

Many of the people at that time were Druids, or treeworshippers. The oak was one of their sacred trees, and because the mistletoe clung to the oak, creeping and twisting itself up the trunk and along the branches, it was celebrated with song on a holy day during the season of frost.





Possum Is Pouched

The opossum is found in the United States in the region known as the Cotton Belt. A full-grown opossum is about eighteen inches long, of a grizzly gray color with a bare, scaly tail like a rat. The opos-sum is the only fur-bearing animal that is pouched. In the Spring the mother produces from six to sixteen young ones which she places in her pouch. She carries them for about two months, or until they are the size of mice and able to take care of themselves.
