAHOMA OFFICIAL

SECRETARY OF STATE MARK EY COMMISSION INDICTED SATURDAY.

ARRESTED AT GUTHRIE WITH WIFE OF COUSIN

Accused Dennis Charge and Says That He is Victim of Black-mail Plot.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Dec. 8.

An indictment charging statutory offenses was returned here today by a district court grand jury against Eugene Matlock, secretary of the state market commission, and Mrs. W. S. Smith, wife of his cousin, Matlock and Mrs. Smith were arrested at Guthrie Wednesday night.

Identical charges were filed against the pair in Justice court here and in Guthrie following their arrest. Matlock pleaded not guilty when arraigned yesterday here and was released on \$1000 bond. He was to appear today in Guthrie to plead to the charge there. Mrs. Smith has not been arraigned in either city.

It was explained that the charges in Guthrie were based on the 1919 Matlock and the woman were alleged to have made there on the night of their arrest, while the Oklahoma county indictment and information charged previous offenses.

Matlock is a former Oklahoma City legislator and was a candidate for mayor at the last city election. Following a meeting of the state marketing commission, yesterday Governor N. B. Trapp indicated that Matlock would be given an opportunity to resign as secretary of the commission.

Charges Blackmail Plot. In a signed statement issued today Matlock charged that he was the victim of a black mail plot of Mr. and Mrs. Smith and that he would not resign as secretary of the market commission. He asserted that he would vindicate himself when given the opportunity.

Matlock declared that after he learned Smith and his wife had threatened to file suit against him unless he paid them \$5,000 he went to a hotel here where they were living and "convincing them that I would not pay any blackmail."

"They threatened to go before the grand jury and have an indictment returned against me," the statement declared.

Matlock asserted that he had gone to Guthrie Wednesday upon request of Smith, who called him by telephone saying he and Mrs. Smith were in Guthrie and that he wanted to talk to him about an important matter. Matlock said that Smith declared "he was afraid to come to Oklahoma City." He said Smith telephoned him twice, before he agreed to go.

"I did not go to any hotel with Mrs. Smith and I never registered any name," Matlock's statement said. "I was on the interurban, alone, returning to Oklahoma City."

FARMERS WARNED AGAINST DEFICIENT FEED CROP IN 1924

DALLAS, Dec. 8.—Warning southwestern farmers against "seriously deficient feed crop prospects for the coming year," Lynn E. Talley, federal reserve agent in a letter addressed today to all member banks in the 11th federal reserve district, embracing Texas and parts of Louisiana, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona, said the "time has come, in our opinion, when the matter should receive the serious attention of member banks in those communities which do not produce feed stuff in commercial quantities."

Farmers must be encouraged to adopt a diversified and intensive production program that will enable them to produce on their own land as large a portion as possible of the feed and other products that they will need for home consumption, Mr. Talley said.

"What the southwest needs is not a larger cotton acreage at the expense of feed acreage, but a larger yield of cotton lint per acre when can be accomplished by intensive cultural methods, aided and encouraged by the credit facilities of our banks."

"Credit dispensed to our agricultural producers upon any other basis than that which will tend to reduce their operating costs to a minimum can not be said to serve their best interests nor contribute to their permanent prosperity."

UNIVERSITY OKLAHOMA SPRINTER ACCIDENTALLY SHOT AT FORT WORTH

NOMAN, Okla., Dec. 8.—Charles E. Davis of Fort Worth, Texas, a sprinter at the University of Oklahoma, was shot in the leg accidentally last night by W. H. Chillis, a policeman, and it is regarded as doubtful that he will ever return to the track.

READJUST FREIGHT TARIFF SCHEDULES LUMBER SHIPMENTS

AUSTIN, Dec. 8.—The railroad commission Saturday issued a rate order readjusting the entire freight tariff schedules on lumber shipments from southeast Texas mills to Texas ports. A rate scheme based largely on mileage was substituted for numerous special rates. Rates from many points to ports were lowered though the schedule proposed by railroads for increase of rates from large saw mill points above the old special rates was followed at most points. The commission left the case open for further orders to complete the revision. Hearings were held last March and September on the cases. The rates are effective not later than February 1, 1924.

Rates are involved to the ports of Galveston, Texas City, Houston, Beaumont, Orange, Port Arthur, West Port, Arthur, Port Neches, Sabine and Sabine Pass.

Rates from Santa Fe points north of Center are fixed at 15 cents per 100 pounds to Galveston, Houston, Beaumont, Port Arthur, Sabine, while rates north and east of Kirbyville to Galveston and Houston are 10 cents and to Beaumont, Port Arthur, Sabine and Orange are 21 cents. A 15-cent maximum applies over the Texas & New Orleans line from all saw mill points with a six-cent minimum between points south of Beaumont to Sabine, Port Arthur and Orange.

CONFERENCE HELD ON EXPORT WHEAT TRAFFIC

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Railroad representatives connected with the Texas Industrial Traffic League conferred today with Secretary Weeks relative to the situation on their lines in the carriage of export wheat and the effect upon that traffic of government barge line competition.

No special request was submitted to the secretary, but attention was called to figures purporting to show that during the last general movement of wheat cargoes for export from Texas ports the government lines doubled their traffic, although the aggregate American wheat export for the year decreased. The railroad men said present rail rates in their territory on wheat were

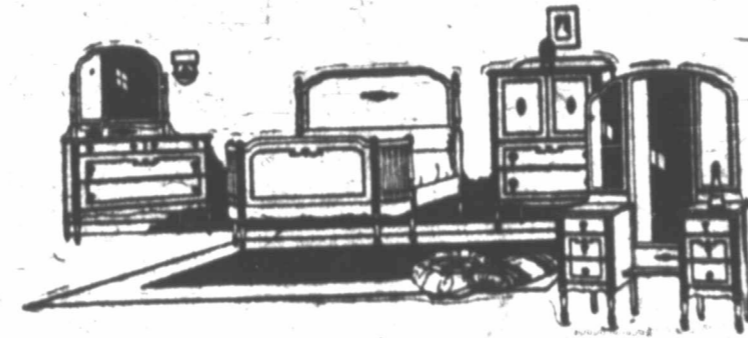
In passing sentence Judge Robinson told him the duration of his term would be dependent upon his conduct.

instance, had about seven score, some Lithuanians and more than a quarter of a million, and others owned tracts almost as large. These estates were well administered. Their owners farmed, then sold, and they made the land and the forests profitable. They used the labor of the peasants, giving them small plots and plots of ground to work for themselves and leaving them in possession of the grain. I have heard that on the estate of a noble Polish of the present, Hungarian minister in Washington, the estate and society received only thirty seven a year in addition to a small piece of ground of his own. Thirty seven acres at the gold value.

When the new republic was formed, parliament passed a law to take over these great estates, paying their owners a fixed price for them, and to distribute them more evenly and equitably among the people. This is now being done. The story of the distribution is somewhat complicated, but in brief, some millions of acres of lands are to be sold in small tracts at low prices and on long time to farmers who will cultivate and care for them. The scheme has been carefully worked out and I am told that it promises to be a success.

The Co-operative movement. During this trip through the country I visited some of the co-operative institutions which are to be found all over Bohemia. The co-operative movement started long before the war, and there are now co-operative associations of a half dozen or more different kinds. Some of these are connected with the farmers; some with the laboring men and some with the consumers. They are closely allied to the political parties, each association having its own party as its special defender. For instance, the Social Democratic Party has a very large membership in the Co-operative Union of Co-operative Societies of Prague, and the Agrarian or Farmers' Party is allied with the Central Co-operative Society which has most of the agricultural societies and savings banks on what is known as the left bank system. The Social Democratic Party have among them a large number of the Labor Co-operatives. The Agrarians own the most property and do the most business of over one billion kronen. There are also German co-operative societies and Polish co-operative societies. There are co-operatives allied with the Socialist Party and societies of small manufacturers and traders, all forming a perfect mass of co-operative movement. Altogether Czechoslovakia has over ten thousand co-operative undertakings with over 2,000,000 members, who with their families embrace more than half the population. These societies now propose to combine with the other co-operative societies of the Balkans and the whole may form a buying and selling organization of considerable weight.

One of the co-operative mills I visited ground the wheat of its members, and had a bakery which made some thousands of loaves of bread every day for their own use. It had a coffee roasting factory or sort of coffee-roasting establishment and great warehouses, where the threshing machines, reapers, mowers, and tractors belonging to the society were kept to be loaned out to the people. When the grand jury made its partial report two weeks ago it asked permission from Judge P. A. Martin to recess until December 10. This request was granted when the foreman announced that the jury had not as yet completed its labors.

Although no definite information is available, it seems probable that the grand jury will complete its investigations some time during the week at which time it will make its final report.

COMPLETE NEGOTIATIONS WITH MEXICO OVER DEBT

NEW YORK, Dec. 7. (U.P.)—Action by the international committee of bankers declaring the plan of financial debt readjustment operative yesterday consummated negotiations begun in 1919 to recover interest payments on the Mexican external debt aggregating about \$150,000,000 in principal. More than \$21,000,000 U. S. gold has been remitted by the Mexican government to provide the first year's service on the deposited bonds, the committee announced.

In publishing simultaneously announcements in New York, London, Paris and Mexico City, Thomas Lamont of J. P. Morgan & Co., chairman of the committee, issued a statement saying the minimum fund of \$15,000,000 U. S. gold covering the first year's interest on all the \$200,000,000 or more bonds included in the agreement had almost been completed.

Man Can Learn Enough About Religion For His Own Salvation, Judge Kay Tells His Bible Class Sunday

Following is the lecture delivered by Judge John C. Kay at the Strand theater, Sunday morning, to the members of his Bible Class of the First Methodist Church, South, as reported by Roy E. Carter.

"This is not my class and I have never given myself credit for it. A great many things work together to make it a class, the music, the work of Brother Jones and the singers and the good men who come here to the class and I take no credit if there is one thing I would like to say for myself out of it though, 'I would be the fact that a goodly number of elderly men come here. I feel proud of that fact. I don't think that men grow so much in knowledge. Some of the young men know more than we do of all that that is called knowledge, but they do grow in judgment. Men learn what is held of and what to leave alone and the is where your elderly man knows more, he has that settled thing that is called wisdom and that I am glad to see them here, glad that they should come here, because it is a compliment to the cause that we represent.

"Now, religion is first of all supernatural. If a man thinks that he cannot adopt it that he cannot believe in it, that he will have none of it, unless he can explain it in his own terms, say that man can only walk away from it. You may expect and you must expect many and many a place in the book that is above you and beyond you. It's a queer thing that Thomas said, 'I won't believe that this is the Lord unless I thr at my hand into his wounded side, and it is a queer thing that men will say, 'I will not believe the Bible unless you can define it to me in my terms.' It is peculiar that you should do that about religion and not anything else, because there is no direction that you may go except you come to a door that is shut. Nobody respects the scientists more than I do. I rejoice in their every accomplishment, but the greatest of them said, 'I am like a little child just picking up pebbles on the great shore of knowledge.' But you are willing for the door of the scientist to be shut. Whatever mystery confronts him does not seem to bother him.

Who Created Earth?
"Ah, Mr. Scientist, who put the blue in the blue of the sky? Why is the eagle born with his eyes shut? Why is it, as I have said to you since before, that the least little pine tree can get its roots out of the ground when we cannot get any? Who put the beauty in the peacock's tail and the crystals in the depths of the mountains and why? There is no answer except in the bible and not this side of the judgment will there be any other answer and yet if the scientist is confronted with his mysteries and his miracles, doesn't he make as great claims as that man who believes in religion?"

"Now we have here a story that the Holy Spirit descended upon the people at Pentecost, a wonderful miracle, not the first time that it had happened in the Bible nor the second nor the third nor the fourth nor the fifth and always in the same language, but how does it differ from other cases in the Bible? This is the first time and the first place that the spirit came to every man. It had been striking before at one place and this man and that man, but now it came to all and became a vital force of a great democracy.

"They were all with one accord and in one place, said the Book. Now, does the spirit descend on us, have we got a spirit striking the whole people at once? How came the football boys yesterday? And it was a fine thing to do, I think it was a fine thing to do and it is just such things as that that make a town and make a community and make the boys and girls glad and anxious to live there and to stay there for life. I was once on a New York train coming down through the Old South and on the back end of the train I sat out there with some most elegant gentlemen. They were on a committee to go down to the commemoration of Andrew Jackson's Battle of New Orleans, so you can imagine what kind of people New York would send down there, and we were coming from the farming district and talking about the boys leaving the farm and why they were leaving the farm, and one of these men said I know about it. I know why he leaves there, he says—it's because he grows tired of going without wages and gets tired of eating salt pork and getting up before day. I said to this magnificent looking man, 'How do you know?' and he said, 'I have been there.'

Spirit of People.
"So people get together in a community and in a city in order that they may exercise what is and what ought to be a fine spirit of a people and it is so in life as well as in religion.

"We can understand how the spirit of a people will descend on them at a football game, a baseball game, an election, or a hundred other different things, which you see happen, but we are surprised when we hear that there is a great spirit that descends on men with more power and more force and with better results. Now, what is the office of the Holy Spirit? It has but one office, it is not the salvation of men directly, nor the uplift of men directly, but the chief office of the Holy Spirit is to convict men of sin. Ah! It is that strong whisper which says, 'You are wrong, wrong, wrong.' It is that judge who cannot be corrupted, sitting within your breast and saying to you that you are weighed in the balances and found wanting; it is that Spirit that whispers to you, 'You have failed, you have failed, you have failed.' Now we have all heard it, how indeed have so many of us heard it again and again crying out that we are on the wrong road, that we have adopted the wrong view, that we are feeling in the wrong direction.

"Now men don't have to listen to it, that is one of the great things about the divinity of men, that you have got your election and choice, as I think it, to accept or reject the views and voice of the judge that would condemn you. There are great thoughts, not my thoughts, but the thoughts that are written in this Book, that you may walk down the way of life and select as you will either the good or the evil and that you may reject the voice

of the Spirit, crying out, 'Take the best, take the best, take the best.' You can do that and that is a great mystery.

Understanding Religion.
"I have said to you that religion is supernatural. I do not know all about it. I know but very little about it. St. Augustine, the greatest doctor that ever lived, said there was more that he did not understand about it than that that he did understand. But what can you do when you don't understand it? Look up on it and keep training yourself in order that somewhere, sometime, you can come into the fuller knowledge of this mighty thing. "So then, a man must not say, 'I will not do anything because I do not understand anything.' There is enough that we do understand, there is enough I say, because it is written that the way is so plain that a fool need not err therein. All there is to Christianity that is necessary for men to know in order to obtain salvation is simple. The Savior never said anything that was not plain and simple and the mysteries are not his mysteries and all the beauty of His life lay in its simplicity, in its every day language, in its ordinary speech. "Can we break open the seal and shell of these mysteries? I think not. I do not think that by searching we can find out all about God. We can find out something, much, very much, but not all, not here. But as I have said, we know enough and can find out enough to work out our salvation. If my view about this is correct, let us say to ourselves that we are going to have faith, that we are going to do works, that we are going to toil and forever toil in the direction of the light that sometime we will come into that vision, when all will be clear. (I thank you.)"

When Driving, Drive, in Warning

It is not the fault of the automobile that 100,000 people have died as the result of automobile accidents--14,800 last year alone. It's entirely the responsibility of the driver. Explanations after the accident will not bring the dead to life or heal the wounds of the injured. Driving an automobile requires both hands on the steering wheel, both eyes on the road and one's whole mind on the job. Safe driving is impossible with eyes focused on the sidewalk fashion parade or with one arm around a girl.
For sightseeing, take the "rubberneck" wagon; for courtship, the old parlor sofa is hard to beat. Transferring parties from the safe, stationary sofa to a high-speed gas buggy has caused many a wedding. Love is commonly supposed to be blind, and it too often is--at the steering wheel.
Increase in automobiles and pedestrians requires additional care in driving. Emergencies may arise at any minute which require quick thinking and prompt action to avert a collision.
Keep your eyes straight ahead when driving forward and look-back when in reverse. Watch constantly for vehicles coming from side streets. If it is sometimes hard to tell which vehicle will reach the intersection first and if there is any doubt, let the other fellow pass regardless of who is supposed to have the right of way.
When driving, drive. Don't depend on the other fellow.

TUDOR SEDAN IS NEW STYLE FORD ENCLOSED BODY

DETROIT, Dec. 8--The Ford Motor Company has announced an addition to its line of cars--the Tudor sedan, which brings to the public an entirely new style of Ford enclosed body.
It is a distinctive type designed to carry five passengers in complete comfort. The roof line is low and straight, which with the larger radiator, now standard on all Ford cars, gave Ford designers an opportunity of effecting most graceful lines and at the same time a most sturdy construction.
Besides its general appeal and high quality aspect, the Tudor sedan has several new features which promise to win immediate favor. The two doors are unusually wide, 23 1/2 inches to be exact, and are set at the front of the car, built in exceptionally heavy frame and swing open forward on either side in line with the driver's seat.
Side windows running back from the doors are oblong in shape and 32 inches in length, affording unusual vision to the occupants, while a large rear window adds to the visibility. All window glasses are lowered flush with the framing.

The tilting seat opposite the driver folds compactly out of the way so the entrance and exit through the large and roomy door is easily and conveniently effected by those occupying the rear seat which is ample for three persons.
Because of the location of the door, the driver has convenient access to his seat without folding up the extra seat alongside. The gasoline tank is located under the driver's seat, making it unnecessary for him to disturb any other passengers when filling the tank.
Interior fittings are attractive. The upholstery is in special fabric of dark brown with fleecing to match. Both the doors and side windows have been equipped with revolving type window regulators of the same design as those used in cars of much higher price.

IS GOOD BUSINESS BUY AUTO ON TIME SAYS RICKENDACKER

DETROIT, Mich., Dec. 8.—"Buying an automobile on time is a perfectly sound and legitimate business proceeding," asserts Captain E. V. Rickendacker, vice president and director of sales of the concern of that name.

"The fact is better business to buy a motor car on time than to pay all cash.

"Especially is this true of the business man who on a year's turnover of his capital, should make this money earn several times the interest charged on time payments on his new car.

"The theory that one should not buy an automobile until he had enough cash to buy it and could spare it for this 'extravagance' dates from that pre-historic period when a motor car was not kept as the greatest of all necessities, but was considered a luxury that could be dispensed with.

"Today all realize that a car pays for itself while it is being paid for.

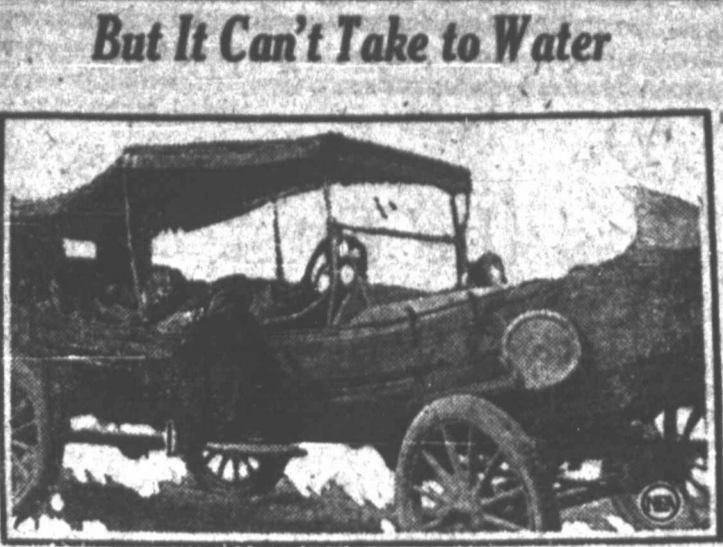
"It not only increases its owner's efficiency and earning power but the absence of a car renders him unable to keep up with modern life and methods at all.

"Seven bankers who used to issue periodical warnings against the practice of buying cars on time, now advise the bank and said last week, 'Tell 'em to come on and register, so they won't have to stand in line a day or two at the last.'

Automobile Registrations Now Being Made; Number In Wichita County Expected to Reach Around 20,000

Registration of Wichita County's motor vehicles for 1924 has been going on for more than a month and County Tax Collector Guy Raley said last week, 'Tell 'em to come on and register, so they won't have to stand in line a day or two at the last.'

All motor vehicles must be equipped with 1924 seals and numbers before January 1, or owners will be subject to penalties and a fine in the event they are arrested.

The total number of motor vehicles to be registered in Wichita county for next year is expected to reach approximately 20,000, an increase of about 2,000 over the registration for this year, according to Mr. Raley.

Under the new automobile tax law the total revenue to be derived by the state and county will be twice as much as it was for 1922, reaching in the neighborhood of \$10,000,000. It is estimated that the amount the county will receive only the horse power fee. This will mean that for certain trucks the

state will receive around \$400 to the county's \$1.

Registration Oversteering.
Under the new law, also, registration of motor vehicles this year will be considerably more complicated than has been the case in the past, the collector pointed out. This year the license tax will be computed on the basis of both horsepower and actual weight of the car, while in the past it had been computed on horsepower alone.

Owners of big cars will be hit the hardest in license tax under the new law, Williams pointed out. The increase in the amount of tax on the lighter cars, such as Fords, will be from 50 to 60 per cent, while on the lighter cars the tax will be about three times as high. The tax on a Cadillac sedan will be approximately \$40.

The registration fee up to this year on Fords has been \$1.75, while for next year it will be \$1.50. In the case of a Buick Six the tax heretofore has been \$2.75, while next year it will amount to approximately \$32, or more than double. The scale is so arranged that as cars get heavier the tax increase proportionately, all varying with the model and style of the car.

Except in the case of trucks, owners will not have to weigh their cars before registration. A table will be kept in the collector's office showing the weights of standard cars and the tax will be computed from these tables. In the case of trucks, where only the chassis is sold by the dealer, and considerable variation exists in bodies, models will have to be employed. The tax on trucks will be computed according to weight, horsepower and tires. Trucks equipped with pneumatic tires will be taxed from 50c to \$1.50 per hundredweight, and trucks with solid tires will be taxed from 40c to \$1 per hundredweight, the advance in the basis of charge advancing every additional 5000 pounds weight after the first 5000 pounds.
