BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Dec. 12.—Police expect to gather further evidence today connecting Fred Glover, negro, with at least part of the series of 24 murders that have occurred in Birmingham. Glover was captured by Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Sparks as the negro who hit Mrs. Sparks over the head as they were crossing a vacant lot Sunday afternoon. Mrs. Sparks is recovering from her wounds.

Eleven Members Grand Jury Deny Being Klansmen

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Dec. 12.—Former Governor C. Watson's effort to prove that a Ku Klux Klan conspiracy led to the return of the indictments charging him with offenses while office met with a rebuff yesterday when 11 members of the grand jury which indicted Watson denied his allegations that they were Ku Klux Klansmen.

McADOO SPEAKER BEFORE WOMEN'S LUNCHEON CLUB

MESSAGE OF PRESIDENT IS LABELED "A COUNSEL OF DORMANCY."

DERIDES PROPOSAL FOR RAILWAY CONSOLIDATION

Nowhere is There the Stimulating Call of Progress, He Declares.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 11. (AP)—President Coolidge's message to Congress was labeled "a counsel of dormancy" and his opposition to a bonus for ex-service men characterized as a summary dismissal of "the claims for consideration" in an address by William Gibbs McAdoo before the Women's Luncheon Club and the Women's Democratic League here today. The former director of railroads derided the president's proposal for a voluntary consolidation of the systems of transportation as a "heavenly gift for reduced freight and passenger rates with no assurance of relief at the end of the trial," telling his hearers that the country is not seven years of delay, but action.

"The president's message," said Mr. McAdoo, in part, "is largely a counsel of dormancy. Nowhere is there the stimulating call of progress. The world is in commotion and vital domestic and foreign issues upon us for solution, but no effective program is offered for the alleviation or correction of domestic ills, nor is encouragement given for invigorating international policies which will reopen world markets for our surplus products, tend to promote economic stability or encourage peace and tranquility between nations."

Comments on President Coolidge's message in the recommendation of tax reduction. The whole country favors tax reduction. The Democratic party has stood consistently for it since the signing of the armistice and should cooperate without regard to partisan considerations in any effort to ease the tax burden. This effort should be directed, not alone to a reduction in the gross sum of taxation, but to an equitable and progressive distribution of the burden and the toll of the burden, then upon unearned incomes, namely those which come from investments, is commendable.

"This proposition was first made by the Democratic secretary of the treasury in 1915 and was offered in 1917 as an amendment to the revenue bill, by Senator Harris of Georgia. It was defeated by a vote of 16 Republicans to 21 Democrats on the ground, as stated by Senator Ferguson, then chairman of the finance committee of the senate, that: 'The question of raised and unearned income was most exhaustively considered by the committee, by the senate and by the treasury department and the opinion was nearly unanimous that any such provision is impossible of administration.'"

"What has produced this extraordinary reversal of opinion on the part of the treasury department and the administration? If this provision was soundly administered by the administration in 1921, why is it possible of administration in 1924?"

"The president opposes any increase in the tax of the soldiers who fought the war to victory. Although a great reduction in the tax burden can be made and the reasonable compensation proposed for the soldiers and sailors can be provided at the same time, the president is determined that justice shall not be done to the war veterans. The just claims for consideration are summarily dismissed but the president is strong for the maintenance of the Federal Reserve bill which gives favored trusts, monopolies and combinations in restraint of trade a subsidy estimated at more than three billions of dollars per annum or twice as much as it will take to pay the soldiers' bonus in cash. For privilege everything; for the defenders of the country nothing!"

Gratified Not Criticized

"The president declares that no more important duty rests on the government than the adequate care of sick and disabled veterans and yet there is no word of representation for the grantees who have depended on the veterans bureau and have stolen or misappropriated funds which were set aside to take care of the sick and women who suffered the loss of health and become permanently injured in the service of the nation."

"The president offers no constructive thought on the railroad problem, perhaps the most important domestic problem confronting the nation. He generalizes somewhat vaguely about the value of consolidations and suggests that the railroads be given authority to voluntarily consolidate."

Mr. McAdoo declared the consolidation proposal of President Coolidge gives little promise of relief for the farmers particularly and for the people of the country, while the whole from the present excessive cost of railroad transportation."

Man Who Wrote Many Wills Did Not Write Own

WAKEFELD, Ill., Dec. 11. (AP)—Although Homer Cooke, said to be the oldest practicing attorney in the country at the time of his death last week, is claimed to have drawn more wills than any other lawyer, he failed to draw up one for his own estate.

Letters of administration filed here by his daughter, Miss Helen Cooke, who was named executrix, shows that the estate amounted to about \$4,000 personal property and a few small pieces of real estate. Mr. Cooke was 92 years old.

POSTPONE MEETING OF SENATE COMMITTEE ON NAVAL OIL LEASES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11. (AP)—The meeting of the senate public lands committee called for today to resume inquiry into leasing of naval oil reserves was postponed by chairman Smart when he received a physician's certificate declaring that former Secretary Albert B. Fall would not be able to attend.

The doctor's statement was telegraphed from New York, where Fall underwent an examination yesterday. The physician said Mr. Fall was suffering from a "severe run down condition, cough, loss of appetite" and added that a week's rest was considered necessary to obviate danger of the conditions becoming aggravated.

SPEAKERS DISCUSS VARIOUS FEATURES OF OIL INDUSTRY

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 11. (AP)—A score of speakers at today's session of the convention of the American Petroleum Institute discussed every phase of the oil industry from drilling equipment to proposed national sales campaigns to quicker interest in oil burning articles and implements.

Speakers included J. M. Johnston, chief expert of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad; E. M. Hornor, president of the Mahr Manufacturing Company; A. B. Hiten of The Texas Company; and C. H. Chalmers of the Chalmers Oil Burner Company.

Steps must be taken by the oil industry to maintain fuel stocks if the roads are to continue burning oil, Mr. Johnston said. Approximately 20 per cent of coal is used at present in non-tractive effort, but the use of oil overcomes this loss to a great extent, he asserted.

Mr. Hornor urged that the oil men cooperate in a national advertising campaign, asserting advertising creates "economy and efficiency."

Mr. Chalmers discussing the fuel properties of oil said it maintained a uniform temperature and suggested an "educational campaign" to popularize the use of oil for heating purposes.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 11. (AP)—Captain Richmond Pearson Hobson, Spanish-American war hero and prohibition crusader, was safe at home today after an experience which like his adventure in Santiago Bay last year surrounded with publicity but unscathed.

A windstorm and brush fire set the stage on which Captain Hobson unwittingly played the role of missing husband and father. He had gone into the hills with his brother, Major J. M. Hobson, and an investor from the district attorney's office in search of the major's son and his own who had failed to return from a hiking trip which expected.

After the three men were well out of reach of telephones the missing hope came home. Then Major Hobson became separated from his two companions, and when he could not find them again launched another search of the hills. High winds and a dangerous brush fire lent substance to the rumor that all was not well with Captain Hobson and his companions, but reports were proved unfounded when the men returned to their homes and knowing that a search had been started for them.

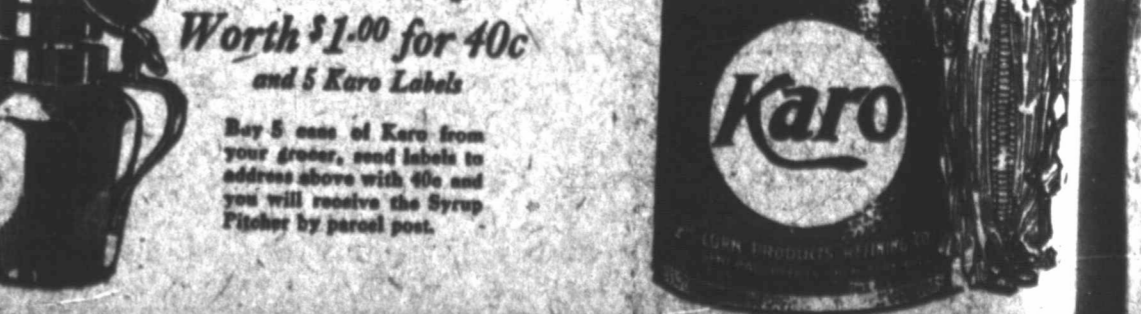

Cloudburst, heavy rains, and heavy snow have been reported by northwest Texas and southern Oklahoma cities during the past 24 hours.

Impassable roads and suspension of outdoor work are reported from all parts of this section, due to the heavy rainfall.

J. W. Lytle, in charge of the volunteer United States government weather bureau at the Wichita Falls Electric and Power plant, reported almost two inches of rain up to 11 o'clock Wednesday.

The government weather forecast for Wednesday night is cloudy and continued cold weather. Fair and slightly colder weather is the prediction for Thursday.

Inclement weather has delayed railroad traffic on all lines operating out of Wichita Falls. The heavy snow in the Panhandle and Denver lines and heavy rains and sleet are responsible for the late trains on other lines.

Trains Running Late. Fort Worth and Denver trains were running twelve to thirteen hours late Tuesday afternoon and one train was snowbound north of Amarillo.

Mr. Lytle's weather report Wednesday morning, covering the time since 8 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, showed that the maximum temperature was 34 degrees and the minimum 22 degrees.

Sherman Salesman Kidnaped and Robbed of \$200 at Durant, Okla.; Son Dies While Father Is Captive

ARDMORE, Okla., Dec. 12.—Official investigation was expected to be started here today into the alleged kidnaping of E. T. Arnold, a candy salesman from Sherman, Texas. He declared he was enticed from in front of a Durant theater Friday evening by a stranger and taken to an isolated spot several miles from town where two other men waited with an automobile.

The salesman was unable to say what territory his captors had traversed, declaring that he lost all sense of direction. He asserted that the aimless journey continued until yesterday when the three men came to a point three miles west of Waurika where without explanation they released him, handing him 145 and told him he was near a town where he could get a train for his home.

Arnold, who went to Durant to open up a new sales territory, has been sought by authorities throughout southern Oklahoma since his disappearance was discovered when he failed to keep an appointment with a client Saturday morning.
