

AMARILLO PASTOR ADDRESSES MEET OF ROTARY CLUB HERE

"The value of a man is not in a highly developed physique and body even if it is edged with high intellectual powers, but it is best exemplified in the high ideals found in this and other civic organizations of the city," said Dr. Milo Atkinson, pastor of the First Christian Church of Amarillo at the Rotary Club luncheon Thursday. This statement came as an answer to his question to the Rotarians, "What are you worth?"

As an example Dr. Atkinson told the story of a visit to a home for incurables in Tennessee. "Would you give your health and mental qualities for a certain amount of money to go and live in that home?" he asked. "Do you see the value in what you possess?"

"Your body probably does not have the strength and physical energy of a steer that is running around in the field or a mule may have more kick than does your good right arm, but all the power and strength must be guided by your intelligence."

Dr. Atkinson told of the many instances of highly educated and trained men in prison and out who've a menace to humanity because of these highly trained powers. In conclusion, he stated that the only method that has been found for the attainment of high ideals was the spirit of brotherhood. At the conclusion of his address it was moved and seconded that members of the Rotary Club give a rising vote of thanks to Dr. Atkinson for expressing so well the ideals of the organization.

POSTAL INSPECTORS TO INVESTIGATE ACTIVITIES OF CHICAGO ATTORNEY

CHICAGO, Dec. 12. (AP)—Two postal inspectors today were assigned to cooperate with representatives of the state's attorney in investigating the extent of the alleged swindle said to have netted Attorney Leo Koretz several millions.

A reported violation of the postal laws, said Chief Postal Inspector A. E. Garner, was based on the sending of dividend checks of the Koretz Oil Companies through the mails to stockholders.

High salaried executives hired by Koretz to go to Panama and take charge of the Bayano River Trust Company called back recently that they could locate no such company, land or oil development project and Koretz disappeared just before these reports came back.

A small safe in one of Koretz's offices contained nothing but a few worthless papers when opened by police today. The vault in the office, however, held 250 bottles of various kinds of choice liquors.

Koretz's alleged operations, according to Prosecutor Crews, divided those of Donald J. Rufus Wallingford of fiction.

WOMAN SPEAKER SAYS KLAN GREATEST MENACE

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Dec. 12. (AP)—The greatest menace to better relations between the negro and whites is the Ku Klux Klan, Mrs. W. C. Winborough, St. Louis, superintendent of the Women's Auxiliary of the Presbyterian church in the United States (south), declared in an address today before the meeting of the executive committee of the Federal Council of Churches.

She asserted it is "organized anarchy, breaking up homes, terrorizing communities, torturing and slaying victims and accomplishing its diabolical purpose with covered face."

"If it is not checked it will strike at the very life of our government," she declared, adding:

"This organization is reaching its terrible tentacles into every state in the union. The time for action has passed. If this monster is to be crushed it must be done by the Christian people of America."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—The Democratic organization of the house has selected Representative Guinn Williams of the thirteenth Texas district for a place on the agricultural committee. This is one of the major committees of that body and it is seldom that a member as comparatively new as Congressman Williams is thus honored. As this is a major committee he will not be entitled under the rules for the house to any other assignment. The committee assignments are to be confirmed at an early date.

Representative Marvin Jones of the Amarillo district who was a member of the agricultural committee during the last congress, relinquished his place on that committee and has been given assignment in the committee on Insular Affairs. This was done at his request and was prompted by the belief that the question of Philippine independence would prove an issue at an early date. In addition, by taking assignment on the committee, Congressman Jones will be entitled to membership on other minor committees.

AMARILLO WILL HAVE ANOTHER NEWSPAPER

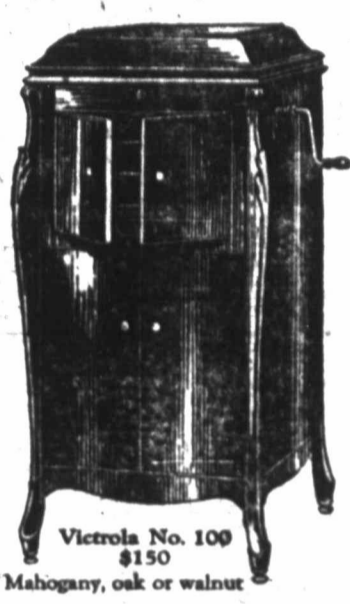

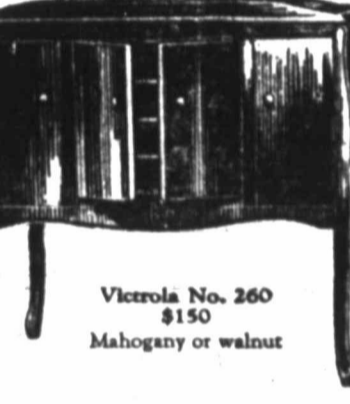

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Five Hundred Entries In Eighth Annual Show North Texas Poultry Association Opening Here Thursday

Five hundred birds were placed on exhibit at 115 Scott, at the opening of the eighth annual show of the North Texas Poultry Association in this city Thursday morning. Poultry of every breed and variety from the established strains to the newer and freak breeds are included in the show. Exhibitors are here from every section of Texas and a number of out of town poultrymen are represented. Some exhibitors were disappointed Thursday morning when they were unable to secure space and space in the exhibit, Guy Jones, secretary of the association, said. Many of the exhibitors in this immediate territory who have reserved space have been unable to bring their birds to the show on account of the weather. It is evident to the officials of the show that the show will demand a building of much larger dimensions next year.

E. H. Carver, superintendent of the show, said Thursday morning that one of the largest classes of Rhode Island Whites ever exhibited in a southern poultry show was on exhibit at the local show. Other classes are well represented. The show is attracting large crowds of local and out of town exhibitors and poultry breeders and fanciers. Wichita Falls is

well represented and judging, which started Thursday morning, showed that the local birds ranked favorably with the out of city competition. Adding to the attractiveness of the display a number of food product companies have installed booths and exhibits which should be of interest to poultry and stock breeders.

SUSPEND PROPOSED RAISE IN FREIGHT ON CEMENT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11. (AP)—Proposals of southwestern railroads to increase rates on cement from Ada, Okla., to points in Louisiana were nullified today by the Interstate Commerce Commission which suspended until April 15 next new rate schedules prepared to go into effect December 15. An investigation will be made of the rate situation during the suspension.

From Ada to Shreveport, La., at present rates on cement are 214 cents per 100 pounds, while to Alexandria, La., they are 22 cents, and to New Orleans 231 cents. The new schedule would make the charge hereafter to all three cities 251 cents per 100 pounds.

Episodes of Dramatic Intensity Beneath the Usual Placid Surface Feature Week in British Politics

By ROBERT J. BREW, U. S. Staff Correspondent. Copyright, 1924.

LONDON, Dec. 12. (AP)—Beneath the placid surface which always over-lays British politics, episodes of dramatic intensity have occurred this week. Paired with the prospect of the Labor party being entrusted with the destinies of the British Empire, King George courageously made it known to his advisers that he will not hesitate a moment to call upon Ramsey MacDonald and his followers to perform that task. I am informed that his majesty was far more ready than the majority of the Conservative party to make this unprecedented experiment in English history, and that he is particularly averse to summoning to the palace and entrusting the formation of a ministry to a Conservative successor to Premier Baldwin if the latter decides to resign. King George's view is that it would be both impolitic and unfair to seek to deprive the Labor party of the fruits of its successes in the recent election. However, from the moment that the Conservative cabinet, yesterday decided that Premier Baldwin ought to remain in office, the question of a labor ministry was shrouded in the mists of the present.

British merchants and industrialists are now more perturbed by the prospect of what a Labor government might be able to accomplish in the immediate future, than by what is actually possible. As a result of last week's elections Labor remains just as ineffective as the Liberals and although they are again the official opposition, they could not exist in power a single day without the active support of the Liberal party. As a matter of fact the Liberals represent industrial capitalism just as much as the Conservatives do. Therefore if circumstances next year place him in the position of premier, MacDonald would be instantly put in the minority the moment he proposed a capital levy, or the nationalization of industries. The present government will live on the tolerance of a controlling Liberal minority. A Labor government would be even more under the Liberal heel. An analysis of election figures demonstrates clearly that at least two-thirds of the voters opposed the Labor program. The total number of the electorate is 15,122,751. All but four seats are now filled, the Conservatives winning 253, Labor 172, Liberals 118, and other parties seven. The Conservatives received a total of 5,506,697 votes; the Laborites 4,472,973, and the Liberals 4,193,770. Nearly 2,400,000 failed to vote and there was a 1,000,000 majority against capital levy and the nationalization of the industries. Individual Service today supplied the following official definition of the Labor party's present attitude on both these questions: "We propose a non-recurring levy beginning at one per cent on incomes of \$10,000 rising in a graduated scale to fifty per cent on fortunes in excess of \$1,000,000. All fortunes below \$25,000 to be exempt. This is the plan devised by Labor experts, but would be modified, if necessary, by treasury officials to make it workable, but without sacrificing the underlying principles. Glands.

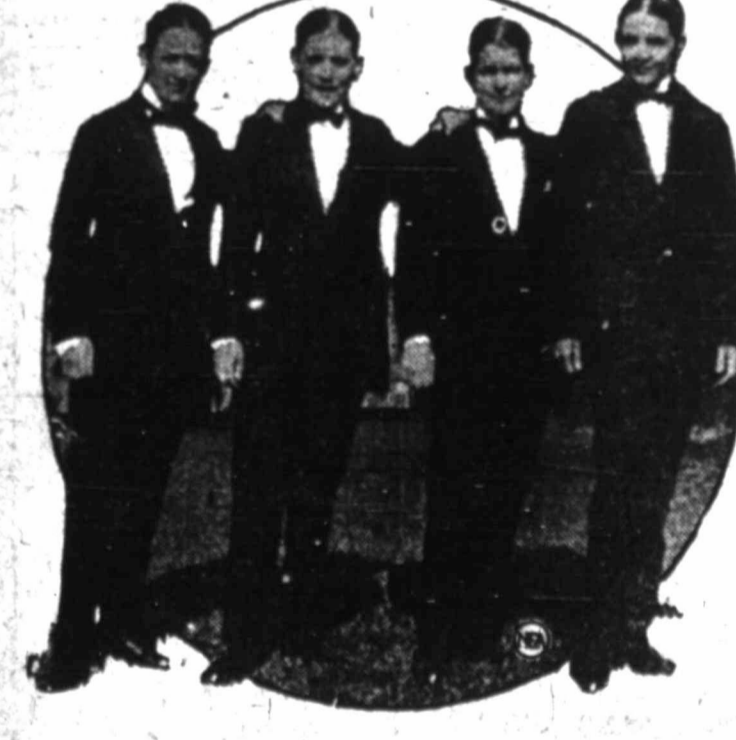

PARAMOUNT ISSUE IN MASSACHUSETTS GOVERNOR PINCHOT

SUCH IS THE SITUATION THAT
WILL FACE SENATOR
JOHNSON.

HAVE PRIDE AND FAITH IN MASSACHUSETTS SON

California Senator Expected to Center
Attack On Districts
in Boston.

BOSTON, Dec. 12.—What Hiram Johnson comes into Massachusetts to fight President Coolidge he will find one of the most interesting political issues. That issue is pride in Massachusetts and faith in Massachusetts. There is not one of the 16 districts in this state where there is any present probability of Johnson getting the delegates as against Massachusetts' own son. If Johnson is to get any delegates from this state he must accomplish what is unquestionably the situation as it stands today, and the writer cannot find any observer here who is able to imagine any future circumstances likely to change this situation, except in the direction of solidifying it into a firm front against the invader. There is no political leader whatever, and no other person or any substitute likely to be willing to stand as a candidate for delegate to the national convention in behalf of Johnson. Any one who should do this would be courting political, social and business ostracism in his own community.

The belief here is that Johnson's manager will pick out one district here in Boston where the normal Republican vote is very small, and have Johnson personally make speeches in it and otherwise concentrate on it with the hope of winning two out of Massachusetts' 16 delegates, and proclaim this to the world for whatever damage it might do to Mr. Coolidge's prestige. But, even as to this one district, competent observers say that so great is the local pride in having a Massachusetts' son in the White House that the Democratic votes in the district would go into the Republican precincts to elect Johnson.

There are some critics of Mr. Coolidge in Massachusetts, chiefly because of disappointment over his anti-union stand, for virtually all the leading newspapers, both conservative and radical have been in favor of the bonus and have taught a considerable portion of the people to favor it. Coolidge's critics, however, are not so numerous as they are in other parts of the state. In fact, the only group of delegates, which would be a serious threat to his position, is the group of delegates from New England, Johnson does not stand to get more than ten, at the outside. It would be safer to bet that Johnson will get no delegates from New England than to bet that he will get fifteen.

Under these circumstances, since the amount of time and energy necessary to get Johnson delegates from New England could be so much more profitably expended in the west or the middle west, it is necessary to find a motive for Johnson's invasion of Massachusetts and New England other than the number of delegates he can get. That motive is taken to be the desirability from Johnson's standpoint, of setting up a counter demonstration designed to prevent Mr. Coolidge's election in California. An agent of Johnson's organization, who is an able and resourceful politician of the old time type, is already at work in California and may have some success in selected districts, but of the 100 delegates from New England, Johnson does not stand to get more than ten, at the outside. It would be safer to bet that Johnson will get no delegates from New England than to bet that he will get fifteen.

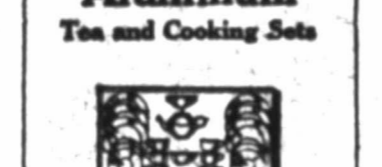

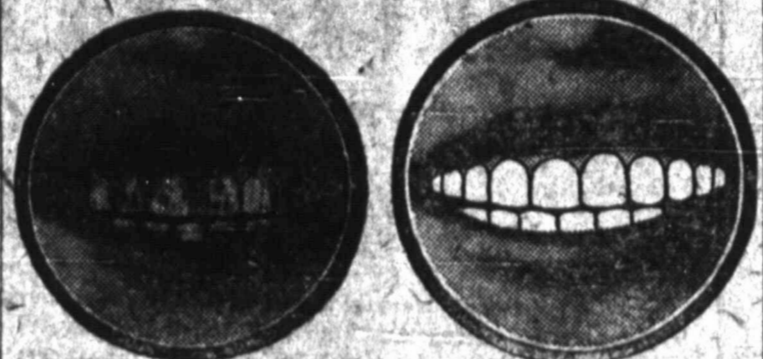

Mr. Ebbets like all the other baseball magnates, is in baseball for profit. The amount he offered for Hornsby is more money, that is, more profit, than his club could possibly make in a most prosperous season, under any conditions.

The baseball gentlemen are commencing to rave insanely. In Republican Pennsylvania the new state boxing commission has prohibited "mixed bouts." "Mixed bouts" are boxing bouts between white men and colored American citizens.

The Republican governor of Pennsylvania may be greatly interested in this ruling against a large number of his supporters. Oddly enough, one of the members of the new Pennsylvania boxing commission is a colored man. Of course, he had nothing to say about the ruling.

The South American Boxing Federation presents Luis Angel Firpo with a diploma for his "exploits in the United States." That is interesting news. It proves that there are in South America persons as lacking in a sense of the importance of things as there are in this country.

Scores of South Americans have come to the United States and performed exploits in business, in art, in science, infinitely more important than the knocking out of Jess Willard and Charley Weiner, or being knocked out in two rounds by Jack Dempsey.

For a long time Firpo's home city, Buenos Aires, one of the most beautiful cities in all the world, prohibited boxing. Today a telegram announced that the city council had approved an ordinance permitting boxing. Presently you will read of exciting bouts from the Argentine for American heavyweights to come there to meet "the Wild Bull."

There are but two heavyweights in America at this time, not including Dempsey, who can give Firpo a struggle. They are Harry Hills, first of the heavyweight title contenders, and Tom Gibbons, of St. Paul, who ranks second among the contenders, or third in the whole heavyweight line, which begins with Dempsey.

Wife Says She Killed Husband In Self Defense

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—The Rev. Dr. William Norman Guthrie, rector of St. Marks in the Bowery, and his vestrymen have been summoned by Bishop William T. Manning of the Episcopal diocese of New York to explain the dancing entertainment given by parish girls at recent festivals of the congregation. Reports were published that the girls were scantily clad.

Bishop Manning wrote he was "greatly shocked and scandalized by reports in the newspapers which I fear have not altogether been exaggerated." The dances were given at two entertainments. At one girls were costumed to represent the signs of the zodiac, and at another Greek classical dances were a part of the program.

MOSCOW, Dec. 13.—The government has decided to carry about a boycott against Switzerland because of the acquittal of the Swiss engineer, Maurice Conradi, charged with the assassination at Leningrad last May of M. Vorovsky, soviet representative, and has instructed the soviet representatives abroad to grant no visas to Swiss citizens. Meanwhile the Russian authorities will investigate the whereabouts of Swiss residing in Russia with a view to their expulsion.

Russia will also boycott all Swiss goods and will require a certificate of origin of goods suspected to be of Swiss origin. The northern New York bootlegger is bold and not ashamed of his identity. 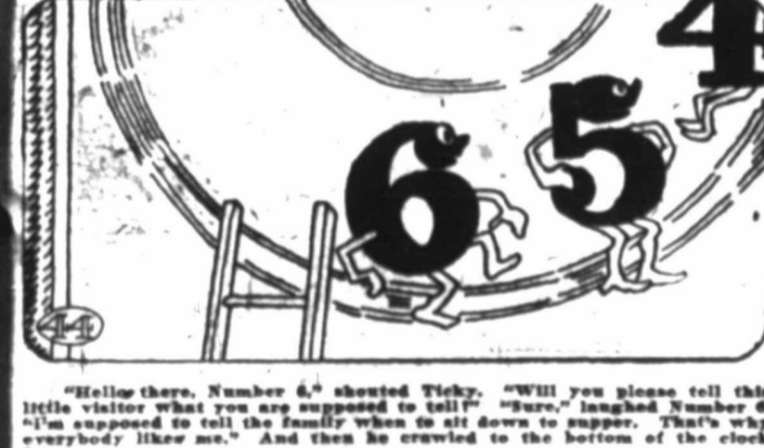

DECREASE 76,850 IN DAILY AVERAGE OIL PRODUCTION

NORTH TEXAS FIELD HAS A DECLINE OF 3900 BARRELS LAST WEEK.

CENTRAL TEXAS DISTRICT HAS LOSS OF 54,950

No Change in Prices in the Major Districts of the Midcontinent Field.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13. (AP)—The daily average gross crude oil production of the United States decreased 76,850 barrels for the week ending December 13, according to a summary of the American Petroleum Institute. A reduction of 54,950 barrels in the daily average production of the Powell field in Texas accounts for most of the decrease. Daily average production was 1,277,500 barrels, a decrease of 54,950; California production was 728,350 barrels, decrease of 18,400; Oklahoma shows a daily average production of 557,700 barrels, a decrease of 1,450; Kansas 71,150, increase 200; Texas 61,600, decrease 1,500; central Texas 221,500, decrease 5,000; north Louisiana 54,450, increase 900; Arkansas 119,400, decrease 4,500; Gulf coast 52,900, decrease 1,500; eastern 115,000, increase 500; Wyoming and Montana 155,850, increase 7,250.

Daily average imports of petroleum at principal ports for the month of November were 226,713 barrels compared with 224,423 for October and for the week ended December 13, 244,200 barrels compared with 226,419 for the previous week.

There were no changes reported in crude oil prices for the major districts, midcontinent being quoted from 15 cents to 15.50 a barrel, according to the gravity of the oil; Pennsylvania crude, Bradford district, 21.50 and other grades 22.50, and gulf coast 15, California crude ranged from 60 cents to 16 cents a barrel.

(AP)—Henry Ford will be nominated for president whether he desires to be or not, it was unanimously decided at a meeting here last night at which a national Ford for President Club was organized by a score of supporters of the automobile manufacturer. The group representing nine states is meeting again today. Roy E. Harrop of Omaha, Neb., was elected president of the club. At the conclusion of the meeting it was announced that no plans had been made as to how Mr. Ford would be nominated or whether he would be nominated on the Democratic or a third party ticket.

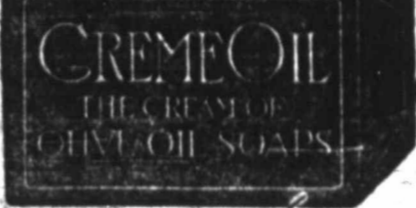
