FORD WILL HAVE OPPOSITION WHEN HE SUBMITS BID

TENNESSEE AND ALABAMA COMPANIES TO MAKE JOINT OFFER.

CONGRESSMEN CHARGE IT WOULD CREATE MONOPOLY

Senator Shields Has Proposal Designed to Protect the Territory Affected.

By Universal Service: WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—Henry Ford will have opposition when his bid for the Tennessee and Alabama power project is submitted to the war department and congress.

Information has reached Washington that a joint bid for the big Tennessee river power project will be submitted by the Alabama Power Company and the Tennessee Electric Power Company.

These two companies operate in the territory of Alabama and Tennessee that would be served directly by the Muscle Shoals development.

They also have physical connections with the Georgia Railway and Power Company and through it with the Southern Power Company, operating in Georgia and the Carolinas.

The Alabama company, which recently purchased the Gorgas Steam plant and transmission lines, which Ford bought in his original bid, was a bidder for Muscle Shoals last year, after Ford had submitted his offer.

The Tennessee company is a new factor in bidding for Muscle Shoals.

WEATHER HOKUM.

Old-time superstitions about the weather are being exploded one after the other. The latest exposure is the tradition that rain follows a big battle.

The Weather Bureau in Washington, D. C., admits that rain often follows a battle, in the ordinary course of events, just as it often follows a dog fight, a baseball game or a bridge party. But that's just chance, and the rain would have come, battle or no battle.

How did people first get the notion that rain followed battles? Probably because troop movements, preceding a battle, are best carried out during fair weather, a dry spell. And the dry spell naturally comes before a rain.

One might just as well reason that fair weather precedes a battle.

Maybe you were raised on a farm and acquired a lot of superstition about the moon's effect on weather. Many generations of soil tillers always planted seed in "the dark of the moon."

The Weather Bureau again steps in, and says modern science "is unable to find any evidence that the moon affects the weather to any appreciable extent."

The movements of our atmosphere generate our weather changes. These movements represent the dissipation or using up of a great amount of energy in the form of heat. This heat comes from the sun. The moon is a cold dead planet and sends no heat to us. So it can't influence the weather noticeably.

The moon, pulling on the earth, does cause a tide in the air, same as it causes ocean tides. But delicate measurements show that this moon-caused air tide is insignificant in its effects.

Weather is regulated by the sun, almost entirely.

IT HAPPENED IN MAINE.

Maine is one of the original thirteen colonies which formed the American Union. Some of the first settlements in America were in that colony.

The descendants of these early settlers are the present inhabitants of that state. There is probably a smaller percentage of foreign born residents in Maine than in any other state today in the Union.

Up near the village of Damariscotta it is said a few days ago a maniacal fellow slew his wife, her aunt and her grandmother, then the wife and son of the sheriff, and then took his own life. Barred from the village cemetery his body was buried on an adjoining farm. On the night of Christmas day unknown persons exhumed his body and burned it in the cottage where he had killed the three women.

One motive in explanation of the burning of the body is that a tradition was current in that community that when a body is burned the act gives rest to the spirit of the deceased which would otherwise return as a "hant." But the more probable explanation is that the body was exhumed and burned in a rage of elemental passion.

Remember, this happened in Maine, a state inhabited almost exclusively by colonial stock. Its civilization ought to be of the highest. It has been hundreds and even thousands of years in building up. Yet in a moment we see it thrown back hundreds and even thousands of years to an act of superstition, ignorant savagery. It is such acts that cause us to pause and consider how thin is the veneer of civilization laid over us.

"WE HOPE IT WILL BE HELPFUL."

Now comes the news that the League of Nations is to undertake the financial rehabilitation of Hungary. If the league is as successful with Hungary as it is reported to have been with Austria it will certainly be performing a useful service.

We can all remember the dreadful plight of Austria following the end of the war. The nation was in bankruptcy. Its most productive territories had been cut off. There was demoralization, disorder and disorganization everywhere. The people faced chaos, starvation and anarchy. But the League of Nations stepped in. It placed a kind of receivership in charge of Austria's finances. It advanced a loan. Austria's budgets were balanced. Conditions began to improve and have steadily improved since. Austria today is far from being in the worst condition of the countries of Europe.

Now something of the same sort of aid is to be extended Hungary. All of us must hope that it will be helpful in no less measure than it has been for Austria, but hoping is the limit of our participation, as President Coolidge said, in reference to the League of Nations, "we hope it will be helpful."

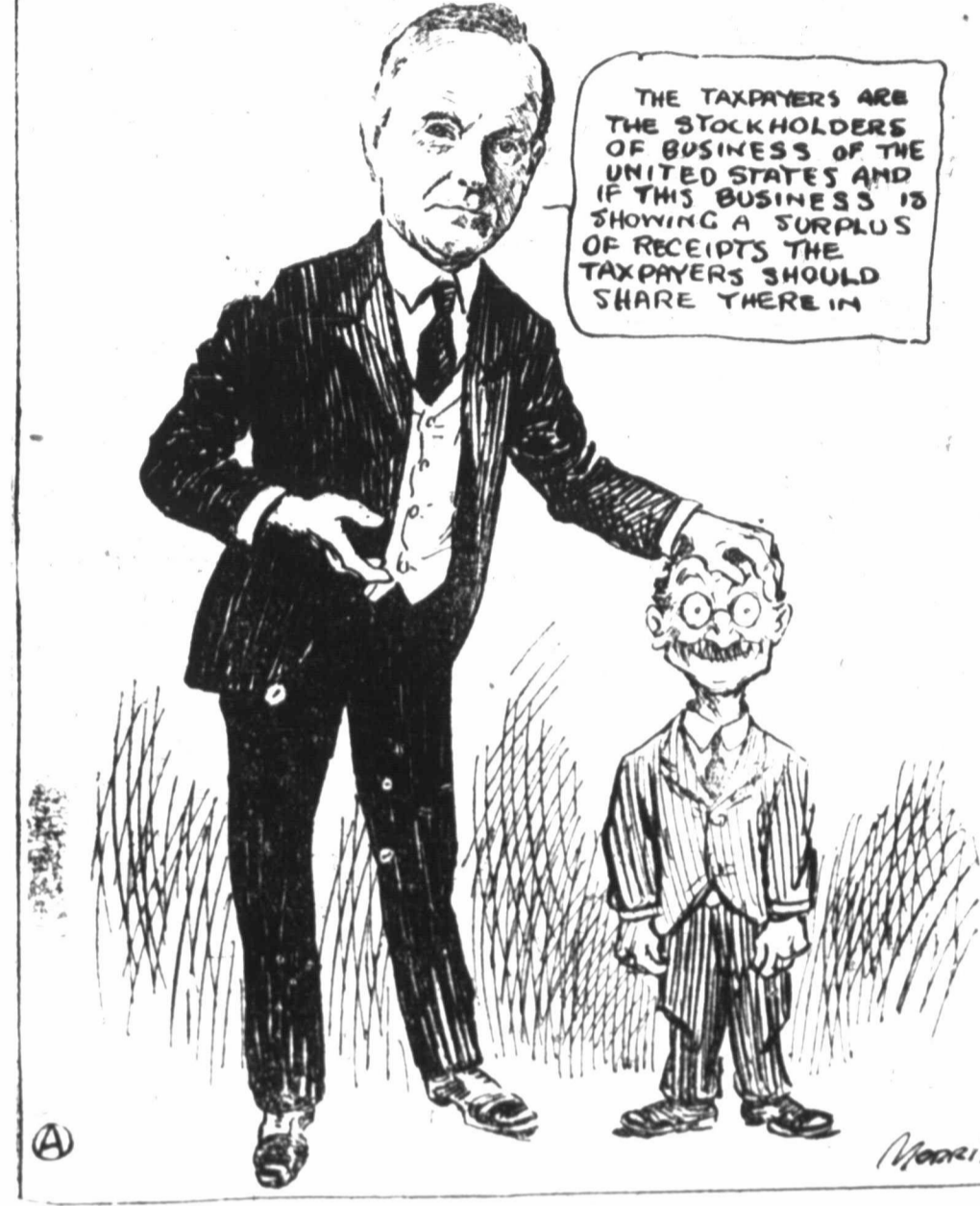

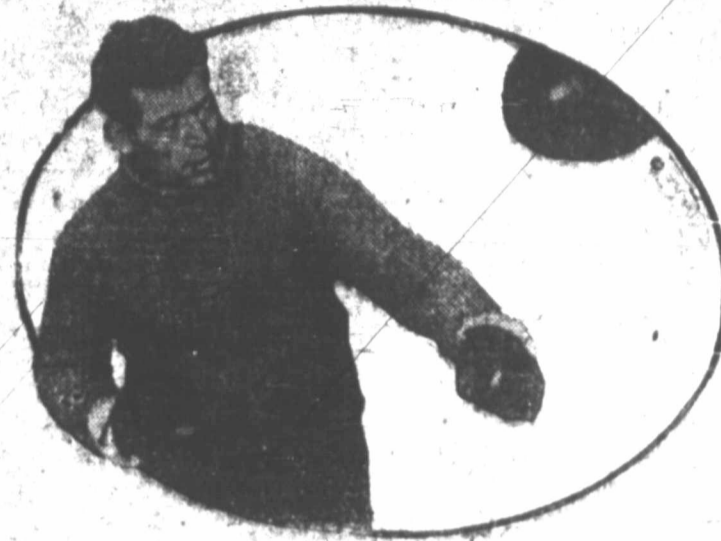

Burkburnett Association to Give Two Day Dog Races at New Park On January 12 and 13 for Big Stakes

A two-day race has been planned by the Burkburnett Coursing Association for January 12 and 13 to be staged at the new regulation coursing park, located just south of Burkburnett on the paved highway. Big stakes will be offered for each day's race.

On the opening day a prize of \$200 has been offered for the winners in a 24-dog all-age race, which has already drawn some of the fastest dogs in this section of Texas and southern Oklahoma.

On January 13, in addition to a number of side features a 12-dog, 1923 (utility) race will be run for which a prize of \$145 has been posted.

Every dog that is being entered in these races is registered stock, some representing the best breed of dogs in the country.

Since the new coursing park was opened six weeks ago, lovers of sport in Wichita county have been attracted to these races and record crowds have been in attendance each day. The park is of regulation size and is so constructed as to give the jack rabbits the best chance in the world for escape.

The rabbits which will be used in the races on January 12 and 13 are "old heads" so to speak as quite a number of them have led a pair of dogs across the straightaway a half dozen times, each time slipping through the holes and leaving his pursuers behind yelping and barking.

Everyone of the rabbits which will be used in the races in January have already been at the park for the past ten days. Each day the rabbits are run over the course in order to get them acquainted with the lay of the ground and the slip holes through which they can pass and be safe from harm.

In a recent race only four rabbits out of 24 lost their lives. The fact that the rabbits have more than an even break to get away from the dogs has helped considerably in attracting the attention of hundreds of people. In many instances strange rabbits are run over the courses and even though slip holes are provided, a frightened rabbit never finds the holes and consequently the sport of the game is marred by the mutilation of every rabbit.

The slip-aways are so constructed as to guarantee safety from the pursuing dogs.

The Burkburnett park is said to be one of the best in the country and has already attracted the attention of dog owners from three states.

GOOD PROGRESS BY SUB-COMMITTEE ON TAX REDUCTION BILL

CLEAR THE WAY FOR SPEEDY ACTION FOLLOWING HOLIDAYS.

HAVE AGREED ON TWO IMPORTANT SECTIONS

Plan to Lift Out Administration Features and Report in Separate Bill.

By WINDER R. HARRIS, U. S. Staff Correspondent. WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—Good progress is being made by the voluntary sub-committee of the house ways and means committee in sorting out the administrative features of the Mellon tax reduction bill. The purpose was to clear the way for speedy action when the whole committee resumes consideration of the measure after the holidays.

Thursday the sub-committee will consider a recommendation to the whole committee on the feasibility of lifting out the administrative features and reporting them to the house in a separate bill, leaving the actual cuts in tax rates recommended by the administration for a second measure. Sentiment was said by sub-committee members to be strongly in favor of this course.

The first reason for such action, it was explained, was that there are no serious differences of opinion among the Republicans, Democrats and Progressives on this part of the Mellon plan, which would insure early action on a separate bill.

Secondly, it was said by following this procedure the senate and the finance committee on that side, which, under the constitution, must await action by the house on all revenue and tariff legislation, would be given something to begin work on while the house was completing the remainder of the program. When the house later shall pass the bill embodying the second half of the Mellon proposal—the actual reduction in income and other tax rates—the senate, it was pointed out, could very easily combine the two measures. Or, if the tax cuts met with a prolonged fight and appeared in any serious danger, which is not now expected, the administrative bill could be put through separately. This would simplify and facilitate the operation of the present law and give the treasury \$60,000,000 in additional revenue by stopping up loop holes for evasions.
