COSTS OF CITY GOVERNMENT.

On another page in this issue is printed some statistics concerning the cost of city government in Wichita Falls and also a dispatch showing the averages of 261 cities of over 30,000 population. The statistics, which are for the year 1922, show that the per capits cost of city government in Wichita Falls, which includes the public schools, was \$42.11 against an average of \$57.38 per capita in the 261 cities for which statistics have been compiled by the government. Our per capita cost is therefore \$15.27 under the average. While complete statistics are not yet available it is believed that the per capita cost for 1935 will be less than for 1922.

In indebtedness, too, Wichita Falls is well below the per capita average. The average per capita intos for the 261 cities was \$93.42 while that for Wichita Falls was \$66.81, or \$26.61 under the

One feature about the report from Wichita Falls that is not so satisfactory is the excess of expendiits in Wichita Falls. It is largely explained in expenditures for water extensions and other public improvements. But while Wichita Falls was spending more than her revenues the same was true of almost every other city, the per capita average of expenditures in excess of revenues for the 261 cities us who are so much higher favored, being \$5.65) In Wichita Falls an earnest, sober effort is being made to balance budgets and it is believed that the report for 1923 will show a great improvement over 1922 in this particular.





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
