DALLAS MAN KILLS WIFE AND DAUGHTER, ATTEMPTS SUICIDE CHARGE WICHITA KLANSMEN TAKE LAW INTO OWN HANDS

Insurgent Troops Leave Vera Cruz For March Toward Mexican Capital 10,000 Men Available for Movement

VERA CRUZ, Dec. 10.—Insurgent troops have left Vera Cruz under orders for an advance toward Mexico City. At various points along the interoceanic railway they will be joined by other contingents and the united forces will then proceed toward the capital, advancing in a skirmish. It is estimated that about 10,000 troops are available for this movement.

General Berlinga and Colonel Mayer, Oregon officers who were reported to have been executed after the capture of Jalapa by the insurgents, were spared. Colonel Mayer was one of 300 prisoners taken in the fight who were brought here last night.

The steamer Platanero Algeria is carrying to New Orleans Theodore Trester and Enrique Soldener, who are to go to New York as confidential agents of the provisional government.

A detachment of Oregon troops is reported to have been defeated in a skirmish in Nayarit territory, Generals Ortega and Maya, loyalists, being killed.

General Estrada, who also is advancing toward Mexico City from Guadalajara, has informed the insurgent chieftains here that an attempt by General Ferrer to land federal reinforcements from Sinaloa and Sonora at Manzanillo was frustrated by the rebels.

CONFIRMED REPORTS CAPTURE OF CAPITAL OF VERA CRUZ

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 8. (Via Laredo, Texas, Dec. 10. Delayed.)—Capture of Jalapa, capital of the state of Vera Cruz, this (Saturday) morning by rebel forces was officially confirmed here tonight. With this single success it was declared in official quarters that the revolt headed by General Guadalupe Sanchez, who favors the presidential candidacy of Adolf de Llerenas, had reached the maximum development possible, with the nucleus of the outbreak centered at the state of Vera Cruz and in the states of Guadalajara and Jalisco.

The defenders of Jalapa, a portion of the federal garrison which reported to have been captured, returned to the city to join the revolution, together with 3,000 volunteers. The rebels are reported to be organized force will await reinforcements, officers and proper equipment. It was officially reiterated that the widespread conspiracy hatched by reactionary conservative elements supporting De Llerenas was doomed to fail, first because it is not supported by the popular classes of Mexico, second because the government has been able to surround the affected districts with a superior force of federal troops and a large number of loyalists. This was officially announced at Chapultepec castle.

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mexico, Dec. 10. (Military authorities have ordered patrols throughout the north-eastern portion of the state to investigate the reports that General Nicolas Rodriguez has crossed the Rio Grande with a force of men and was threatening Juarez.)

Rodriguez headed an uprising one year ago between Juarez and Chihuahua. He was reported to be venturing rail traffic between the two cities for several hours. He was last heard from in El Paso, being arrested on charges of violating the neutrality laws.

Special Train to Abilene for Football Game Friday Planned by Chamber of Commerce; Reserve Tickets Tuesday

If as many as 125 Coyote fans go along a special train will be operated to Abilene Friday for the football game between the Coyotes and the Abilene Eagles.

The train will leave Wichita Falls at 7 a. m. Tuesday night, and will return to reach Abilene at 11 p. m. Tickets may be obtained at the chamber of commerce, and if the number sold falls short of 125, money will be refunded to purchasers.

President Clinch of the chamber of commerce Monday appointed a committee consisting of John Gould, chairman, W. E. Huff, Arthur Selman, F. S. Richardson, and C. U. Daniels to handle arrangements for the train.

Members of the committee issued

an appeal to the fans to go on this trip and support the Coyotes loyally in this semi-final struggle for state honors. In spite of the top-heavy scores that Abilene has piled up, the fact that they opponents have been defeated in the last game, that the Coyotes have subdued, is pointed out by Coyote adherents. That this season's campaign has anything to do with anything is indicated in the Dec. 10th game; the Leopards, prior to meeting the Coyotes, had amassed a total of 113 points against a number of strong North Texas teams.

The Coyotes will probably leave Tuesday night, so as to have time to work out Thursday afternoon. THREE MEN PERISH PASSED BY EXHAUST AUTOMOBILE TRUCK

LIVINGSTON, Mont., Dec. 10. (Ed Wright of Livingston, Dave Soroka of Minneapolis and Dale Sparks of Billings, perished early yesterday in Yellowstone Park five or six miles from Norris, at the foot of the Blazing Hill, when gassed by the exhaust of their automobile truck and burned by fire that followed.

The men, employees of the Park Transportation Company, had gone out in a blizzard in two feet of snow. Camping for the night Saturday evening they threw a tarpaulin over their truck and made a tent of it. Sometime during the night the exhaust gas is believed to have asphyxiated the three and later the tarpaulin took fire and the bodies were burned.

MOTORISTS RESCUED BY LOGSROVING AND CABOCHES

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Dec. 10. (Four trips were made last night by logsroving and cabochees between Palmer Lake and Greenland, Colo., 25 to 30 miles north of Colorado Springs, to bring to the former place motorists imprisoned on the Colorado Springs-Denver highway by the snow storm. On the last trip two women were brought in, railway officials here said.

Highways into Colorado Springs from every direction except to the south were reported impassable. The northeastern part of El Paso county is virtually snow bound with a fall of 14 inches reported at the south end. A blizzard has been blowing all day. Palmer Lake garages are crowded with stranded motorists and between 15 and 20 cars are reported stalled by the roadside. One large closed car is said to contain 15 persons who congregated in it to keep warm.

SOLD FREIGHT TARIFF OF RAILROADS JUSTIFIED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10. (Transcontinental railroads were held justified today by the Interstate Commerce Commission in its decision to give the same rates on fruits and vegetables shipped from Pacific coast points via Chicago into the southeast as are given when traffic is routed via Memphis, East St. Louis or New Orleans.)

N. Y. COTTON OPENS 100 TO 102 POINTS BELOW SATURDAY

NEW YORK, Dec. 10. (The local cotton market today broke 100 to 102 points below Saturday's close owing to weak Liverpool cables and a readjustment of ideas as to the next crop estimate. Liquidation carried January down to 22.75 and March to 23.20. This latest decline represents a drop of from 150 to 121 a bale from the season's high point on November 20. The trade here now anticipates a yield of about 19,000,000 bales in the forthcoming government report, instead of previous estimates of 9,250,000 to 9,500,000 bales.

COTTON FALLS ONE AND THREE-QUARTER CENTS HERE

Falling a drop of over 100 points on the New York cotton market Monday morning, local cotton dropped over a cent and a half, from 32 cents to 31 cents per pound for middling. Local cotton jumped to 24 cents per pound a week ago, but has been gradually falling since that time.

Brings Girl Home From School Kills Her and Mother and Then Attempts to Take His Own Life

DALLAS, Dec. 10. (Feyton Pierce, 21, out of employment for a long time, today shot and killed his wife, Cora, 40, and his daughter, Ruth, 11, in the Pierce home brooding over the fact that upon himself probably inflicted fatal wounds. He still was alive today, but physicians held him in a room for his recovery. Marion and Leon Pierce, two smaller children, ran from the house as their father began shooting. Another small daughter was at school.

Pierce went to a school house shortly before the shooting and brought Ruth home. Taking her to the mother's bedroom, he fired the fatal shots. Officers said investigation indicated he had insufficient funds to support his family.

Race Horse Man Kills Woman and Takes Own Life

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Dec. 10. (Cyrus Shelton, race horse man and trainer of fast horses, yesterday killed Mrs. Marjorie Evans, and then turned the gun on himself and ended his own life. Frank Evans, Jr., five-year-old son of the woman, witnessed the double tragedy. Shelton was accused by the woman's former husband of breaking up his home. Shelton leaves a widow.

AMERICAN PETROLEUM INSTITUTE TO DISCUSS VARIOUS USES OF OIL

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 10. (The many uses of oil and its by-products such as producing heat and power and for the construction of roads are to be discussed at the convention of the American Petroleum Institute which opened here today.

Leaders of the petroleum industry from all sections of the United States have arrived to attend the meetings, which continue through Wednesday. The producer, the pipeline man, the refiner and the marketer are represented.

The problem dealing with fraudulent oil stock promotions is scheduled for discussion and will be the theme of an address by Lou E. Cline of Kansas City, president of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World. Agriculture, the farm and its relations to the oil industry will be subject for the assembly in an address by E. T. Meredith, former secretary of agriculture, during the Wilson administration. It was said, Mr. Meredith speaks Wednesday.

The extensive use of oil for production of automobiles will be discussed by Joe Sheedy, vice president in charge of operation of the United States emergency fleet corps, and by W. H. Wilson, secretary of the increase in the use of oil for propelling ocean steamers.

The more important meetings will be tomorrow. A number of group meetings have been scheduled in which reports of the electric company, the oil movement to standardize oil drilling equipment, the transportation problem, oil marine transportation and railroad regulations will be taken up in the afternoon group meetings and will be submitted to the assembly in the form of reports, it was explained.

HEAVY NORTHER WITH RAIN AND SNOW HITS WICHITA FALLS AREA

STRONG WIND BEGINS EARLY SUNDAY NIGHT, FOLLOWED BY RAIN

LOWER TEMPERATURE IS MONDAY NIGHT FORECAST

Snow Falling at Childress, Chillicothe, Amarillo, Forgan and Camargo, Oklahoma

MERCURY IS HANGING AROUND 25 DEGREES

AMARILLO, Texas, Dec. 10. (Snow driven by a hard biting wind is covering the Panhandle today.

It about three inches on the level and is drifting badly. The mercury is hanging around 25 degrees. Train service is interrupted.

Northwest Texas and southern Oklahoma are in the grip of a norther and blizzard. Rain is reported from all sections and snow is reported at Childress, Chillicothe, Amarillo, the Panhandle generally, Forgan and Camargo, Oklahoma. According to J. W. Lytle, in charge of the United States weather bureau observation station at the Wichita Falls Electric Company, real winter weather has arrived. The mercury on Sunday night and the following day will be in the 20's and 30's.

Government predictions call for snow or rain in this section, with much colder weather. The thermometer is expected to register below 20 and 30 degrees during Tuesday morning, with strong north winds are sweeping through the Panhandle and plains, with a velocity estimated at 25 to 30 miles an hour.

The strong wind began sweeping through Wichita Falls at about 9:30 o'clock Sunday night and the driving rain began about 11 o'clock and continued through the night of Monday morning. It was still raining in Wichita Falls Monday morning and railroad dispatchers reported rain at all points on lines operating out of this city except where snow and sleet had been substituted for the drizzle.

Weather reports received from Mr. Lytle of electric company Monday noon, for the last twelve hours showed that the maximum temperature here was 39 degrees; four-tenths of an inch of rain had fallen in Wichita Falls and a strong wind was blowing from the north. The barometer read 29.44.

Has Not Reached Height. Indications are that the norther has not reached its height. The mercury is still on the decline and snow is reported falling nearer Childress and Amarillo.

The dispatcher for the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad reports snow falling between Forgan and Camargo, Oklahoma with sleet or rain at all other points.

Monday morning snow was falling between Chillicothe and Childress and snow was reported falling Sunday night at Amarillo and in the Panhandle, by the dispatcher for the Fort Worth and Denver railroad. Rain was falling at all other points as far south as Fort Worth and Dallas.

Dispatchers for the Wichita Falls and the Wichita Falls and Southern railroads reported cold weather was blowing from the north. Roads are slick and practically impassable and activities in the oil fields and on the irrigation project are practically suspended. No westward train has been reported by railroads.

It is not known how long the cold spell will last, but indications are that it will remain for several days and the peak will not be reached until Monday night or Tuesday.

Grand Jury Adjourns After Returning Ninety-Two Indictments, Having Been In Session 21 Days Since October 1

Charging that members of the Ku Klux Klan of the county had been taking the enforcement of law into their own hands; reporting that the members of the Klan and the Klan as a whole had not given the grand jury any assistance in its attempt to terrify out the guilty parties who have been engaging in night floggings and further stating that the grand jury had received no help from the officers in the county in the investigation of this sort of crime and charging that many officers in the county were members of the Ku Klux Klan, which the grand jury considered a menace to the peace and happiness of the community, the members of the grand jury of the 89th district court Monday morning made their final report and were discharged from further service.

The grand jury also reported to Judge Martin that it found in its investigations that the victims of the night floggings had been threatened with death if they divulged their treatment.

The report also includes a statement from the grand jury that the statements circulated following the charge of Lonnie Davis at Iowa Park, regarding alleged misconduct on the part of Mr. Davis with certain individuals were wholly untrue and unsubstantiated.

The grand jurors also took occasion to state that the grand jury used in the Lonnie Davis case of circulating infamous, slanderous and unfounded reports against the character of the victim had been pursued in practically every case which the grand jury had investigated.

During the grand jury's existence, since the first of October, it was in session 21 days, examined 423 witnesses and returned a total of 92 indictments.

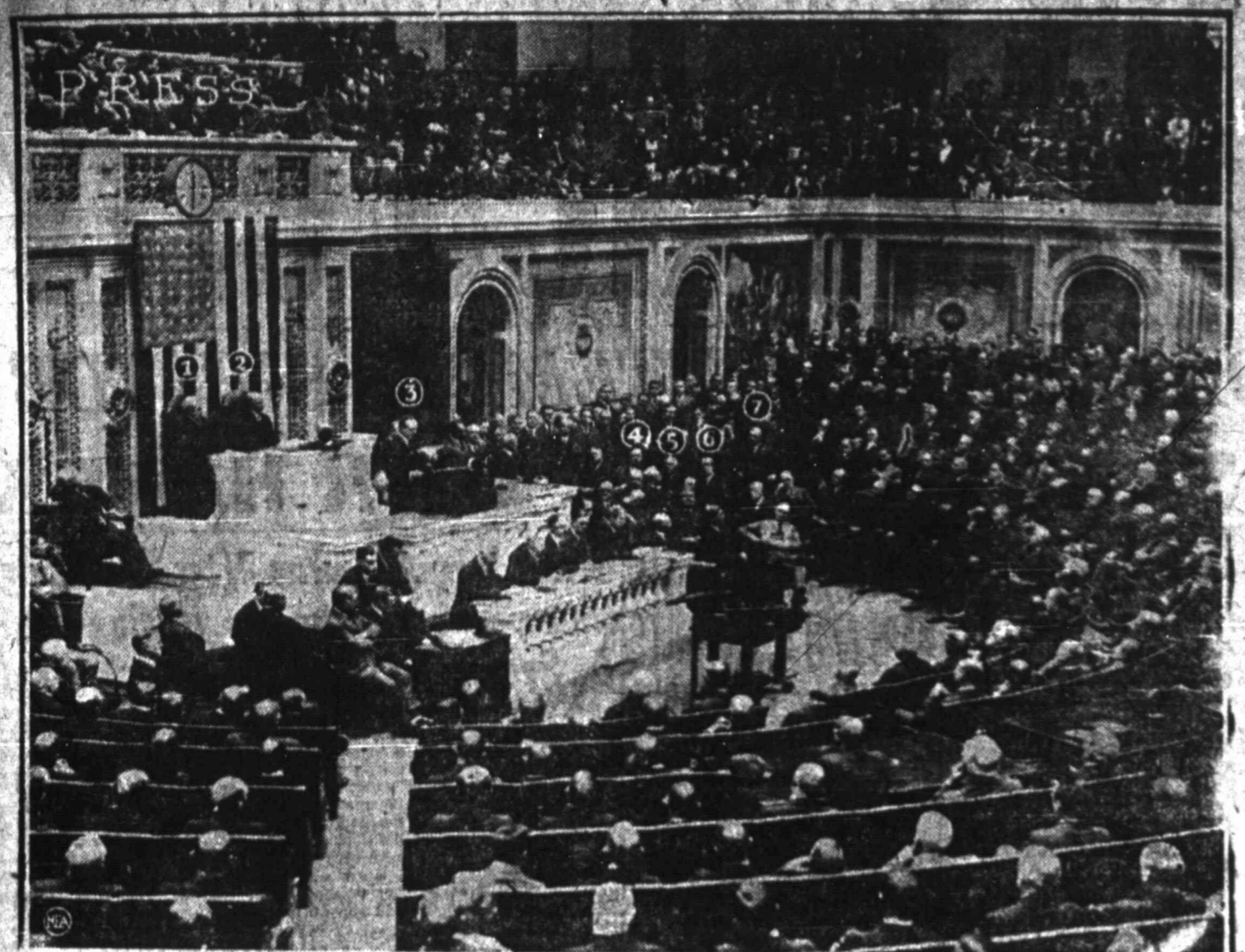
Text of Report. The report in full follows: To the Honorable F. A. Martin, Judge of said court: "Now comes the grand jury for your honor upon the 1st day of October, 1933, to diligently investigate all crimes committed in this county, and to render a verdict and have faithfully endeavored to discharge them. Pursuant to your request we first investigated the case of Lonnie Davis, charged with being confined in the county jail, and after five days service we turned in your honor a court report approximately sixty indictments, charging various crimes, all of the grade of felony.

We then entered upon an investigation of the class of crime that had been committed in Wichita County against various parties who were in the night time and who were confined in the county jail, and carried to secluded places in the night time and who were brutally whipped. We found this investigation to be a most difficult and baffling one, due to the fact that the victims of the floggings were in the night time and the unfortunate victims, in most instances, are so frightened and so badly frightened and brutally assaulted, that they are unable to identify their abductors.

In all, we have labored for a total of 21 days, and examined more than 425 witnesses. At the time of our recessing upon the 21st day of November, 1933, we turned in 23 additional felony indictments, making a total of 92 indictments returned by us. Included in this number were nine indictments for assault with a prohibited weapon, in connection with night floggings.

As a result of our investigations, it is the opinion of this grand jury that there is and has been for some time past, a widespread and systematic effort on the part of certain individuals, belonging to the Ku Klux Klan, to take the law into their own hands and to regulate the moral and personal conduct of those whom they perceive to be in discord with their views, and in some instances, brutal assault and injury. BRITISH PEOPLE AWAIT MEETING CABINET TUESDAY

LONDON, Dec. 10. (AP)—The British people apparently must wait until tomorrow's cabinet meeting, before learning how Prime Minister Baldwin proposes to act in the present political crisis. Rumors that he has recently decided to resign are branded as untrue in conservative quarters. His supporters in the press advise him not to resign. His opponents are strongly insistent that it is impossible to remain as prime minister. The Daily Mail says that at a week-end conference three of the cabinet urged the premier to resign immediately and advise the king to invite Ramsay MacDonald, labor leader, to form a cabinet, a course which Mr. Baldwin agreed. The other ministers emphatically disapproved, saying that the circumstances demand continuance of the conservative government with a new premier. In several quarters there is a growing expectation that Mr. Baldwin will advise the king to invite MacDonald to form a cabinet.

CHARGE MEN TAKE LAW IN OWN HANDS

(Continued from Page One.)

suddenly in the night time, and carried into the country and there unmercifully, without excuse or justification, brutally whipped until the blood ran from their bodies, the victims being threatened with death if they divulged their mistreatment. During this time these crimes seem to have increased in number and the boldness of the perpetrators has steadily grown. The most recent and gruesome of all these crimes culminated in the abduction of a young man by the name of Lonnie Davis, on the night of August 12, 1923, in a garage in the town of Iowa Park, at which time he was standing in a few feet of the night watchman's house, a member of the Ku Klux Klan. This young man was rendered unconscious by a blow upon the head, a sack placed over his head and he was carried to a point near the Archer County line, where the most brutal and heinous torturing was administered to him of all that have befallen any of the victims of these night marauders. His back, down his shoulders and the calves of his legs, was lacerated and beaten with a wire rope, and he was left unconscious in the middle of a large pasture in the night time, the blood streaming from his body.

Hearts Glaciated.
We wish to inform your honor that this grand jury has diligently and thoroughly investigated, to the best of its ability, every conceivable cause for young Davis having been punished. As to this, we have been given various reports. It was generally circulated by certain parties that Davis was whipped because he was a bad character in Iowa Park, and that he had been too familiar with his brother's wife when he worked in a cafe owned by his brother. It was also reported by different parties in this county that this young man had been guilty of improper conduct with his employer's wife at Duncan, Oklahoma, and that a party named men came from Duncan, Oklahoma, and reported the punishment for that reason.

We state to your honor, in justice to Lonnie Davis, and in justice to the wife of his brother and his employer, at Duncan, that the grand jury had before it every witness that was supposed to have circulated these charges against Davis and gave these individuals every opportunity to substantiate the same, and we beg to state that not a single witness was able to find what would tend to any misconduct on the part of Lonnie Davis, either as to his moral character, or as to his bad reputation in any other manner, and all witnesses gave, as far as they knew of their personal knowledge, the young man a good reputation and admitted that they knew of no act of any kind that was reprehensible on the part of this young man. One member of the grand jury, a trip to Duncan, Oklahoma, and investigated the life and conduct and the reputation of Lonnie Davis while he lived and worked in that city, and he learned that this young man had a good reputation there; he also obtained a written statement from his former employer at Duncan as to the effect that Lonnie Davis was a splendid young man while living in Duncan and that he bore a good reputation in every way. We found that the charges against this young man both at Iowa Park and Duncan were absolutely false, and it is the opinion of the grand jury that they were made for the purpose of injuring his character and good reputation in Wichita county, and of inciting public sentiment against him in order to appease the wrath of an outraged public on account of this brutal and barbarous assault.

Personal Malice.
The grand jury is of the further opinion, from all the evidence, that certain parties, having personal malice, grievance and envy toward Lonnie Davis, caused, brought about and took part in his flogging. We have been unable to secure sufficient evidence for the finding of an indictment in this particular case, upon which the grand jurors believed a conviction could be secured. We desire to state, however, that in this, as well as a number of other cases investigated by us in which indictments were not returned, that this grand jury has many times evidence pointing to the guilt of certain parties of participating in the flogging, than certain organized and self-declared "regulators" had of the guilt of any of their unfortunate victims.

"It is the opinion of the grand jury that the tactics pursued in the Lonnie Davis case have been pursued in practically every case investigated by this body—that of circulating infamous, slanderous and unfounded reports against the character of the victims.

"We wish to state to your honor that neither the officers nor members of the Ku Klux Klan have availed themselves of the opportunity to invite or entreat them by your honor in his charge to the grand jury, to assist the grand jury in ferreting out the guilty parties in the many flogging cases which have taken place in this county within the past sixteen months or two years. We have not had the assistance or encouragement of the Ku Klux Klan, or the members thereof, in uncovering any of the floggings in this county.

Peace Officers Members.
The peace officers of the county have not been, of any assistance to the grand jury to apprehend the guilty parties, and a large number of the peace officers are members of the Ku Klux Klan. We regard the condition of affairs prevailing in the county as a serious menace to the peace, happiness, liberty and safety of the people of this county.

"Having served the county for many weeks and feeling that we have done all that is possible at this time in the way of uncovering crimes in this county, we now ask to be discharged.

BEEF CATTLE SPECIALIST LOOKING OVER HERDS IN THE BENJAMIN TERRITORY

BENJAMIN, Texas, Dec. 10.—George W. Barnes, beef cattle specialist of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas extension service, assisted by County Agent H. M. Cantrell spent several days visiting the Patton, Epithea, Hamilton, Beavers, Propps Jones and Smith ranches, studying types and confirming and uniformity. For several years Barnes was in charge of the Bar Cross ranch in Arizona, a property of 35,000 acres and stocked with high bred Hereford cattle.
Texas breeders have made an enviable reputation in the corn belt as producers of high class feeders. This fall members of the Knox-King Hereford Association, with headquarters at Benjamin, Texas, have shipped between 2,000 and 3,000 head of high class calves and yearlings direct to corn belt feed lots in Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Kentucky.
As the result of an unusual amount of moisture during October and November, with exceptionally warm weather up to this time, pasture conditions promise to be very good during the winter. Cattle are in good condition. Several members are holding their calves and yearlings for spring shipment, feeling that the long predicted shortage in cattle is due to materialize. Inquiry coming to the office of the Knox-King Hereford Association shows that while a great many Texas calves and yearlings have gone to the corn belt feed lots, a number of feeders are holding back on account of the high price of corn. Many prefer to have their calves in the spring as against them in the fall and having such a long feeding period. Practically no age testers are to be found in the country.

Engineer D. M. Puckett Would Welcome Applications for Positions

A survey of District No. 13 was made by the state highway department, disclosing that the Wichita Falls district contains a total of 578 miles of road which will come under the care and control of the state highway department, beginning January 1.

In addition to the two supervisors, seven foremen will be appointed, each of whom will have charge of the work in two counties.

Since practically all of the appointments for positions in the organization will be handled through Mr. Puckett, he asks that men who want work as drivers of drags, trucks and tractor drivers and men to operate blades, make applications for the positions with him. Mr. Puckett will maintain an office in the basement of the county court house.

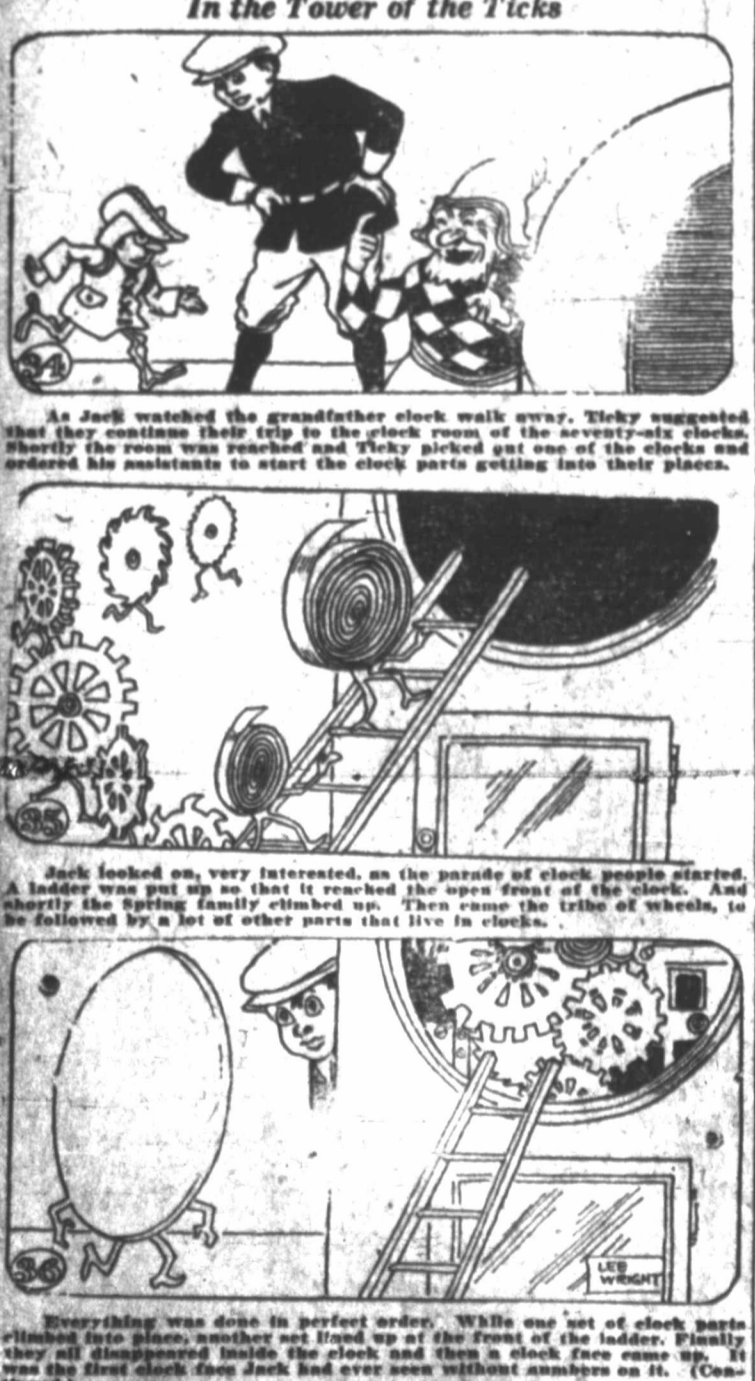

Mercury In Dope Barometer Shows Higher Pressure for Abilene Eagles Although Coyotes Have Heavier Squad

The championship of Districts 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 10 of the Inter-School League and the berth in the semi-finals for the championship of the state is at stake when the Abilene Eagles and the Wichita Falls Coyotes meet on the gridiron next Friday. It should be and will be a battle of wits. From the standpoint of weight the Coyotes have a two team advantage. The records made during the past season as well as those of the past three seasons by the Eagles, give them an advantage. In other words the dope books indicate that the Coyotes are the favorites. During the 1922 season they have piled up a total score of 546 to their opponents' 107. The Coyotes trail far behind in this comparison for they have scored but 177 points against their opponents 71. The Eagles have played two more games than the Coyotes. The Eagles possess an exceptionally fast backfield combination. They cannot only make gains through the line and around the ends but four men who can accurately pass the ball on forward passes and receive just as well. Records show that the holders of the two wing positions are very clever in the art of receiving the forward pass. The Coyotes possess neither a good passer or a good receiver. However they have been demonstrating several times during the season that the Coyotes on defense have been very good in breaking up the aerial game. The Coyotes line tips the beam at 1230 pounds as compared with 1230 pounds for the Eagles. The backfield of the Coyotes weighs 624 pounds and the Eagles 618 pounds. The Coyotes have a slight advantage here but it is not anything on which to bank. These figures are on the basis of the regular lineup of both squads.

MALLORY STAR OF YALE ELEVEN RISES TO FAME EVEN THOUGH HE COULD WIN BERTH AS PREP ATHLETE

MEMPHIS, Dec. 10.—Today Bill Mallory is a name to conjure with in college football. The name of teams him as one of the outstanding players of the year. To Yale and to Yale men he ranks with the immortal What Coy was to the victorious Blue of another decade, "Memphill Bill" is to the triumphant Elis today. An inspiring leader, a magnificent fighter, a great player, the southern boy, playing a backfield position, has been an important factor in putting Yale football back on the map. It was probably fitting that this quiet spoken, well-built blond young man should be the captain of the first unbeaten team the New Haven university has produced in years. And yet Mallory was not always a great football player. Back here in his home town the citizens can recall when he was not a football player at all—except at heart. Mallory has always had the athletic spark, and the competitive urge, but in his younger days he had neither the skill nor the power to back them up. Fired With Ambition. Mallory, who is now hailed as the greatest defensive fullback the game has ever developed, as well as one of the finest place kickers in the sport, this same Mallory wasn't good enough to play on his own home town school team, a matter of some five or six years ago. Mallory did his "prepping" at the local university school, a school which annually turns out crack-jack kid elevens. Mallory came on for the team, a tall, scrawny, lanky lad with a keenness for the fight and an irrepressible ambition to make the team. They put him on the scrub. Day after day this youngster, who was destined to later become the south's most brilliant contribution to the eastern gridiron, was out battling against the varsity, doing his heroic best to win a favorable gesture from the coaches. Couldn't Make Grade. But somehow or other Mallory just couldn't make the grade, and all the time he was at the local school he had to be content with a place in the scrub lineup and a seat on the varsity bench when the big games were being played. It was the same at baseball. Mallory had the idea that he was a catcher and he tried for that berth on the varsity nine, kept trying all during his stay here. His opposition was most formidable or else Mallory was somewhat deficient. Anyway, he didn't get very far as a catcher on the school team. Naturally when he went away, and eventually landed at Yale, his old buddies at home didn't expect he would suddenly burst up the athletic world, certainly not as a football player or a baseball player. Race Tipsters Organize to Furnish 'Reliable Dope' on Race Horses and To Tell Just Which Horse Will Win

By SAM E. WHITMIRE Copyright by Universal Service. NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Horse racing is at an end on northern tracks until next spring, but there is no likelihood that the average fan who likes to make a little wager now and then will suffer from the lack of information on the ponies. To help him along, there are at least 125 tipsters in New York, who have just organized themselves into the Racing Information Exchange House. The tipsters have headquarters on Broadway at Times Square, with spacious rooms, a "dope" library covering the past 50 years, and all the paraphernalia for picking winners. "Jockey Joe" was in charge when I went there for information. When he saw my old time horse man's button, he loosened up, explaining to me the business of tipsters. "Before we organized, each tipster had to maintain his own official booker, his own rail, birds and his own line of business. We have done away with the expense of carrying most of these birds, our organization doing it as a unit. "The information is telegraphed in here every day and our members have free access to the calling-in person or on the phone. "Then the organization sells lists of names and addresses of bettors and our members exchange lists accumulated from answers to advertisements in racing papers. We have in our possession more than one million names of race players in all parts of the country. "A list is a. o. k. for the tipsters so long as it is plain over the wire, but when he makes a miss or two his clients desert him, so he has to get new names. So he sends out another or two more. "The tipsters' offices are segregated in Nassau Street between the city hall and Fulton Street and all around Times Square. Each tipster tips himself in a retired, trainer, jockey, or track man, with here and there a former owner. They give their prospective clients the very best time to do any betting in their own country. "Several of these offices are in charge of genuine, old time Kentucky colts, in broad brimmed hats and boots, with tails flung over the breath. These old fellows talk horse with clients from coast to coast. "The offices have leased telegraph wires to the tracks and all have phone switchboards, a few with as many as fifty extensions. 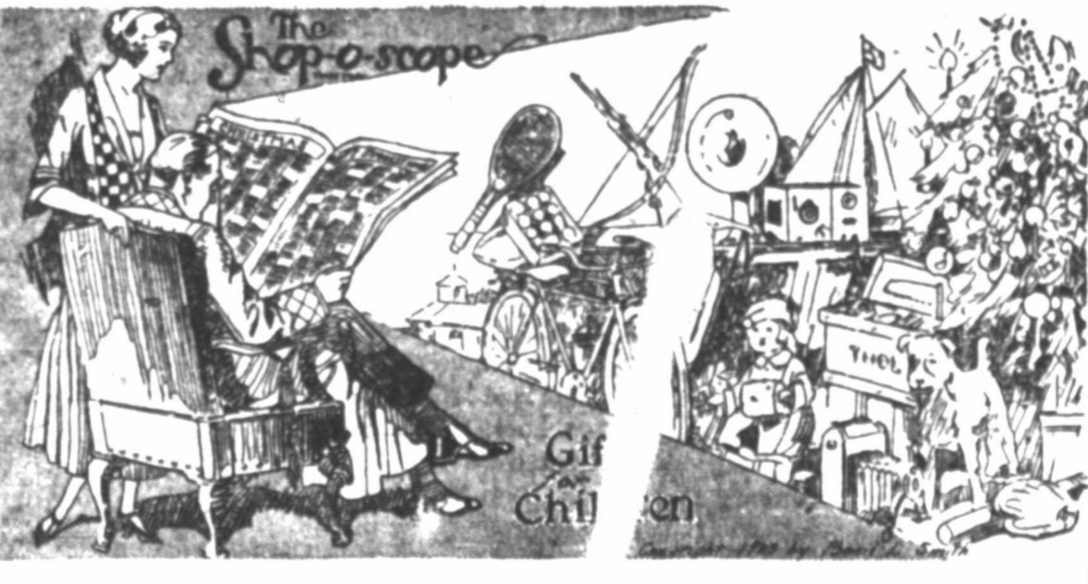
